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SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN DECISION

Tribunal Hands Down Far Reaching Decision in Celebrated Safety Appliance Case

Washington, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—By an odd coincidence, a number of vital questions concerning the scope of the Safety Appliance Acts of Congress came before the Supreme Court of the United States about the same time and were answered together.

One of these arose in the suit of F. M. Delk, a brakeman on the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad company, for injuries suffered while attempting to manipulate a defective coupler of a car on a switch in Memphis, Tenn. The United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit finally decided against Delk on the ground that while the railroad was under an absolute duty to equip cars with automatic couplers and other appliances required by the Safety Appliance Acts, yet it was only under the common law duty to exercise reasonable diligence when it came to repairing the appliance. Delk had contended that the acts changed the common law duty so as to make the railroads absolutely liable for not repairing appliances required by the statutes, as well as for not equipping cars with the appliances.

The direct reverse of this holding was announced, by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit, when the United States sought to recover from the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railway Company \$100 for each of four alleged violations of the Acts. There it was held that the railway company was under an absolute obligation to keep appliances with which their cars must be equipped in repair. The railroad claimed that the court held them liable, notwithstanding the company did not know its cars were out of repair and had no intention to violate the law.

Another question was passed

upon by the United States District Court of Colorado, when it held that the Colorado & Northwestern Railroad Company, a narrow gauge railroad, entirely within Boulder County, Colorado, and said to be using locomotives and cars equipped with the old link and pin couplers was liable to the government for a violation of the law. In so doing the court held that it was not necessary in order to bring a connecting carrier within the Safety Appliance Acts for it to have an arrangement for a continuous transportation or shipment with the preceding carrier. The courts had always held that such had been necessary to bring a carrier within the interstate commerce act of 1887.

The United States District Court for Northern Alabama went even a step further. It held that the United States was entitled to a penalty from the Southern railway company for an alleged violation of the Safety Appliance law in a case where a shipment originating and ending within the state of Alabama, was carried in a car not properly equipped. The court held that this was a violation of the law because the car was used sometimes for interstate commerce, and therefore was an instrumentality of interstate commerce.

EAGLE PASS FLOODED WITH REFUGEES

Foreigners Fearing Attack by Rebels Flock to American Side in Swarms

Eagle Pass, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—Swarms of Mexicans and Americans are hurrying to Eagle Pass today expecting an attack by the rebels on Ciudad Porfirio Diaz at any moment.

Lieutenant Alvarado of the federal garrison has only fifty men in his command to hold the city and it is probable that he will surrender without any resistance. The attack is expected to be made tonight.

REBELS MODIFY THEIR DEMANDS

Three Cabinet Members and Fourteen Governors Demands of Insurrectos

Juarez, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—The rebels have modified the conditions on which they at first agreed to consider terms for peace and instead of four cabinet members are now asking only three.

They still hold out for fourteen governors of states. The federal government in its first peace proposal wanted to give the rebels but one cabinet officer.

It is doubtful under present conditions if the rebels can force better terms than these from the federal government.

FLEEING NORTH ACROSS THE RIO GRANDE

Foreigners Leaving Mexico in Train Loads Coming to United States

Laredo, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—Fifty Pullman passengers were aboard the trains reaching here today from parts of Northern Mexico, mostly from Saltillo. They consisted in greater part of women and children. The men were left behind to look after their property rights.

JUAREZ VICTORY UNITES INSURRECTOS

Planning to Gain Control of Entire North Part of the Republic

Chihuahua, May 13 via El Paso May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—News of the fall of Juarez was served to unite all the scattered bands of rebels in the states of Sonora, Durango, Zacatecas and Agua Calientes. Madero is now planning to gain control of all these states.

ARMISTICE COVERS ALL MEXICO

Leaders of Both Sides to Agree to Peace Compact That Covers All of Mexico

Juarez, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—Within twenty-four hours an armistice will be declared by the warring factions that will cover all Mexico. A time and place will be designated and the peace envoys will undertake the second time to restore order to the Mexican country.

THE DEUTSCHLAND DIRIGIBLE WRECKED

After Six Weeks' Service Count Zeppelin's Latest Air Craft Is Total Loss

Dusseldorf, Prussia, May 16.—(Special to the Signal)—Count Zeppelin again today experienced another misfortune in the loss of his latest air craft, the immense dirigible balloon, the Deutschland that had seen only about six weeks of service. It fell today on the roof of its shed and is a total wreck.

SANTA FE TRAIN SERVICE

Officials Party Pass Through Snyder on an Inspecting Tour

The first through train on the Santa Fe between Sweetwater and Lubbock passed through Snyder Sunday. The train consisted of

four coaches and a Pullman and was occupied by President Ripley and party on a tour of observation and inspection. The coaches were of the newest and most attractive model. An observation car gave the officials opportunity to get a good view of the magnificent country and towns along the line.

A short stop was made at the depot in Snyder and the party had opportunity to look out over the best town on the route. From here the party pulled out for Lubbock, thence to Amarillo. Another train went through Monday and it is expected that very soon a regular train schedule will be announced.

LABOR LEADERS AGAIN IN COURT

A DAY AT THE NEW TOWN OF PYRON

Townsite Opening Draws Large Crowds—Many Snyder People Were Present

The formal opening and town lot sale at the new town of Pyron came off on Wednesday and Thursday, May 10 and 11, and it was a great event. The first day was given over to the south country people and a special train was run up there from Sweetwater and lots of people from that town seized the opportunity to buy property in Scurry county. There was a barbecue and a big crowd. Thursday was Snyder day and the Santa Fe ran a train of four coaches carrying down about 200 people. Pyron is twenty miles southeast of Snyder in one of the prettiest and richest portions of Scurry county. It is an old settlement. The new town is about three miles from the old town of Pyron and of course the stores of the old town have been moved to the railroad. The Santa Fe people have a fine well of water there and have erected a large stand pipe and will soon build a depot and be ready for business. The townsite is laid out on the gentle slope of one of the prettiest prairie landscapes to be seen any where, and already there is a general merchandise store there kept by the Adams Brothers. Another large building is soon to be occupied as a general store and another house is waiting for a stock of drugs. The Pyron Hotel, kept by W. E. Warren is a substantial house and they set a good table there. A long stretch of concrete walk on either side of Main street gives the place a look of progressiveness. Arrangements have been made for the erection of a banking house between the post-office and the hotel and taking a general survey of the situation a sprightly town there within a few months. The first man to greet the Snyder excurters was the picture man and we all posed for a panoramic photo, and then went up town to a mammoth barbecue generously supplemented with pies, cakes and other good picnic doin's brought in by the big hearted Pyronites. After dinner came the lot sale. Col. A. C. Wilmeth made a speech showing that the man who buys Scurry county dirt and stays with it will be rich some day. He cited men who have grown independent in that way and told of others who had become discouraged and sacrificed their holdings. The Pyron community is largely made up of former Collin county people and the town is be-


ing promoted by Collin county capitalists.

The town is mapped out in blocks and lots. W. F. Glass, an old resident, has a good home on the hill overlooking the town and has reserved a block near his home, which may some day be made into a beautiful park. A new school house is being built in the northwest part of the townsite and R. D. Bumpass is there with a lumber yard ready to furnish building material for further improvements. Uncle John Y. Bowen owns a good farm nearby and S. J. D. Hallman is there with a good farm and while Mrs. Bowen was not present, it was a pleasure to meet Mr. Hallman and share his generous old Johnson county hospitality. The community has a fine class of people and Col. Wilmeth was so much impressed by the great number of bright, pretty girls and young ladies that it was all we could do to pull him away. The people are hopeful, prosperous and happy and glad to have railroad connection with the outside world.

Pyron is one of Scurry county's good communities and we rejoice in the loyalty of that citizenship to the whole country. We belong to them and they to us and we rejoice in whatever good fortune may come to them.

The Signal is the home paper with them and will always take pleasure in telling of their progress and development. We are going back in the near future to mingle with those good people in their homes.

Then and Now

The pioneer who set his cabin on the edge of a little clearing and pegged away with axe and grubbing hoe until he wrought a prosperous 160-acre farm out of the woods, has passed. In these days a button is pushed and paternalism responds with the agility of a bell hoy. It may be the paternalism of a new progress, but certainly it is not in harmony with the initiative and grit of the early builder—the man who labored in the sweat of his face when not otherwise engaged in standing off Indians or fighting wild animals. For instance, Minnesota extends state aid to settlers on logged-off lands. Wherever the stumps are removed these lands are very productive, but it costs quite a bit to clear them. Under the Minnesota plan the state raises the necessary money by means of bonds and settlers repay the clearing cost in fifteen annual installments. In other words, Minnesota clears the land, sends an expert around to advise crop planting, another official drops in along about harvest time, and possibly there is an expert to look after the marketing of the crop.

This is not criticising any movement looking to farm efficiency and the betterment of the farmer man and his family. Rather it is to inquire if this paternalism of the new progress will work out lasting benefit of our social system? Will state and even national aid to ease in livelihood make for increased energy, thrift and patriotism?—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

The county will now build crossings to the boundary of the city property on the streets surrounding the square where the city will in turn complete the crossings to the edge of the sidewalks making a complete walk from all sides of the square. 

Incipient Rebellion Breaks Out in Camps of Madero's Ragged Soldiers

Juarez, May 13.—(Special to the Signal)—An incipient rebellion has broke out in the camps of the insurgents and the followers of Madero are looting and demanding that they be fed clothed. Horses were taken from the rebels this morning by command of Madero and a number placed under arrest and carried before the provisional president whom they defied because Madero said he could not give them immediate food and money. Orozco headed the party of insurrect rebels who made the strong demands of Madero. They were finally dispersed with promises that their immediate needs would be attended to.

ATTACK IS EXPECTED AT ANY TIME

Women and Children Moved From Cananea For Safety

By Associated Press. Cananea, May 13.—(Special to the Signal)—All last night scores of automobiles from points along the Arizona border were kept busy carrying women and children out of Cananea in anticipation of an attack on the place by federals. Men were refused the use of cars, leaving all vehicles for use in carrying for the women and children. The men are hurrying to the border on foot. Cananea has about 400 men for defense.

MADERO ESTABLISHES CAPITAL AT JUAREZ

Juarez, May 13.—(Special to the Signal)—Madero has established headquarters in the old Custom House where a little more than a year ago took place the international hand-shake between Diaz and Taft. The events that are transpiring now were least expected at that time.

Many of the troops here are being sent south west tonight to Cases Grandes where they have 1000 horses. They will carry artillery and ammunition since Washington announced yesterday that arms might be shipped into Mexico. They will probably use them against Chihuahua.

NAVARRO IN TEXAS

Insurrecto General Escorts Federal Officer to Safety on American Soil

By Associated Press. A Dallas bulletin from El Paso, today says that Madero personally escorted Gen. Navarro, whose life had been threatened, to the river and that the latter waded the Rio Grande to Texas soil and that he is today under the protection of the Stars and Stripes.

ALL MEXICAN CUSTOM HOUSES CLOSED

By Associated Press.

El Paso, May 13.—(Special to the Signal)—There is not a Mexican custom house in operation on the border between Eagle Pass, Texas, and Nogales, Arizona. Along this entire border line, it is impossible to enter goods foreexport from the United States into Mexico. This condition was brought about by the fall of Juarez into the hands of the insurgents and the abandonment of Naco, Agua Prieta Ojinaga by the federals.

The cause of the abandonment is not certain, unless the federal government intends to leave the country to the insurgents and its troops south to protect towns it considers of more importance than the border ports. The abandonment may be a part of federal government's program to comply with its agreement with the United States not to permit any more fighting on the border. By leaving the towns to the insurgents it assures compliance with the agreement.

The present garrison at Agua Prieta consists of Mrs. Gatliff, American curio dealer, two chinamen and a large number of empty houses.

The town is said to be heavily mined by the federal government.

Insurrecto leaders at the local junta declare that the rebels will not take Agua Prieta now, although several thousands are in the hills near town.

The leaders predict that the departed federals will be engaged en route.

After the federals got out of Agua Prieta, they became engaged in action with the rebels nine miles west of Agua Prieta in a narrow pass.

An American cattle man who has just arrived in Douglas saw the action and automobiles with sight seers have gone to the scene.

The federals left Agua Prieta mined. Insurrectos from Douglas are now digging out the dynamite.

One American took 110 pounds from one place, and one mine 50 feet long was unearthed. It contained much dynamite with fuse and caps attached.

Federals who left, filled the trenches and piled up their shovels, picks and all tools and burned them. They broke the stocks and otherwise mutilated all the guns they could not carry. The Americans are collecting these souvenirs but the customs officers of the United States are seizing them as they cross the line.

All federal offices have been closed and abandoned. As orders for the evacuation were duplicated to Naco, many American mining camps will have to close down through suspension of the customs service.

Between Agua Prieta and Hermosillo a large rebel force is concentrated and it is unlikely that Col. Reynaldo Diaz and Maj. Luis Medina Barron and their forces will be able to reach the capital without a big battle. Hermosillo is now surrounded by a large band of rebels including 300 Yaqui Indians armed with Mauser rifles.

Orders of Withdrawal Sudden

The Agua Prieta garrison worked until a late hour last night constructing new entrenchments. Toward dawn the soldiers began to undo this work, filling up not only the new trenches, but the old ones left by the insurgents. The adobe breast-works were leveled to the ground and the block house south of the bull ring was battered into kindling. The trenching tools were then piled in heaps and burned, and leaving not a man behind, the garrison began the evacuation at dawn.

Fire Protection

The readers of the Signal will notice the call of the mayor, Mac Taylor, of the meeting of the city council on Monday, May the 22, and that the tax payers may come and give an expression of their views as to the buying of Fire apparatus. We believe that Snyder will have a splendid water system as far as it goes, and in order to get the full benefits of this system we must have hose and something in which to carry it. Hose carts are out of date and it is asking too much to ask volunteer firemen to get out and make horses of themselves by pulling these carts around town. Every tax payer is entitled to some protection and to some of the benefits derived from taxes drawn from him and the only way we can get these benefits is for the city to purchase a horse drawn combination chemical and hose truck or wagon. These wagons are made to carry ladders also for common needs.

Fifty per cent of all fires are put out by chemical extinguishers with but little damage by water where if only water was used the damage would be much greater and not only that, by having a combination chemical and hose apparatus every house in Snyder and outside of the water limit would have the same protection less the distance.

It is unjust and unfair to give all the protection to any one section of town and if you inside the water limit will look at this problem in a fair and just light you should aid us of the outside in every way possible.

Our town has suffered enough in the last four years from the fire fiend and it is high time we were up and doing. Snyder is a city now and we must lay aside our swaddling clothes, our prejudices and everything that does not work for the common good of our community. Watch us grow. A Citizen.

Commander of Juarez Garrison Blamed For Surrendering The City



Looking Ahead

Up in Kansas a farmer was driving a farm wagon behind which he was trailing a corn-stalk cutter. Just as he crossed the Union Pacific railroad track something went wrong with the wagon and the farmer got out to fix it, leaving the trailed stalk cutter sticking out on the railroad track. There was a curve in the track that prevented the engineer from taking in the situation until too late to stop. The engine was derailed and damaged, the engineer and fireman managed to jump and save their lives, though the farmer came out of the mix-up with a broken ankle.

Now naturally the farmer will want the railroad to pay for his stalk cutter, for in a juitjitsu affair between such a machine and a passenger engine it is easy to see there was not much of the cutter left.

Then if the trial judge, without fear of the initiative, referendum, and recall, should instruct the jury to find for the railroad on account of the farmer's gross negligence, another howl would probably go up against the fossilized judiciary and the hiring press, and Kansas wisdom, bunched in statehouse, would evolve and enact a new and drastic law bearing upon trail wagons and led mules and railroad slow downs at road crossing during the stalk cutting season.

Railroads and corporations must be extremely careful; they have plenty of time and should be sure they are right before they go ahead.

But farmers and other citizens who drive vehicles are always in a hurry—and the wagon road was there first.

Hence capitalism must be curbed, and the courts must catch the popular idea.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

THE JAIL CONTRACT IS AWARDED

County Accepts Bid of San Antonio Firm—New Modern Structure for \$15,000

The plan calls for living rooms for the jailor and his family on the lower floor with cells and corridors on second and third floors. There will be separate cells for the sexes and colors and a hospital for sick prisoners and insane persons. Every modern point will be observed and it will be a jail creditable to a progressive county.

It is expressed in the contract that the work is to be done by Seurry county labor with a single exception of the supervisor and the jail is to be completed by October 15, 1911.

Home Owning

Alleging that there is an organized movement on foot on part of foreign interests to acquire large holdings of cotton lands in the southern states, President Barrett of the Farmers' union urges that it is to the welfare of the southern farmer and business man to co-operate to the end that the farmer may own his acres.

The foreign ownership of large cotton-bearing plantations is a menace much more substantial than the old boggy of foreign competition in cotton growing.

It is worth the careful consideration not only the farmer himself but, as well, of the business man who would suffer from this new factor in our economic scheme.

President Barrett shows a realization of the condition, when he says:

"The movement of 107,000 Americans across the border in one year has unmistakable significance, and it must be recognized with regret that the element thus lured away represents some of the best blood and the most valuable energy among our people. That such a movement should occur while in the eastern states vast tracts of serviceable farming lands are neglected seems anomalous, but the stubborn fact is there, and is not to be gainsaid."

The Constitution has often indicated the evils of tenancy or "cropping," as those which the entire South should combine in minimizing or wiping out.

The one-horse farmer is, in the last analysis, the backbone of the South.

He should be given the opportunity to acquire his own land upon reasonable terms.—Atlanta Constitution.

A Little Overdue

"Stop wasting your sympathy on the children of society woman, the automobile woman, or the club woman, and transfer it to the children of the woman who is a member of the Child Culture Club," says Elizabeth J. Preston, in McCall's Magazine. What the average child of today most needs is a little wholesome neglect; he has been "studied," understood, observed and "cultivated" until he has become a nice-mannered little freak who can think out things for himself, and is president of his self-government club. He has controlled and repressed himself until there is not enough vitality left to grow on. I am so sorry for a child that is brought up "rationally"—not a bite between meals, called in at sun-down, "reasoned" with instead of spanked, and who thinks to remove his shoes and stockings when he knows his feet are wet. When I see, I say to myself, "How glad I am that mother was too busy when I was one of five little ones to 'cultivate' me!" Every human person thrills with indignation at the thought of the miserable little creatures forced by poverty to work in mill and factory, field and mine; sometimes I think they are scarcely more to be pitied than are the children of the theorists who are denied a kiss when they are good, or a spanking when they are bad, and whose childhood days have been burdened with duties, cares, responsibilities and knowledge to which they should remain a stranger. In one way, the child forced to work in a mill is better off than the others, for he has laws to protect him, and there is no statute to stand between the "cultured" child and his foolish mother.

Blames Politicians

"It isn't the farmers, it's the politicians, who are objecting to the reciprocity with Canada," said James J. Hill, chairman of the Great Northern. "The plea is made, ostensibly on behalf of the farmers, that Canadian wheat would come in and deprive the American farmer of obtaining the pay for his product to which he is entitled. As a matter of fact, the difference in the price of wheat between Winnipeg and Minneapolis is only 2 1/2c or 3c, and the cost of transportation over the 450 miles between those cities would add 8c or 9c to this, so that argument seems ill-founded."

"They say the market for manufactured products is dull. Well, what better customer do we want for just these products than Canada? Who was the best customer in the United States last year? Great Britain. And who next? Canada. Doesn't it seem logical and reasonable that this northern neighbor, our best customer but one, should be cultivated?"

"The reciprocity measure is the greatest which has come before the country since the Civil War and should be passed."

Regarding a report that the Hill lines are to be extended into Canada, and that the Canadian Government stands ready to give a subsidy of \$10,000 a mile for such extension, Mr. Hill said:

"That statement is stupid. We have all the lines we want to care for now. If they want lines they'll have to build them themselves."

Some Long Sea Voyages

Salem (Ore.) Statesman. One day last week there arrived at one of the Portland docks a French sailing vessel that had been 280 days out from Dublin, Ireland, one of the slowest voyages of the season for such a craft and one that will go on record along with other trips of considerable length on the salt water.

The vessel experienced many severe gales, which at times almost put her completely out of service. Her captain and crew report all sorts of hardships experienced during the time that their craft was at the mercy of the sea, and it is safe to predict that they are mighty glad to be able to tread the earth, especially in such a beautiful climate as this Oregon possesses.

A foreign paper says the sea is full of such lonely craft, endeavoring to round Cape Horn in either direction through a region of almost perpetual gales, or idling in the doldrums to the irritation of their dispirited crews.

Within the experience of the deep sea sailor such passages are nothing unusual when Cape Horn has to be weathered and its prevailing winds won through. On March 2, 1910, the four-masted bark Invernesshire sailed from Hamburg, bound for Santa Rosalia, in the Gulf of California. During a passage which included such incidents as her temporary abandonment by her crew in dread of her foundering, she was forced to put into the Falklands to refit, and sailed again on her interrupted voyage on September 27. From that time she was neither seen nor heard of until she arrived safely at her destination on February 2, 1911—338 days out from her original port of departure.

The voyage of the Invernesshire almost compares with the per-forms of the cumbersome craft of earlier navigators, except, no doubt, that it was a tedious pas-

sage and not enlivened by encounter with carracks laden with pepper from Malabar, of which the king of Spain was owner. On November 19, 1857, the Desire, under command of Thomas Cavendish, a gentleman of Suffolk, set sail from the headlands of California for the English Channel.

At the break of day June 8 of the following year she fell in sight of the island of St. Helena; on July 9, she crossed the line, and after holding the brave trade winds to the limit of 40 degrees north latitude recovered the long wished for port of Plymouth on September 7, 1858. Not much better could be expected from the ships and their equipment.

Among some extraordinary voyages made by deep sea sailing craft within recent years there may be mentioned that of the eBacon Rock, engaged on a short postal trip between two Australian ports. After all hope of her safe arrival had been abandoned, she turned up Taleahuano Chile, 6000 miles from her intended destination. Being in light trim, and consequently with no grip on the water, she had been unable to make any progress against a persistent head wind and her master had been compelled to square yards and make a fair wind of it across the broad Pacific.
