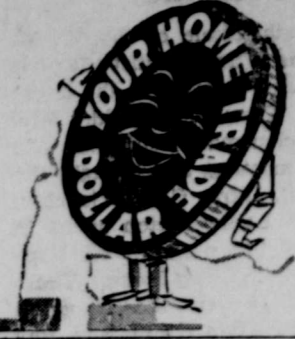

Dr. Cross To Test Cows In Briscoe County

Dr. James Cross Veterinarian from Tullia will be in Briscoe County the 20th and 21st of April to test cows for Bangs and T. B. Dr. Cross will be in Silvertown the 20th and Quitaque the 21st.

Bangs disease in cattle is the cause of the dreaded disease Undulant Fever. Cows are also carriers of T. B. It is the hope that ever dairy cow that is used for milking purposes will be treated. The fee will be very nominal as this is a County wide testing campaign. The charge will be one dollar for each test per head.

Dr. Cross said that in cases where the mileage is too great from Silvertown or Quitaque the charge would be slightly higher.

There is a campaign going on all over the State to clean up Bangs and T. B. This will be Briscoe County's effort.

People that desire to have their cattle tested should contact the County Agent at Silvertown or Mr. O. R. Stark at Quitaque. It is advisable to the number of cattle and the place located as soon as possible in order to get a schedule set up.

Dairy goats also will be tested. The County Agent also states that if he is not in his office to leave your name and the number of cows that you plan to have tested with the Ladies in the ASC office.

Texas Highway Accident Report For March

Nine persons were killed, 67 injured with an estimated property damage of \$47,049, in accidents according to a report issued by the Texas Highway Patrol of District 5. 68 accidents occurred on state and federal highways, 6 on farm to market roads, 10 on county roads and 11 in small towns.

This figure is up from the March report of last year. At that time two were killed and 53 injured during March of 1954.

95 accidents were investigated, 14 speeding arrests made, and 34 DWI arrests.

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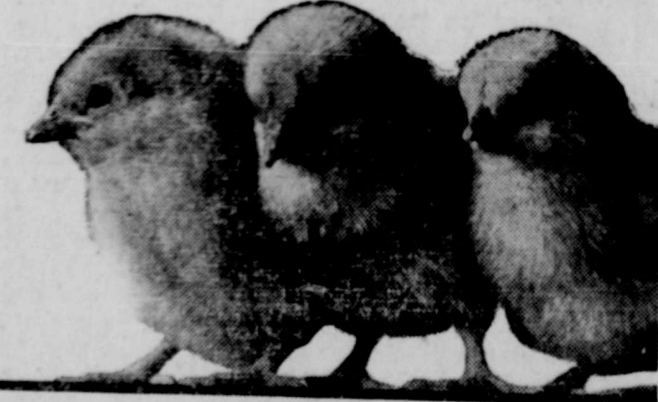

Andy Rogers Bill On Immoral Material Passed

Austin, April 7 — The Texas State Senate Wednesday gave final passage to a bill sponsored by Senator Andy Rogers, District 30, of Childress, that will prohibit the publishing and distribution of lewd, vulgar and depraved literature, moving pictures and penny arcade pictures in Texas.

Aimed at lewd and immoral material that has been rapped as a major contribution factor to problems of juvenile delinquency, the House by Representative G. McIlhenny of Wheeler. A second such measure by Representative Pool of Dallas, dealing only with publication and distribution of comic books, was also passed by the Senate and sent to the House for further consideration.

Passed by a whiping majority in both the Senate and House of Representatives, the bills lack only the Governor's signature to become law.

"This problem of lewd and depraved literature of all kinds being placed in the hands of our children by irresponsible publishers and distributors is one that we cannot afford to shrug off," Senator Rogers said today. "Guided by enlightened public awareness and realization of the growing dangers of immorality and delinquency, we have passed a

measure that can do much to solve this great problem. We realize that morality cannot be legislated. But we can help create a more healthy atmosphere for the growth and development of our citizens of tomorrow."

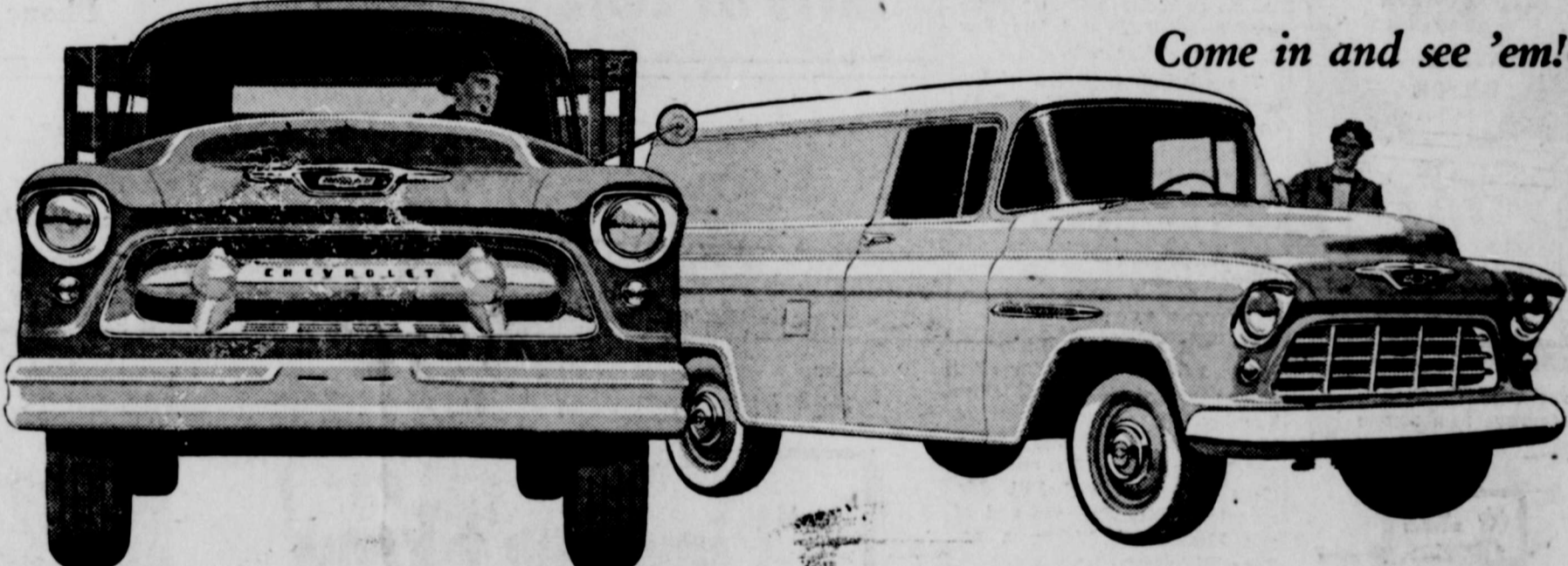

Dairy Industry Offering Scholarships To Graduates

Austin. — Scholarships amounting to \$1,000 each for the study of dairy manufacturing at Texas A. & M. College and Texas Tech were approved this week by the as, Ralph D. Eyer of Wichita Dairy Product Institution of Texas Falls, president, announced.

High school seniors interested in making the dairy industry their career may obtain application forms for the dairy scholarships from their county agent, high school principal, vocational agriculture teacher or the registrar at either Texas A. & M. or Texas Tech, Eyer said.

All applications must be sent to the registrar of one of the two colleges before June 1 along with a 300-word essay on "The Importance of the Dairy Industry of Texas" and a 100-word statement on "My Reasons for Choosing the Dairy Industry as a Career."

The two winners of the scholarships will receive \$250 a year for four years of college study. Scholarships will also be awarded to high school seniors in 1956, 1957 and 1958.

Eyer said there was a shortage of trained personnel in the

dairy industry and it was hoped that through the scholarship program the industry would interest more students in dairy manufacturing and thus fill some of the gaps in the industry.

He pointed out that there were many types of positions in the dairy industry open to personnel with specialized training — training that can be obtained in college. Among the jobs where specialized training is necessary he listed as dairy plant executives, buyers, milk production specialists, sanitarians, pasteurizer operators, cheese makers, ice cream and frozen specialty artists, condensed and powdered milk plant operators, inspectors and graders, control consultants, food specialists, customer solicitors, food demonstration experts, retail and wholesale salesmen, public relation, advertising and merchandising specialists, specialists to handle milk, ice cream, butter and cheese trade association work, research chemists, bacteriologists, engineers, county agents,ists of dairy scientists and business extension specialists, and specialness such as sales engineers, supply sales and distribution men and equipment design and sales experts.

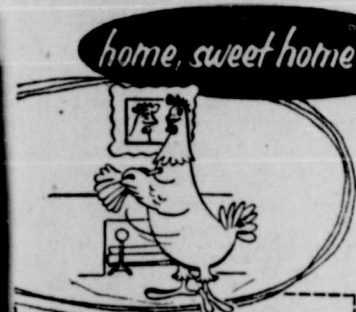

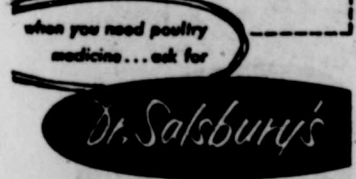

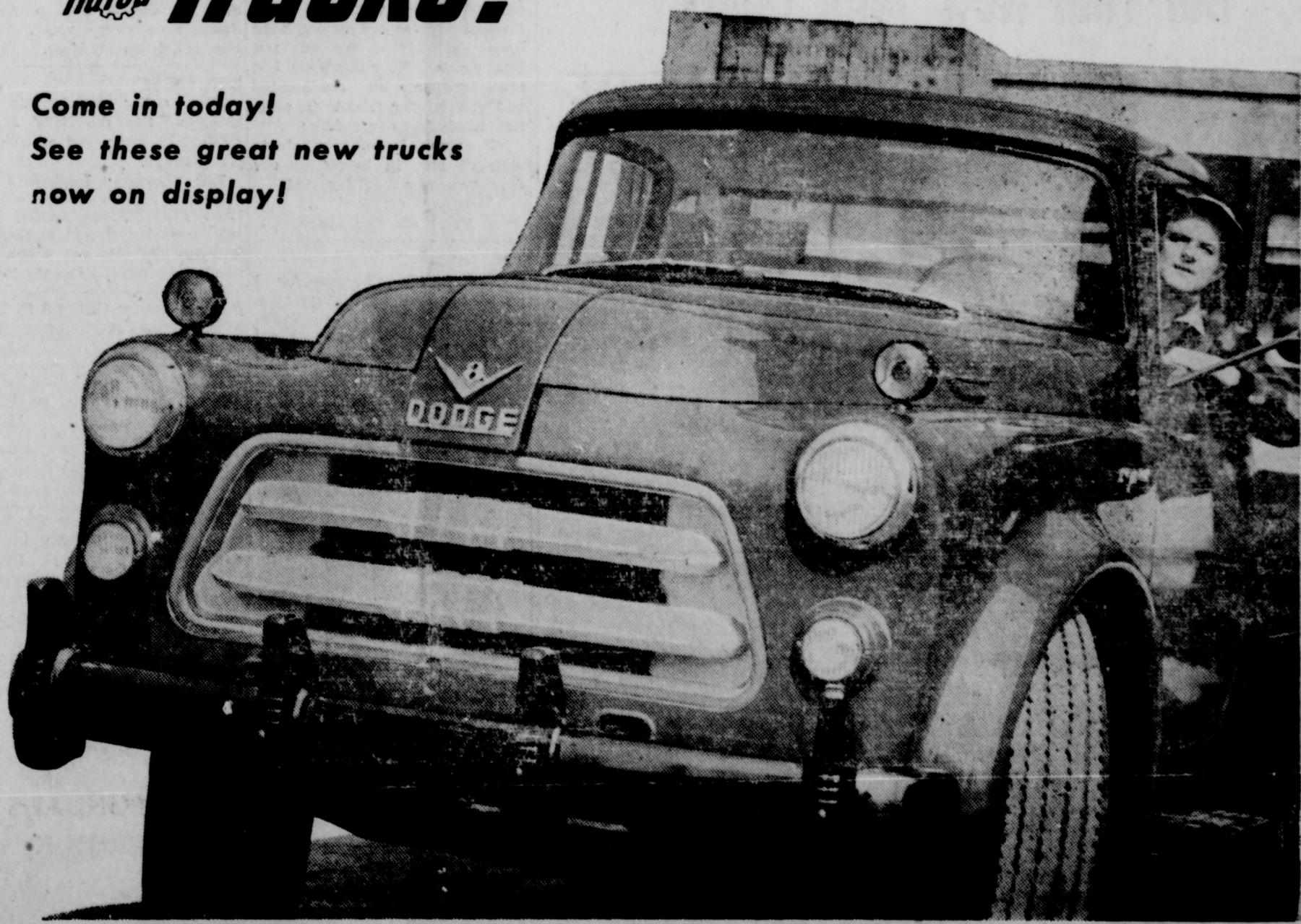
