SNYDER'S RAILROAD OUTLOOK

HALO OF PROMISES GROWS BRIGHTER. TWO TRUNK ROADS COMING OUR WAY

KATY MAY SOON BUILD TO ROSWELL

Fort Worth to Stamford—Rotan to Roswell. Still Another Trunk Line—Vast Possibilities For Snyder

A special from Waco to the Dallas Herald tells of rumors of a story of extension of the Texas Central from Rotan to Roswell. The report says:

Waco, March 9.—One or more eastern publications state that the Katy will build from Rotan to Roswell, N. M., a distance of nearly three hundred miles. This would make the Texas Central over five hundred miles long.

This report revives railroad prospects for Snyder and leads older citizens to expect that work will soon start and that the Central will probably be built to Snyder by next fall. There has been some significant movements among railroad men looking to other connections and now it seems almost certain that the Katy will proceed very soon to build a line from Fort Worth to Stamford to connect with the Texas Central. This will put Snyder on the direct through line from Fort Worth to Roswell. This road will traverse country all the way that now has no railroad and will develop sections of the finest country in Texas.

From surveys being made and from persistent rumors afloat we are led further to believe that the Quana, Acme & Pacific now partly built from Quana to Spur will come

right on from Spur through Kent county and to Snyder on its way to El Paso.

That line will be specially valuable to Snyder in furnishing a direct line to St. Louis and Kansas City to the north and the El Paso connections to the south and pass through a vast section of west Texas never before touched by a railroad.

From these prospects which bear strong features of certainty we conclude that it is only a few months now till Snyder will have two more trunk roads and then we will have the best railroad connections of any town in west Texas.

We would not encourage extravagant plunges, but let it be understood that these things will more surely come if we manifest an enthusiastic and liberal desire for them and no reasonable demands made upon us should be turned down. These two prospective roads coming here will make Snyder the leading railroad city of the west and our city will be to west Texas what Dallas is to the northern part of the state—the metropolis of a vast agricultural and stock growing region and the commercial and industrial center of West Texas and New Mexico.

REGULARS WIN FIGHT

Trainload of Refugees Passes Thru Laredo—Culberson to Meet Taft

San Antonio, March 12.—News that Mexican Federal troops had engaged the revolutionists in battle near Torreon and had won a victory reached the state department here today.

The report came from Consul General Hanna at Monterey who said that he had heard that Torreon had been captured.

From Southern Mexico official advices tell of revolutionary activities at Jalisco. Two small bands of rebels or marauders are said to be roving about the state.

In Guadala Jara the capital one thousand rebels are reported to be holding sway. The reports say, however that they are not considered dangerous.

Refugees Flight Continues:

Laredo, March 12.—A northbound Mexican train arrived at noon and brought two hundred passengers of which one hundred and twenty five were Pullman passengers and principally women and children.

The refugees said conditions in Mexico are better since the big demonstration in favor of the government in the City of Mexico. Like most of their predecessors, these women said their men folks were entirely to blame for their departure.

Culberson to See Taft:

DAVIS BIRTHPLACE TO BE PURCHASED

Kentucky Senate Passes Bill Allowing Fund for Buying Memorial at Elkton.

FRANKFORT Ky., March 12.—With the passage in the house of the Senate bill appropriating seventy-five hundred dollars for the purchase of Jeff Davis' birthplace near Elkton, Ky., the memorial to the president of the Confederacy for which the daughters of the Confederacy have been working was made possible.

The homestead is to be made into a State park and a memorial will be erected upon it.

Plans for a Jefferson Davis way leading to the farm are also projected and the considerations of a state highway extending from the Lincoln road at Bowling Green to the Mississippi way intersecting the Jefferson Davis way are under consideration.

CATTLEMAN KILLED.

Death Results From Accidental Discharge of Pistol.

Roy B. Burnett, former Ft. Worth resident, and nephew of Capt. Burke Burnett, the millionaire Fort Worth Cattleman, accidentally killed himself while playing with a revolver in his home in Carlisbad, N. M., early Tuesday morning, according to a dispatch received by The Star-Telegram.

Mr. Burnett and his wife had been out Monday night to a social entertainment. They returned shortly before 2 o'clock and going into the bedroom, Mr. Burnett who was in a playful mood, picked up a revolver from the dressing table and began twirling it about his finger in the easy fashion so common with cowmen.

The revolver went off and the bullet struck him in the temple, killing him instantly.

Members of the family said that they did not believe that Mr. Burnett thought that the weapon was loaded.

TELEGRAPHER HELD FOR ROBBERING THE STATION

Operator Declared Robber Held Up Texas-Mexican Station at San Diego

Corpus Christi March 12.—Ben Alcala, a former telegraph operator for the Texas Mexican railway at San Diego, Texas, was today held there under \$2500 bond, charged with robbing the station at San Diego of \$300 in cash and \$400 in checks.

Alcala claimed that a masked high wayman held him up and took the money.

Sheriff Tobin, who arrested Alcala testified at his examining trial today that he found a large part of the money and all the checks in Alcala's home.

CHARGE OF SLAVE TRAFFIC

Al Boyce Charged With White Slave Traffic.—Investigation Begun By Grand Jury.

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 11.—An investigation of a White Slave Traffic charge against Al Boyce the son of Captain A. C. Boyce, who was murdered on Jan. 13 by John Beal Sneed was begun here this morning.

The charge depends upon the allegations that Mrs. Sneed was insane when Al Boyce eloped with her.

Sanitarium Officials and other witnesses will be brought before the grand jury.

Texas Made Automobiles

Cleburne, Texas.—The Cleburne Automobile Manufacturing Company has made arrangements to place on exhibition at the Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth, March 18 to 23rd two large Cleburne-made automobiles. One of the machines will be placed in the Coliseum and the other one will be exhibited on the outside.

COAL MINERS AND POLICE IN BATTLE

Mob of Two Thousand Coal Miners Make Attack Upon Forty Police Officers

BERLIN, March 12.—Clashes between the police and strikers are reported to have occurred today in the coal regions. The most serious conflict was near Hamborn in the district of Russeldorf where a mob of two thousand strikers attacked a detachment of forty policemen, injuring five.

The police charged with drawn sabers, wounding many of the strikers.

At many other places the police were stoned. The police used their sabers in dispersing the strikers.

The number of casualties is not reported.

Owing to these disturbances the Christian trade unions and the mine owners have telegraphed to the minister of the interior to send troops or to reinforce the police in the coal district.

The police authorities however, however assert that the police protection is sufficient.

Will Build a Silo.

Mr. O. L. Jones, who farms just northeast of town is a live wire when it comes to keeping in the front ranks of progressive men.

He is now making figures on building a silo for handling feed stuff. He is now expecting to receive complete plans and specifications from an expert and will soon be in position to start the work.

This reminds the Signal that a few days ago Pope Strayhorn suggested that as a means to encourage this work, the people might make up a fund to buy wire and cement for the first two silos to be built here. Mr. Jones has not asked for such aid. He is about to start at his own expense along improvement lines and Mr. Strayhorn's suggestion may appeal to him in a practical way.

WHITE SLAVERY CHARGE

J. B. Sneed, Sanitarium Doctors and Nurse Summoned Before the Federal Body.

Star-Telegram:

Investigation of the white slave charge against Al Boyce, whose sensational elopement with Mrs. J. B. Sneed culminated in the shooting of his father and in the most noted murder trial in the State's history was taken up Monday morning by the Federal Grand Jury here.

United States District Attorney Atwell, before the grand jury met, declined to say whether or not the matter was to be taken up, but at 11:35 a. m., John Beal Sneed who slew Boyce's father, Jan. 13 arrived at the Federal building accompanied by his brother-in-law, J. H. Bowman of Plano, John Snyder of Amarillo who with Lee Tignor, conducted the first search for Mrs. Sneed and by W. P. McLean, Jr., of counsel for Sneed in the recent murder trial.

WORLD WIDE MINE STRIKE.

Walkout Will Spread Generally if Men in United States Quit Which is Likely.

New York—A world wide strike of coal miners is regarded by the coal trade as more than likely if negotiations now in progress between the anthracite and bituminous workers and their employees in this country do not result in a settlement of working conditions.

With more than one million coal miners on a strike in Great Britain and 150,000 in Germany voting to quit work to force higher wages and French miners threatening to quit and it looks like all of Europe is faced.

The anthracite coal operators are drafting their negative reply on the question of wages to the hard coal workers for presentation to the miners on Wednesday.

Next week in Cleveland the bituminous operators and their employees will confer to try to bring about an adjustment of conditions in the soft coal fields.

Coal is being unloaded on the Atlantic seaboard for South American and European ports, usually supplied by English firms.

TEXAS INSURANCE MATTERS

Reports From President Stephenson Of Texas Life Insurance Convention.

Nineteen Texas life insurance companies are holding their stockholders meeting today, second Tuesday in March, and there were probably three thousand or more stockholders in attendance at the home offices of the various companies.

There were four Texas life companies transacting business in the state when the Robertson bill became a law. Today there are nineteen Texas companies, members of the Texas Life Convention, and the combined assets of these companies total more than ten million dollars. They issued new paid for business during 1911 in the sum of forty-eight millions and had more than one hundred and sixteen million dollars of insurance in force at the close of the year. They are writing new business at the rate of millions a month, and expect to place sixty millions of paid for insurance on their books during 1912.

Texas companies combined have about eight million dollars invested in Texas securities, and under the operations of the Robertson Law outside companies transacting business in the state have invested more than ten millions in Texas mortgage loans during the past three years—a sum ten times greater than the combined holdings in Texas mortgages of the twenty-one with drawing companies at the time they left the state.

The Robertson Bill, which so stirred up the state at the time it was enacted into law, was amended by the succeeding legislature, and again amended and merged into a general insurance code at a later session. The law retains the investment feature, however, and it is this feature of the law that has added more than ten million dollars to the mortgage loans in Texas, held by life insurance companies domiciled outside the state. The amount of such loans carried by the twenty-one withdrawing companies was less than a million dollars.

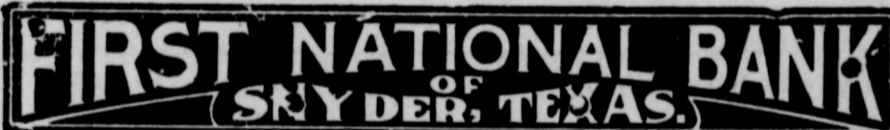

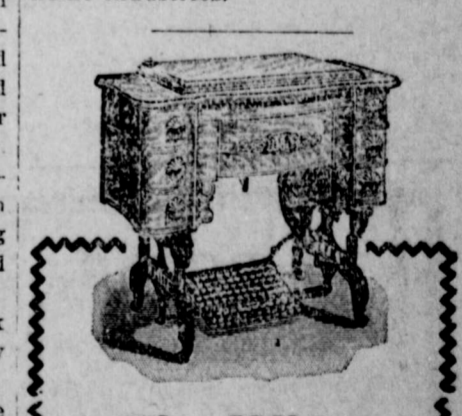
Lost Valuable Mare.

"We need an increasing and widening agitation until every school building in this country is suitably equipped and open for this purpose without any other payment by those who wish to use it than the public taxes to which all self supporting persons necessarily contribute directly or indirectly through the cost of living.

"What was called the neighborhood civic club, composed of adult citizens of all classes, parties, and shades of opinion, was the very foundation stone of the whole movement of Rochester. The first great lesson of the movement is that such organizations held their meetings in school buildings continuously for four years; that they did actually develop the community spirit in a most remarkable degree; that they proved to be capable of discussing in a spirit of fairness and good will questions involving the most extreme and radical differences of opinion; that they proved not only willing but eager and insisted upon hearing both sides of the question considered, and that they did not lose their heads nor were they carried away by radical utterances and

appeals so as to take any hasty and ill considered action."

How to Feed Cotton Seed Meal.

A friend of the Signal who is interested in all progressive ideas in farm matters has decided to adopt the cotton seed meal ration for horses and mules. It has been proved beyond doubt that it is a valuable feed when properly mixed with other feed and the careful farmer will avoid peril by knowing before hand how much of the meal he may use. Too much of it will ruin the experiment and injure the animal. The proportion is based on a horse or a mule of a thousand pounds weight and according to the amount of work or exercise to be given the animal.

John C. Burns, professor of animal husbandry at the A. & M. college gives out this scientific suggestion:

"As much as two to two and a half pounds of cottonseed meal per 1,000 pounds live weight per day may be fed to horses and mules, in combination with their other food, with very good results. When as much as three pounds of cottonseed meal have been fed, less favorable results have been obtained. Cottonseed meal is rich in protein, or muscle-producing material, and hence is especially valuable for growing animals and breeding stock. When fed to work animals, it improves the ordinary ration of grain and prairie or sorghum hay, by making it better balanced. The following daily ration per 1,000 pounds live weight is a good one for horses and mules doing moderately hard work:

Two pounds cottonseed meal; eight to ten pounds corn or kafir corn, or milo maize, or rice bran; twelve to fourteen pounds sorghum or prairie hay, or Johnson grass or Bermuda hay."

Fire Insurance Notice

For the information of the policy holders of the town of Snyder we wish to call attention to the restrictions in your policy contract with reference to keeping gasoline, naphtha or other products of petroleum of higher inflammability than kerosene oil also carbon, carbide, dynamite and other explosives.

There seems to be some misunderstanding about what the policy permits in such cases and it is better to have an understanding before the fire than a misunderstanding after the fire.

If you get your Texas Standard Fire Policy and carefully read lines 11 to 30 inclusive, you will find therein contained all the things you must not do to avoid violating your contract with reference to keeping such articles as well as some other things. You will see that you are not permitted to keep gasoline, carbon or such articles of like nature in any quantity whatever, except by a permit granted and endorsed on the face of your policy. This permit can be had for the keeping of one gallon in automatic closing cans without charge. If more than one gallon is desired, then a charge is made for the permit, based on the amount desired to be kept and the kind of

IS TIME TO KEEP COOL

Texas Congressman Gives Views on Mexican Situation, Discusses Results of Investigation

Washington, March 10.—Representative Slayden of Texas, asked to contribute to a symposium on the Mexican situation by a New York paper for tomorrow, made the following statement:

"Conditions in Mexico are deplorable, but I do not see how individual Americans of the Congress of the United States can help the situation now. So far as I am informed we have no right yet to interfere in the internal affairs of that country.

"If the Administration were to listen to the hysterical or ill-informed we would become immediately involved in war with Mexico.

Would Unite Mexicans.

"Suggestions of intervention come from selfish interests that believe that if the United States should exercise any sort of control in Mexico it would increase the value and earnings of mines ranches and other investments. They also come from a few timid people who really want protection and from the turbulently inclined who see opportunities in war.

"Intervention is protested against by most Americans in Mexico from whom I have heard. They believe as I do that it would have the most deplorable results.

"It would unite all Mexicans against us at once. Just as soon as the first American soldiers on a hostile mission crossed the border, Orozco, Madero, Gomez and all the other warring leaders and factions would become a compact body united in their hostility to the invaders.

"Then Americans who were still in Mexico would be in danger not from the Government, for it is by far too enlightened for such savagery, but from irresponsible bandits.

Will Have to Pay Damages.

"Except an occasional crime committed by thieves and murderers, Americans and other foreigners have so far been reasonable protected in their persons. Of course the Mexican government will finally have to settle to the last penny for all damage done to the persons and property of foreigners who are residing there under treaty rights. It will be a big bill, but it will have to be paid.

"We are not altogether without responsibility for conditions in Mexico. Our neutrality laws were neither clear nor strong enough to prevent aid going to Madero in his assault on the Diaz Government. They are old and absurdly inadequate for the proper discharge of our neutral obligations.

"I believe that the President is laboring to prevent trouble and every lover of peace must pray for his success.

"Even temporary political association with Mexico would be a misfortune. It would give us 16,000,000 unwilling partners in Government. This is a time for everybody to keep cool and as patiently as may be, wait for the President who represents us all, to solve these annoying complex problems."

STRIKERS PARADE

Quiet Demonstration at Lawrence Early Today—Five Arrests—No Trouble

Lawrence, Mass., March 8.—Striking textile workers made a big, although quiet demonstration this morning prior to the time for opening the mills.

Thousands of men and women crowded Essex street and the approaches to the factories were lined with pickets but no serious trouble occurred. Five arrests were made.

One woman was assailed by a striker and a razor was found on a foreigner who was taken into custody for disorderly conduct. No perceptible increase in the number of employees resuming work was noted.

FARMERS ARE NEEDED IN TEXAS

Their Arrival Would Add Fifteen Million Population and bring in an Immense Wealth.

WASHINGTON.—The Federal department of Agriculture recently made the statement that the Texas farm had decreased in size during the past decade from 357 acres in 1900 to 262 acres in 1910, all of which goes to show that the Texas farmer is rapidly learning lessons in diversification.

The Texas farm is still too large one farmer cannot cultivate more than 50 acres unless he employs help, which would mean another farmer. On this basis, Texas needs 3,000,000 more farmers, which would mean an increase in population of 15,000,000 people, and these farmers would bring with them \$1,000 each in property, which would make an increase in property values of \$3,000,000,000 or more than the whole value of all Texas property.

OUR LEADING INTERESTS

Scientific And Practical Agriculture Of First Importance With Our People.

The Signal would be glad to see the pupils in all our schools, city and country, take up the study, in a practical way, of all lines of agriculture. The state has wisely provided for the teaching of agriculture in the schools and it ought to be given more attention than it is getting.

It may well be considered a misfortune that a great per cent of the people conclude that every educated boy should take a profession or go to congress. Only a small per cent of them ever succeed in politics and more good, solid sense is required for intelligent farming than for a profession. The time was when people seemed to think if a boy was not bright enough or from other causes could not qualify for a profession, he could farm. That notion is being exploded in actual practice.

We do not say by any means, that a man must have a college education to be a successful farmer, although the more education he has the better for him, but we do believe he should know the soil in all its elements and agencies. He should understand chemistry, geology, philosophy and other points connected with animal and plant life. He should understand the climatic influences so as to understand the law of nature bearing upon his section of country. He should know the seeding time and the harvest season and should know how to prepare his land so as to get the highest benefits from nature's store house.

Not least in the catalog of studies on the farm are the conditions to be met at selling time. The wise farmer studies the markets and is prepared to offer his products at times and in a condition to bring him ample profits on his well directed efforts.

The school boy will take interest in these things if parents and teachers will direct them. Get the boys to talking about it encourage them to have charge of small areas, if only a few square yards, or a few plants in the garden, and their interest will increase.

They should be taught the adaptability of given soils to given crops they will soon learn what to plant, when and how to plant. They will find in actual practice the nature of irrigation and fertilizing and before long we will have a generation of practical farmers coming out of our public schools.

The Signal would be glad to have the name of every school boy and girl in Scurry county who will under take to cultivate a small area of ground or any who will take up a line of poultry raising, or who will take up the growing of hogs and see what can be done in any of these lines by fall.

Let us have volunteers in these lines and a committee of practical men will visit all these young farmers and note their progress during the season and next fall these efforts and achievements will be rounded up and premiums will be given for the best methods and the best results.

Now we hope the fathers of our boys will help us in this matter. We feel sure that with reasonable encouragement the boys will put much interest and energy into this movement.

MORE SNOW.

Fall Reported at Amarillo and at Vernon This Morning.

AMARILLO, Tex., March 8.—Snow began falling here early today. There was a brisk wind and a quick drop in the temperature and colder weather predicted for tonight.

Vernon, Texas, March 8.—Snow and sleet appeared here today along with a norther.

Conditions at Cisco.

Cisco, Texas, March 8.—The second norther of the week struck here last night and there is no promise of its abating today. The weather has delayed the planting of small grain somewhat. It is also expected there will be a reduction in cotton acreage this year.

J. W. Neill Address Farmers

Mr. J. W. Neill of Big Springs, who is working for the State Bureau of Agriculture lectured Saturday afternoon at the court house to at least a hundred men mostly practical farmers. Mr. Neill is well posted on farm conditions in West Texas. He understands cultural methods and knows the crops that are adapted to this country. He has also made a study of fruits and berries and he is anxious to see our people give more attention to these lines. Right now, he says that our orchards are in danger of being ruined by borers and other enemies of fruit trees. He says that is what causes so many fruit trees to die. It is not due to dry weather as so many are apt to think.

Mr. Neill's lecture Saturday was devoted to insect pests, principally to boll worm the enemy most to be dreaded in this country. In discussing the boll worm he goes back to the spring time and wants to eradicate the fly that produces the eggs that hatch out the cornworm the tomato worm, the cut worm and all the others that come on as the fore runners of the boll worm. He shows that they are all different generations of the same family and that they begin as early as in April coming from the chrysalis to the worm, then the butter fly or miller the egg stage and then the worm and round again and they reach the boll worm stage in the late summer and fall. Mr. Neill urges the war to start during the spring, by plowing under, burning, poisoning or any and every other plan that will diminish the breed and stamp out the pest.

The Agricultural department is sending out literature covering these points and every farmer is urged to get in line for these helps. Let us all work together along these lines and great good will be accomplished.

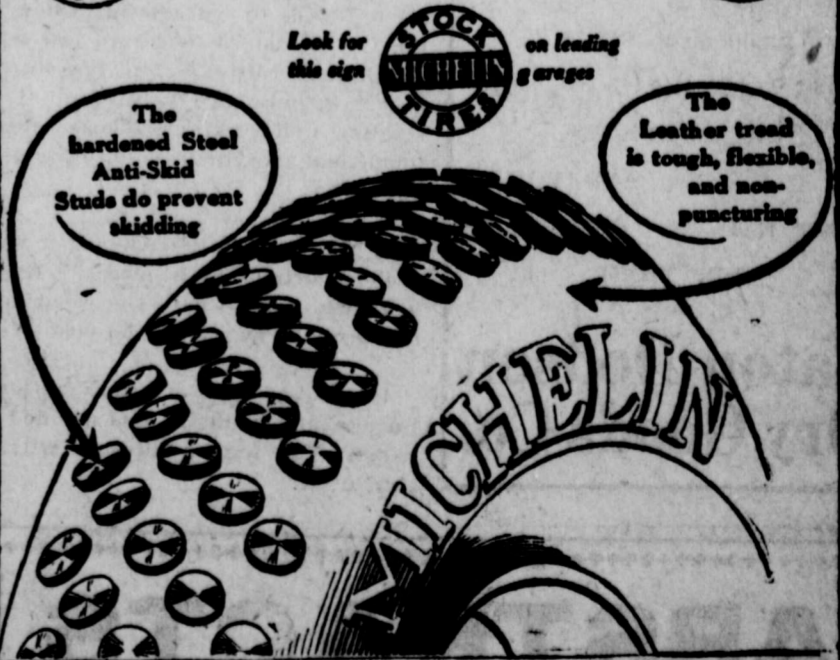
