James Emmett Daniel Briscoe County Pioneer Dies at Floydada

James Emmett Daniel, 88, pioneer Briscoe County attorney and official, passed away at the People's Hospital in Floydada, Texas, at 5:15 a. m., Saturday morning, April 21, 1956, after a lengthy illness. Funeral services were held Sunday at the Silvertown Methodist church at 3:00 o'clock, conducted by Rev. T. W. Condon, Jr., pastor of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, Floydada, assisted by Rev. H. H. Gates. Interment was made in Silvertown Cemetery. Grave services were held by the O. O. F. Lodge. Mr. Daniel was born September 1, 1867, in Hickory County, Missouri. On December 19, 1888, he married Miss Etta Francis Dickson who preceded him in death March 8, 1946. To them were born four sons, two of whom preceded him in death, Robert E. Daniel and Norvel Leroy Daniel. Survivors were: J. M. Daniel and E. Daniel, both of Floydada. Other survivors include five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Moving to Briscoe County in 1892, he eventually settled in Silvertown, where he served as the second district and county clerk and as county judge and county attorney. He was admitted to the bar in 1912. For sixteen years he was secretary-treasurer of the Silvertown National Farm Loan Association. For the past ten years he had lived in Floydada. At the time of his death he was member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Floydada and the Odd Fellows Lodge.

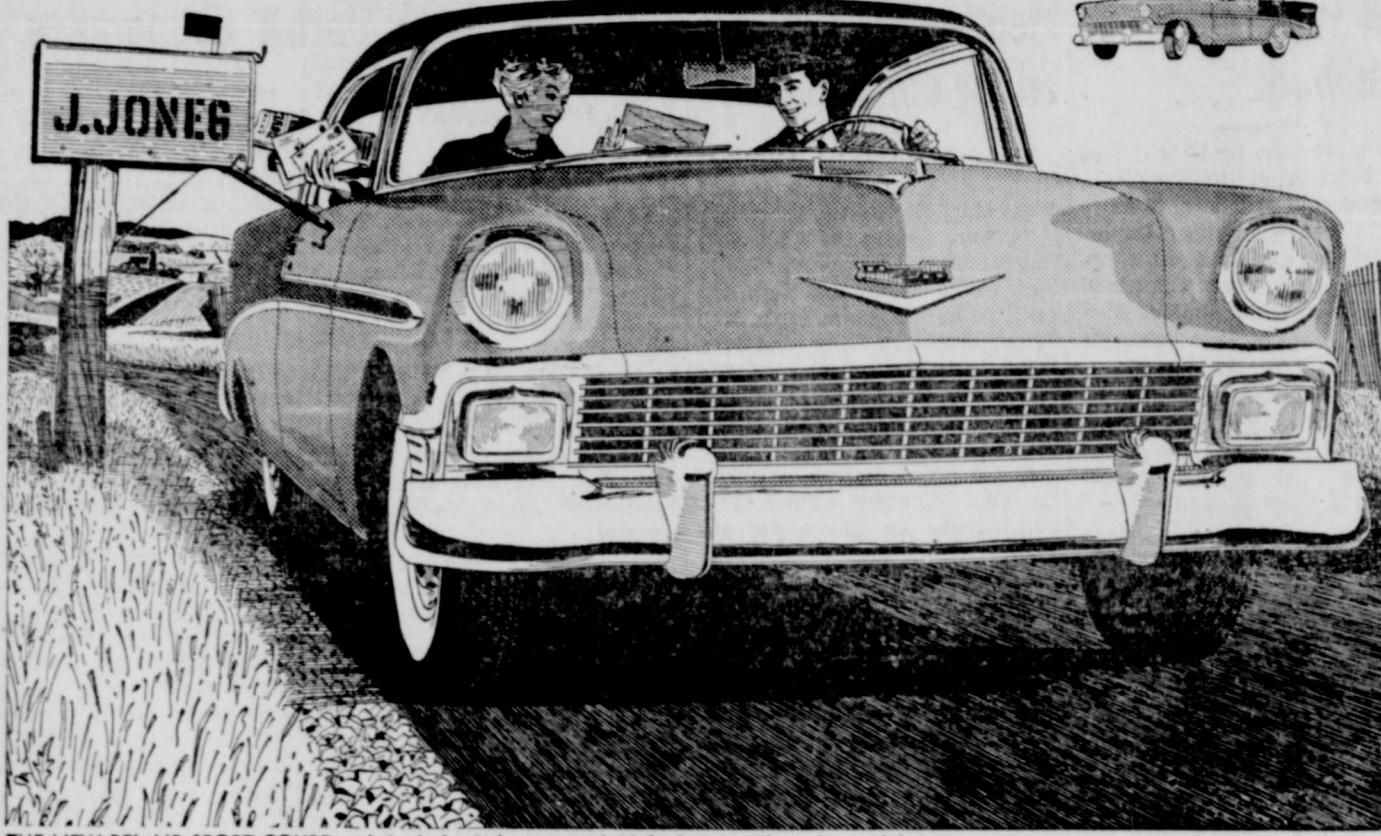
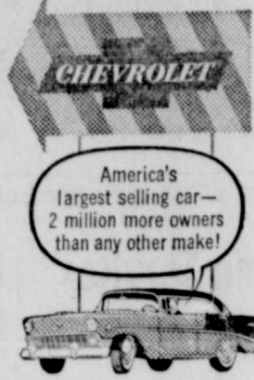

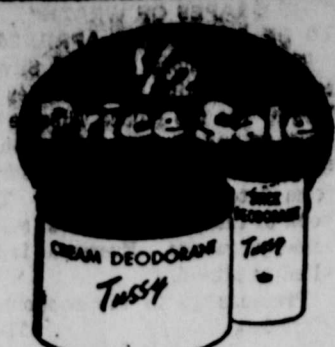
