He was born into a family with a taste for adventure who often ended up on the front row to the historic events of the times. In 1804. Hays's grandfather sold his expansive estate, the Hermitage, near Nashville to Andrew Jackson, then an up-and-coming judge as well as Jack Hays's distant great-uncle. Hays's father fought with Jackson during the War of 1812.

Houston named Hays to a Ranger unit, serving with Erastus "Deaf" Smith and Henry Karnes. Hays came to Texas in the midst of chaos and spent much of his time with reconnaissance work stunning the populace. The

By 1840, he had risen to the rank of captain. But Texas was at its weakest, with sparse ability to even defend itself. The Rangers had the backbone of frontier defense for the republic. Hays in response staged an assault on Laredo, a town claimed by Mexico in the disputed territory between the NuecesRiver and the Rio Grande. He returned the horses the Rangers had seized in the raid, promising that the raid was a warning. He would lead another raid against Mexico later that year.

After years of fighting largely on their own turf, Comanches decided to even the score and launch a surprise raid deep into Texas, in those maddening weeks as 1841 Comanche raid brought

By John Jefferson **RAIN DIDN'T HELP**

One year, an article in the **TPW Outdoor Annual about** quail was entitled "Just Add Water." Much of Texas' quail range lies in south and west Texas -- areas often hard hit by infamou Texas droughts. Those areas usually need rain. Add some, and they often have quail. Much of these areas caught good rains during the fall. So, did that bring on a bountiful quail hatch? No! That surprised me, too. The rains came a little late to spur the pairing and breeding that quail usually go through if rain hits in the spring or summer. The population was already drought-depleted when the rain began. Robert Perez, TPWD's top quail man, said there was some pairing after the nourishing rains refreshed the range in the fall, but the rains were more a detriment than a salvation. in the high water failed to survive the cold weather conditions. that arrived a little early this winter. Another reminder that man does not control the weather. Perez did have a couple of positive things to say about quail. 





Sixth Largest Company **Relocates to Texas Dallas Morning News**

DALLAS, TX-McKesson Corporation, the nation's largest pharmaceutical distributor, announced it will relocate its headquarters from San Francisco to Irving in April. The company has more than 75,000 employees globally. It ranks sixth on the Fortune 500 list. With the move, McKesson will become the second-largest by revenue to be based in North Texas, surpassing AT&T Inc. The largest, Exxon Mobil, is also headquartered in Irving. McKesson began setting the stage for its relo-

• Twenty-four out of 26 cation last spring. It opened a North Texas campus in Las Colinas and relocated U.S. Pharmaceuticals Group. its largest business unit and biggest revenue driver. When its campus opened, it brought about 1,000 jobs to Daklas-Fort Worth. Since then, it has grown to about 1,600 jobs at the campus. With the headquarters relocation, McKesson's top executives will be based in North Texas. Company officials say the relocation will bring additional jobs in divisions such as human resources, finance and accounting and corporate strategy, but it did not specify a number. The company has about 500 jobs in San Francisco, and most of those will move to Irving or another company hub by 2021.




