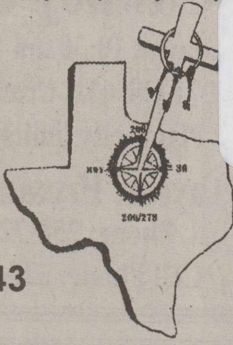

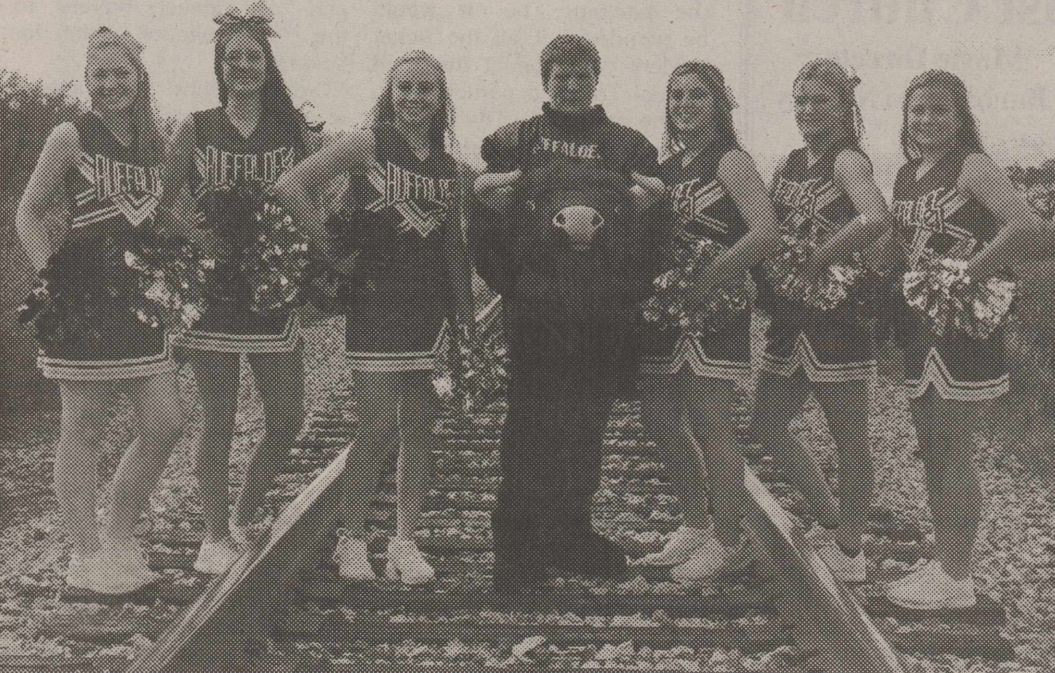

Cancer Walk This Saturday - Rain or Shine

The Cross Plains Community Cancer Fund's "Colors of Hope" Cancer Walk is this Saturday, October 13th - rain or shine.

With the weather reports varying from a clear, sunny day to very cloudy, the organizers are preparing a back up plan. One thing is for sure, the Cancer Walk will go in.

The event starts at 5 p.m. on Saturday on the CPISD Football Field and brings local residents together for an evening of fun, food, games, live music, prize drawings, support for those fighting cancer and a remembrance of those who have passed on.

This year's walk is memory of our friends, coworkers and loved ones who have lost their fight to cancer this year and in honor of the survivors and those still fighting the battle.

Walking teams and local organizations and businesses set up camp on the football field along with all kinds of other booths. Many brightly colored booths will follow this year's "Colors of Hope" theme.

Awards will be given for the "Best Decorated Booth" and for the Team/Booth that raises the most money.

One of the highlights of this year's walk is the Corn Hole Contest. Get your team together for the bragging right of being the best Corn Hole team in town! Teams will play to 21 points, best 2 out of three.

Kids will enjoy not one, but two inflatable bounce houses,

sponsored by Sparks Insurance. The Turner Family and the First Baptist Church Youth Group will be in charge of the inflatables and the children's games.

The Cross Plains High School FFA will man the Children's Train.

Other Game Booths include Cake Walk and Bingo sponsored by Texas Heritage Bank.

Sheena Apple's booth will feature Earl the Rodeo Clown.

Neva Yates Roping Event October 14th

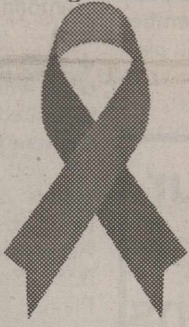

This roping was started 6 years ago to honor the memory of a wonderful woman. The money raised by the club is donated to the Cross Plains Cancer Fund, this year the club has included Royce Atchley as a co-recipient.

Six years ago the Turkey Creek Rodeo Club and the city of Cross Plains lost a dear friend to cancer. While not a Cross Plains native, Neva Yates married a home town boy by the name of Tim Yates. Neva became the secretary for the TCRC Club and played a large part of getting the club back up and running again.

To honor Neva's memory, the Turkey Creek Rodeo Club created a memorial roping where the proceeds would be donated to the Cross Plains Cancer Fund. This year the club will be donating to both the Cross Plains Cancer Fund and Royce Atchley.

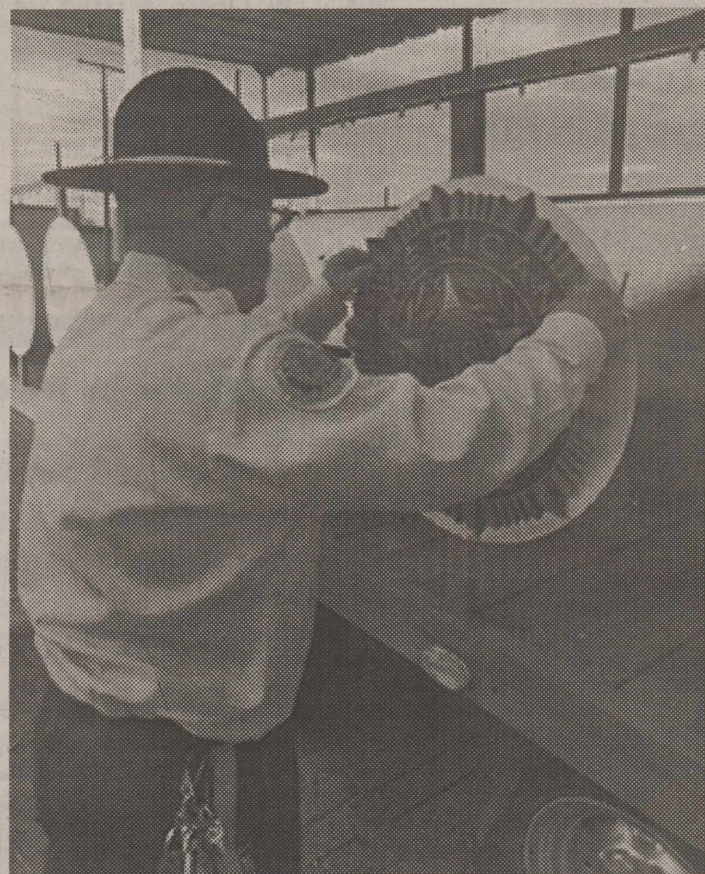

The Buffaloes, who had an open date last week, carry a 4-1 record into the start of district play, thanks to a stiff defense.

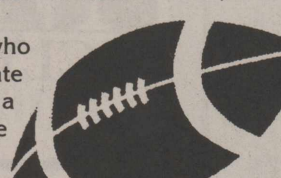
Cross Plains' defense has held its opponents to seven points or less in four of its five games this season.

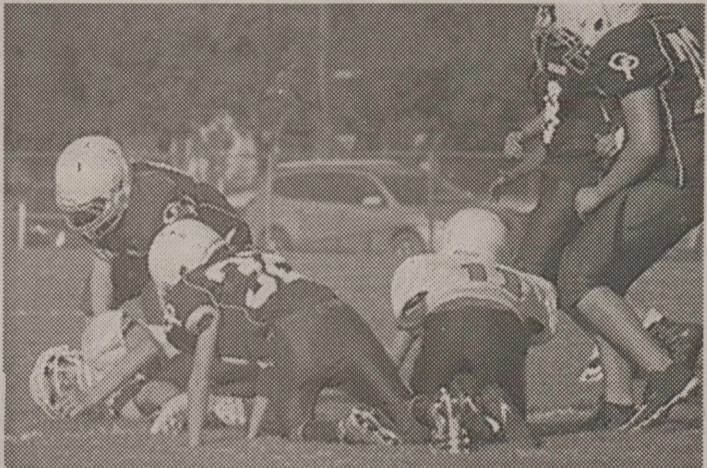
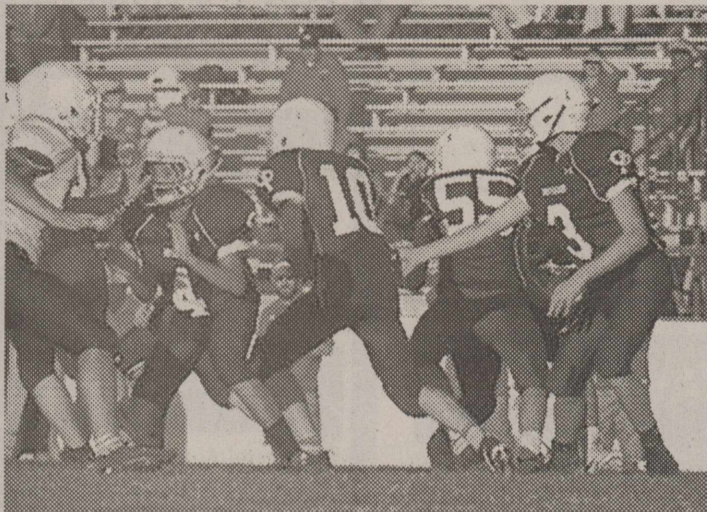

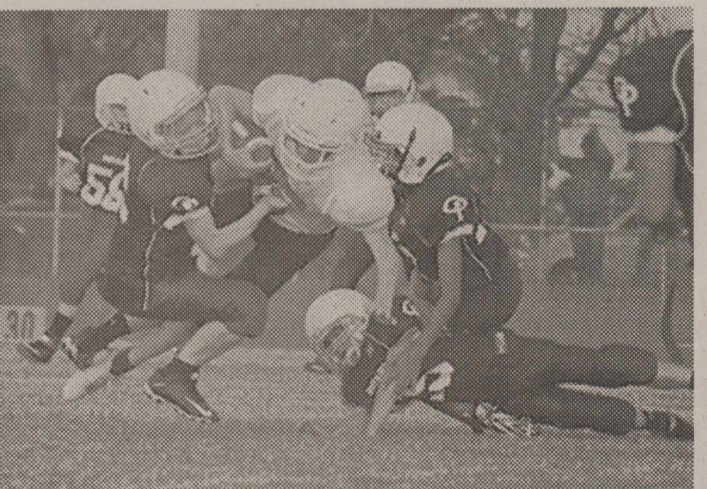

Services to Parentally Placed Private School Children with Disabilities
The law does not require that services be provided to all children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private or home schools, or to every private or home school. However, every effort will be made to provide appropriate services with proportionate IDEA funds. If you will contact your local school district or Comanche Special Services SSA, you will assist us in our effort to accurately count all IDEA-eligible children enrolled in private and home schools. This count will help to determine how best to use the proportionate share of IDEA funds to meet the needs of children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private and home school settings.

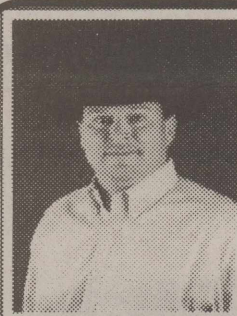

Sales tax revenue totaled \$2.7 Billion in September

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.7 billion in September, 14.8 percent more than in September 2017. "Vigorous growth in state sales tax revenue continued in September across all major industry sectors," Hegar said. "While the fastest growth in tax collections was fueled by business spending, especially in oil- and gas-related sectors, robust consumer spending spurred significant increases from restaurants and retail trade as well." Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in September 2018 was up 12.4 percent compared to the same period a year ago. The sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections. Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuel and oil and natural gas production also rose in September 2018: • motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$401.4 million, up 4.1 percent from September 2017; • motor fuel taxes — \$325.1 million, up 10.7 percent from September 2017; and • oil and natural gas production taxes — \$487.1 million, up 66.1 percent from September 2017. The Cross Plains 4-H club is off and running. The members are learning about parliamentary procedure, how to run a meeting, and how voting plays a vital part in decision making.

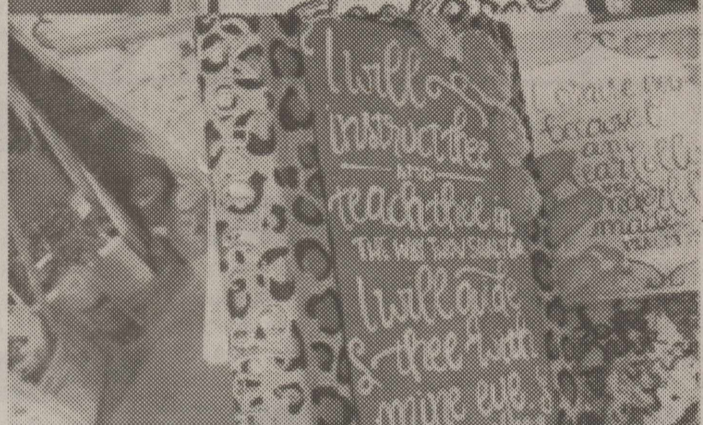
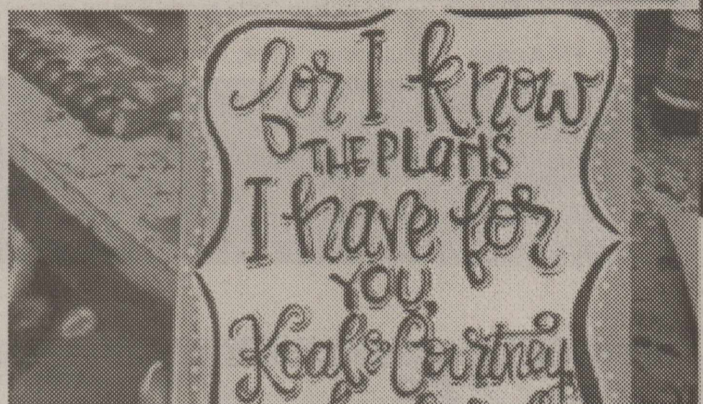
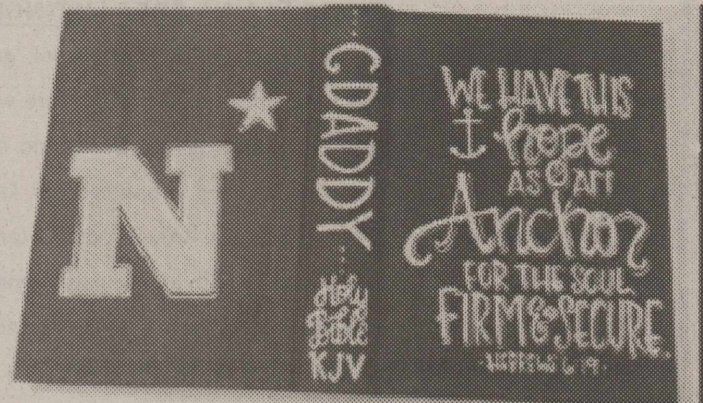

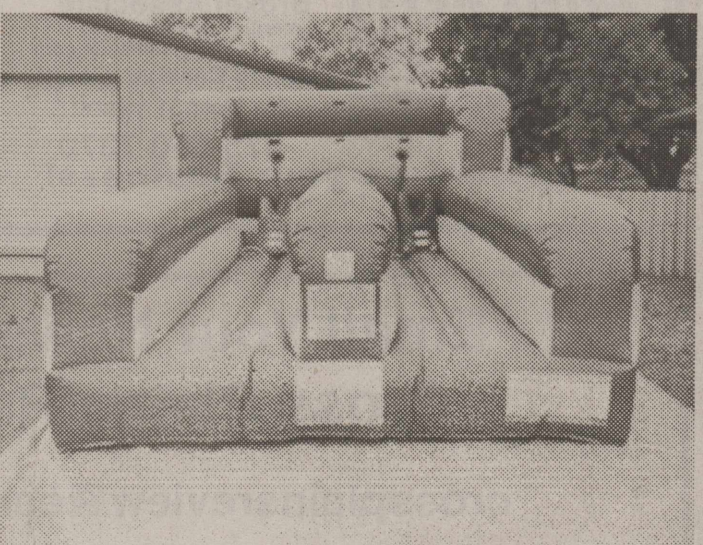

GOOD YEAR FOR DEER

Coming out of a summer that recorded 32 days of over 100-degree temperatures with some highs hovering around 110 might sound gloomy to deer hunters. But Texas whitetail deer are one of God's most adaptable critters -- second only to Wile E. Coyote. Coyotes make a living off an endless menu of meal possibilities. Deer are vegetarians with a diet more dependent on the weather -- particularly rainfall. But, they make out by seeking out food where they can find it during droughts. They prefer forbs -- weedy stuff -- but can successfully shift to woody plants as conditions dictate.

Add agricultural crops, neighborhood gardens and flower beds -- even year-around deer feeders -- and the fittest survive. Then, there's the old adage "If you don't like Texas weather, just stick around!"

Man, does that apply this year! Most of Texas had a decent spring forb production and the brush greened-up, providing a good start to antler development. Then, summer conditions began diminishing. That's where the woody brush species of plants came into play until the weather changed. And, Man, did it.

South of Kingsville, some areas gauged 21 inches of rain in July! Alan Cain, TPWD's white-tailed deer program leader, said it looked "... like a jungle with all the green vegetation." He added that a good mesquite bean crop was developing and would nourish deer in areas with mesquites. In Central Texas, there were 17 consecutive September rainy days, making it one of the wettest ever. And more rain is forecast. If you hunted doves, you probably swatted a few mosquitoes.

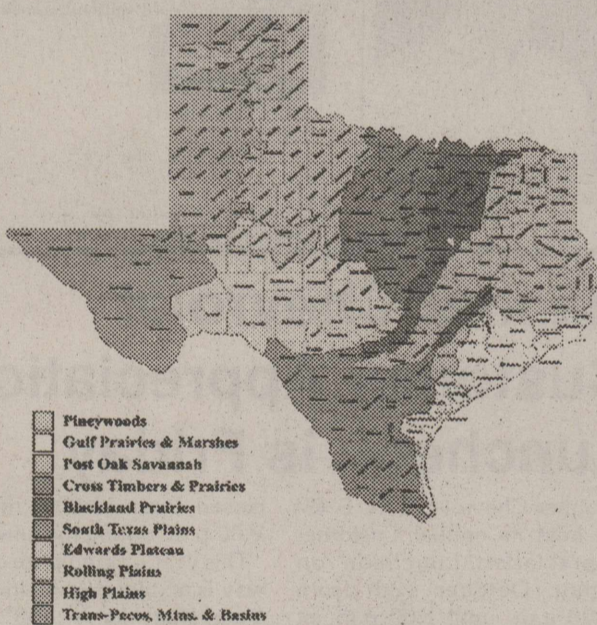
The rain means deer will be in good shape. The bad news for hunters around deer feeders is that deer will prefer the native vegetation to corn and protein early in the season. Trail camera pictures I've seen show fine antler development, but most are night-time shots. That will change with cooler weather, shorter amounts of daylight, and the upcoming rut. But the deer are here, and healthy. Texas has nearly 4.6 million deer, dispersed over most of the state, according to Cain's TPWD surveys.

The Edwards Plateau, AKA the Hill Country, has the most, around 2.6 million, according to Cain. Areas around Mason, Llano, and neighboring counties have the highest density. A good fawn crop in 2015 will mean more

bucks 3.5 years of age, and the 2013 crop will add 5.5-year-old bucks this season.

The Cross Timbers Region north of the Hill Country, has the second highest population. Hunters there may see a few more bucks in the 6.5-year age class due to good fawn recruitment in 2012. In South Texas, there'll be many larger bucks, although perhaps slightly fewer 6.5-year-olds. Highest scoring bucks will be

found in South Texas and the Western Rolling Plains.

Cain projects average antler quality all across Texas -- and "average for Texas" is highly coveted elsewhere. We are blessed.

"Each year, many quality bucks are taken in every ecoregion," Cain points out. "That buck of a lifetime could be in your neck of the woods!" -JJ

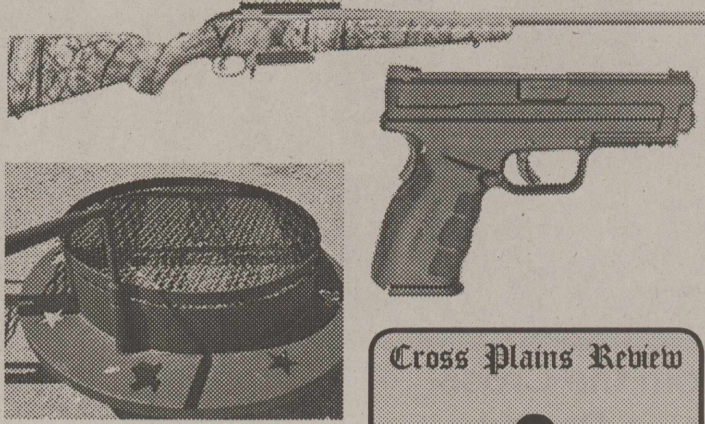

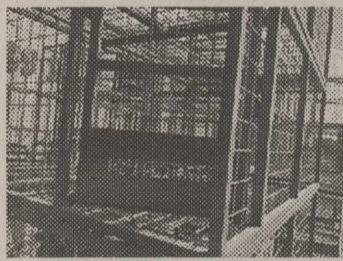
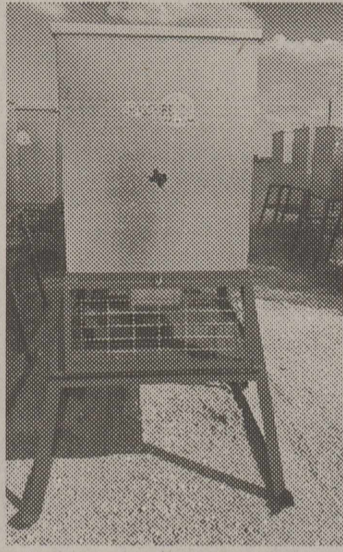

Secretary of State Reminds Texans to Exercise Caution when Registering to Vote

AUSTIN, TX - Texas Secretary of State Rolando Pablos today issued the following statement and guidance to Texas voters regarding voter registration websites that purport to assist voters in registering to vote online in the State of Texas:

"We remind all eligible Texas voters that online voter registration is not available in the State of Texas. Any web site that misleadingly claims to assist voters in registering to vote online by simply submitting a digital signature is not authorized to do so. All Texas voters should be extremely cautious when handing over personal and sensitive information to any unknown third party. I urge voters to always visit VoteTexas.gov for accurate information about registering to vote and voting in Texas. My office is committed to

ensuring all Texans understand proper and legal procedures for registering to vote, and that all Texans who are eligible have the opportunity to submit valid registrations ahead of next week's October 9th deadline."

To verify your registration status, voters can visit the Texas Secretary of State's "Am I Registered?" tool.

Eligible Texans who are not already registered to vote may complete and print a voter registration application here, request an application from their county elections administrator, or obtain a voter registration application from, for example, a nearby public library. Once completed and signed, eligible Texas voters should submit the application to the county voter registrar in their county of residence. Completed voter registration applications must be postmarked by October 9th,

2018 in order to be accepted.

For a registration submitted to the county voter registrar by fax, a hard copy of the registration application must be received by the registrar within four business days after the faxed application is received.

If you have moved to a new address within the same county or have changed your name while remaining in the same county as your current registration, you can update your information online.

Texas voters who have been affected or displaced by Hurricane Harvey can learn more about voting issues for Texas Harvey evacuees here.

Wheat Variety Pick's List for the Rolling Plains of Texas 2018-2019

The AgriLife Extension Wheat Pick's list was selected based on the Rolling Plains Uniform Variety Trial (UVT) coordinated by the AgriLife Research and Extension personnel. Our ongoing Picks criteria include a minimum of three years of data across multiple locations. A "Pick" variety means this: given the data, these are the varieties we would choose to include and emphasize on our farm for wheat grain production. Picks are not necessarily the numerical top yielders as important disease resistance traits (leaf or stripe rust, wheat streak mosaic virus), insect tolerance (greenbugs, Russian wheat aphid), or standability can also be important varietal traits that enable a producer to better manage potential risk. We look for consistency of yields, e.g. the regularity with which an individual variety is in the top 25% of yield at each location. For more detail, please refer Texas Wheat Variety Result.

PATH TO THE PLATE - BEEF

Path to the plate is a research-based educational program conducted by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service that helps consumers understand how their food choices impact their health. Ag plays an important role in our daily lives from the production of our food, to its harvest, to how it arrives on our table.

Path to the plate aims to dispel popular myths and misconceptions about food production.

In Texas there are 242,000 farms/ranches that operate on over 130 million acres. 9.6% of Texas farms/ranches are family farms, partnerships, or family-held operations. 14% of Texans work in the ag and food industry. Over 5 million calves born on cow-calf operations in Texas each year.

There are over 1 million beef cattle operations in the U.S. and they produce over 24 billion pounds of beef. Texas is the top cattle producing state in over 11.8 million head. Right here in

Callahan County we have over 16k head of beef cows. Beef cattle is the number one ag enterprise in Callahan County, annual income from cattle sales is over \$14.5 million.

Cattle are ruminant animals, meaning they have a four-compartment stomach that allows them to convert low quality forage (grass/hay) into high quality beef protein. The four compartments of their stomach are rumen, reticulum, omasum and abomasum.

We all know we get steaks, roasts, and ground beef from beef cattle. Along with byproducts such as leather, crayons, candles, lipstick, and paintbrushes. But other byproducts of beef cattle include chewing gum, gelatin to make ice cream and marshmallows, and even medicines such as insulin.

Beef can be prepared in many ways depending on the cut of meat. Steaks are usually grilled while ground beef is browned or cooked in the form of hamburger. Beef can also be roasted, braised, broiled or stewed.

3 ounces of lean beef contains nearly half of the daily value of protein and has less than 10 grams of fat. Beef also has iron and B-vitamins.

Expert: Texas Outdoor Enthusiast, Livestock Producers, Homeowners Advised to Watch for New Tick

Confirmed reports of the longhorned tick, *Haemaphysalis longicornis*, in seven states have prompted a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service entomologist to alert Texans to its possible arrival here.

Dr. Sonja Swiger, AgriLife Extension veterinary/medical entomologist at Stephenville, said the longhorned tick isn't named for the iconic bovine symbol of the Lone Star State, but rather for the distinctive, but underrated "horns" sprouting from a portion of its head.

"This tick is a relative newcomer to the United States and though it has not been confirmed here in Texas, it has been confirmed in Arkansas," she said. "It's not at all choosy about who or upon what mammal it feeds on or who it dines with, as it has been found feeding right alongside other external parasites."

Some ticks, like the cattle fever tick, prefer to complete their life cycle on a single host. Not the longhorned tick, which Swiger said is a three-host tick, meaning it requires three different hosts to complete its life cycle. Animals on the menu include, but are not limited to: cattle, white-tailed deer, horses, goats, sheep, dogs, cats, opossum, birds and raccoon.

Swiger said she has no reports of it feeding on people in the U.S., though it is known to attack people in Asia and the Pacific. She did say the

longhorned tick is not a known carrier of the pathogen causing Lyme disease.

"Even though there are no reports of it being a Lyme disease carrier, this tick is a known vector of several bacterial, viral and protozoan disease agents that affect both livestock and humans," Swiger said. "So, it's worth keeping an eye on."

"It's an exotic East Asian tick, originally from China, which moved to Australia and then to different locations in the Pacific and eventually here," Swiger said. "It's highly adaptive to a broad range of climates as evidenced by the seven states where it's been documented, which along with Arkansas, include New Jersey, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, New York, and Pennsylvania. So, it's at home in climates from tropical to temperate and is also quite cold tolerant."

Swiger said it's an aggressive biter that frequently builds intensive infestations on domestic hosts such as livestock.

"Their presence causes great stress to the animal, which translates to reduced growth and production, and exsanguination, or serious blood loss," she said.

To make matters worse, Swiger said the tick is parthenogenetic, meaning females can reproduce without a male, so a single fed female tick can create a whole population by herself.

To prevent and offset concerns, Swiger said producers, homeowners and hunters this fall should consider conducting surveillance of ticks on their livestock, pets and harvested game and submit any suspicious ticks they find to: Texas Animal Health Commission, State-Federal Laboratory and follow instructions at <http://www.tahc.state.tx.us/vets/TicksandFlyLarvae-Submissions.pdf>.

"If historic record is any indication, once it arrives, it appears the longhorned tick is here to stay," she said. "But with diligence and management similar to that used with other tick species, serious trouble can be kept to a minimum."

Beware of Armyworms

Many counties are reporting armyworms damage across the state. Armyworms love the cooler temperatures and wet conditions that we are going through currently. With the rain that we received over the couple of weeks, conditions have been favorable for armyworms. Armyworms are picky eaters that prefer high-quality, fertilized forage typically found in fields maintained for hay production.

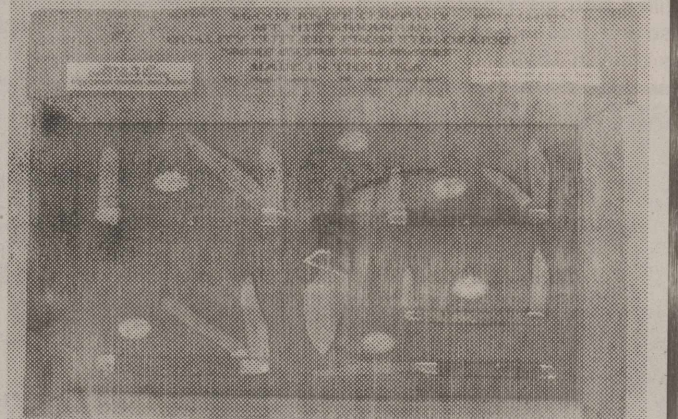

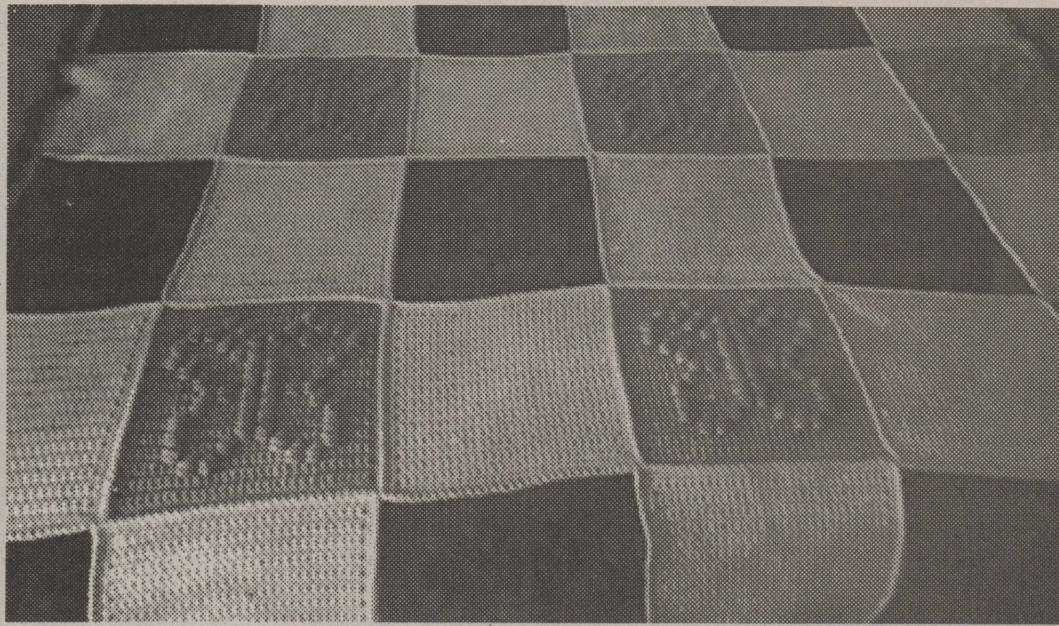

Diplomat and Professor Edwin Kyle

Teachers can change the world, even just one student at a time. Edwin Kyle was one such teacher. The longtime Texas A&M professor and dean not only taught a generation of students but also helped modernize farming in the United States and across the Western Hemisphere. Perhaps known more today as the namesake for the home of Aggie football, Kyle built a worldwide reputation as an educator, scientist, diplomat, and humanitarian.

Edwin Jackson Kyle was born in the Central Texas community of Kyle in 1876. His father, Fergus Kyle, founded the Kyle in Hays County, just south of Austin. It has since exploded into a bustling Austin suburb of nearly 40,000 residents. He was also a former Confederate officer and veteran of the state legislature. It was his father who co-sponsored the 1905 bill with Sam Ealy Johnson, father of future President Lyndon B. Johnson, that allowed the state to buy the Alamo and preserve it as a historic site.

In 1896, he enrolled at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas (which became Texas A&M University in 1963). As was the custom at that time, he became a member of the Corps of Cadets and underwent military training. He was so respected by faculty and his fellow students that he stepped into the position of Commandant of Cadets for three months after the previous commandant resigned. Kyle is the only student to ever serve in that role. Kyle proved a very skilled with his academic work also and graduated at the top of his class in 1899.

He traveled to Cornell University in New York where he received a bachelors degree in agriculture in 1901, followed by a masters degree the following year. In 1902, he was invited back to A&M as an agriculture instructor. In addition to his classroom duties, he had a large field on campus where he experimented with different crops.

By 1904, he was also put in charge of athletics. Seeing as there were few facilities for the football team to practice or play, he set aside a portion of his experimental field and began building a stadium. He purchased the lumber for bleacher seating and bought a grandstand, all out of his pocket for roughly \$650 (or more than \$18,000 in 2018 dollars). Students began calling it Kyle Field in his honor.

In 1911, he was named founding dean of the new School of Agriculture. The next year, he published Fundamentals of Farming and Farm Life, a classic work on agricultural education that was the standard for decades. His expertise as a horticulturist grew steadily. He wrote numerous articles on growing fruits, vegetables, and pecan trees. In 1941, the federal government asked him to tour Latin America to study their agriculture and to teach more modern techniques. Kyle formally retired from A&M in 1944.

However, even at the age of 68, some of his most important work was just beginning. That year, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed him as director of the Houston branch of the Farm Credit Administration, a program designed to help farmers with their finances and to help them

with the means to modernize their farms.

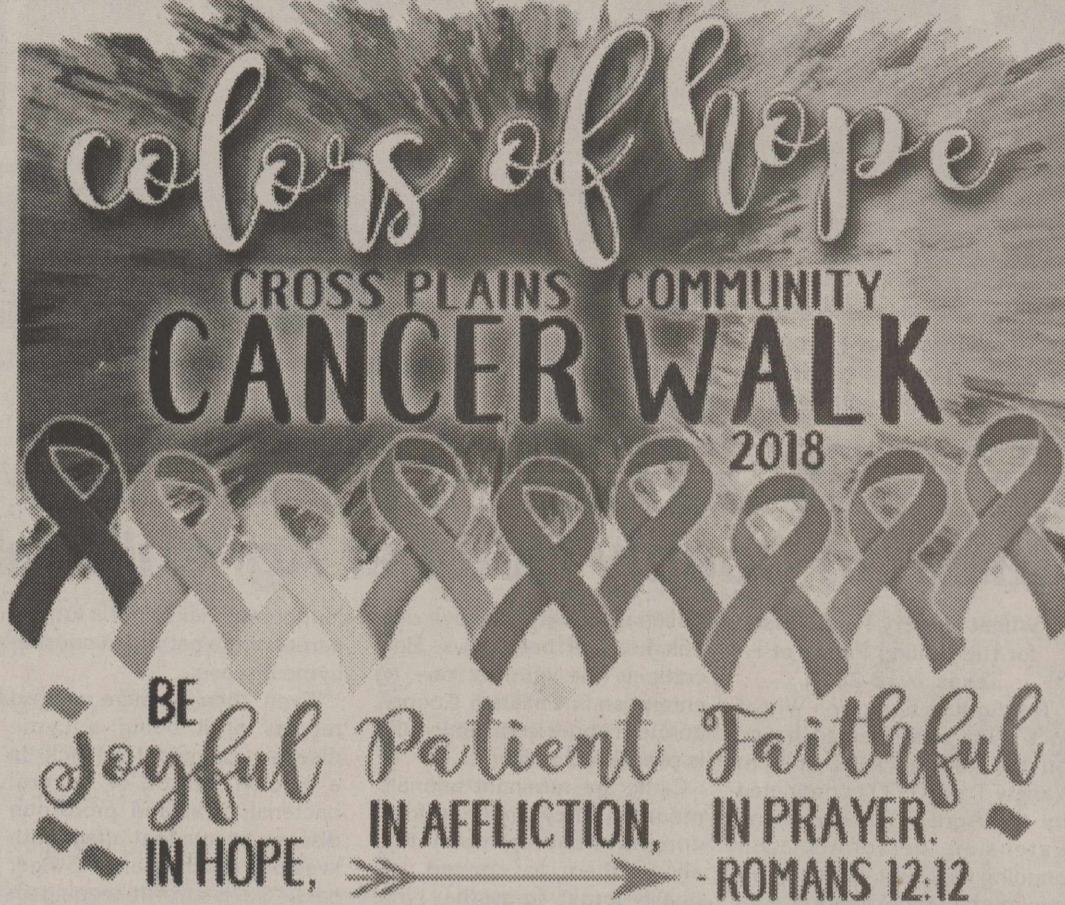
In February 1945, Roosevelt nominated Kyle to become the United States Ambassador to Guatemala. With Roosevelt's death in April and other emergencies surrounding the war, his nomination had some delays. However, he was approved by the Senate in May and sent to his new post in Central America by the new president, Harry S. Truman.

Kyle helped Guatemala continue to modernize its farming techniques during his time as ambassador. He quietly stepped down from the position in 1947. However, after his departure, the Guatemalan government invited him back for a special ceremony to receive the Order of The Quetzal. It is the highest award offered by Guatemala, given to Kyle in honor of his humanitarian efforts for that nation. He is the only American to ever receive the award.

After his return from Guatemala, he returned to Bryan and settled into retirement. The A&M Board of Directors formally named Kyle Field in his honor in 1956. Kyle died in December 1963 at age 87, a beloved figure in the Texas A&M community. His namesake Kyle Field in the years since has continued to be a focal point for the university community and has since expanded into a gigantic stadium capable of seating more than 110,000 people.

Ten nominees are voted on by students in January and the winner is announced in February. This award has been given since 1981 and our library now has all 38 titles.

Since the Texas Book Festival's founding by former First Lady Laura Bush and others in 1995, part of its mission has been to promote Texas libraries and literacy. Each year, proceeds raised at the annual Festival fund the their Texas Library Grants. Over \$3 million has been awarded to more than 800 libraries across Texas. The 2018 Texas Book Festival Weekend will take place on October 27 & 28 on the grounds of the state capitol in Austin.
