

New Highway Map Invite Tourists

Glimpses of Briscoe County History **Since 1892**



Gid Mayfield came to Briscoe County in 1886 and his is one of the first claims in the county which can be traced. He filed on his land which was located six miles west and two miles north of Silverion. He lived on one half section and bought two and one-half sections more. He built the dugout pictured above just under the ledge of the top bank of a canyon and lived as a bachelor there for four years. He then married and lived in his half dugout seven years more. They got their water from a spring about a hundred yards from the house. He went to Herald, below Vernon, once each year for dry goods and groceries. He drove 150 head of mixed cattle from East Texas to begin his herd.
