## First Shots For Children Began On Tuesday

A group of Hale County people went by plane to Austin Sunday to pick up the Saik polio vaccine for five counties, including Briscoe. The shots were started Tuesday with the first and second grades of Quitaque schools receiving the shots on that day. Mrs. Wyatt, Briscoe County school nurse, and Dr. N. L. Powers, of the Briscoe County Hospital gave the inoculations. Silvertown school children started their shots on Wednesday.

The second shot will be given in two weeks.

James Hunt, Hale County Chairman reports that he had received a telegram from Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health officer stating "It will be impossible for National Foundation to offer third dose to same children seven months later."

Tommy plans to continue his schooling after high school at Texas Tech and will major in agriculture.

Charles Mayfield. Charles Wayne Mayfield is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Mayfield. He is completing his fourth year of Vocational Agriculture at Silvertown High School, and will graduate in May. He plans to attend College next fall, but is not definite on the college he will attend. Charles has made for

himself an outstanding record in F. F. A. activities, as shown by his State Farmer Degree application. He has been active in school and community activities. James E. May, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer May, enrolled in agriculture in 1951-52. His productive projects have included beef, dairy, swine, cotton and grain sorghums.

### Handwritten Corrections Of Will Not Recognized In Court

Changing and revoking wills has involved many an estate in litigation because the proper legal methods were not used and the statutes were not followed.

Take the case of Mr. S. Some time ago he went into his lawyer's office and laid in front of his attorney a will which had been prepared for him about a year previously. He said that he had made a few changes in it and wanted to know whether his attorney thought the changes were all right.

Mr. S. was attempting to change two items of his will by drawing lines through certain words in these items and interlining, in his own handwriting, the changes he wanted. He was not attempting to revoke his entire will but merely trying to change these two items.

If Mr. S. were to die with his will in that condition, the probate court would not recognize the changes that he had made, but would probably probate the will as it was originally written. Mr. S. was surprised to learn this and immediately requested that a new will be prepared.

After the will has been once executed, changes cannot be made legally by crossing out parts of a will and interlining corrections or additions. To change a will, an entirely new will must be written and prop-

erly executed or an addition by way of a codicil should be executed.

Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a very easy to postpone doing a modification of the will. It is to do so may result in the in-thing of this kind, but failure tentions of the maker of the will being thwarted to a certain extent.

"My Zoo Family" by Helen Martini, the book review for this week would be of special interest to children. If you have tender spots in your heart for animals you too will enjoy this book, or if you just admire people who do the job in life they like and are suited for.

The Martini's visited the Bronx Zoo in New York City often. They spent their Sunday's and vacations enjoying the animals of the Zoo, until they decided to use the zoo as their means of livelihood, if Fred, the husband could obtain a job there, which he did.

Helen Martini was soon asked to take a baby lion, then three tiger cubs, a leopard and others. She kept them at her home until they were two or three months old then they provided a nursery at the zoo where she tended them until they were old enough to be placed in a cage.

This book is the story of quite extraordinary relationship between Mrs. Martini and the dozens of animals she helped to rear: lions, tigers, leopards, jaguars, gorillas, marmosets, deer and many more. Seen through her fond eyes, each one is a personality, as individual and fascinating as the members of any more conventional family: quick-witted Bagheera, the black leopard who insisted on going home with them every night even though he was getting too old for such. He would sit in the back seat, and when they stopped for a light, people would poke their heads and shout "Is that what we think it is". He learned to take

the paper in every night, and on Saturday when there was no paper she had to have some paper handy to give him or he wouldn't budge.

The melancholy howler monkey required that everyone mourn with him; the clownish lion Zambezi; gentle Dolly, the deer, affectionate and inquisitive; and lovely Dacca, one of the original tiger cubs who grew to superb maturity and regularly produced offsprings which she brought to Martini for her blessings. One of these cubs is in the Forst Park Zoo in Fort Worth.

The Zoo is maintained by private donations, and each year they held membership day, where a parade was staged for the visitors with each keeper proudly displaying his best animal. Afterwards they held a show of the animals who did tricks. One show she was particularly fond of was given by the tortoise. They had three of them weighing from 160 to 300 pounds, and they were ridden by three little girls. They held bananas on strings in front of the tortoise to get them to move. They were named slow, slower, and slowest. In this race slowest won.

Written with much warmth, packed with anecdotes and facts, humorous and observant — this is a book to delight readers of many ages and tastes, all those who have ever prowled through a zoo and are anxious about the world which lies on the far side of the bars.

If you get a chance read this book, its humorous, wholesome and good.





### Tech Museum Popular With School Children

Lubbock, March — Thousands of West Texas school children will have the opportunity this spring to take conducted tours through the Museum at Texas Tech, thanks to a gift by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.
