REVOLUTIONISTS ARE ACTIVE

ALLEUROPE EXCITED BY REPORTS OF REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITY

RESIST MONARCHISTS

Troops are in Readiness Along the Border to Repel Threatened Invasion.

Special to Signal.

Paris, France, July 27.—Persistent reports of new revolutionary activities in Portugal excite the curiosity of Europe as to the destiny of the youngest of the world's republics. It is certain however, that the government, which now seems fairly well on its feet will offer a stern and probably bloody defense to any effort at restoring a monarchy.

Twenty thousand reserves have been called to the colors and are stretched along the northern and northeastern frontiers, the most vulnerable points for intruders.

Another important phase of the situation is the unrest known to be prevailing among the mountaineer element which has not yet become accustomed to the new order of things. To reassure these people, the government has inaugurated a policy of dispatching to the mountains a small detachment of soldiery, commanded by an officer, whose business is to explain the objects of the Republic and counteract the hostile influence of monarchist agents.

The seaport town Agadir, on the western coast of Morocco, was little known of until the arrival of a German warship, which plunged all Europe into the fear of complications and even gossip of possible war. Now Agadir has leaped into worldwide prominence.

The Sous region, extending far back from Agadir, is rich in mineral and agricultural wealth far

beyond the dreams of engineers and offers new proof of the fact that Morocco is a country teeming in natural resources which have only to be skillfully worked to make it one of the wealthiest regions in the world. In the past the relation of Europe with Agadir were important. In the sixteenth century the portuguese disembarked there and built a fort. The Dutch imitated the Portuguese in the eighteenth century and up to seventeen hundred and eighty three the Spaniards claimed the right to land there and to seek provisions. An English company established itself at Cape July, but was forced to leave by the Sultan. England had, however a vice consul at Agadir up to the seventeenth century. The bay of Agadir is perhaps the finest and most protected on the Moroccan coast, and should Morocco eventually be divided among the powers would be a splendid naval base for the lucky acquired.

Farm Display at Fair

Mr. W. L. Gross insists that the people of Scurry county should get busy and get up a general collection of farm crops to be put on display at the Dallas Fair. He wants corn, maize, kaffir corn, cotton, broom corn, millet, sweet potatoes, grasses and such other things as may be profitably shown there.

Besides these he wants descriptions of soil, climate, timber, mineral and a general outline of prospects, together with information as to schools, churches, railroads and public buildings and enterprises.

He further insists upon having cuts made of the court house, the schools and the churches and other views in town and country.

In the good work he must have the cooperation of all the business men and everybody else in the county, so that the real conditions in Scurry county may be properly shown at the Fair.

We ought to have a three days meet in Snyder, but if we are too backward and timid, for that, we must have a display at the Fair in Dallas this fall.

BUSY DAY IN SENATE

SENATE DEFEATS UNDERWOOD HOUSE BILL BY GOOD MAJORITY

LA FOLLETTE SENSATION

Says Effort Being Made to Force President to Veto Tariff Legislation.

Washington, D. C., July 27.—The Senate today defeated the Underwood house wool bill by a vote of 44 to 36.

The La Follette Amendment was likewise defeated by a vote of 14 to 66. La Follette then by a vote of 49 to 31 secured a reconsideration and offered a modified amendment which passed by a vote of 48 to 22 by Union of Democrats and insurgent Republicans.

This reduces raw Wool duties 35 per cent and correspondingly woolen duties.

Senator La Follette created a sensation when he declared that the high protectionists on Republican side had agreed to vote for the democratic house wool bill sure that its excessively low duties would justify the president's veto.

Senator La Follette introduced another amendment proposing reduction of woolen goods which he said would compensate the farmers for their loss on Canadian Free Trade.

His amendment would reduce the duty on raw wool from 45 to 40 per cent.

SITUATION TENSE

Strained Relations Existing Between Germany and France

WANT PRO DAILY PAPER

PROS SAID TO BE RAISING MONEY FOR ORGANIZATION OF BIG DAILY

MONEY SUBSCRIBED

Matter Will Be Discussed at Fort Worth Meeting Saturday.

Lockhart, Texas, July 27.—Lea Beatty of this city who will attend the Fort Worth Prohibition Committee meeting in Ft. Worth Saturday that he will propose the organization of a large daily newspaper which will be run in the interest of the prohibition cause in Texas.

He says large sums of money have already been raised for that purpose.

PRESIDENT TAFT SENDS MESSAGE TO CONGRESS

In Eliminating Land Says He Acted for the Best Interest of the Nation.

Special to Signal.

Washington, July 27.—President Taft sent a special message to the Senate today shouldering full responsibility for opening for 12,800 acres of the Chugach National Forest Reserve in Alaska, an incident which has become to be known as the Controller Bay Affair.

In concluding he brands the now famous "Dick to Dick" postscript as a "wicked fabrication" and says that Chas. P. Taft whose name appeared in the alleged postscript "has no interest in Alaska never had and knows nothing of the circumstances connected with this transaction." Moreover, the President adds, his brother does not even remember that he ever met Richard S. Ryan, representing the Controller Railway and Navigation Company.

As for eliminating the land in question from the reserve, the

President says that there is no danger of the Controller Railway and Navigation Company or any other interests monopolizing the field, and nothing to show that his company is in any way connected with the Morgan Guggenheim interests. Hence he believes that in eliminating the land he has acted for the best interests of the nation.

"I am as strongly convinced as any one of the necessity for the conservation of our national resources" said the President, "and as much opposed as any one to their monopolization by large corporations, but my convictions on this point did not deter me from taking the step which I hoped might lead to encouraging the construction of a railway from Controller Bay to the Bering coal field. I thought the paring down of the amount of public land to be acquired for terminals by the railway company proposing to build the railroad was a poor policy and one not calculated to secure investment or speedy construction."

As to the charge made on the floor of the Senate that the order was secret, the President says this was utterly unfounded. In support of this he says that ten days before the order was made the details of Ryan's application and the probability of its being granted were given wide publicity. He cites in this respect that the Associated Press carried an account of the matter, Oct 28, 1910 as taken from a type written

LATEST RETURNS SHOW 555,885 VOTES POLLED—ANTI MAJORITY UNDER 5000

EACH SIDE PERSISTANT

Margin So Narrow as to Be Uncomfortable. Country May Expect Contests

By Associated Press: Dallas, Texas, July 24, 10:30 a. m.—(Special to Signal)—According to unofficial returns this morning the antis are still in the lead something under four thousand.

The opinion is held among the large morning papers that the antis will win by a close margin, the later return may swing the election the other way.

Dallas, Texas, July 24—(Special to Signal.)—Texas has defeated the Statewide prohibition constitutional amendment in Saturday's election according to an admission expressed today from the pro headquarters in Houston and also according to the returns in early today after thirty six hours of ballot counting.

The wets maintain a slender lead, barely more than 5000 as shown from the unofficial returns. Unless the vote yet to come in should carry ten thousand or more, the entire count remaining of only a few thousand ballots it cannot now swing victory to the dries.

The boxes yet to report are from sparsely settled sections remote from railroad and telegraph or telephone lines and the hopes of the pros had just about gone at 11 o'clock today.

Dallas, Texas, July 24, 2:30 p. m.—(Special to Signal)—The anti majority in the Statewide prohibition election of last Saturday foots up to 4,387 at 1:45 this afternoon according to the almost complete (though unofficial) returns up to this time the antis polled 230,136 votes and the pros polled 225,749.

Scurry County Vote

The total vote in Scurry county gives the pros 985 to 430 for the antis.

Two boxes gave an anti majority. Red Bluff 4 to 3 and Cottonwood Flats 7 to 2.



**PROTECTIVE POLICY COURSE
OF GOVERNMENT IN TAR-
IFF LEGISLATION**

May Profit From a Split in the
Forces of the Opposi-
tion

Special to Signal.
Berlin, July 21—A split in the
Hansa Bund is the latest event in
the internal politics of Germany.
This is a great organization form-
ed about two years ago for aug-
menting the influence of the com-
mercial classes over legislation
and for combatting the Agrarian
movement.

It now consists of nearly 250,
000 individual members besides
some 750 commercial and indus-
trial organizations of various
kinds. Thus the total member-
ship of the Bund, direct and in-
direct is considerably more than
one million and it is therefore by
far the largest private organiza-
tion of any sort in Germany. In
June the Bund held its annual con-
vention at Berlin; and in view of
the near approach of Reichstag e-
lections the speeches took on a
very aggressive character against
the Agrarians and the parties sup-
porting them. The president of
the organization announced a pol-
icy which means practically that
the Bund prefers to see a Social-
ist elected rather than an Agra-
rian.

His attitude has given great of-
fense to the Central Association of
German manufacturers, the na-
tional organization of the largest
manufacturers of the empire.

This body has just announced
its withdrawal from the bund, be-
cause of the vigorous attitude ad-
opted against the agrarians at
the convention. The Association
explains its action by alleging that
the course adopted by the Bund
endanger the protective policy
which is supported by a tacit alli-
ance between the manufacturers
and large land owners. The seces-
sion of the Association does not
mean that all manufacturers of
the country will desert the Bund;
and on the other hand many of
the organizations of the smaller
and medium sized manufacturing
establishments have declared their
support of a vigorous attack up-
on the Agrarian and the Conserva-
tive parties.

In some quarters it is believed
that the defection of the Associa-
tion will help the Bund since it
will enable it to put forth more
energy in its struggle with the
Agrarians. It is also believed that
it will tend to draw the lines more
clearly between the supporters of
the present tariff policy of the
Empire and those who prefer a
more moderate form of protec-
tion.

**ENGLAND, RUSSIA AND JA-
PAN FIND SOURCE OF
CHINESE TROUBLE**

Crops Out in all Diplomatic Ne-
gotiations Between the
Countries

London, July 21 (Special)—
Diplomats are beginning to
wonder whether there will ever
be an end to the negotiations over
the various Chinese loans. They
got the railroads off their hands
and thought there was nothing
more to be said about the Man-
churian loan. Lately, however,
it has again cropped out in the
dispatch bags. Japan and Russia
objected to the clause that provid-
ed that in future loans the coun-
tries supplying the money in this
instance should be given the first
option. Russia and Japan
thought that established a mono-
poly and the ambassador in Lon-
don complained to the foreign of-
fice.

It has been pointed out that
such a clause is put in all loan
agreements and is a usual business
arrangement. No formal answer
has been given as yet but it is be-
lieved that steps will be taken by
interested powers to allay the
feeling in Japan and Russia that
they are being shut out by any
loan transactions in China.

A Few Suggestions

The County Physician is frequently reminded that an unpleasant odor is permeating the atmosphere of a certain street or alley this may be on account of the highly sensitive olfactory of the individual, or it may be that some of our citizens are so far forgetting themselves that they are letting their place become a nuisance to the community, hence a publication of some of the Sanitary rules, may not be amiss.

Rule 1—The local health authority shall examine into all garbage offal, nuisances within the city (or county, as the case may be) and the owner or occupant shall cause such to be removed, destroyed or prevented as the case may require. And it shall be unlawful for any person within the city (or county, as the case may be) to allow any garbage, offal or any substance detrimental to public health to accumulate or to remain on the premises own- occupied or controlled by him.

Rule 5—All cattle, horse or hog pens, stables or enclosures in which any cattle, horses or hogs may be kept or confined shall be so drained and all offal so removed as to create no offensive odor or smell.

Rule 8—All occupants or owners of property shall keep same thoroughly drained, so that no waste or stagnant water be allowed to collect thereon.

Wants Information

The following letter is self explanatory: San Antonio, Texas, July 22. Mr. E. J. Anderson, Sec. Young Men's Business League Snyder, Texas.

Dear Sir:

I wish to obtain a little data concerning the water supply in your district. What amounts of water in gallons per minute can be obtained from your wells? Have you ten and twelve inch wells, and if so have these been tested for capacity.

What is the nature of the formation through which this supply comes? Is it sand, sand rock, gravel, limestone veins or what? How thick are the water bearing strata. The method to pursue depends very largely upon the supply that may be had from the well.

Regarding cooperative work, at present there are not sufficient funds appropriated to employ further assistance but there will be a bill presented in the called session of the Legislature which is to meet to 31st, asking the state to co-operate with the Department of Agriculture at Washington in this work. If this passes it will allow me assistance by means of which I will be able to arrange for considerable work. May I ask you to speak to your representative at Austin to assist in its passage? Give me what data you are able and I will then outline as well as I may what course to pursue. Yours very truly,

FIRST CALLED SESSION

OF 32ND LEGISLATURE WILL MEET IN AUSTIN ON JULY 31ST

SOME OF THE BIG FISH

In Political Waters Will Swim Around Capitol During Session

Special to Signal.

Austin, Texas, July 22—On July 31, the first called session of the Thirty-second legislature will be in session and our solons will face the State with clear conscience and clean shirts.

This is a called session of our legislature and of course only subjects submitted by the Governor can be legislated upon and the friends of the chief executive claim that this is one session of the Texas Legislature that will not have an opportunity of fighting a duel with civilization. This is certainly good news as the State is accustomed to shivering like a lemonade shaker while the Legislature is in session, but this blessed assurance effectively muzzles many members who have a genius for knocking off laws as a country boy does a hoe down.

This is hurricane weather in Politics; the prohibition election has rent the State in twain and ill winds that blow no good occasionally whirl through the capital. Candidates are beginning to peep out from behind the clouds like stars that appear and disappear on a stormy night and now and then a sun dog shows up on the political horizon to threaten foul weather, but the wise ones tell us is merely the clearing of the atmosphere for new ideas.

Some of the biggest fish in the political waters will be swimming around Austin during the present session. The re-districting of the State will bring out the political map-makers and the Appropriation Bill will cause those who tread political paths for a liveli-

hood to rally around the pie counter.

Those high up in the political roost predict a large increase in membership in State Representatives and the Congressional districts may show an increase in number and in any event, the realignment will cause many a candidate, actual and prospective to add a few chapters to the profane history of the State, while a few of them will have to take a cold plunge and abandon politics.

The appropriation bill to meet the growing demands of the State will necessarily show new items as well as increase the current expenditures.

Texas has never spent any money in the development of its resources, but the present season of the Legislature may reach the wisdom strata and at least put a few sign boards on the road to progress.

The governor is being urged to submit innumerable subjects for legislation but the present Chief Executive has never shown a disposition to add to the swollen and turbulent stream of legislation and reasons as plentiful as blackberries will have to be advanced before the governor will be convinced.

The sessions will not be without its sensations. It is always customary to put a few new wrinkles in the Democratic party during the legislative session and some of the member swill want to powder their records with star dust in order to make a showing with their constituents and then there will be many a Democratic roadster come trotting down the political pike while the legislature is in session. BRING ROCK FROM MEXICO

Government Plans to Get Around Alleged Exorbitant Charges of Railroads

Galveston, Texas, July 20—With a view of importing rock from the quarries in Mexico, Maj. G. P. Howell, United States engineer has been sent to Vera Cruz to make a thorough investigation as to conditions and report to the War department.

His charged the railroads, by charging exorbitant rates on rock from Texas quarries for the Aransas Pass, the Galveston and other jetties, the government was practically held up for many thousand dollars as the railroads controlled the transportation facilities from the quarries.

Congress has removed the duty on rock from Mexico for public projects and it is said that rock in unlimited quantities can be imported from Mexico by water at something like one half the cost charged for rock in the United States and that this is applicable to the Atlantic coast as well as the Gulf coast sections.

Captain Earl I. Brown, United States engineer, who is to succeed Major George P. Howell in charge of the Texas district of harbor and fortification work arrived here this morning from Wilmington, N. C. He will assume charge of the station about August 1. Upon arrival here he received notice of his promotion to major to fill the vacancy in the corps created by the advancement of Maj. E. R. Stewart, to the Lieutenant Colonelcy.

Major Brown will be the youngest officer of that rank in the army. He comes to Texas with a long and enviable record in the waterways, harbors and defensive construction department of the Government Engineers corps.

REVOLUTIONISTS RAMPANT

EX-SENATOR ALDRICH APPEARS BEFORE INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE

President Did Not Seek Election of Lorimer to the Senate

Washington, July 20—Former Senator Nelson H. Aldrich of Rhode Island was one of the witnesses to appear before the Lorimer investigating committee today.

He was on the stand for many hours and was closely questioned by the Committee.

The witness flatly contradicted the story of Edward J. Hines to the effect that he, Aldrich had asked Hines to use his influence in behalf of Lorimer in his race for the Senate.

The Senator also denied that he sent word to Governor Deneen that President Taft had said that Lorimer was the most available man for the place and that he thought he should be elected.

CHOLERA EPIDEMIC FEARED

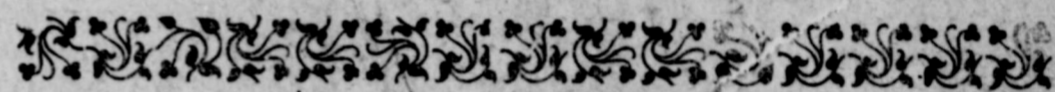
