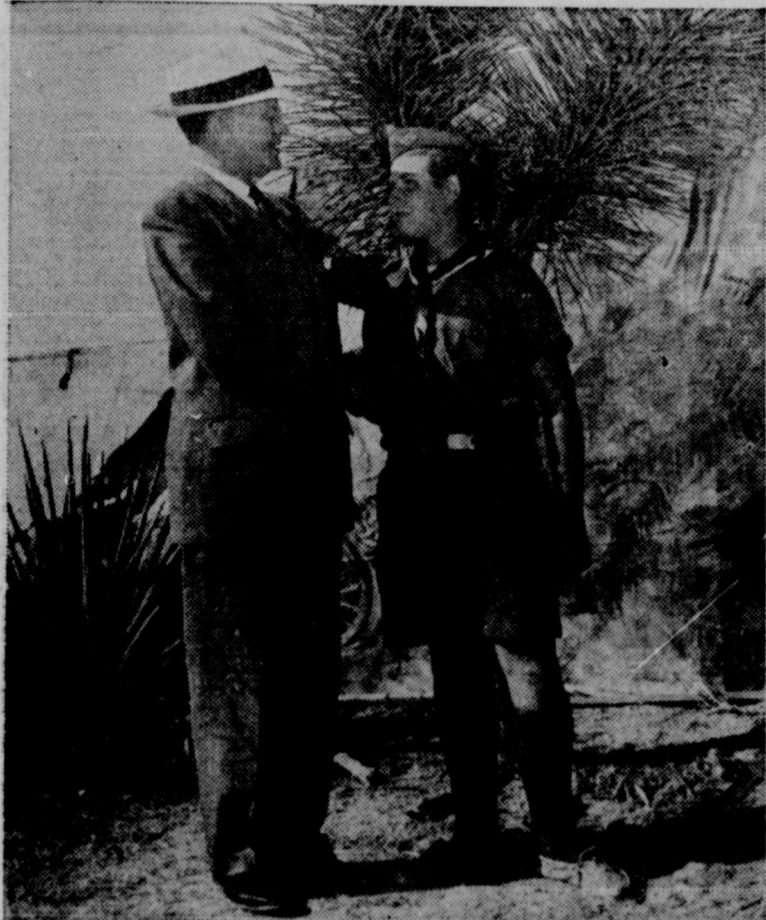

Alva C. Jasper Honored as Outstanding Farmer

On Thursday evening, July 30, the Silverton Lions Club honored Alva C. Jasper, Rockcreek community, as the outstanding conservation farmer in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District for 1952.

This award is sponsored by the Fort Worth Lions Club and local Lions Club, working with soil conservation districts in Texas. Mr. Jasper was chosen by the supervisors of our local district.

His program for 1952 was: 80 acres Austrian winter peas; 20 acres clover and alfalfa mixture; 10 acres Madrid clover, overseeded on native grass; 20 acres Austrian winter peas, vetch and rye mixture.

In the last three years Mr. Jasper has had a legume on all of his land but 20 acres. The farm consists of 318 acres. He has results to show that this program is a paying proposition. In one case he followed Austrian winter peas with combine maize. This maize made 900 pounds more grain per acre than adjoining land that had been fertilized. Both of these fields received the same number of waterings and tillage operations.

Mr. Jasper is continuing this program in 1953 with 100 acres of cowpeas planted with combine maize and 20 acres of wheat overseeded with Madrid clover this spring.

Co. Agent Ledbetter Checks Two Irrigated Cotton Fields Friday

County Agent Robert Ledbetter reports that he checked two irrigated fields Friday afternoon for bollworm. He found 6 eggs and one worm in the 200 acres that he checked over. Such an infestation would not warrant poisoning, said Ledbetter. If 6 to 10 eggs or worms are found per 100 cotton stalks examined, poisoning should begin immediately. It should continue at weekly intervals until the worms are cleaned up. There are several insecticides that will do a good job, but a 2 to 1 mixture of toxaphene and DDT will probably do the best job now, reported the agent.

The bollworm can really get lots of cotton quick if it is let go unchecked, so farmers should watch closely to see if the infestations of the worms are running up.

"These spot checks are not good as a picture of the area, but will have to do until next week at which time I hope to have several co-operators that will check the insects in their own fields and report in for the several areas of the County," said Ledbetter.

Mr. L. A. McMinn, who farms north of Silverton has indicated that he would check his fields and report in once a week. Several more of these are needed as a county wide situation can then be made. This will mean money in every ones pocket as worms make little preference to whose field they get in. You can share in your neighbors work as the County Agent would never have the time to look at all the fields in the County.

Texas Longhorn Cavern Enjoys Many Visitors

Burnet, August 5—Texas Longhorn Cavern, world's third largest cave and one of the state's top scenic wonders, is heading for its second quarter-million visitors. A pretty blonde girl from Houston became the 250,000th visitor to the huge cavern since it was opened to the public more than twenty years ago.

Mrs. Marlene Chadick, 22, passed through the legendary Sam Bass entrance with a group of visitors from Houston and was greeted by H. H. (Hob) Galloway, manager, and other cavern officials. She was presented with a complete western outfit as a memento.

The quarter-million attendance record was established at the high point of the cavern's best tourist season to date, Mr. Galloway said. Attendance so far is running ahead of the cavern's best year, which was 1951.

The record was also the second milestone in the past few days for Mr. Galloway, who doubles in brass as a Burnet bank president, Chamber of Commerce director and chief booster for Longhorn Cavern.

He was recently presented with an engraved watch for his 20 years service as cavern manager, at a banquet attended by more than 100 guests. The guests included Chamber of Commerce officials from the neighboring towns of Lampasas, Bertram, Marble Falls and Llano. Also Frank D. Quinn, chairman of the Texas State Parks Board, and Max Strahe, head of the lower Colorado River Authority.

The cavern is located in Longhorn Cavern State Park, four miles south of Burnet. Two miles of its eight miles of explored length have been developed and lighted. Guided tours are scheduled seven times daily.

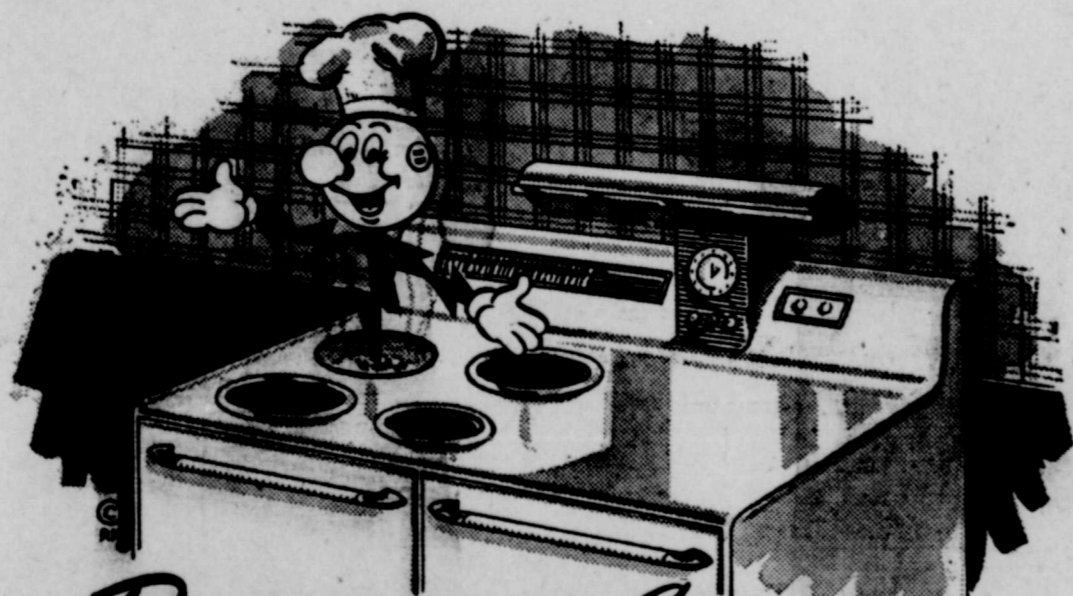

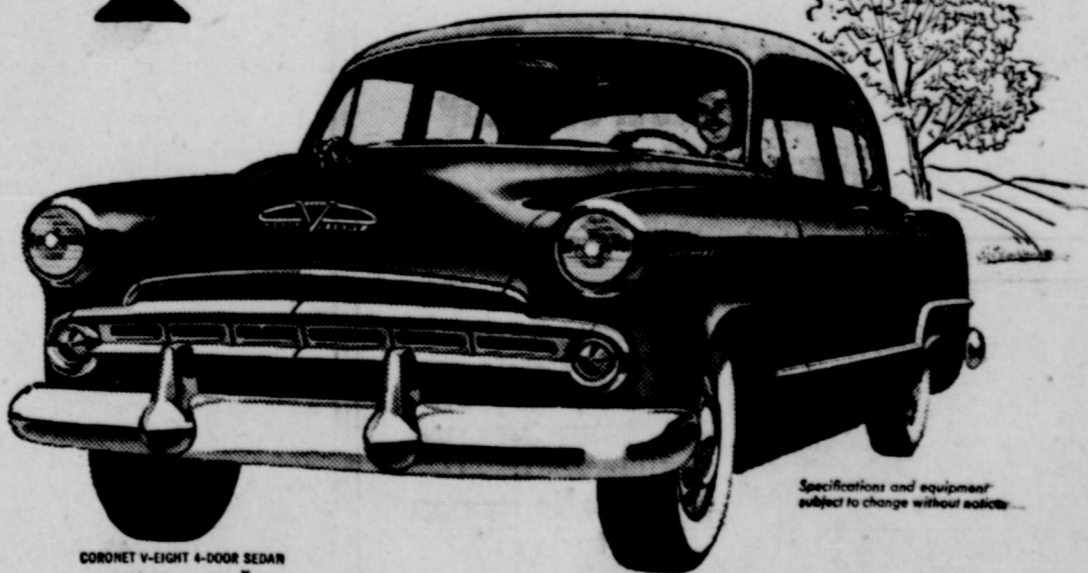
