## Large Crowd at Highway Meeting

The beautiful canyon setting at Claude Crossing, along with a good program, plenty of food and fellowship, went hand-in-hand to provide a good time in general for the four hundred or more who attended the dedication of this new bridge and the additional paving which not only makes Silvertown more accessible to the people of Vigo Park and Wayside, but marks another step in the progress of Briscoe County.

State Rep. Leroy Saul of Kress; District Highway Engineer Palmer Massey of Childress; and Armstrong County Judge Carl Wood spoke at the dedication. Doc Minyard of Silvertown, chairman of the Business Men's Group had charge of the meeting. Rev. G. A. Elrod offered the dedicatory prayer.

After the dedication services the group spread basket lunches together. The soft drinks were furnished and served by Tomlin-Fleming Gin Company, Fred Logan of Willson-Nichols Lumber Company; and J. J. Hall, Silvertown Motor Company. Perry Whittemore of the First State Bank furnished the ice cream for the group.

Those present for the dedication received further encouragement that the additional paving and bridge over Palo Duro Canyon which will connect this section with the Claude area, would be completed before too long. This will cut the distance from Silvertown to Claude from 98 to about 50 miles, and at the same time provide one of the most beautiful drives to be found anywhere.

## Street And Highway Under Construction

Curbing and widening of Highway 86 on Lone Star Street is well underway in Silvertown. Work on the street is being done from the city limits on the west to one block east of the court house. The project is being financed jointly by the property owners adjacent to the street and the state highway department. Property owners pay for the curb and gutter and the Highway Department bear the expense of widening the pavement to the curb. The construction crew is in the process of curbing the street at the present time.

As soon as the curbing is completed Ernest Lloyd Company of Fort Worth will begin removing 12 inches of dirt from the street shoulders where a caliche base will be laid and then topping to complete an attractive and useful street.

Construction of 9 miles of pavement is now underway east of Silvertown and runs to the Quitaque Cap. This portion of road was constructed 20 years ago under the supervision of a W. P. A. construction project. The road will be 24 feet wide and will have a completely new caliche base and topping will be placed on the present road bed, according to O. B. Johnson of Quitaque, who is resident Engineer for the job.

Some interest is being shown in paving additional streets in Silvertown while the construction crew is available. There have been no attempts to curb these streets. Paving strips are estimated to cost \$1.50 per running foot. This looks like the best opportunity to get some more paved streets if property owners will get their blocks signed up.

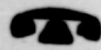

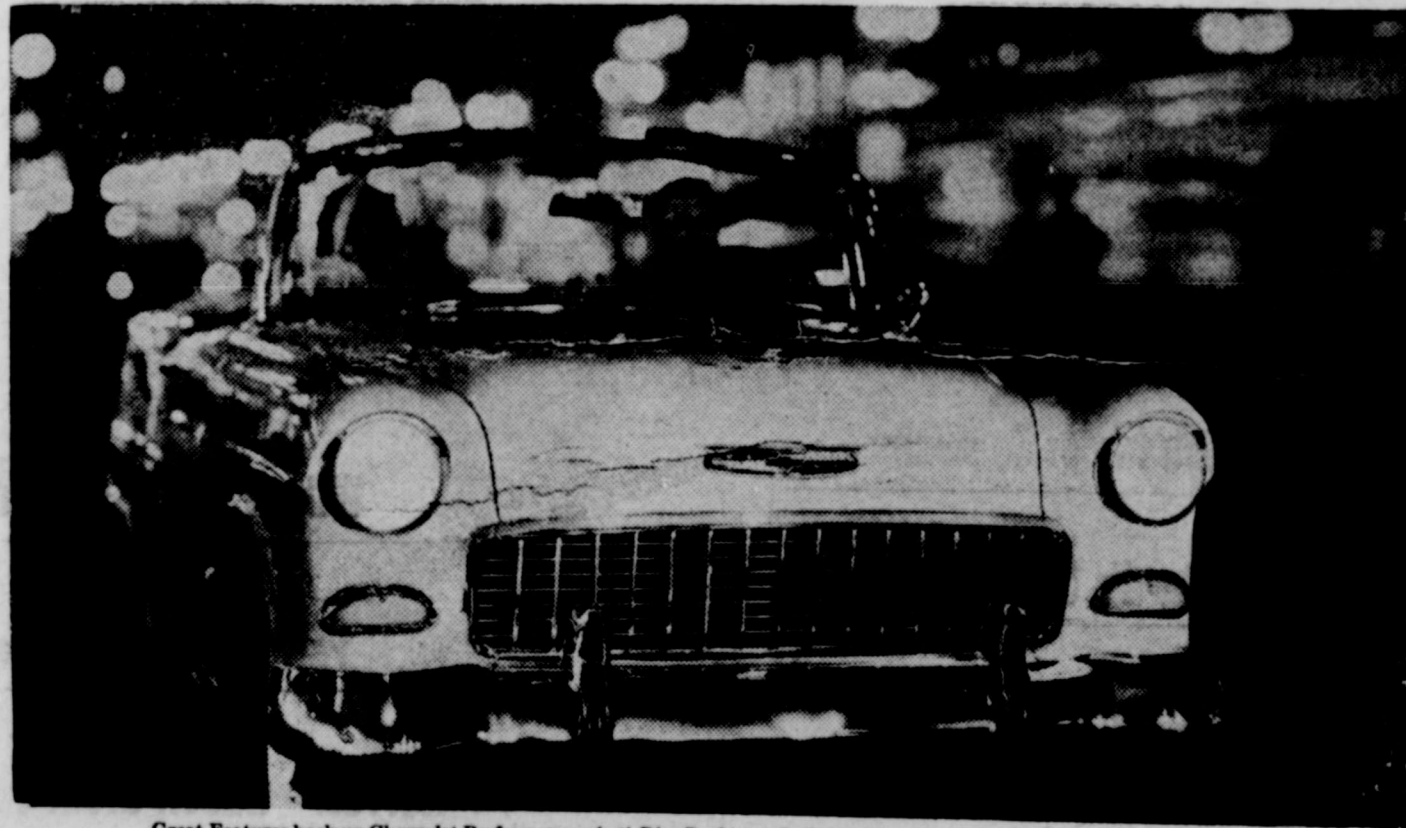

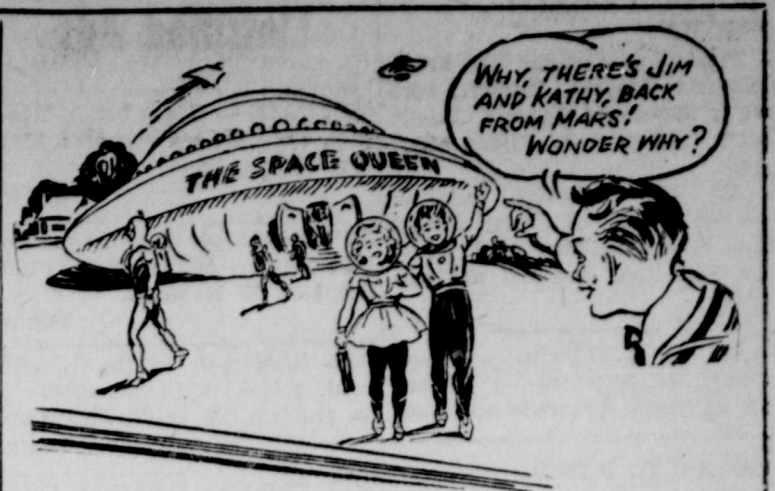
