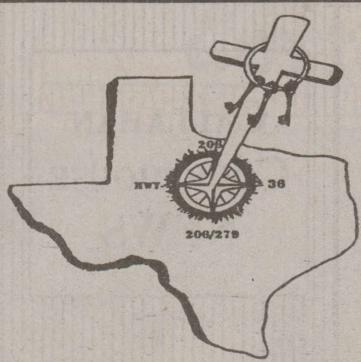

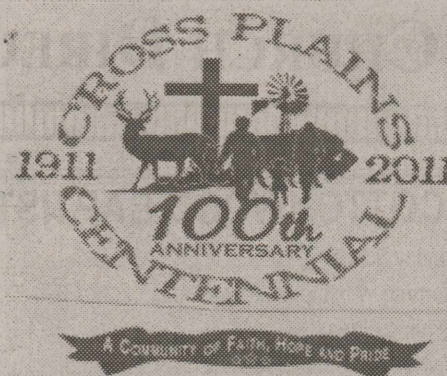

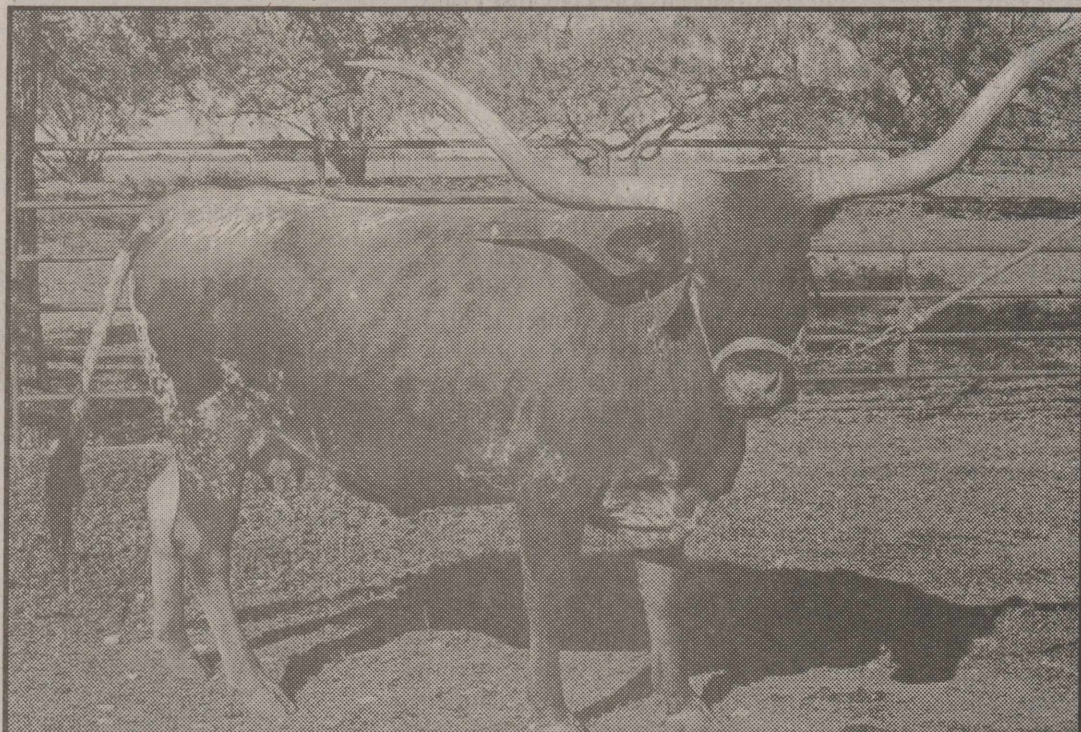

The Chamber had many door prizes that were given away by drawing tickets of the attendees.

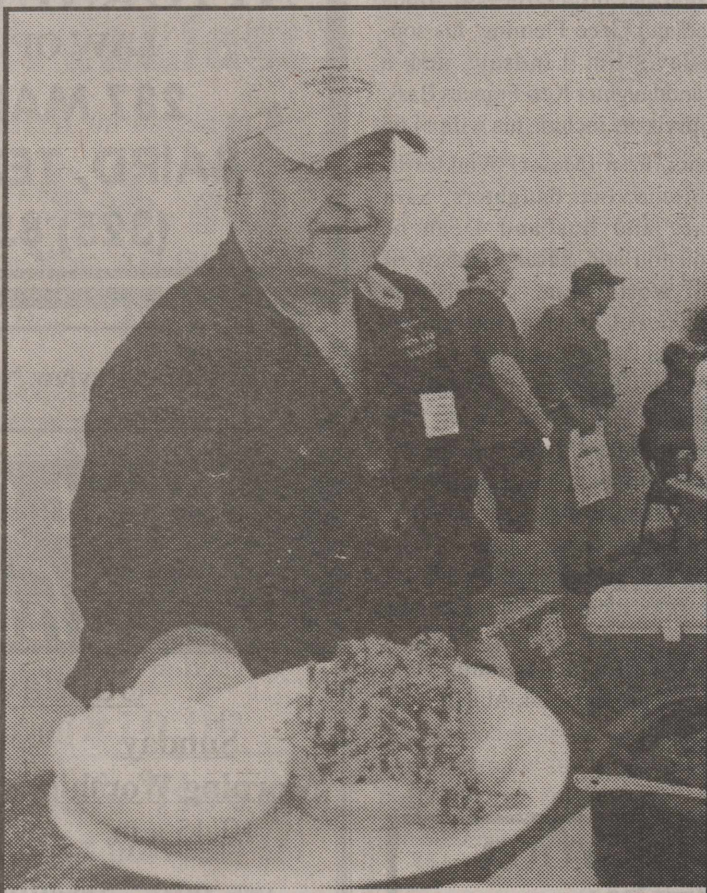
The weather was beautiful and everyone had a great time.

Historic Rocket Launch on Friday, November 9th

Seventh and eighth grade students at Cross Plains Middle School are about to make history on Friday, November 9th. As part of the NASA "Summer of Innovation" Mini-Grant Program, students have spent class time each week building ammonium perchlorate composite propelled rockets which will be launched in nearby Burkett. The public is not only invited, but ENCOURAGED to attend this historical event! If you have never been to the launch site and need directions, see below, or just meet at the school and follow the busses, which will be leaving Cross Plains I.S.D. at 8:00 a.m.

The Cross Plains Public Library was awarded the \$2,500 grant for students to design-build-launch their own rockets under the watchful eyes of Pat Gordzelik and science teacher Rhonda Kelley. Students have finished

their design phase and most of the building phase. Two days before launch, the eight team captains (teams are comprised of 4 seventh-grade teams and 4 eighth-grade teams) will fill out the FAA paperwork necessary for the launch, first checking the effects that the weather will have on their rockets, and then predicting how high their rocket will go before it reaches apogee. On launch day, the altimeters will be put in place and the team whose rocket comes closest to their prediction (and lands safely) will be declared the winner.

Also on launch day, team members will have specific duties to perform on their checklist, before approval for launch is given. Even the smallest mistake could result in the rocket spiraling out of control (heads up, everyone!) or crashing to the ground. Team captains oversee

the checklist of items, while one member "chains" the harnesses, another folds and attaches the parachutes, and others assist Gordzelik with attaching the altimeters and ignition to the rocket. Team members will draw stones to determine who gets to ignite the rocket.

Across the nation, similar high school programs have participated in the same activity, and it pushes the students involved to the limit. But key in the Cross Plains ISD program is the age of the students (7th and 8th grade), as compared to the usual senior 12th grade

Billie Jean Calhoun, 84, passed away on Wednesday, October 31, 2012, in Midland after a lengthy illness. In spite of her fixed income, she managed to put a few dollars in every one of them. Even though she had lost one eye several years ago and was barely able to see out of her remaining eye, she continued to crochet up until her death, making the stitches only by the feel of the needle and yarn.

In addition, Billie had an amazing love for animals. She always had a least one dog and no animal was ever treated more royally, nor loved more.

When in Hamilton, she was an active member of Calvary Baptist Church where she enjoyed attending the Ruth Sunday School class. She also loved attending the activities at the Special Care Center in Hamilton and meeting new friends there.

She was also a huge fan of older movies, and when anyone in the family had a question about an actor or actress from yesteryear, Billie was the one to ask. Her memory of such things was astounding.

She was preceded in death by her parents, as well as her husband, Russell, after 43 years of marriage, and an infant son, Charles Jay.

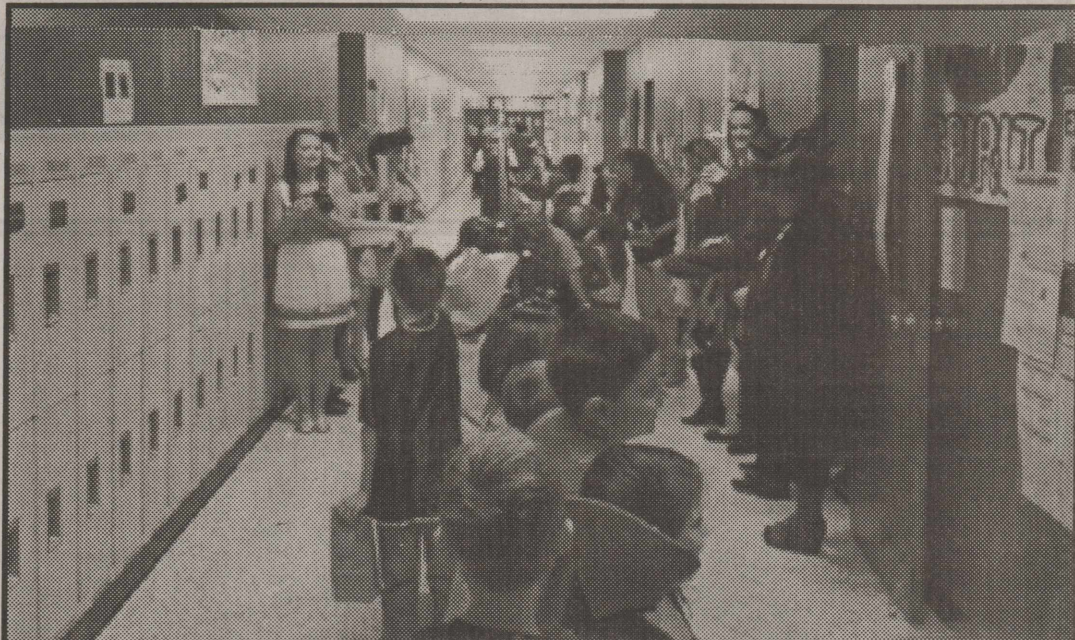

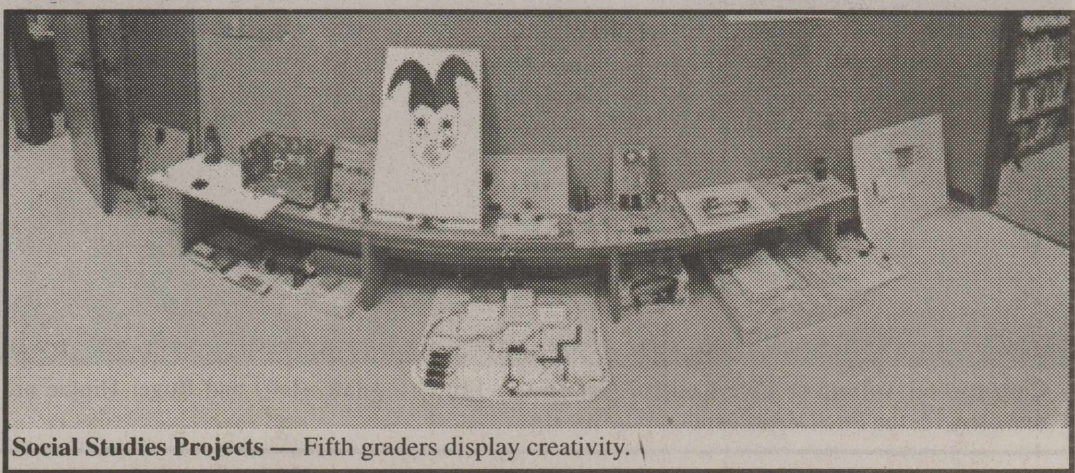

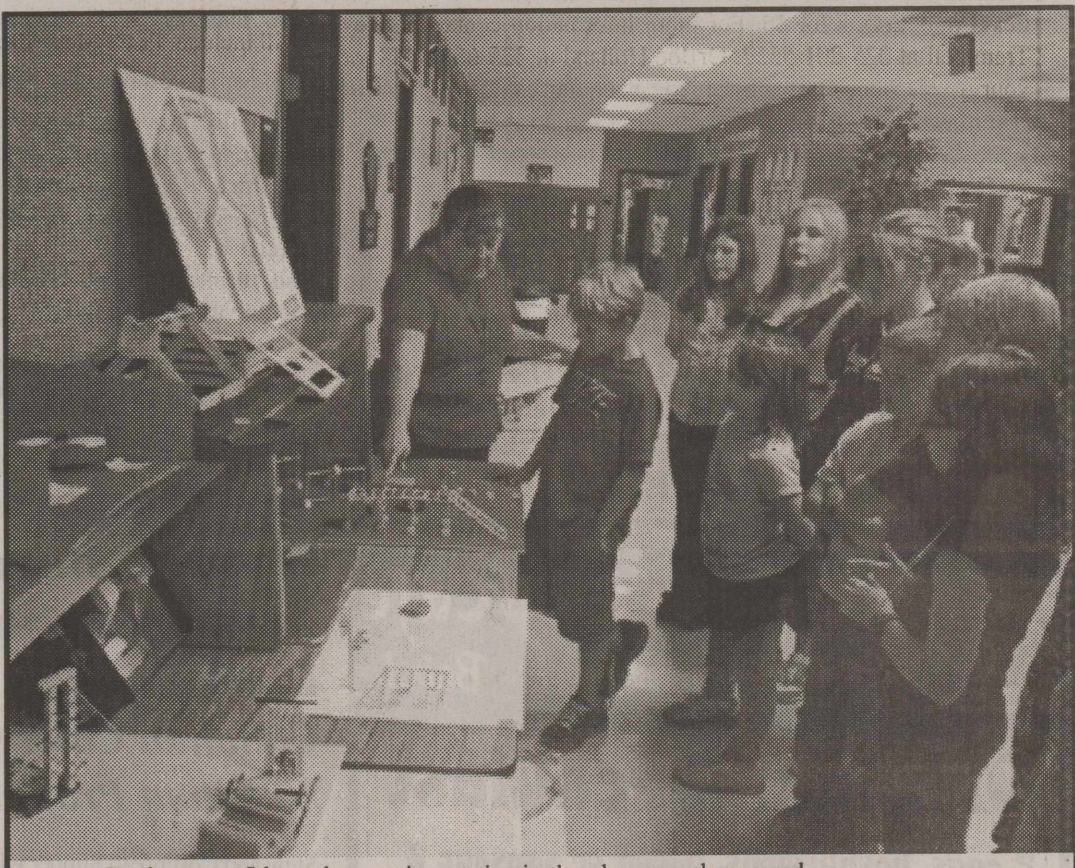

Cross Plains Buffaloes Fall to #3 Albany

The Cross Plains Buffaloes dropped their second district game to the #3 state ranked Albany Lions. The Lions offense proved to be too much as the final tally read Albany 73, Cross Plains 23. Blake Hutchins ran the ball well carrying the ball 28 times for 167 yards and two touchdowns. Hutchins added two extra points as well as a 32 yard field goal with 3 seconds left in the first half.

Highlights of the night included a 90 yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Tristen Stephenson to junior tight end Josh Branch on the third play of the game.

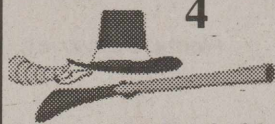

The **October Teacher and Students of the Month** have been chosen. **Deanna Golson** was chosen by her peers to be

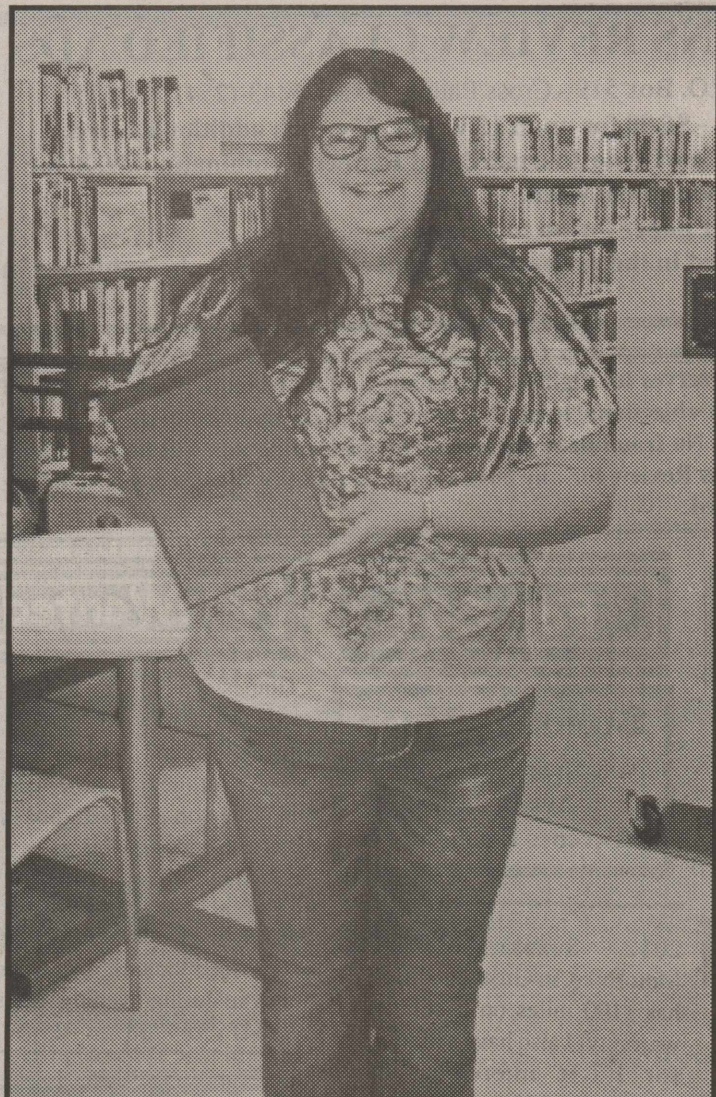

requirement), and the recovery details. Most programs use what is called a "motor ejection" for recovery. But the Cross Plains program instruction to the students is to install a "brain" in their rockets.

This device is an electronic altimeter that, when set to parameters and correctly installed in an on board "avionics bay" built by the students, will sample the atmosphere differences during powered ascent, and deploy their parachutes electronically. The difference in these two procedures in huge, resulting in a 98 percent accuracy electronically, as opposed to; at best, 55 percent mechanically, and that is usually by experienced users only.

The NASA Summer of Innovation (SoI) program is designed to support student interest in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) by strengthening the capacity of organizations or schools that inspire and engage female, minority or high poverty middle school students in STEM

content. The SoI focuses on organizations that provide student experiences during the summer and thorough extended learning efforts designed to keep students involved in NASA-themed STEM activities during the academic year.

Our thanks to Higginbotham's for donating the paint for the rockets and to Texas Heritage Bank for helping sponsor this event. In case of inclement weather, launch will be rescheduled for the following Friday, November 16th. Directions to Jim Burkett's ranch (launch site): *At the blinking red light in Cross Plains, go south on Hwy 206 for 1.1 miles, then veer to the right at the Y intersection and continue on Hwy 206 for 12 miles to FM 2806. Proceed right (west) on FM 2806 .8 miles to County Road 166, and veer left for .7 miles. There is a gate to the left, go through it, turn right, and drive to the launch sight area.*

"VETERANS DAY" is a national observance honoring all American military veterans, living or dead, but especially living veterans who served their country honorably during war and peacetime. It is always on November 11 because the World War I armistice was declared on the 11th hour on the 11th day on the 11th month in 1918. Its purpose is to recognize America's military veterans for their patriotism, love of Country and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good of the United States.

Veterans are patriotic men and women who have served our Country in the United States Armed Forces. A veteran includes anyone who has served honorably with the length of service being immaterial. The official spelling of Veterans Day is the attributive with no apostrophe rather than the possessive case with an apostrophe (i.e., Veteran's Day or Veterans' Day is not correct).

Every Veterans Day an official wreath-laying ceremony is held at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. Parades, celebrations, ceremonies and other events honoring veterans are held throughout the Country.

Baird High School recognizes and honors local veterans and their families each year with a special program and luncheon at the school. It will be held this year on Friday, November 9th, and commendably demonstrates student patriotism as well as student veteran support at its best.

Veterans Day should not be confused with Memorial Day which is a national observance on the last Monday in May that honors all deceased military veterans who sacrificed their lives in the service of our Country. There is an annual area Memorial Day celebration

at historic Belle Plaine Cemetery south of Baird.

Here are some facts about our Veteran population:

9.2 million veterans are over 65. 1.9 veterans are under 35. 1.8 million veterans are women. 5.2 million are Gulf War veterans. 7.8 million are Vietnam veterans. 2.8 million are Korean veterans. 2.6 million are World War II veterans. 6 million veterans served in peacetime. 2.9 million veterans have service-connected disabilities. 1.7 million veterans reside in Texas.

There is a solemn yet special bond between all surviving veterans as a result of our shared military experiences, including the loss of comrades killed during wartime. We truly believe the privilege of serving our Country to be one of the greatest experiences of our lives and one for which we were blessed, remain grateful and will never forget. We also remember well every day of our lives the fact that some of us gave all and all of us gave some.

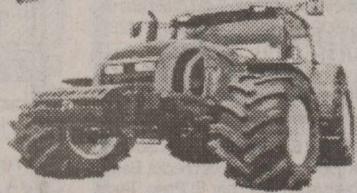

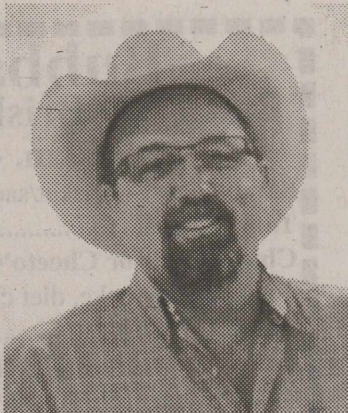
TxDOT recognizes employees for safety

Be aware of wildfire threat during hunting season

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — With hunting season under way and some areas of the state still recovering from last year's drought, Texas Forest Service officials are urging caution for those heading outdoors.

Hunters should refrain from building campfires and burning debris during windy or dry conditions. More than 90 Texas counties currently are under a burn ban.

Keep in mind the following wildfire safety tips:

- If there is no burn ban in place and conditions are right, you may safely build a campfire. But keep the fire small, never leave it unattended and remove flammable leaves and

other materials from the area surrounding the fire.

- Make sure the fire is extinguished and cold to the touch before you leave it.

- Clear combustible materials and vegetation away from your camp house to reduce the likelihood of a wildfire to spread.

- Keep water nearby when welding on stands.

- Drive only on designated trails. Don't park or idle vehicles in tall, dry grass, which can be ignited by contact with a hot muffler.

- Use caution with cigarettes and matches.

- Use spark arresters on all power equipment.

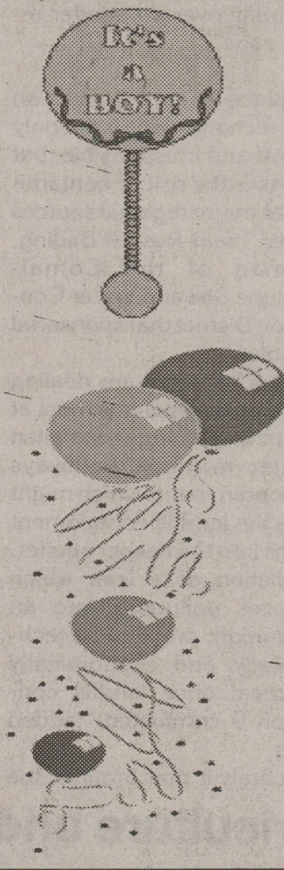

Water conservation districts Concerned About Landfills Over Recharge Zones

Temple, TX (November 1, 2012)—Planning and constructing a landfill over any aquifer recharge zone is a big “no, no” according to Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs).

SWCD directors representing 216 Texas SWCDs attending their 72nd Annual Meeting October 29-31 in Bastrop approved a resolution to seek legislation that would bar the construction of a landfill over an aquifer recharge zone.

“To place a landfill over an aquifer recharge zone is not only negligent and irresponsible, but it increases the risk of contamination to major regional sources of water,” said Russell Bading, Chairman of the Comal-Guadalupe Soil and Water Conservation District that sponsored the resolution.

“The problem we are dealing with is that an aquifer is most at risk within its recharge zone when rainwater recharge pathways carry contaminants which might escape the landfill containment systems into the deeper aquifer. Remediation of a leak which introduces pollutants into an aquifer might prove to be technologically and economically impractical once landfill construction is completed,” added Bading.

The catalyst that brought the

issue to the forefront of Texas SWCDs is that the Carrizo-Wilcox Aquifer to the south and east of San Antonio provides water to 60 counties including Bexar County.

According to Bading, a proposal to build a landfill on a 1,125 acre tract of land in eastern Guadalupe County near Seguin should be of major concern to all Texans because what happens over the Carrizo-Wilcox Aquifer Recharge Zone should not only be of interest to residents of San Antonio, but to all citizens in the state.

“The irony here is that current state law only prohibits the location of landfills over the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone. The Carrizo-Wilcox Aquifer Recharge Zone doesn’t have the same protection under state law,” said Bading.

According to the Texas Water Development Board, (TWDB) data, since the 1970s, groundwater consistently has accounted for more than half of all Texas water use. Texas has nine major aquifers and 21 minor ones.

In 2008, according to the latest TWDB Water Use Survey information, groundwater provided 60 percent or 16.1 million acre-feet of water used in the state. An acre-foot is the amount of water needed to cover an acre of land to a depth of one foot, or 325,851 gallons. Of that amount, almost 80 percent was used for agricultural irrigation. Municipalities relied on ground-

water for 15 percent of total groundwater use. The remaining 5 percent of groundwater use was for manufacturing, mining, domestic livestock and other uses.

“To protect all groundwater in the state from landfill contamination, Texas SWCDs want the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) and the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts (ATSWCDs) to work with the state legislature to enact legislation which would prohibit landfills to be placed over any aquifer recharge zone”, said Bading.

The TSSWCB administers Texas’ soil and water conservation law and delivers coordinated natural resource conservation programs through the State’s 216 soil and water conservation districts.

Additionally, the TSSWCB is the lead agency for planning, implementing, and managing programs for preventing and abating agricultural and silvicultural nonpoint sources of water pollution. The agency also administers a water supply enhancement program through the targeted control of water-depleting brush. The TSSWCB also acts to ensure that the State’s network of 2,000 flood control dams are protecting lives and property by providing operation, maintenance, and structural repair grants to local government sponsors and facilitates the Texas Invasive Species Coordinating Committee.

Agriculture under secretary announces support for projects to improve rural housing

TEMPLE - TEXAS, October 18, 2012 – Agriculture Under Secretary for Rural Development Dallas Tonsager today announced the selection of recipients in 49 states and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico for grants to make repairs and improve housing conditions for low- and very-low-income rural residents.

“For many rural residents, maintaining a home with basic features such as indoor plumbing and safe electrical wiring is often unaffordable,” Tonsager said. “This program supports basic repairs to improve living conditions for rural residents with extremely limited incomes.”

The more than \$4.4 million in funding announced today is being provided through USDA Rural Development’s Housing Preservation Grant program. Funds are provided to intermediaries such as town or county governments, public agencies, federally recognized Indian Tribes, and non-profit and faith-based and community organizations. These organizations then distribute the funds to homeowners and owners of multi-family rental properties or cooperative dwellings who repair dwellings occupied by low- and very-low-income

residents. Funds are not provided directly to the ultimate recipients by USDA.

Grants may be used to make general repairs, such as installing or improving plumbing or providing or enhancing access to people with disabilities. Funds may also be used to weatherize and make homes more energy efficient. Many of the USDA grants are being leveraged with funding from additional sources.

“The cost of maintaining a home is challenging for many rural homeowners,” said Paco Valentin, USDA Rural Development State Director. “This funding, available through Rural Development Housing Preservation grants, will help rural property owners make improvements to ensure their homes are decent, safe, sanitary and energy-efficient.”

In Texas, three recipients have been awarded over \$236,000 to help low- and very-low income rural homeowners eliminate safety or health challenges. Rolling Plains Management Corporation will receive \$118,277 to repair and rehabilitate 54 homes over a two year period in 25 counties with leveraged funds from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. The

City of Marble Falls will receive \$100,000 to be used on 12 homes in conjunction with the Amy Young Barrier Removal Program managed by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to provide grants to persons with disabilities for home modifications necessary for accessibility and the elimination of hazardous conditions. Community Services, Inc. will receive \$18,000 to assist 5 homeowners with leveraged funds from the DOE and LIHEAP Weatherization Programs for plumbing, electrical and structural repairs required to bring houses into code compliance and for energy saving measures.

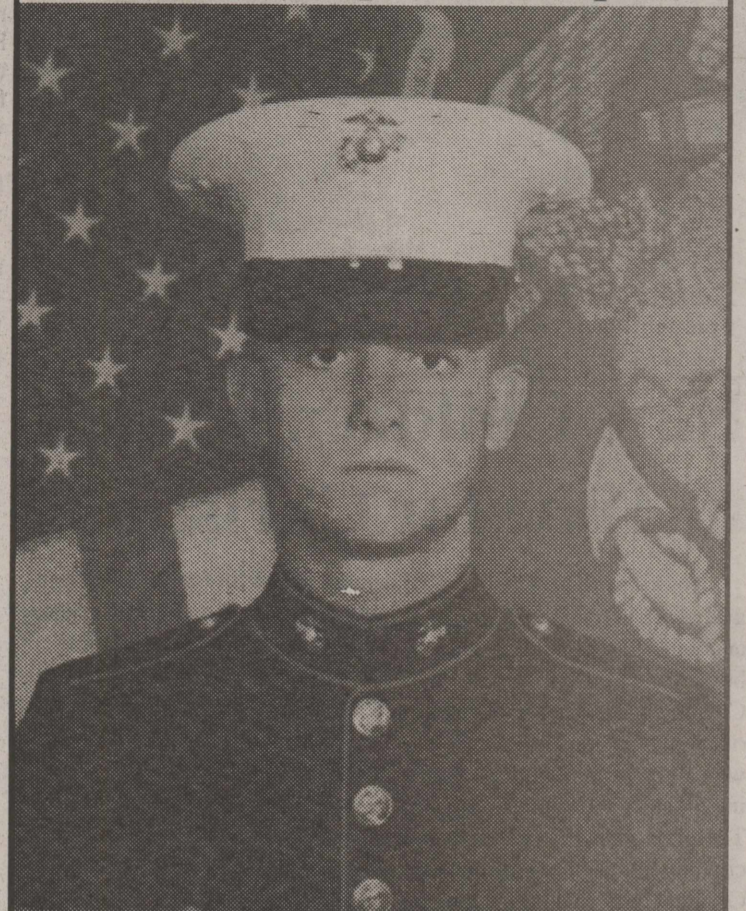
