

Silverton let the world know that there was such a place on the map and impressed upon the railway commission the fact that we want and need a railroad, or railroads. We also got some very favorable publicity in all the state papers. We got everything we went after except the railroad, and we started it on the way.

There are pessimists, knockers and bolshevik's in every comnamity. Silverton has her share, but it is refrsehing to know that there are enough progressive citizens to put over a "stunt" like the Plainview trip which did no harm in the world and will result in untold good.

TYPHOID FEVER

A number of cases of Typhoid Fever are reported in Silverton and vicinity. This is to be expected. Typhoid fever is a filthborne disease which is communicated from one person to another by germs from the bowels of an infected person, reaching the mouth of a well person. The most common carrier of the germ is the fly, however it is often transmitted through water or milk.

The insanitary condition that exists in Silverton nont only allows multiplied breeding places for the flies but adds to the Typhoid menance. Flies crawl over infected filth and carry the germs on their hairy legs direct to adjacent homes.

In cities where water supplies are protected and sanitary laws are inforced typhoid has been reduced to nill. No one is foolish enough to argue that the passage of a sanitation ordinance here would absolutely rid us of flies but it would certainly reduce the ir enace.




