

### Local Option Order

Commissioners' Court,

May 19th., 1905. On this day the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, met in Special Session, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes of an election duly and legally held at the Court House in Silverton in Justice Precinct No. one (1) in Briscoe County, Texas, on the 8th., day of May, A. D. 1905, in accordance with an order of this Court for an election to be held at the Court House, the reg ular voting place within the said Precinct, in said County, to determire whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in said Justice Precinct No. one, in the said Briscoe County, Texas, said order made and entered on the Minutes of the 17th., day of April. 1905, as original order of Commissioners' required by law. And it appearing to the Court that County Cerk of said County had duly posted notices of said election in the manner provided by law, and on file in my office. the Court having opened the polls as shown by the returns of said election, and fully counted the votes cast at the same, as shown by said returns, and, it ap count, fully and tairly made, and the result felly ascertained at the said election so held, as aforesaid, that there were 91 votes cast at said election, that there were cast "For Prohibition" 69 votes and "Against Prohibition" 22 votes, and that a majority of 47 of the legally qualified voters of said Justice Precinct No. 1 in said county, voting at said election did vote "For Prohibition."

Now, therefore, it is hereby by the Commissioners' Court Briscoe County Texas, pursuant to Article 3390, of Title 69 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, by this order declared that a majority of the votes cast at said election so held, as aforesaid, were "For Prohibition," and that the said election hath resulted in favor of the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating lipuors within the limits of the said Justice Precinct No. one (1) in Briscoe County, Texas, except as provided by law.

It is therefore, now, hereby declared, that the sale of intoxicating liquors, except for the purposes and under the regulations prescribed by law, in Justice Precinct No. one (1) in qualified voters of said Justice Chronicle.

Precinct No. one (1) in said County of Briscoe, may, at a legal election, held for that purpose, by a majority vote determine otherwise.

Wherefore, the County Judge of this, Briscoe County, is hereby ordered to have this order published as provided by law.
