RAIL REQUESTS TO BE ARGUED ON JULY 19

Thursday announced that a hear ing has been granted on the application of the four railroads seeking to build extensions into the South Plains of Texas and the date for such hearing before the entire commission has been set for July 19.

This is expected to prove the most important railroad case to be taken up by the commission during the Summer, for not only are the four applicant railroads -Burlington, Santa Fe, Frisco. and the Texas Panhandle and Gulf-directly involved, but it has attracted the interest of many others.

President Loree of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Hudson and allied roads seeking an outlet to the Southwest has indicated he will have an observer pres ent at this hearing, as have the Van Sweringens, who are seeking to consolidate the Nickel Plate system with a Southwestern connection.

Authorities disagree as to the origin of the Wyandotte family of chickens, but it is thought that they were introduced into America about 1866. This breed of poultry being gentle and do not have a tendency to fly. They are good forager and lay the year around.

The birds are a silver in color, having considerable markings on the wings and breast. The hens weigh about six and one half

pounds, while the cocks weigh about eight and one-half pounds. Most people prefer the clean legs on the Wyandotte fowl although hens with feathers may

To Destroy Insects

There are two classes of insects which are very harmful and destructive to the garden and truck crops, viz the sucking and the biting or chewing insect.

The sanjose scale which is killing the peach and plum trees of planning what the club would do the country and the squash bug The club will be belong to the sucking insect family, while all those insects such as the ghasshopper, potato bugs, and angel food cake were served and worms which eat the leaves of the plant, belong to the biting The club will meet next Thurs or chewing insect family. Remedy for biting or chewing insects: Spray the plants with mixture made of 1 1-2 lbs. of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water. If you will add about M. U. ladies. At noon a most 5 lbs. of lime to this mixture it will adhere or stick to the foliage or leaves of the plant much better. This mixture will kill oo per cent of the insects which attack the garden crops. If you desire to make this spray in a small quantity, put I tea spoonful of arsenate of lead to each gallon of water.

Remedy for destroying sucking insects: Spray with kerosine emulsion; take one gallon hot water, dissolve 1-2 lb. of strong laundry soap in water, then take away from fire and add 2 gallons ciety met at the church on last of kerosine to the hot wter. 


