## Neva Yates Roping Event October 13th

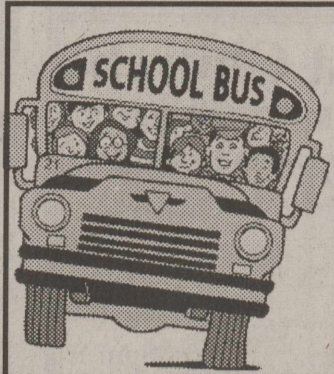
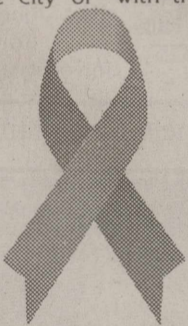

# Buffaloes Defense Stuff Plains in 21-7 Victory

Cross Plains High School's defense continued to shine as the Buffaloes defeated Plains 21-7 in a non-district football game played Friday night in Snyder. The victory marked the fourth time in five games this season that the Cross Plains defense has held its opponent to seven points or less.

Plains quarterback Austin Ward completed a 17-yard touchdown pass to Alex Morales on the game's opening possession, but that was it for the Cowboys' offense. The Buffaloes held Plains to just 110 yards total offense and only seven first downs. Cross Plains forced the Cowboys to punt six times in their eight possessions.

Theron Allen caught three touchdown passes to lift Cross Plains (4-1) to the win. The Buffaloes, who amassed 404 yards of total offense, tied the game, 7-7, late in the first

quarter on a 35-yard pass from Caleb Hernandez to Allen.

In the final seconds of the first half, Sean Hernandez hit Allen with a 10-yard TD pass to give the Buffaloes a 14-7 halftime lead. The final Cross Plains touchdown came on an 11-yard pass from Sean Hernandez to

Allen in the third quarter. Allen, who had five receptions for 96 yards and three touchdowns to pace Cross Plains' offense, also had an 18-yard run. Sean Hernandez, who stepped in at quarterback in place of Caleb Hernandez, completed 7 of 12 passes for 75 yards.

Sterling Switzer led Cross Plains' ground attack with 100 yards rushing on 14 carries. Ty Tipton had 21 carries for 63 yards and Sean Hernandez ran 11 times for 43 yards.

Cross Plains has an open date this week before opening District 7-2A Division II play Oct. 12 at Haskell. Plains fell to 2-2.

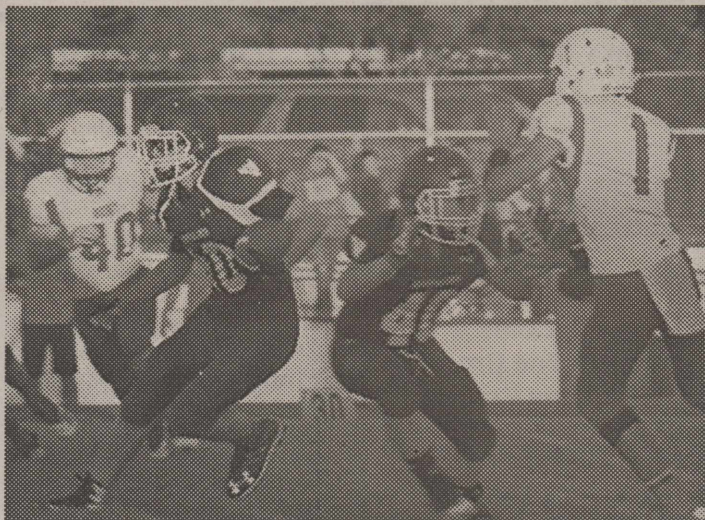
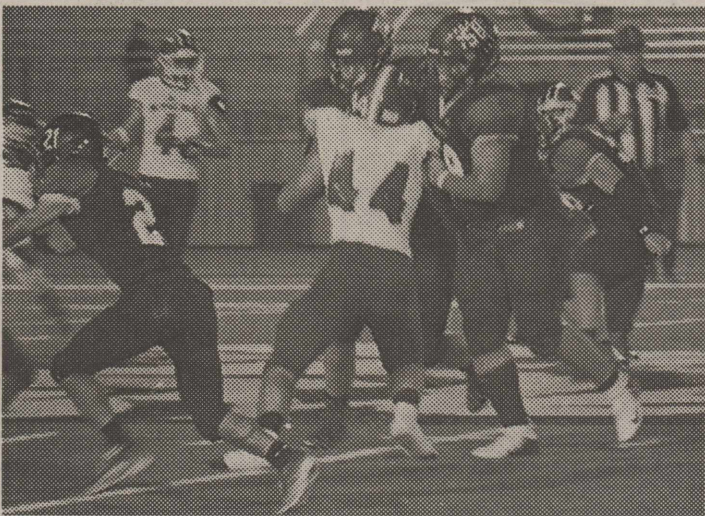

## Fire Prevention Week is October 7th-13th Latest Statistics Show Home Fire Death Rate Higher than in 1980

September 26, 2018 – According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), if you have a reported home fire today, you are more likely to die than you were in 1980. This startling fact is attributed to several factors, including the way homes are built and the contents in them. "Open floor plans and a prevalence of modern synthetic furnishings make homes burn faster and the fires produce deadly smoke and gases within moments," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. According to Carli, you can have as little as two to three minutes to escape a home fire today as compared to eight to ten minutes years ago.

These concerns prompted NFPA to create "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere" as the theme for Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13, 2018. It emphasizes three basic but critical messages:

- Look for places fire can start
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm
- Learn two ways out of each room

"This year's Fire Prevention Week messages point to the essentials of home fire safety," said Carli. "Looking for potential fire hazards in the home, making sure your smoke alarms are working properly, and

having a home escape plan that everyone has practiced – these actions can dramatically reduce the loss from home fires."

Motivating the public to take these steps can prove challenging, notes Carli, because people don't think they could have a fire, despite the fact that home is the place they're at greatest risk. Four out of five U.S. fire deaths occur in homes.

"Because we have reduced the overall number of fires, there is a general complacency and a lack of action around home fire preparedness and planning," said Carli. "Our goal for Fire Prevention Week is to make sure people recognize that fire remains a very real risk, and that everyone needs to take action to protect themselves and their families."

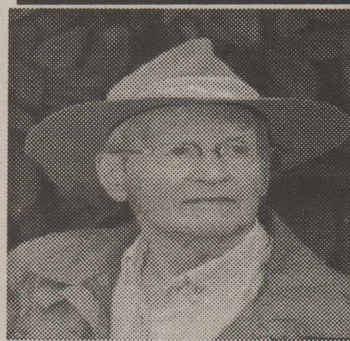

#### FALL FISHING

Somebody asked me how I could live in Texas during a summer with 32 days of 100-degree weather. I answered, "By looking forward to fall."

And now it's fall. The weather guys say autumn begins on September 1, but most Texans know the first of September is still High Summer. I'm almost always out in a field on that day -- the opening of central zone dove season -- hiding in the shade of a bull mesquite, a large pecan, or oak, so that's the one day of the year I can recall. Whoever coined the phrase, "Hot as the Fourth of July" has never hunted doves in Texas, or the saying might have been different.

But it's now late September, and feels like the beginning of autumn. Periodic rain has helped. And the thought of fall fishing excites a nation of fishermen. A friend, Highland Lakes fishing guide, Mike Hastings, calls October "Tackle Box Month." It's already started. Hastings interprets that by explaining that you can almost close your eyes, reach into your fishing tackle and carefully select a lure -- any lure -- and catch fish with it. It's worked for me. I've heard of someone attaching a hook to a beverage can ringtab and catching a fish with it.

Cooler weather makes for cooler water, and bass can comfortably move into shallower shores, creeks and coves to chase baitfish. That makes finding game fish a little easier. Shallower water also means anglers can use topwater lures more successfully, as well as other baits that don't have to dredge the bottom like the jigs and worms many resorted to in July and August. Diving crankbaits, swimbaits, and stickbaits are also back on the firing line this time of year. Chatter baits, last year's popular Sprinkler frog, the Whopper Plopper, and the Booyah Pad Crasher will take fish, too. I've

caught good fall fish on Rat-L-Traps. Take your pick.

Choose a bait in which you have confidence. That means one you can cast accurately and one you believe will catch fish.

Many overlook the psychology of fishing. If you believe you are going to get a strike, you just might. If you don't think you will, you still might. That makes fishing fun. The more you know about fish, their habits, and habitat, the more successful you'll be. But the only truly important thing to know is that you must keep your bait in the water. Do that and fun will follow... along with

better mental health.

Spending a pleasant fall day on or along the water with a fishing rod in hand instead of a computer mouse, seeing leaves starting to change, being away from traffic noise and annoying people, can mellow your mood. Catching fish is just a bonus.

Renowned fishing writer, John Gierach, once wrote "Your stature as a fly fisherman isn't determined by how big a trout (or any fish) you can catch, but by how small a trout (fish) you can catch without being disappointed."

# Top Fifteen Football Games in Cross Plains

The end of the top fifteen games in Cross Plains has finally come. All the games mention has all been entertaining in their own right but only one can be number one. What separates the top five from the rest of the group is the historical significance each one has represented over the 91-year history of Cross Plains football.

**#5 "Wide Left" 1994**  
After the success of the 1988 season, Cross Plains fell off the cliff. From 1989 to 1993 the Buffs failed to win more than four games during that span. Before district play in the 1994 season, the outlook wasn't looking good having a 1-3-1 record.

To the surprise of some, Cross Plains responded by winning two straight district games over Santa Anna and Evant. Suddenly the future seemed bright with three winnable games left on the season. But standing in their path was an old rival.

The Gorman Panthers were one of the dominant teams in the district and a thorn in the Buffaloes side. Not since 1988 had Cross Plains defeated the Panthers and with the game hold district championship qualifications, the stakes couldn't have been higher.

To start the game, the Buffaloes shocked everyone by kicking and recovering the onside kick. The ensuring drive would lead to a 7-0. The Panthers would soon answer the Buffs with a touchdown of their own tying the game at seven.

Till the fourth quarter the game was a defensive struggle as both teams held each other to zero points. Both the Buffaloes and the Panthers would score in the fourth, however Gorman failed to make the extra point leaving the game 14-13 in favor of Cross Plains.

With 1:18 left in the game on the Buffalo 34, the Panther offense would drive down the field and all the way down to the 11-yard line with 40 seconds left in the game. But a false start penalty and the Buffalo sack drove Gorman back to the 23-yard line with 6 seconds left in the game.

Instead of going for the touchdown, the Panthers opted to go for a field goal for the win. With all the fans standing on their feet, the Gorman field goal sail left of the field goal post and gave Cross Plains the 14-13 victory.

Following the victory, the Buffaloes would win their final two games to give their first district championship in 38 years. Till this season, 1994 remains the last district championship won by the Buffaloes.

**#4 "Going into the Lion's Den" 1933**  
The Cross Plains Buffalo football program was relatively young back in 1933. With its first official season coming

in 1927, the Cross Plains was omitted into the UIL in 1929. While hopes were high on the Buffaloes, the struggles became apparent.

From 1930-1932, the Albany Lions were the kings of the district winning three straight district champions and a bi-district win in 1930. For many of the teams that were in the district, the Lions were unbeatable. Cross Plains also never came close to beating the Lions being outscored 115 to 19 in the four meetings between the two teams.

During the 1933 season, it seemed the Albany Lions were set on a fourth straight district championship. However, the Buffaloes threw a wrench in their plans.

In a stunning game that shocked many people, Cross Plains and Albany played in to scoreless tie 0-0. For the first time in history, the Buffaloes had shut out the Lions, a team that would beat would them an average score of 29-5 in their all time meetings.

At the end of the season, Cross Plains and Albany were tied in the district standings zero losses. Since there was no clear winner, due to the fact both teams tied 0-0, a winner take all game was scheduled to be played in Albany.

For the Buffaloes, the task seemed impossible. Not only was Cross Plains having to travel to Albany, but the Buffs had beat the Lions, a task no team had done to that point. Very few people were giving the Buffaloes a chance at victory. Even the Albany newspaper was already setting the game between them and Stephenville for the Bi-District Championship.

However, lighting would strike twice. In one of the most stunning upsets in Cross Plains history, the Buffaloes defeated the Albany Lions 7-0 to win their first ever District Championship in football history. The victory sent shockwaves through the Big Country and stunned fans as the Lions were not going to playoffs for the first time since 1929.

With the victory the Buffaloes would face another daunting task at hand.

**#3 "The Shootout at Roscoe" 2016**

Coming off the best season in fifteen years, the Buffaloes were not satisfied. From the start of the 2016 season, Cross Plains had set their sights on a goal that hadn't been done since 1997. Win a playoff game.

From 2011 through 2015, the Buffs made the playoffs three times. Out of those three times, however, Cross Plains had drawn some of the toughest teams in their Bi-District game. Chilton in 2011, Muenster in 2012, and Seymour in 2015 had gone a combined 27-12 in their respective seasons. All three teams would go to win not only Bi-District, but in the Area rounds as well before falling in the regional semifinals.

With their 52-34 win over the Miles Bulldogs, the Buffs would clinch second place in their district and draw the Wink Wildcats in the Bi-District round. The Wildcats, finishing third in their district, were a strong team coming out with a potent offense. However, they were not on the same level as previous three playoff opponents.

For the first time since 1997, the Buffaloes had a 50-50 shot at winning a playoff game.

As many of the games on this list were defensive slugfests, the playoff game between Wink and Cross Plains became an offensive shootout. With both offenses combined for 700 points for the regular season, the two teams traded touchdown after touchdown. Neither team seeming to gain the advantage as the Buffaloes took the halftime lead 26-20.

During the second half, both defenses couldn't stop the team from scoring as the offensive fireworks continued to explode. By the start of the fourth quarter, the Buffaloes held a 34-28 lead. With the Wildcats taking the lead at 36-34, Buffaloes would finally get a break and score two unanswered touchdowns taking a 50-36 lead.

Though the Wildcats would score to make it a one possession game, they failed to recover the onside kick as the Buffaloes would win the shootout 50-42.

With the win, Cross Plains would hold up their first Bi-District Championship trophy since 1997. All though the Buffaloes would fall to a powerful Munday in the Area Round, the Buffs made history.

**#2 "The Upset" 1933**

Following the shocking district championship win over the Albany Lions, Cross Plains was in unfamiliar territory. The Buffaloes were in the Playoffs for the first time in history and were playing for Bi-District championship. But for the Buffs, they had face another daunting task.

The Stephenville Yellow-jackets had become a local powerhouse in the early thirties and late twenties winning several district championships. On top of that the undefeated Jackets had beaten the De Leon Bearcats 20-0, the team Cross Plains had lost to during the regular season 7-0.

Even though the game was being held in Cross Plains, no one was giving the underdog Buffaloes a chance for the win. Many reporters believed this was the best Stephenville has had and would eventually win the Regional Title that season.

For the second week in a row, the Buffaloes would shock the entire Big Country and the entire state once again. In a stunning upset, Cross Plains defeated the mighty Stephenville Yellow Jackets 13-7. Once again, the Buffaloes made history by winning, not only its first district championship, but winning its very first playoff game as well.

**#1 "Breaking the Curse" 1988**  
From 1957-1986, the Cross Plains football team fell under a curse. During those 29 years, Cross Plains would only have six seasons were the Buffaloes would win five or more games. Out of those six seasons only two would have more wins than five, 1967 (6-4) and 1974 (7-2-1). It was sad to say Cross Plains wasn't doing too well, especially being stuck in 2A division with schools twice their size.

But in 1987, things started to turn around. Finishing up their last season in 2A at 7-3 and dropping back down into 1A, the Buffaloes were thinking of a district championship for the 1988 season. After being drubbed 33-0 to the rival Baird Bears and a 1-2 start to the season, being people wondered if Cross Plains would get back into playoffs for the first time since 1956. But the loss turned out to be the boost this team needed.

After starting the season 1-2, the Buffaloes would win their next seven games in route of clinching their first playoff berth since 1956. In the season finale, Cross Plains met old rival Rising Star with the district championship hanging in the balance.

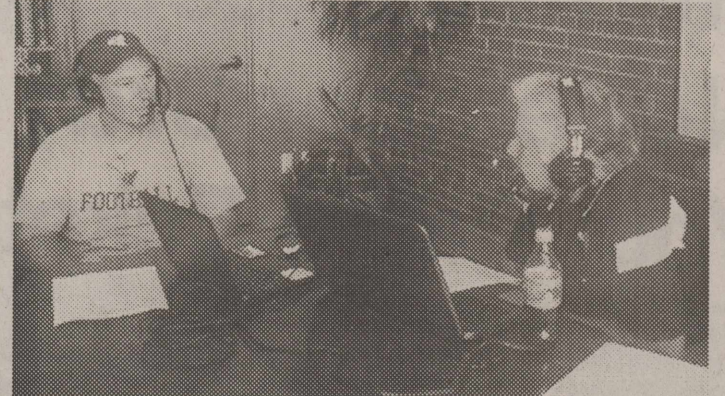
However, a district championship season wasn't meant to be as the injury bug wiped out key starters while game killing penalties doomed the Buffaloes in a heartbreaking 21-0 loss.

With the loss of their starting quarterback, the Buffaloes were underdogs in their matchup with the Menard Yellowjackets. Going undefeated during the regular season, Menard clinch the district championship with 20-19 win over the Eden Bulldogs.

At the start of the Bi-District game, the Buffaloes jump to a 14-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Menard would respond with a touchdown in the second quarter and field goal to cut the lead 14-10.

After both teams were held scoreless in the third quarter, the Buffaloes were 12:00 minutes away from making history. Late in the fourth quarter, Menard had the ball at the Cross Plains 9-yard line. But in an amazing goal-line stand, the Buffaloes stopped the Yellowjackets on a 4th and 2 to take control of the ball. On the ensuing possession, the Buffaloes would seal the deal on touchdown run win 20-14.

Even though the Buffaloes didn't win district, Cross Plains won its first playoff game in 55 years and broke a 30-year playoff curse. With snapping two different steaks and playing without the starting quarterback, the 1988 playoff game is the best Cross Plains football game in history.

## The Texas History Minute

### Real Estate Developer Trammell Crow

The skylines of such major cities as Dallas and Atlanta changed markedly in the 1960s and 1970s. Though it took millions of dollars and an army of builders and architects, these projects emerged from the visions of only a handful of individuals. Trammell Crow was one of the leading developers of the mid-twentieth century who brought these visions to reality, moving from a modest background to becoming a Texas business legend.

Fred Trammell Crow was born in 1914 in East Dallas. He was one of eight children in a small, three-room house. His father was an accountant and provided a modest living for the large family. From a young age, Crow was willing to go out and find work. Starting at age ten, he took a series of odd jobs from plucking chickens to loading trains.

Crow graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School in Dallas in 1932. Initially unable to afford college, he took a series of jobs to save for his education, which was difficult as it was during the Great Depression. Eventually landing a \$13 per week job (or about \$254 per week in 2018 dollars) as a messenger for a local bank, he was able to enroll at Southern Methodist University in 1933. After an extended program of night courses, Crow graduated with a degree in accounting in 1938 and that year became the youngest certified public accountant in the state.

He worked for a Dallas accounting firm before enlisting in the Navy in 1940. During his time in the Navy, he worked as an auditor to ensure proper fulfillment of contracts with defense manufacturers. Crow married Margaret Doggett in 1942, who had narrowly escaped death in 1939 when the Nazis sank

an English passenger liner she had boarded. He stayed in the Navy until 1946, and returned to Dallas.

Crow and his wife eventually had six children. Crow was reported as a devoted father, attentive in their lives, and would often bring them to the office as young children while he worked on his various projects that developed into a real estate empire. By 1949, he saw manufacturing and distribution increasing in Dallas and the need for storage. He built his first warehouse and leased out the space to Rayovac Battery. However, almost half the space was unused; and Crow leased the remaining space to Decca Records. It was a different approach than the traditional practice of building to the specifications of a specific customer. Crow made it successful and quickly branched out.

By the mid-1950s, he was the largest developer of warehouses in the city. He also worked with fellow Dallas real estate developer John Stemmons for many years. The two developed the Dallas Market Center in 1957. Stemmons, concerned with the large debt accrued with the project, largely ceased working with Crow afterward. However, Crow continued to expand and develop the property which eventually included the Dallas Trade Mart and Dallas World Trade Center.

The decade of the 1960s saw some of his most ambitious projects materialize. In the early years of the decade, he began working with Georgia businessmen to create Peachtree Center in downtown Atlanta. Billed as "a city within a city," developers envisioned it as a new downtown core for the city. A series of 14 buildings would be built or redeveloped into conference

centers, office space, and hotels. Peachtree Center Tower, a 31-story building, was unveiled in 1965. In the late 1960s, he partnered with financier David Rockefeller and developer John Portman to build San Francisco's Embarcadero Center, ultimately a complex of seven buildings. The complex included hotels and office buildings, the first of which was completed in 1971, with the last completed in 1989.

In the mid-1970s, inflation and increasing interest rates started causing problems for Crow. This forced him to reorganize his company, but his properties kept bringing in rents. Business journalists began calling him the world's largest landlord. His business expanded into dozens of cities across the nation. By the boom years of the 1980s, a real estate development could scarcely be found in Dallas without Trammell Crow's name on it. In 1984, he completed the 50-story Trammell Crow Center in downtown Dallas, a building that topped 700 feet in height. As a noted patron of the arts, he donated much of his East Asian art collection to establish an Asian art museum open to the public inside the building.

However as the new century began, he slipped into Alzheimer's Disease. His once brilliant mind for business slowly eroded until he slipped away entirely in 2009 at age 94. His epitaph read, "Builder of Buildings, Builder of People." His wife of 66 years passed away in 2014.

The company Crow built was sold to CBRE Group, a California-based real estate conglomerate, in 2006 for \$2.2 billion.

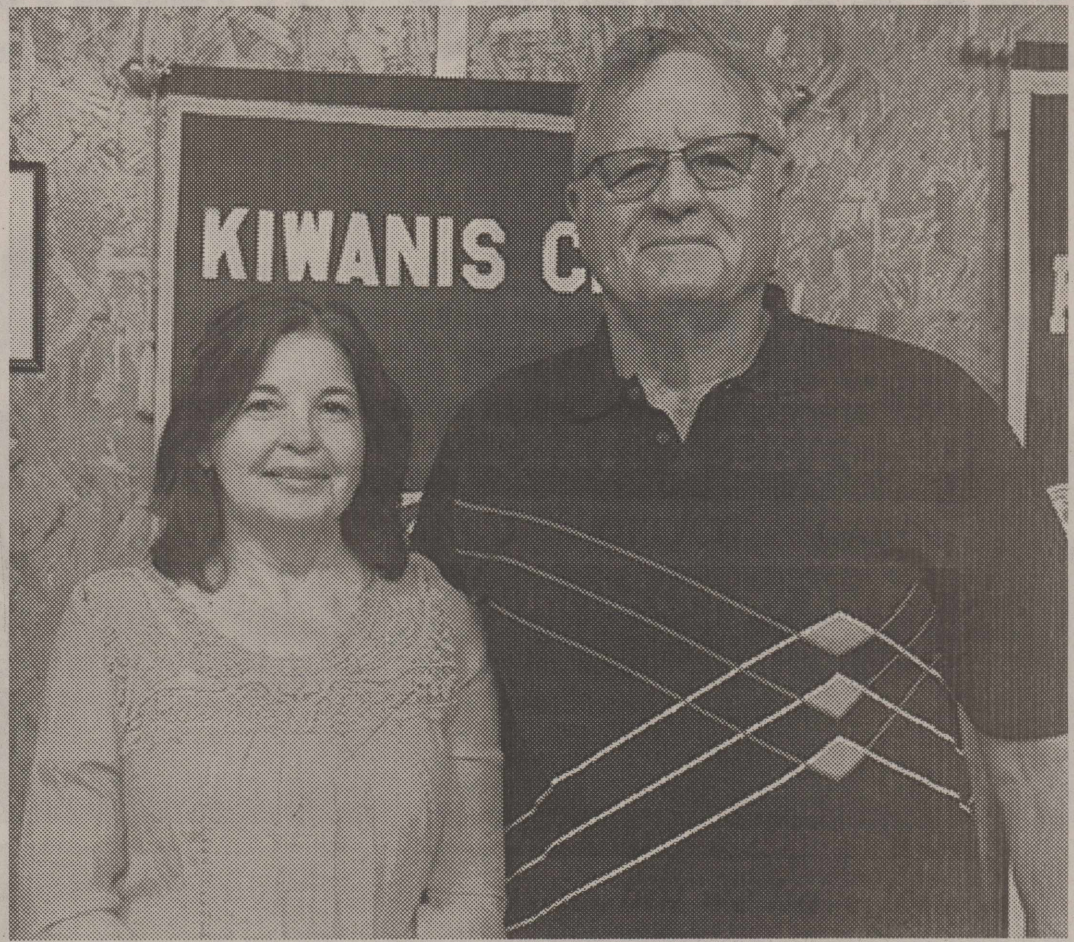
Lighted Balloons are also available.

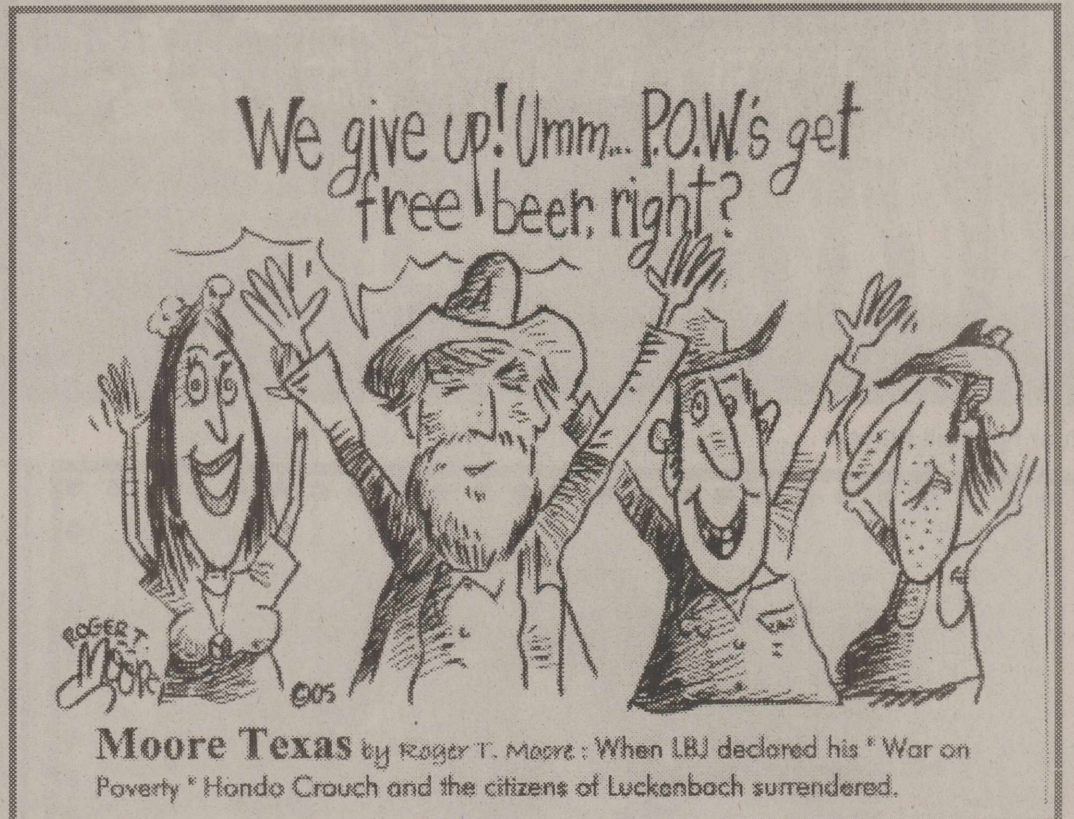
Somebody made a lemon-aide pie that was the best this "semi-pro pie eating professional" has ever tried. Thank you to everyone who came out and enjoyed the evening.

## The Recipe Corner

### Buttermilk Cake with Carmel Icing

Prep Time: 35 minutes Bake time: 45 Minutes + Cooling

**Ingredients:**

- \* 1 cup butter, softened
- \* 2-1/3 cups sugar
- \* 1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- \* 3 large Eggs
- \* 3 cups all-purpose flour
- \* 1 teaspoon baking powder
- \* 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- \* 1 cup buttermilk

**ICING:**

- \* 1/4 cup butter, cubed
- \* 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- \* 1/3 cup heavy whipping cream
- \* 1 cup confectioners' sugar

**Directions**

1. Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a 10-in. fluted tube pan.
2. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla and eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. In another bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder and baking soda; add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk (batter will be thick). Transfer to prepared pan.
3. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 45-50 minutes. Cool in pan 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.
4. For icing, in a small saucepan, combine butter, brown sugar and cream; bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; cool 5-10 minutes. Gradually beat in confectioners' sugar; spoon over cake.

Editor's Note: To remove cakes easily, use solid shortening to grease plain and fluted tube pans. Makes 16 Servings.

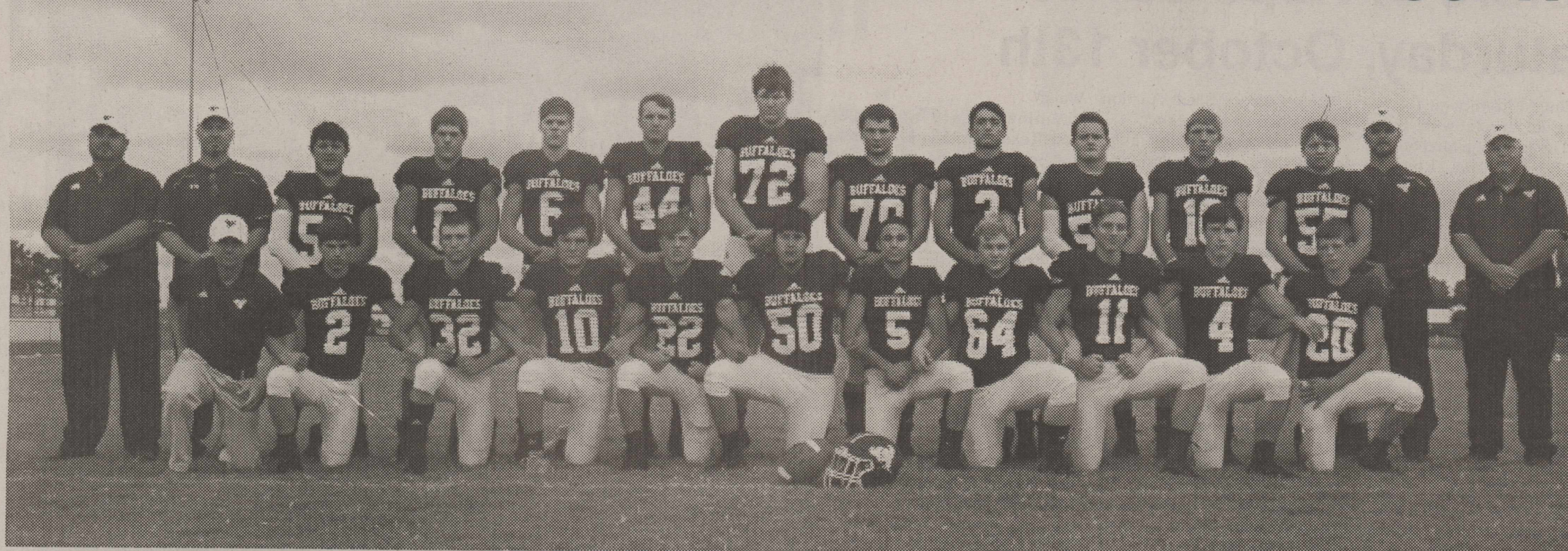

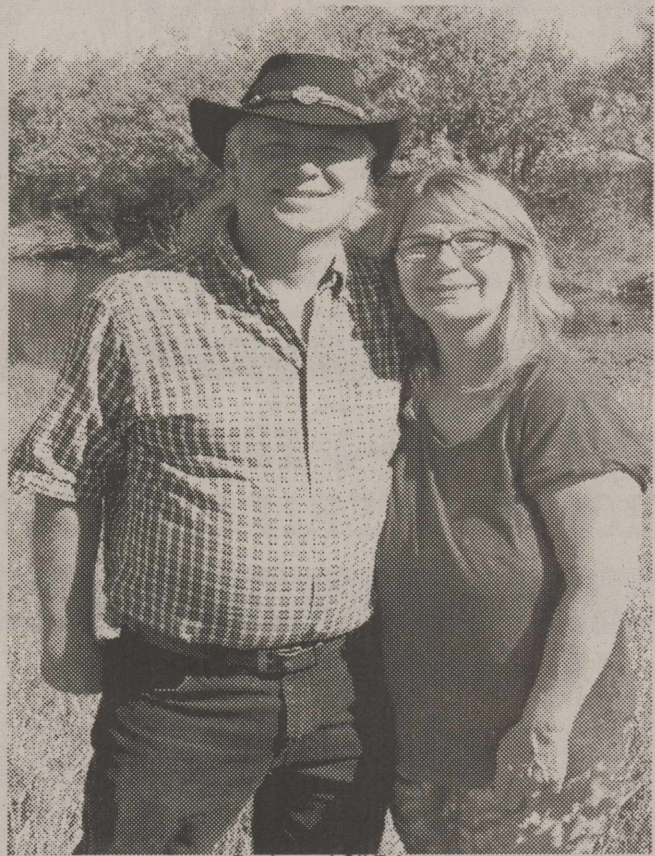

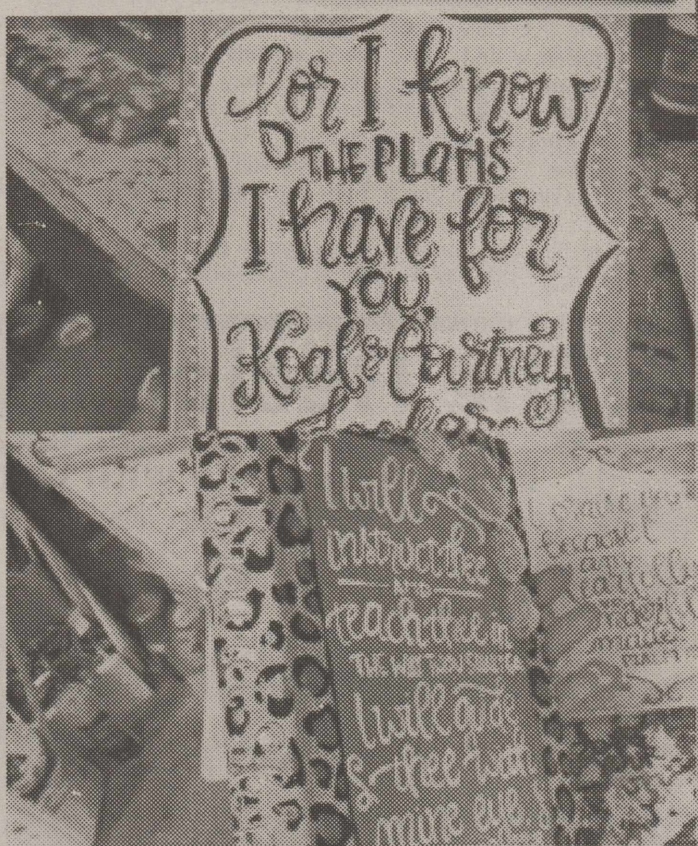
From the Cross Plains Review... 100 years ago, December 1, 1918.
