DR. NORRIS IS INDICTED

Fort Worth Preacher Accused of Perjury—Firebugs Still Pursue Him.

Another chapter has been written in connection with Rev. J. F. Norris and the municipal authorities in Ft. Worth. People who have kept up with the moral warfare in that city will remember that a few years ago all the better element of society there, including the leading news papers made a relentless war on the indecent districts of the city and they, in a measure broke up the haunts of vice.

Later it is charged there has come about just as hard a state of affairs where evil doers have defied the law. A large element of the people set to work to stop it, but they failed to get the support of the mayor. They went to the city papers and were turned down. They established a local paper and have published some red hot matter. These writings so incensed the mayor that he called a mass meeting and delivered an address that was not fit to print. Dr. Norris, the pastor of the Baptist church, was considered to be one of the principal writers of this reform paper. In course of time, Dr. Norris and one of his deacons received anonymous letters threatening harm to them and to their church property.

Later on Dr. Norris was shot at one night while seated in his library and his residence was set on fire and his church was burned.

On last Friday night his residence was again fired and he and his family had barely time to get out. That is not all. Some while ago Dr. Norris appeared before a grand jury and stated upon oath that he did not know who wrote the threatening letters and swore that he did not write them and also denied authorship of certain articles printed in the local paper. Now comes a further session in the fact that the grand jury of which Editor Ousley of the Record was foreman and taking up the former testimony of Norris, they have returned an in-

dictment against him charging perjury.

Mr. Norris was arrested Saturday and gave bond in the sum of \$1,000.

NEW ENGINES FOR T. & P.

Ten of the Engines to be Put in Commission on This End of the Road it is Said.

Abilene Reporter:

A Texas and Pacific official who did not want his name used for the reason that the "higher" up officials do not always appreciate items given out by subordinates about contemplated improvements, etc., reports that the Texas and Pacific just placed an order for twenty new engines, ten of which are to be used on the West or Rio Grande division and ten on the Marshall or Eastern Division.

The new engines on the Marshall division will be put to work hauling passenger trains and those on this end will be used for pulling freight for the most part.

Those to be used on this end will be the consolidated type of engine and will be the largest and most powerful ever used on this road.

The date of delivery will be ninety days hence.

Dr. Alexander and Wife, Divorced.

Judge and Mrs. S. P. Hardwicke returned yesterday afternoon from Fort Worth where Judge Hardwicke was representing Dr. J. M. Alexander in the divorce proceedings, filed in the sixty seventh district court of Tarrant county.

Judge Hardwicke reports that the divorce was granted by Judge Simmons on yesterday morning and with the petition was filed an agreement as to the property rights of each, or an agreement as to the division of the large community estate, and a further agreement that Mrs. Alexander may visit her little five year old son Minor at stated intervals.

Mrs. Alexander is now a resident of Fort Worth and the divorce proceedings were instituted on Friday last by mutual agreement and all things settled satisfactorily and agreeably.

The Community estate consisted of brick buildings in this city in addition to other property.

SUPERIOR EARLY CONDITIONS

Country Never Had Brighter Outlook for Prosperous Year.

The season now in the ground in this country is now believed by the farmers to be sufficient to bring up the crops and furnish growing moisture till far into the Spring and the weather forecasters have outlined seasonable rains throughout the Spring and summer months.

The past winter has been unusually favorable for putting the land in good condition. The ground has been frozen and fields are thoroughly pulverized. Feed crops will be planted now in a few weeks. There has already been the greatest acreage ever known here planted to oats which will come up as soon as the weather gets warmer while the acreage in cotton is to be reduced, the land will be in capital condition for it and we anticipate a bumper crop of everything.

Our people will diversify more than usual and if they should miss in some lines they will make good in others.

Even some of our people who are inclined to pessimism are saying that it looks like we can't help making a good crop, though they say, we may not get summer rains. To this the more optimistic old settlers reply that we always get rains during the summer time.

Rev. U. C. Howard of the Presbyterian church here and Rev. A. B. C. Dinwiddie, pastor at Baird will devote this week and next to the further raising of funds for the one hundred thousand dollar Women's building in course of construction at Waxahachie, in connection with Trinity University. They have succeeded beyond their expectations in the other two weeks work and hope to be equally successful this time.

Brother Howard will occupy the Presbyterian pulpit at Sweetwater next Sunday while the pastor Rev. J. M. Youree will speak here, morning and evening.

THE CRISIS IN MEXICO

United States Realizes Resolution Beyond Madero's Control. Calls Americans to Get Out

Washington, March 2.—Admitting that Mexico's crisis has approached, Uncle Sam took two unprecedented steps:

Advised that Americans in the Revolution ridden zone to withdraw at once.

Warned Americans within the jurisdiction of the United States strictly to observe the neutrality laws.

Plainly speaking these two acts constitute recognition that the revolutions in Mexico are beyond the control of Madero and reaffirm the American attitude that intervention must be averted.

Americans are urged to leave sections of Mexico where they are now dangers of attacks, because Uncle Sam does not want to be forced into a declaration of war with Mexico by injuries to our citizens.

The advices to Americans in Mexico to flee from danger zones contained in a telegram to Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City, by Acting Secretary of State Wilson.

That under the word "advise" the administration here serves a warning was indicated in the significant reference in this dispatch that the American consuls take charge of the abandoned effects.

SCURRY COUNTY AND THE SANTA FE

Furnishes More People to Demonstration. Road Seeks Country Development.

The Santa Fe Demonstration train was a big attraction and for the

Our people are studying all the departments of diversified farming and many of the suggestions learned from the lectures and from the literature distributed will be put to practical use and in a few years one may notice vast strides of improvement in methods and good results will be noticeable in all the farm where it is done.

The Santa Fe people are interested in the development of the country along their line to the end that the people may be more prosperous and the railroad will handle greater volumes of business.

The Santa Fe Cutoff will be the main line from California to the Gulf Coast and in course of time the people living along this line will realize the advantages to be had here that will not be in hand in other sections. That road will be worth vastly more to Snyder than many people seem to think. By reason of location on this line Snyder is in direct touch with all the cities and ports of the country, and Snyder will be put down as one of the very best towns on the line.

We have the land the water, the climate, the railroad facilities, the high toned moral people and when it comes to the putting up of a bonus we'll have the money.

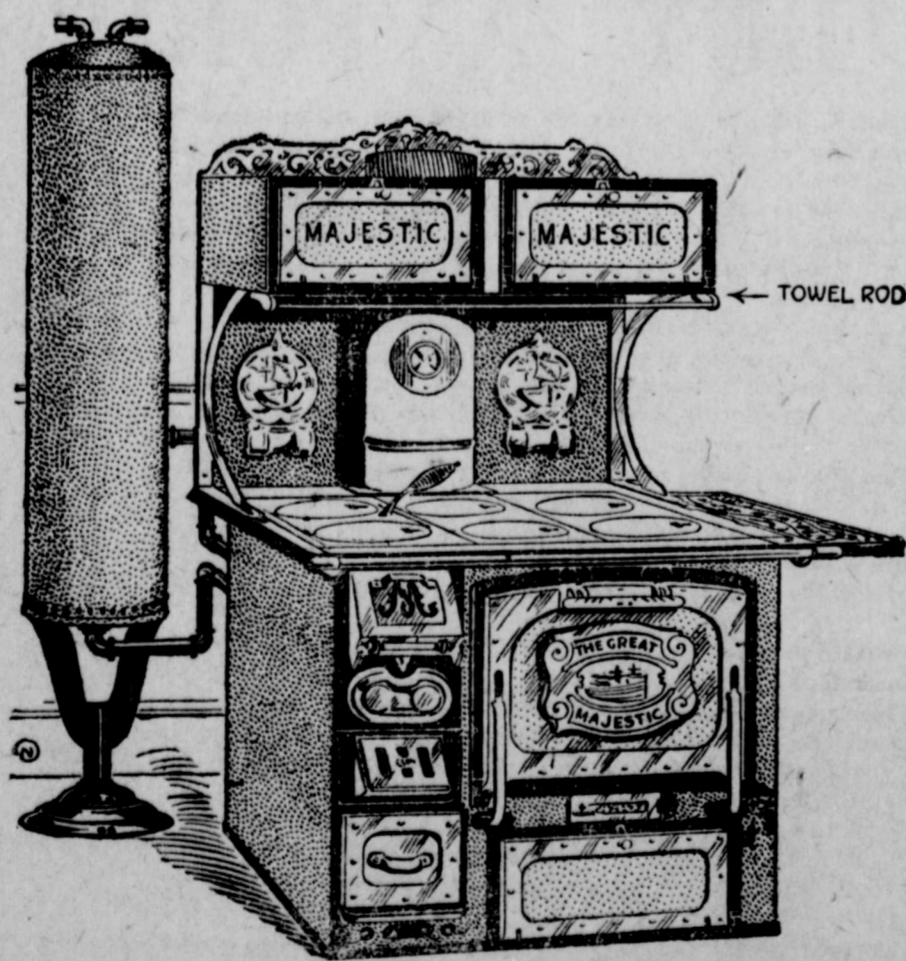
The Grand Lodge will meet in Dallas on April 22 and a committee will be appointed to visit all the applicant cities which may have bids submitted.

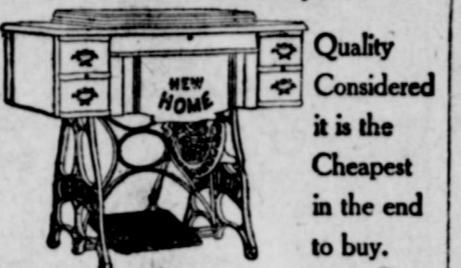

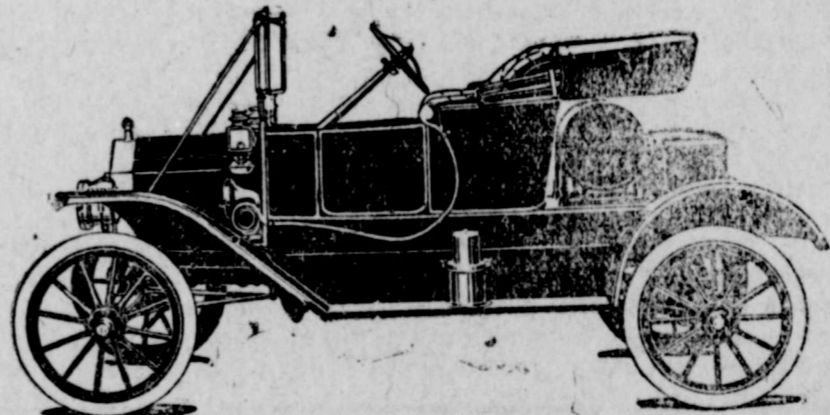

REVIVING THE FUGITIVE SLAVE LAW

Houston Chronicle:

More and more amazing reports come from Lawrence, Mass., concerning the methods pursued by local and state officials at the behest of wool trust bosses who are trying to force an army of women and children mill workers to accept further reduction of starvation wages.

We are told that these Russianized public officials declare their purpose not only to prevent forcibly, the sending of children from Lawrence to other cities where they are guaranteed food and shelter, but have further declared their purpose to go into Vermont, New York and Pennsylvania and bring back several hundred children who have been sent away by their parents for such protection against starvation.

Governor Foss of Massachusetts, aspiring to the Democratic party's nomination for the presidency permits these outrageous violations of the law. State troops under his command take part in them.

The city authorities of Lawrence permit them and participate in them.

The courts of Massachusetts have granted no relief.

It is high time the Federal government takes a hand. The wool trust was granted protection which enabled it to sell its products, for one and one half times as much. Dallas News points out, as it could sell them for if we had free competition with foreign woolen manufacturers.

The trust was granted this subsidy, the News says truly, upon the "wool trust's promise that the extra charge the American Woolen Company was thus allowed to make would be turned over to its employees so that they would not be forced to the social level of Europe's 'pauper labor'."

Congress has a right to see whether this trusteeship is being abused. Indeed it is its highest duty to do so. If the bonus which the American Woolen Company has been allowed to collect from the Americans, instead of being distributed among its employees, as was promised, is by a process of malversation being made to swell the dividends of the American Woolen Company then it becomes entirely pertinent for Congress to establish that fact.

As if everybody with an ounce of sense did not know that this federal bonus is being stolen from the workers and being used to swell the dividends. As if everybody did not know that it is the universal practice of trusts and monopolies which collect this federal tariff bonus!

The facts are notorious.

The trusts and monopolies have used their political power at Washington to collect this bonus—amounting in the aggregate as the late Senator Dooliver declared to several billions of dollars yearly—and they have used their control of the American industries to crush labor unions and reduce their employees as fast as possible to the social standard of Europe's 'pauper labor.'

Their latest usurpation of public authority expressed in their published determination to revive the fugitive slave law against their employees who send children to friends in other states in order that these children may escape starvation, is clear proof that the tariff subsidy takers have become drunk with power.

They should be prosecuted to the full limit of the criminal law for each and everyone of their arrogant invasions of the legal rights of their fellow citizens. They should be made to pay damages in civil action. They should be stripped of their tariff bonuses. They should be ostracized by every decent American.

Governor Colquitt and Liquor Regulation.

In the letter to the Democrats of Texas recently issued by friends of Governor Colquitt the following statements appear: "In the meanwhile Governor Colquitt has rendered signal service in the interest of temperance and in the enforcement of law by suppressing many so called social clubs which were saloons in disguise." "Governor Colquitt's re-election will insure an administration free from a harassing legislation alert to material affairs and pledged to salutary and practical reforms in response to the universal demand for progressive limitation of the liquor traffic and for the strict enforcement of the law."

It is gratifying to know that even the partisan friends of Governor Colquitt thus recognize the fact that the demands for limitations of the liquor traffic have become universal. But in view of the past record it is not believed that the people of the state will place much faith in the promise that such reforms can be

secured through any effort on the part of Governor Colquitt.

It has not been forgotten that since Governor Colquitt's inauguration the legislature has met in both regular and special session. At the regular session a number of bills were passed for the regulation of the liquor traffic all of which with out exception were vetoed by the governor. The special session was called to meet after the prohibition election had been held, and state-wide prohibition had been defeated and at this session the "universal demand of the people of the state for limitation of the liquor traffic" were ignored by the refusal of the Governor to grant any of the requests which were made of him to submit such measures to the Legislature—the only way in which they could be considered by them.

Even less sincerity will be credited to the Governor's efforts to suppress the social clubs for it will be recalled that after the adjournment of the regular session of the Legislature the Supreme Court in the Dallas Club case held that under existing law legitimate social clubs were not liable for the tax imposed upon liquor dealers, and the burden was on the State that any such clubs were not bonafide social organizations. At the time this decision was rendered the Governor professed to be grievously disappointed and announced broad-cast through the papers that he would have his Assistant Attorney General prepare a motion for re-hearing and undertake to have the decision set aside but after this motion has been overruled at the special session of the Legislature which convened shortly afterwards he persistently refused to submit to that body the question of amending the law so that the sale of liquor by such clubs could be prohibited.

In the face of such persistent refusals to take advantage of the opportunities afforded to procure some legitimate regulation of the liquor traffic the people of Texas can not be expected to place much faith in the claims of Governor Colquitt's friends as to what he would do along that line.—Cleburne Review.

THE PEOPLE AND THE BOSSES.

Colliers Weekly claims to have looked over the political situation in Texas and its conclusions are here expressed:

That issue which divides the two wings of democracy in America has squarely divided the two Senators from Texas. Senator Bailey takes the stand with the reactionary, Wall Street wing of the party. He opposes a presidential primary, the obvious reason that he believes his faction's best chance to retain control of party machinery is in avoiding a test before the people.

Senator Culberson takes his stand with the progressive wing of the party. He advocates a presidential primary, because he believes the people, not the bosses should control the machinery of the democracy.

The demand for a presidential primary in Texas is steadily increasing. Although the Wilson state organization is leading in the demand for a primary the desire for it is not confined to adherents of the New

Jersey governor.

Many prominent Texas democrats who favor other candidates for the presidency believe it to be proper and right for the state committee to order a primary and at a suitable time will join with Wilson's supporters in a public demand for it.

Senator Culberson wants a primary because it would strip the bosses of their authority.

If the people permit the bosses to select the nominees, the popular election in November to choose between them becomes little more than an empty formality.

The bosses and not the people will have chosen the president.

J. H. Noak a second member of the party accused of lynching the Mexican boy for almost nothing in Williamson county was tried last week and was acquitted. In crimes of that sort, the charge should be called murder instead of lynching, for that was what it was. The lad was murdered by a lot of tough young men.

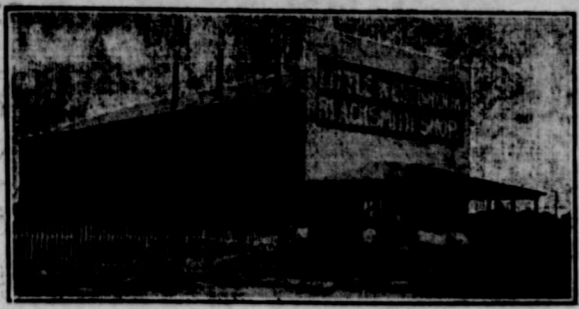

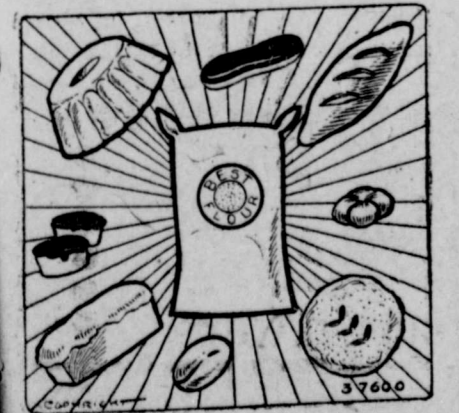

ADVANCEMENT IN FARMING

Scurry County People Are Studying Scientific Agriculture—Many Will Try Experiment

Since the Santa Fe Agricultural educational train was here a week ago, our people have been discussing the lectures delivered by the Santa Fe party and all admit that the propositions laid down are worth consideration and many will act upon the methods explained by the lecturers. The plans outlined for raising poultry and hogs and caring for buttermilk will be put into practice in a limited way until more extensive preparations can be made.

It is understood that a number of our farmers will undertake to go into intensive scientific farming, setting apart a few acres for that purpose to be cultivated along the lines indicated by the agricultural bureau. The Signal invites written articles along this line and asks that all farmers who will go into the experimental farming to report your names to the Signal so that we may know who are on the list and especially you are urged to be at the institute meeting at the Court House Saturday afternoon and hear Mr. J. W. Neil and there to tell what you are doing.

The lecture on silage last Saturday was instructive and we shall expect a number of siloes to be built here.

Pope Strayhorn suggests that in order to get this work started it will be a good plan for the people to make up enough funds to pay for the concrete and wire for the first two siloes to be put up. That would start the people on this line and it would demonstrate their value.

J. T. SNEED KILLED AT GEORGETOWN

Tragedy Occurs in Post Office—Victim Shot in Back and Dies Within Few Minutes

Georgetown, Texas, March 6.—Cap. J. T. Sneed father of John Beal Sneed tried at Fort Worth for the killing of Capt. A. G. Boyce following the elopement of Al Boyce with Sneed's wife was shot and instantly killed here this morning by R. O. Hilliard one of his tenants. Hilliard shot Sneed twice in the back and then turned the pistol upon himself by: I am losing my mind. J. T. Sneed Hilliard had lost his mind as was shown by a note found on his person after the tragedy. The note was addressed to his wife. It read: "To Ruth to the post office for his mail. Hilliard caused it. I am going to take my revenge and go to the asylum. I loved you as dear as a husband ever did."

Signed: R. O. HILLIARD. The tragedy occurred at 9:30 o'clock and Sneed was shot as he was walking out of the post office where he had gone to get his mail.

Hilliard was a former tenant on the Sneed plantation near Rosebud. He and Sneed had come to town this morning together, riding in the same wagon. At that time Hilliard showed no sign of the plot to take the old man's life. After reaching town the two separated and Sneed went the gun upon himself. One shot fired Hilliard followed and stood outside the door. As Sneed approached to leave he began firing rapidly with a forty-five calibre revolver. Two of the shots struck Sneed in the back. He staggered forward a few feet and with a groan sank to the sidewalk. After he fell Hilliard fired two shots more into his body and then turned the gun upon himself. One shot fred through the heart ended his life.

No Connection With Boyce Trouble: The tragedy caused a tremendous sensation in Georgetown and business was suspended for hours. Rumors were thick after the shooting, the report having spread not only throughout the city but in other parts of the state that Captain Sneed had been slain by a member of the Boyce family.

The killing of Capt. Sneed had no connection with the Boyce-Sneed affair and leaves the burdens of those troubles upon the sons of the two families. Brooded Over Discharge: Rosebud, Texas, March 6.—Up to about a year ago R. O. Hilliard worked on the Sneed ranch about ten miles from here. For two years Sneed complained to some of his friends here that Hilliard's conduct was getting too boisterous and said he was trying to give him a chance to do better. Finally he turned Hilliard off the ranch. Hilliard had had intermittent employment since and apparently brooded over his trouble with Sneed. He left there late yesterday for Georgetown arriving there before daylight today.

MANY MEZICANS ARE KILLED

GOVERNMENT TROOPS RECAPTURE SAN JUAN GUADALUPE FROM INSURRECTOS ENCOUNTER AT TEXCALTEPEC

Zapatistas Also Defeated by Mexican Forces Whose Casualties Only Nine.

CITY OF MEXICO, March 6.—Forty Vasquistas were killed many wounded in a battle with government troops near Texcala in the state of Coahuila, south of Torreon according to report from the commander of government troops. A detachment of 100 federals and rural guards today recaptures San Juan alupe which was held by the rebels who retired.

Twenty Zapatistas Killed at Cuernavaca, March 1.—A detachment of federal troops under Colonel Tibanez today killed twenty Zapatistas in a fight at Texacalla, state of Morelos. The federal troops suffered nine casualties.

Much Cotton on Hand.

President Peter Radford of the Farmer's Union returned from a business trip to Spurr this morning from an extended trip to the state and says the farmer has more cotton on hand now than have had at this time of the year for a number of years. He estimates the holding to the amount of the union made urging the farmers to keep their cotton for higher prices. Mr. Radford said he had talked with people everywhere and that next year many Texas farmers will follow the example of the Western National of Fort Worth and loan money to farmers on their cotton instead of forcing the cotton farmer to sell and loaning money to cotton merchants.—Fort Worth Telegram.

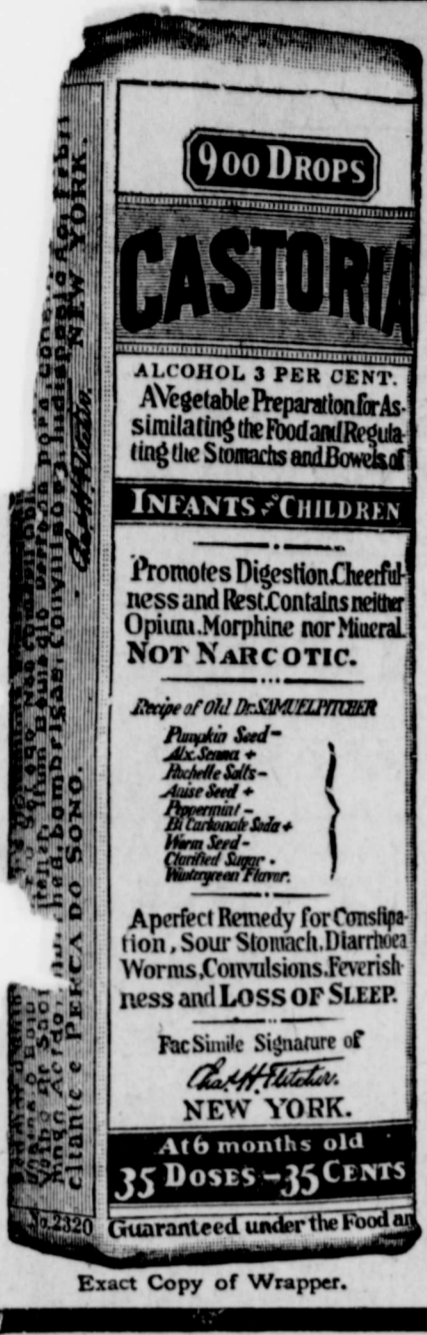
