CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Water Conservation

Our dryland farmers (and there are more of them than irrigated) are more conscious of the need for saving water than they have ever been.

A good example of this is Beth Joiner, eight miles south of Silverton, who has rigged up his own pitter.

Beth put it this way: he needed something to pull behind his chisels or sweeps to make pits numerous enough to do some wood, large enough to hold some water, small enough to not throw you off your tractor when you plow again.

Beth came up with the tool to do the job. One way discs cut in half, welded in a staggered position on a stalk cutter like axle. Each pit holds approximately 1 gallon of water when it falls on the slope and between the terraces.

Mr. Joiner is quick to point out however that this is supplementary to leaving all stubble on the surface. Pointing up the fact that the first principle of water conservation is leaving all residues on the surface.

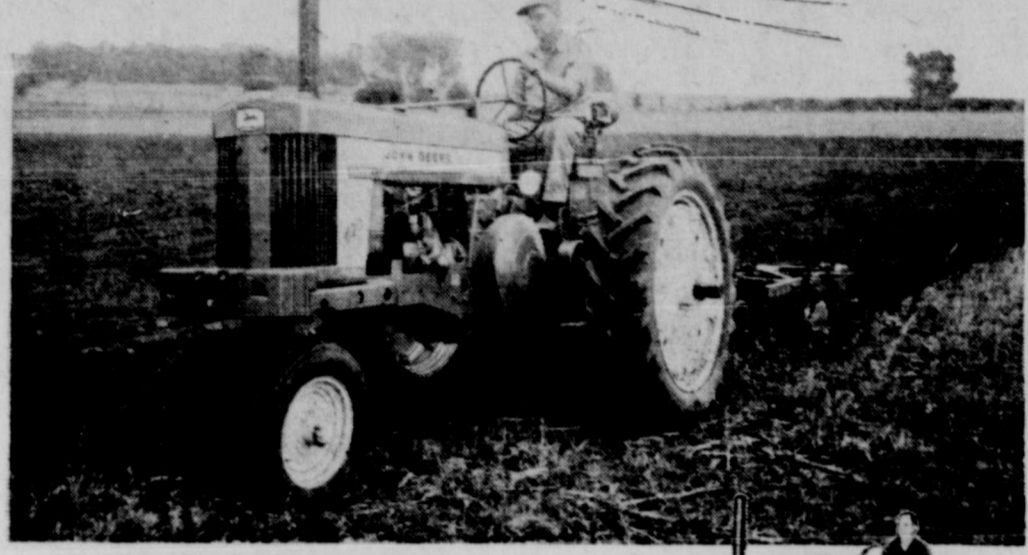
