

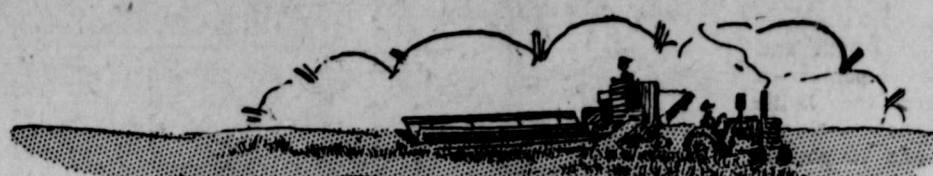

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DON RAY WATTS DIED IN BRISCOE COUNTY HOSPITAL

Accident Fatal to Plainview Lad

Don Ray Watts, 15, Plainview High School sophomore, was fatally injured Saturday afternoon when run over by a truck in a pasture eleven miles east of Silverton.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Watts who reside seven miles southeast of Plainview, died at the Silverton hospital soon after he was rushed here by automobile. His chest was crushed.

The accident occurred about 2:30 on the Carl Dean Bomar farm where Watts and Charles Ray King, had gone to get a dead animal for the Plainview rendering plant.

Don Ray was sitting on a front fender of the vehicle when it hit a ditch. Young Watts was thrown to the ground in the path of the truck.

King a sophomore at Plainview High School, also, got Watts into the truck cab and took him to a farm house from where the injured lad was taken by automobile to the hospital. He died within about an hour.

Don Ray was born August 29, 1939, at Ropesville. The family moved to Hale County about a year ago from Childress.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Monday at the College Heights Baptist Church in Plainview.

He is survived by his parents and three sisters.

Interment was in Plainview.

Texans Will Attend Farm Bureau National Meeting

WACO (Sp1) Texas will send five voting delegates to the 36th annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation which meets Dec. 12-16 in New York.

They are J. Walter Hammond Tye, president of the Texas Farm Bureau; J. H. West of Bishop, secretary-treasurer; B. J. West of Abilene, District 7 director; T. H. Huggins of Alto, District 9 director; and R. A. Fuchs of Brenham, District 11 director.

The number of voting delegates that each state sends to the national convention is based on the membership in the state. The Texas Farm Bureau has 55,670 members.

Delegates to the meeting will formulate policies which will guide the AFBF next year in its dealings with Congress, the President and government departments and agencies.

Speakers at the New York session include Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson; Sir Roger Makins, British Ambassador to the United States; Dr. Milton Eisenhower, president of Pennsylvania State University; Clarence Randall, chairman of the Board of Inland Steel Corp; Senator Spessard L. Holland of Florida, member of the Senate Agriculture Committee; and Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, rector of Marble Collegiate Church, New York.

A special train, carrying about 50 Texas Farm Bureau members, will leave Texas Dec. 7 for the convention.

Use Three Cent Stamps For Christmas Mail

Postmaster E. C. Fowler believes that with a three-cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with a two-cent stamp. "First-class postage," he explained today, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker. And they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary. "This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were delivered. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three-cent stamps may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys." None of these postal privileges

are authorized at the third-class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 3/4 X 4 in. or larger than 9 in. X 12 in. require cancellation by hand, and must carry first-class postage. Postmaster Fowler urges everyone to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles, with each address facing the same way. Then attach the postal labels marked "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT-OF-TOWN DELIVERY." These helpful tags are available at the Post Office, without cost, and will shorten delivery time greatly. Parcel post, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends December 5 for out-of-state gifts, and December 10 for those with local addresses. But the sooner the better. Size and weight limitations for parcel post vary according to place of mailing and destination.

In some cases, packages cannot exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined, or 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits are up to 100 inches combined length and girth, and 70 pounds in weight. Veterans Questions And Answers

Q — I have a nephew who is a World War II veteran drawing a VA pension because he is paralyzed from the waist down for reasons not connected with his service. He gets an extra amount because he needs regular aid and attendance. He has just been admitted to a VA hospital for treatment. Will his extra allowance continue, or will it be cut off?

A — It will continue while he is hospitalized. In many instances, the extra allowance stops when a veteran enters a VA hospital. But it generally is continued for paralyzed veterans and those who lost their sight.

Q — Would it be possible for me to take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill on a part-time basis?

A — No. The law requires that on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill must be on a full-time basis.

Q — My daughter has been receiving VA compensation payments based on the death of my husband, a World War I veteran. She reached her eighteenth birthday during the summer vacation between school terms. Will she be eligible for payments for the time between her birthday and the time she resumes school?

A — Yes. Payments may be authorized for the period between your daughter's birthday and her re-entry into school.

Q — I am the widow of a World War II veteran, and I have never remarried. I also am a World War II veteran myself. Would I be eligible for two GI loans — one on the basis of being an unmarried widow, and the other based on my own eligibility?

A — No. You would be eligible for only one GI loan — based on your own eligibility as a veteran.

Electricity Can't Think BUT YOU CAN

Every now and then you pick up your newspaper and see a story similar to this: "Prominent local citizen dies in freak auto crash. The victim apparently lost control at the wheel, and his car hit a street light pole. Unhurt from the crash, he was electrocuted as he attempted to step out of the auto. Police say that the auto bumper touched a live wire in the pole."

A relatively minor traffic accident turned into a tragedy — because electricity is always alert and ready. The auto, insulated by its rubber tires, became charged with high voltage electricity as it contacted the live wire in the pole. As the driver attempted to flee, he probably stepped to the street, maintaining contact with the car through his hands or body. He may even have safely gotten out, only to turn and shut the door. In whatever manner it happened, his body provided the path for the electricity to follow on its way to the ground.

Should you ever get into such a situation — and we hope you never do — DON'T LEAVE YOUR CAR! It's natural to want to. For after the loud crash as a car plunges into a power pole, there is an almost deathly silence. Then creeping into this silence is an ominous snapping and crackling sound. Wisps of smoke may appear around the tires, or where weeds and grass may be touching the car. This means your car is charged with high voltage electricity. Fight that impulse to get of the car and away from that "dangerous snapping sound" as quickly as possible. Unless fire breaks out, you are safe where you are.

If you feel that you must leave the car, make sure you do it this way: Stand, with your body leaning out through the open door; then jump clear of the car, with both feet landing on the ground. It's very important that at no time you touch simultaneously both the car and the earth. Almost without a doubt, electrocutions will result when your body is contacting both the charged car and earth (or street) at the same time.

Should you be the first to arrive on the scene of an auto-utility pole mishap, stop and think! Don't touch the car and be electrocuted. A dead hero can accomplish nothing! Tell

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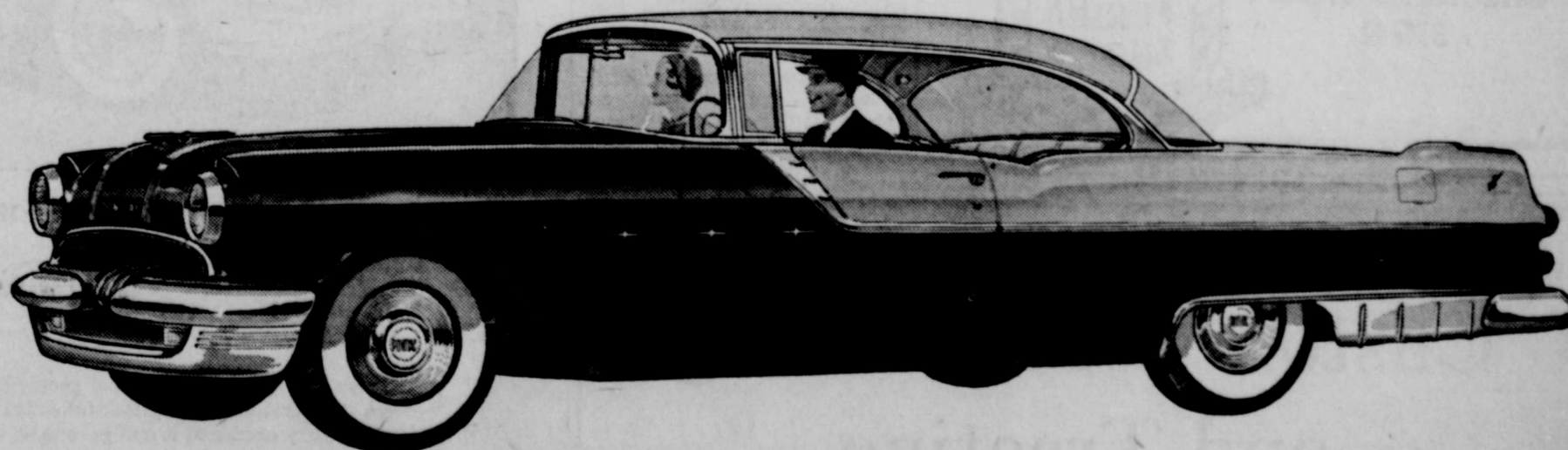

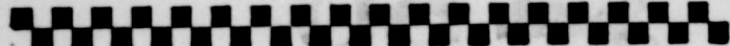
