Tractor Maintenance School Here Saturday

A tractor Maintenance School will be held Saturday afternoon beginning at 1:00 P. M. in the County Court Room.

Each year farmers lose thousands of dollars through improper tractor care. Considering the amount of money that a farmer invests in his machinery and equipment proper maintenance and care should be one of the first thoughts. Tractor dealers and machinery men report that the life of any may be lengthened two or three years by good maintenance.

Wayland Fitzgerald, Joe Lynn Bomar and Elton Cantwell, farmers from this County, will conduct the demonstration. These three men attended a tractor Maintenance School at Lubbock this winter sponsored by the A. and M. College of Texas Extension Service and the Standilind Oil Company. Here these men learned the essentials of proper tractor care.

This school will not take up any complex subjects that only a mechanic could do but will explain and demonstrate the essentials of maintenance and care that can be cared for on any farm by the farmer himself. It will be the essentials that makes a tractor engine last longer than is normally expected.

The Tractor Dealers of Silverton are assisting and taking part in this demonstration. Their assistance will make it a success, and is greatly appreciated.

Topics to be discussed and demonstrated on are Tractor Safety, Air Cleaner, Lubrication, Operators Manual, Electric System and The Carburetor.

If you want to save some money and want to learn some good tractor practices, Saturday afternoon will be one well spent at the Tractor School, according to Mr. Robert Ledbetter, County Agent.

Reports on Highway Accidents In This District

A report on Rural accidents investigated by Texas Highway patrolmen in the Amarillo District during March 1954 shows that there were; 2 persons killed, 53 injured and the estimate of property damage was \$61,529. 75 of the accidents were on State and Federal Highways, 7 on Farm to Market roads, 12 on country roads and 2 in small towns with a population under 2500. The principle violations as causative factors were; speeding, driving on the wrong side of the road, careless and reckless driving and failure to grant right of way.

In March of last year the statistics were as follows: 18 killed, 83 injured, \$64,650 property damage. In February, 1954 they were: 4 killed, 57 injured, \$86,680 property damage.

In carrying out their basic duties, the 28 patrolmen of the Amarillo District No. 5, composed of 28 Panhandle Counties, performed the following activities during the month of March, 1954: 96 accidents investigated, 547 Traffic arrests, and 1362 Warnings for Hazardous Violations, 4186 hours worked during the day and 2500 hours worked at night.

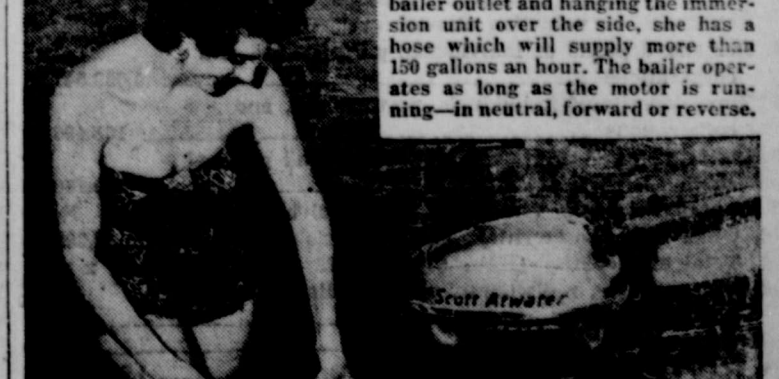

GAS MODERNIZES BRISCOE HOMES

Liquefied petroleum, sometimes called bottled gas, has been a big factor in the modernization of a majority of Briscoe County's 1,100 homes in the past five years.

A study by the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association shows that the high heat fuel has pushed many wood-burning cookstoves and kerosene heaters into obscurity and has helped homemakers here take advantage of modern automatic equipment for kitchen, laundries and comfort heating.

County appliance dealers say sales in recent years indicate a local tendency to buy top-quality appliances incorporating up-to-date controls, modern insulation, easy-to-clean parts and other improvements that eliminate chores and help convert the kitchen and basement into living area as well as improved work space.

Manufacturers of gas clothes dryers report public interest here in this comparatively new member of the gas appliance "family" which eliminates the clothesline routine and saves laundry damage from frost, dust and wind-lashing. Non-farm rural homes also have taken kindly to the high-speed gas incinerator as an answer to garbage and trash disposal problems.

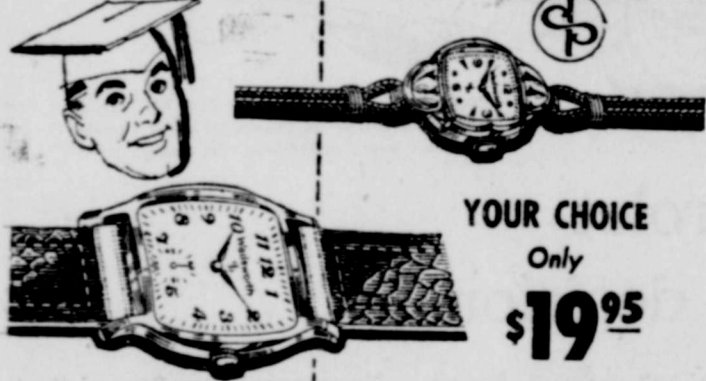

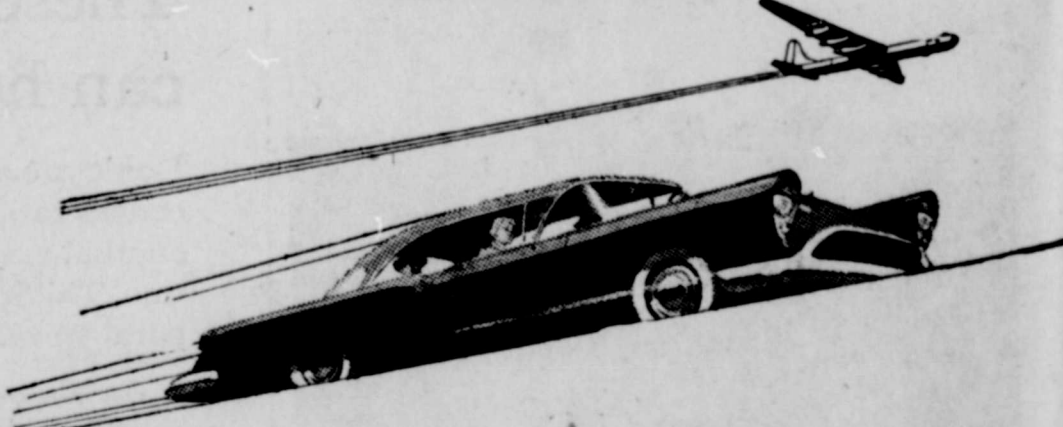
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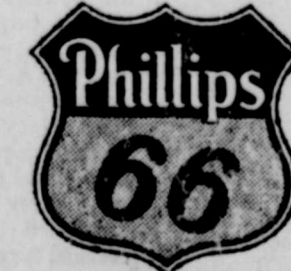

SCIENCE and your Health

THE AUTOMATIC EYE
By Science Features

The miraculously sensitive and delicate instruments that people have on either side of their nose—their eyes—should be greatly appreciated. The camera, a close copy of the eye, has to be continuously adjusted and focused, but the eyes are fully automatic. They can glance from a magazine, out of a window, to a moving object and instantaneously send these sight impulses to the brain for appropriate reaction.

Because of their sensitivity, many parts of the eye areas—such as the lids, cornea or conjunctiva—can be easily damaged. An insignificantly small particle in the eye, the most frequent cause of injury, can result in pain and tears that often stop a person in his tracks.

It is fortunate that people are made extremely miserable by eye trouble, because they then seek immediate relief. Doctors have new instruments and anesthetics to treat the eye and eliminate pain and they also use antibiotics and hormone drugs. The hormones, such as hydrocortisone, relieve the inflammation and antibiotics fight infection. A new preparation, called cortril with terramycin, is the first to combine these qualities for treating a wide variety of eye infections.

There are many common illnesses that can beset the eye: the minor scratch or bruise, styes, the highly contagious pink eye, or the swollen crusty condition called blepharitis are just a few.

Minor ailments, if not cared for, can cause loss of sight, so however slight the annoyance, it should be treated by a doctor.



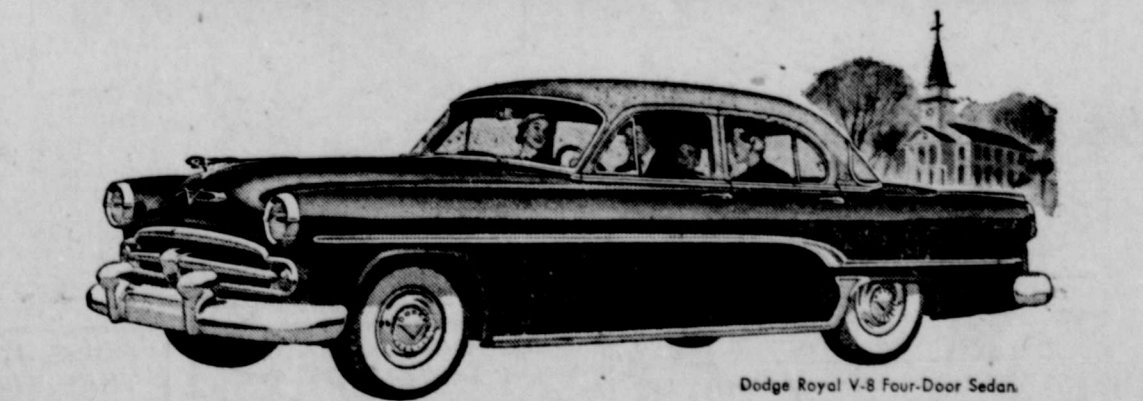
