Cotton John Smith, of Radio Station KGNC Amarillo, will serve as Master of Ceremonies at the Dedication service which will be held Monday evening at 6:30 at the new Claude Crossing bridge.

Plans were formulated and committees appointed for the formal dedication of the bridge and farm to market highway No. 146 at a meeting of the Silverton Business Men last Friday noon. With the completion of this fine bridge and hard-top road, it removed the natural barrier that has slowed travel between the northwest portion of Briscoe County with this section.

J. E. Minyard, chairman of this organization, appointed Shellie Tomlin, J. J. Hall, and Fred Logan to work out plans for the formal dedicatory service. When the group met last Tuesday plans were completed.

Everyone is cordially invited and urged to attend the program at Claude Crossing. Bring a basket lunch and enjoy fellowship together. Ice cream will be furnished for everyone by Perry Whittemore, and the drinks by Tomlin-Fleming Gin Co.

County Judge J. W. Lyon, Jr., and the commissioner's court will be honored at the meeting, as well as others who have worked on the securing and completion of this road.

Many out-of-town notables are being invited to appear on the program. Among those receiving invitations are Marshall Formby, Plainview, member of State Highway Commission; Palmer Massie, Childress, District Highway Engineer; Leroy Saul, State Representative; Walter Rogers, U. ## Uranium Mining Is Underway

Rumors, which were heard in Silverton something over a year ago, that general geographic conditions of the canyons — which have hampered traffic in the Silverton area all these years — looked good for uranium deposits, has gradually grown into facts.

Considerable interest was stirred up when actual assay reports were released from samples on the Mayfield Ranch, located some six miles Northwest of Silverton on the Tule Canyon. Since that time, several discoveries have been rumored and a few officially recorded. It is hard to talk to anyone now, who doesn't know someone who has a find located — just waiting for the right party to come along to help him develop this find.

The editor, along with several others from Silverton, was privileged on last Thursday to visit the site of the first mine located about 8 miles east and two miles south of Silverton. Operations on the Doyle and Clyde Saul Ranch are being directed by Geologist Jeff E. Mayhan, assisted by Henry L. Brotherton, Jr.

A road has been made from the ranch headquarters to the deposit site. Ranch headquarters, which sits close to the rim of the canyons, are occupied by Al Wilson, ranch foreman. The first mine has acquired the name of Quarter Horse No. 1. Mining operations were to start Friday morning, to be carried on in much the same manner as the mining of coal. A shaft will follow the vein back into the side of the mine. Small loads of dynamite will be used to loosen rock formations.

Even the "very young" are enjoying this new era of uranium. Small boys stationed at the entrance of the ranch, where permission must be granted for entrance to the uranium site, are in the business of selling sample ore, which they describe as "hot rock" containing uranium.

Future development is still a matter of speculation, but you can rest assured that it is a known fact that "hot rocks" have been found all up and down the canyons which lie from four to ten miles from the townsite, and circling north and east of Silverton.

Each evening is to be closed with a period of recreation for the entire group and devotional thought presented during a friendship circle. 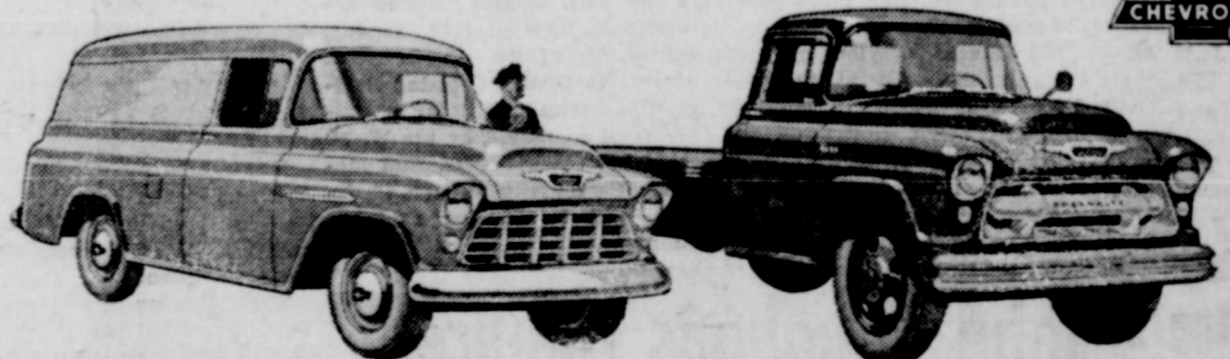

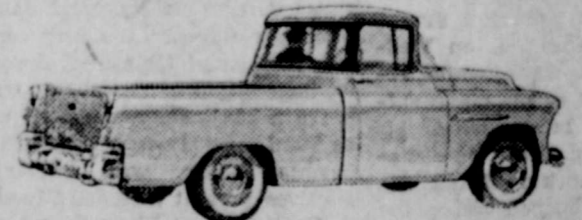

### SS Retirement Discussed

Most older workers know that Social Security payments are "retirement" payments and cannot be paid unless the worker has "retired". It is believed, however, that there is some confusion as to the meaning of the term "retirement".

In the first place, restrictions against persons working while receiving payments applies only to the age group from age 65 through 71. After a person becomes 72 years of age he can receive any social security payments to which he is entitled regardless of the amount of his earnings. People in this group should contact their Social Security Office immediately and file application for payments if they have worked as much as 1 1/2 years in employment or self-employment covered by the Social Security Law.

The rules for making social security payments to workers in the 65-71 age group who are still working are as follows:

- If annual earnings are no more than \$1200 per year, payments to qualified workers can be made for all months of the year.
- If earnings are more than \$2,080 and worker either earned more than \$80 or was actively engaged in operating his business every month of the year, then no payments can be made for any month.
- If earnings over \$1200 and not over \$2,080, or if some months there were earnings of not over \$80 (or in one or more months the self-employed business man was not operating his business himself) payments can be made for part of the months, depending on the facts in the individual case.

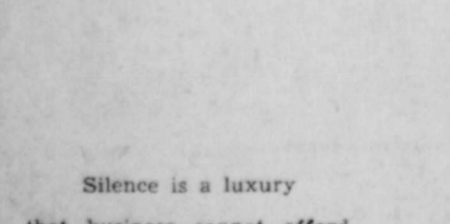

Your grass and legume yield from permanent pasturing can be increased through pasture rotation. This type of pasturing has been greatly simplified with modern electric fences. The electric fence also permits you to take full advantage of temporary pastures, and it is equally as useful for permanent fencing.

M. L. Simpson, Jr., Castro County, reports that his dairy cow pasture produces more profit than any of his crop land. His pasture layout consists of six units divided and fenced all the way around with an electric fence. The dairy cows pasture on one plot only four nights. This system allows the grasses and legumes in the pasture to maintain a high level of vitality that keeps them growing fast and discourages weed infestation. Mr. Simpson has set a record for top production from sixty-five acres of land.

The building of an electric fence is further simplified because the fence is an open circuit. The wire leads from the controller to any number of dead ends; therefore, current for cross fencing may be taken from any point on the fence wire. The circuit is completed through the ground. For this reason your electric fencing equipment need consist of only one wire (for cattle), properly insulated posts and an adequately grounded fence controller.

Experts caution not to use a home-made fence controller of any kind and to install approved units strictly according to the manufacturer's directions. An approved fence controller is designed to deliver only a small fraction of an ampere of electricity for a duration of a small fraction of a second. The current should be interrupted, on-and-off, with impulses carefully limited and spaced. A tested and approved controller makes your electric fence a safe, economical investment for your farm.

**Veterans Questions And Answers**

Q — A friend of mine, on VA's pension rolls, is entitled to an additional amount of money because he is so helpless that he requires constant aid and attention. Will he receive his additional allowance even though his mother provides this aid?

A — Yes. He may receive the additional allowance even though a member of his family provides the necessary services. It is not necessary for him to hire an attendant in order to qualify for the payments.

Q — I understand that if a veteran breaks two appointments for VA outpatient medical treatment, he will not be entitled to further treatment. I broke two appointments, but each time I gave VA at least two days' notice. Will I be barred from further treatment?

A — Since you gave VA at least 24 hours' advance notice, you will not be barred from further treatment. The bar applies only when veterans break appointments without prior notice, and without good reason for doing so.

Q — I am going to school less than half time under the Korean GI Bill. At what rate am I us-

ing up my GI training entitlement?

A — VA considers that you are using your GI training entitlement at quarter time rate. For example, if your course lasts for a year, you will have used up one-quarter of a year's entitlement, or three months.

Q — I applied for disability compensation a couple of years ago. VA asked me to report for a physical examination, but I never showed up. I let the entire matter drop. Now I would like to follow through. What should I do?

A — You must file a new application, since VA has considered that you have abandoned your original claim. Should your new claim be approved, payments may begin as of the date of the new application — not the old one.

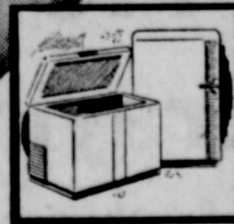

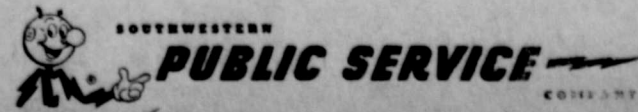
