School Land Article Carried Over

The Signal has made a special effort this week to get a well prepared synopsis of the pleadings in the celebrated Scurry County School Land case and the article will give to our readers a clear idea of the points at issue showing the contentions of both sides at the hearing and telling of the result of the hearing here last week before Judge Thomas. On account of being crowded for space and time, this article is carried over till next issue of the paper.

The Tent Show.

Eller's Theatrical Company gave a tent show on the cotton yard grounds here Wednesday night and they had a full house. The play was the old story so often played, "Ten Nights in a Bar Room."

They had a good orchestra and the people enjoyed the music. There must have been something peculiarly funny about the performance for all next day when one man would ask another, "Did you go to the show last night," they would both smile and then talk about other things.

The grand jury adjourned today. They turned in five more indictments, all for misdemeanor. This makes seventeen bills returned at this term.

The democratic wool tariff bill was passed by the House of Representatives by a vote of 189 to 92. Twenty republican congressmen voted for the democratic measure.

DR. NORRIS ON TRIAL

Defendant Seeks to Quash Indictment—Norris Talks of Persecution.—Guard and an Officer Arrested

The trial of Dr. J. Frank Norris was begun at Fort Worth Monday. The Star Telegram says:

An effort to quash the indictment is the first move of the defense in the trial for perjury of Rev. J. F. Norris which begun in the Sixty-Seventh district court Monday afternoon.

The trial was originally scheduled for 9 o'clock but attorneys for the defense asked for a delay until two o'clock.

Judge Simmons at first was inclined to refuse this delay and told the attorneys that the request was unreasonable.

The state through assistant County Attorney Baldwin, announced ready for trial.

Attorney Gillespie, one of the defense counsel explained that former Senator Odell had been added to the defense counsel and he had just arrived in the city and that they wished to have him go over several motions that the defense intends to introduce.

Judge Simmons then granted the delay.

Norris Talks of Trial:

In discussing his indictment for perjury and for arson before his congregation meeting in Byers Opera House Sunday night, Dr. Norris said in part:

"I cannot conceive of an enmity which will cause men to persecute others as I have been persecuted.

"Why my own desk has been opened and rifled. At Ennis the desk of my dear friend Dr. T. W. White was forced. When my trial occurs I have no doubt but that there will be introduced a note book in which I actually figured up the insurance on our church building. Think of it!

"There are men walking in Fort Worth now with forged instruments against me in their pockets. Some of my dear brethren tell me that I should not talk so that I should not make such statements. Human nature cannot stand everything."

Thomas O'Flaherty who is charged with the burglary of the office of Dr. T. W. White at Ennis Friday night and who was formerly in the employ of the church committee of the First Baptist church as a personal guard for Rev. Norris was arrested by Constable Mann on Monday morning and is being held in Ellis county authorities.

O'Flaherty has retained McLean, Scott & McLean to seek his release on a writ corpus Monday afternoon.

Both Dr. White and O'Flaherty are witnesses for the defense in the Norris case. Dr. White received O'Flaherty on the street Monday morning and it was upon information that O'Flaherty was by Constable Mann.

County Attorney Baskin said he had never been employed by the State to secure evidence.

O'Flaherty with Chief of Police Joe Alexander at Ennis, it is alleged, were found in Dr. White's office on Friday night.

Chief Alexander is under a two hundred dollar bond pending his examining trial at Ennis.

Prior to his arrest Monday morning, O'Flaherty stated that he had been working on the mysteries of the First Baptist church with Sheriff McAfee of Grayson county and that he had gone to Ennis in search of evidence. He admitted being in the office of Dr. White and added that he was there with his companion to write down some names, that Dr. White's partner had told them to go ahead and get some paper on which to write. He denies opening the desk or rifling anything.

Besides he said that he saw Dr. White at the depot the next morning as he was leaving and informed the doctor that he had been in his office the night before.

Showing Fine Fowls

LETTER FROM THE NAVY

Snyder Boy Writes of Experiences and Sight Seeing in Washington.

Dear mother and home folks:

I rec'd your letter to la. There is no use to tell how much I enjoyed it because you know I enjoy letters from home.. Now don't think I am home sick because I do not write Now about my trip to Washington.

We went to parade in that city in honor of dead bodies that were found in the raising of the Maine. We left this station with a band of 104 pieces and four hundred soldiers. The navy furnished a large steamer of the Norfolk and Washington line.

We marched on the lower deck then to the upper decks where we got berths for the night.

After getting everything fixed for the night we went outside for sight seeing. We started from Norfolk at 6 o'clock and steamed up Chesapeake bay, through a fleet of 32 war ships. The scene was grand. We stopped fifteen minutes at Old Point Comfort.

It is dark when we leave here. The band gave a concert as we steamed up the bay. The crowds were lively and fresh. The passengers cheered in great glee. By next morning we had passed through the bay and were out on the Potomac river, about ten miles out from Washington.

The scenery from the river is great to see. We landed in Washington just across from Mt. Vernon. After a look at the tall monument we then marched out to the city and navy yard. Lunch at 10 a. m., then march to the U. S. S. Birmingham where the corpses from the Maine were held in waiting. I saw 64 dead bodies before they were taken from the ship. Then came the great parade—sailors, soldiers, marines, infantry, artillery. One by one the sailors carried the bodies ashore while the band played a funeral march. The moving picture artists were there making pictures of every motion. From here we marched to the capitol up Pennsylvania Avenue. The capitol was a great sight to me. I didn't play on the trip and had opportunity to see things. We saw the whitehouse and the treasury buildings. Here we formed military order and President Taft delivered an

address. The crowd was estimated 15,000 to 20,000 and 5000 military men. Here I saw Admiral Dewey and Col. Roosevelt. There were 5 bands in the parade which was a mile long. This march was continued to the cemetery. On the way here I saw ground on which the battle of Bull Run was fought. While the dead bodies were being buried the Marine band played soft music which made the occasion even more solemn. The bugle sounded the call for mourning and it was sad and lonesome.

From here we were transported on Extra cars back to our ship and we start on our return trip in the dark.

I shall never forget my first visit to Washington. Wanted to send pictures from there but could not get out of ranks.

I am well and feeling good.

SUSPENSION STORY DENIED

Editor of Appeal to Reason Says That Journal Will Continue to Live.

Last week the Signal printed a story of the probable suspension of the Appeal to Reason the leading Socialist paper of the nation—the recognized organ of that political school.

The report embraced a statement purporting to come direct from Fred D. Warren, intimating that the paper was on its last legs.

This story appeared in newspapers all over the country. Since then the Appeal to Reason has come out in a positive denial of the published statements.

In the issue of March 30th, the editor of the paper says:
"The report was circulated Friday of last week by a Kansas City daily newspaper that the Appeal to Reason has suspended. Friday night the Appeal staff was kept busy answering long distance telephone calls denying the story. The Appeal has no intention of suspending. It will stay on the job as long as the Appeal Army backs the paper in its fight for Socialism. The report temporarily caused much rejoicing at Topeka.

The following telegram was sent to the Daily Press, Cleveland Ohio in reply to a query asking if it was true that the Appeal had suspended.

Press, Cleveland, Ohio—The story that the Appeal to Reason has suspended is utterly without foundation. The Appeal was never more alive than it is at the present time. The report without doubt originated in Washington. Congressman Dalzell of Pennsylvania in letters to some of his constituents announced some days ago that the Appeal to Reason must be suppressed. How and when the execution must take place, we have not been advised. We are at work preparing a scathing exposure of the federal judiciary and it may be that an attempt may be made to prevent that edition from going thru the mails. If such an attempt is successful our papers will be sent by express and freight.

Sheriff Caught Lawyers Unawares.

Tuesday was election day in Snyder and court was going along without any special excitement so the lawyers had a sort of holiday.

There was a prominent Abilene lawyer here and he and one of our leading local attorneys decided to go out for a few hours hunting. They went to borrow a gun from Sheriff Boles. That gentleman, generous hearted and always willing to accommodate a friend readily loaned them the gun.

These cultured disciples of Blackstone came back through town armed and equipped for an assault up on the rabbit kingdom.

The sheriff followed them to the streets and reminding them that it is a violation of law to carry a gun within a given distance of a voting box where an election was being held and therefore he would have to exercise his authority to preserve the dignity of the law.

The case of Carl Grubbs, convicted here at a former term of the District Court, of assault to commit murder and was fined \$50 and a term of some days in jail had his case appealed and the judgement was affirmed last week. This case grew out of a difficulty between some young men near Dunn early last year.

JUDGE STINSON ANNOUNCES

Wants to Be Re-Elected to the Office of District Attorney in this District.

Before leaving for his home this week after adjournment of the District Court, Judge James P. Stinson of Anson authorized the Signal to announce him as a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney for the 39th Judicial District subject to the action of the Democratic primaries.

Judge Stinson is a lawyer of recognized ability and as a prosecutor, he is energetic, firm and fair. He is a close watcher of the peace and dignity of the state, but is never disposed to persecute or harass persons who are accused of crime.

He has made the district a good of ficer for these two years and if re-elected he will continue to do his duty. He has been officially engaged in every county in his district and is therefore well and favorably known.

And the Government added another clause to the agreement that the people would so construct their hen houses as to save all the droppings and thus manure was to be used to fertilize their gardens. And it was done. And in a few years Denmark became famous for its fine poultry and the fine quality of her vegetables. Through these simple means of the Danish Government the people passed from a state of poverty to a state of financial independence and instead of being a burden to the Government they increased their public usefulness a hundred fold. Thus the old adage comes true. That there is nothing like success to make men succeed." Here it is, the resources that raised the Danish people from poverty to independence lies at the door of almost every farmer in the land, if they only would rise up and use them.

TETER GETS NEW TRIAL

Judge Blanton Transfers Case to Jones County—Trial Comes in July

District court convened Monday morning with Judge Thos. L. Blanton of the Abilene district on the bench. A civil case of McCullough vs. H. C. Jourdan suit on note was tried and judgement rendered for plaintiff.

A motion was argued for a new trial for Ivan Teter who was tried last week on a charge of statutory rape and given five years in the penitentiary. The court granted a new trial and transferred the case to Jones county. The trial is set for Thursday of the second week of the July term of the court in that county. The court adjourned Monday afternoon for the day and the case of the state vs. Dr. A. W. Browning is on the boards for Tuesday.

Later—Continued for the term.

First Monday in Snyder.
Monday was a great day in Snyder. It was first Monday and there were lots of people in town. There was considerable interest shown in the horses, mules and jacks on display in the streets. Our people are showing some good stock and in a few years Scurry county will be as noted for fine stock as Collin and Grayson counties. There is no reason why it should not be so. We have the grass, the water and the climate and we have the farmers who know how to raise fine stock.

Will Protect Americans.
The United States will take steps to protect American citizens who are in Mexico and other nations are doing the same way. The uncertainty of the outcome of the rebellion in Mexico causes uneasiness for with rebel victory, it is believed the whole country would be at the mercy of toughs and brigands who would have no consideration for the rights of persons of the dignity of nations in such events, foreign residents would probably be the greatest sufferers. To provide against such a state of affairs, President Madero has consented for the United States to supply Americans with arms and ammunition to defend themselves. A shipment of guns and a million rounds of ammunition have been sent out from Washington and should be distributed within a few days.

The Mexican situation is a case for international consideration. If the Madero government falls the United States may find it necessary to step over there and straighten out the affairs, or at least in connection with other nations, draft an outline and tell the Mexican people they must quit fighting each other and get down to a humane and civilized national policy.

Financing Cotton Crop.

"There are now more than 2,200 farmers' grain companies organized, and they are saving the organized farmers \$60,000,000 a year. This estimate is on the authority of the president of the Grain Dealers Association of Illinois. The states of Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota have a membership of 9,000 farmers."

The above is just in line with the plan given out several weeks ago by the Co-Operator to handle cotton. The cotton farmer will never be able to control market conditions until he owns the market machinery himself.

The grain growers recognize this fact when they begin to organize grain companies and to build their own elevators. With these facilities in their own hands they were masters of the situation and able to control the grain market and to make for themselves \$60,000,000 a year. This should encourage the cotton farmer and cause him to undertake some feasible plan for his own relief.—Farm Co-Operator.

Scurry's Agricultural Possibilities
A Signal reporter had the pleasure and advantage last week of hearing Mr. J. W. Neill, who is connected with the state agricultural department, discuss farming in its various lines and that gentleman knows his business.

He can tell a man more in thirty minutes about his orchard than the owner knows after ten years of attention and cultivation. He says trees are killed by insects and fungus growth and then he proves it. He urges people to select good seed to get the seed for planting from the middle of the pod, ear of head, so as to get the strength and best matured seeds for planting. He urges deep breaking and shallow cultivation. Mr. Neill says that Scurry county is in a favored belt for fruit grapes and berries as well as vegetables and he expects some day to see more attention given along these lines. He was asked what peculiar characteristic of the land causes the country about Clyde to be so noted for fruit and vegetables. He said—That is a deep sandy land and that such land holds moisture and the chemical elements necessary for these crops. Taking this theory for a starter, the Signal believes that the deep sandy land near the Colorado river from Dunn to Ira is a superior country for fruit, berries and vegetables, and after a while when this fact is fully demonstrated, the land there will bring fancy prices and the products of that soil will become famous in the leading markets. There is no doubt about Scurry county lands holding fortunes for men who will get about testing in a scientific way.

An Interesting Letter from Snyder.

Mr. Preston Martin, an Attorney of Weatherford, Texas, who is attending District Court here, writes his home paper, the Weatherford Daily Herald, as follows:
Mr. J. E. H. Railey, Weatherford, Texas:
My Dear Mr. Railey:

I have just received two copies of your great home Daily, Monday and Tuesday issues and I was certainly glad to get them. We know how to appreciate a good paper when we get away from home. I have read everything in them, even the advertisements.

I left Weatherford last Sunday night, and spent Monday in Sweetwater and Tuesday in Hermleigh, arriving here about noon Tuesday. I am tied up here in District Court and can't tell just when I will be permitted to return to good old Weatherford. Be sure and send me your paper until I return home. The grand jury has been in session here all the week, but has not yet reported on the cases that I am interested in. I have getting three square meals a day and have a fine place to stay.

When I first arrived here, it was very warm like summer time, but we have been experiencing some severe winter weather ever since yesterday morning. When I retired night before last it was too warm for cover, but during the night it began snowing and everything was covered with sleet and ice when I got up yesterday morning.

Not being used to this western country I had to get up twice and get more cover. The weather has moderated a little but it is still very cold and has been raining nearly all day.

I find quite a number of Parker County people living here. Fritz R. Smith is County Judge, Pat Johnston an old Parker county boy is working in the Collector's office and is a candidate for Tax Assessor, he only has ten opponents.

I find that about as many people are running for the various offices out here as back there; they tell me that this is an indication of hard times. The county has been hit pretty hard with the dry weather bug for the past three years but I find that the farmers are really in a better shape to make a crop this year than they are back there owing to the fact that they made plenty of feed stuff last year and do not have to go in debt for feed to make a crop on.

Rev. F. L. Hutcheson (our own Fayette) is here and doing well; he does not practice law any more but devotes all of his time to his ministerial work. He has made for himself quite a reputation as an evangelist just closed a successful meeting at Hermleigh in this county. I herewith enclose a clipping from the Snyder paper showing mention of his meeting at Hermleigh.

Fayette looks better than I ever saw him; he seems very much pleased with the fact that he will go to Weatherford and hold a meeting the 14th of next month. From what I can learn and observe of him here I am sure that the men representing the Men and Religion Forward Movement in Weatherford have made no mistake in securing him to hold the meeting there in April.

I find here also Lon Graham formerly of Springtown. He is first deputy under Sheriff J. B. Boles and they together sure do make a team of peace officers. If the evil does come this way they are sure to get him; in fact they are so vigilant in the discharge of their duties that they take hold of a fellow on suspicion and they tell me that they really run some fellows in before they do wrong and for fear they might get me I have been awful quiet and good to them ever since I have been here for fear they might put me in their new jail and I would not get out in time for our April term of Court. They have a neat, new and up-to-date court house here and a brand new jail. Lon Graham is the Jailer.

Snyder is a beautiful little western town with two railroads and has more pretty, new up-to-date buildings in it than any place I have seen in the west. There are at least a dozen new brick buildings here built within the last two years, similar to the Kuteman building there and equally as beautiful and they are away ahead of us on nice cement sidewalk. In fact, I find that all of the Western towns are ahead of us on nice cement sidewalks.

Well, I will close as I know you will not have time to read all of this but as I had nothing to do this afternoon, I thought I would write to you and tell you about a few things away out west and thank you for sending me your paper and I hope you will continue to do so each day so long as I have to be here.

Whilst this is a pretty little town to live in, I prefer staying in our old Weatherford. One serious objection I have to this part of Texas is that it is so far from where you

Committee Reasons Called Absurd After the state executive committee at Dallas had refused to allow the democrats of Texas to express their choice for president in primary election. B. F. Looney of Greenville Cato Sells of Cleburne M. M. Crane and C. E. Greenwood of Dallas issued a statement in which they say in part:

The State Democratic Executive Committee today denied the right to the Democrats of Texas of expressing at a primary election their preference for President. They have given as their reason, though couched in many words, substantially these:

First—That the primary election law denied them the power to order such a primary.

Second—That in a primary election fewer voters could be induced to attend than in a primary convention.

Third—That no proper safeguard could be made for the people who do whatever the law does not prohibit. The law directing how delegates shall be selected is a lame excuse for the denial to the masses of the Democrats the right to instruct those delegates. Surely the committee does not want to say that the masses, who are the masters, have no rights except such as their servants, the Legislature grants them. The absurdity of the committee's conclusions is illustrated and made plain by the concurrent construction of all of the State Executive Committees and all of the Democratic conventions held in Texas since the passage of the primary election law.

SCURRY COUNTY LAND SUIT

Court Sustains Defense in Plea of Abatement—Plaintiff's Give Notice of Appeal

The celebrated Scurry County School land case came on for trial in the District Court here Friday and a great crowd of citizens assembled at the court house to hear the proceedings.

This was a suit to test the validity or rather the public expediency of the sale made by the Commissioners Court of four leagues of school land situated in Hockley and Cochran counties.

The history of the transaction is well known to the public and the suit was brought by J. Y. Bowen and a number of other citizens to show wherein the sale was against the welfare of the people because of the price and terms of the sale.

Suit was brought to have the sale set aside and the land restored to the possession of the county. The trial of the case was set for Friday.

The Plaintiffs are represented by former Attorney General R. V. Davidson of Dallas and M. E. Rosser of Snyder.

The defendant is represented by Judge Warren Beall of Sweetwater and Higgins, Hamilton and Taylor of Snyder.

These lawyers constitute a strong array of legal talent and their issues in this case put them on their mettle and it was an intellectual treat to hear them expound the law and cite decisions and rules of law bearing upon the case.

Gen. Davidson read his petition to the Court. It consisted of thirty-two type-written pages, setting forth his reasons why the Commissioners should not have made the sale as it was done.

The defense then read their answer. Then the defense filed a plea in abatement and the argument was a splendid display of legal talent.

Gen. Davidson cited numerous decisions and Messrs Taylor and Higgins read rules, principles, constitution and decisions to show that the sale was a legal transaction and that the plaintiff had no grounds for action.

The Court heard the argument and sustained the contention of the defense and the case went out of Court.

The plaintiff moved for a new hearing which was denied and notice was given of appeal.

The Signal will give a more extensive report of this case next week.

Teter Gets Five Years

The jury in the trial of Ivan Teter charged with statutory rape were charged by the court late on Thursday evening and on Friday morning they reported that they were not agreed and the court sent them back for further deliberation.

It was stated about the court house that they stood one against eleven.

Later in the day they reported agreement and were admitted to the presence of the Court and their verdict was read: "We the jury find the defendant guilty as charged and assess his punishment at five years in the penitentiary."

Attorneys Payne and Perkins for the defendant gave notice of appeal.

The convicted man was placed in custody of the Sheriff pending the filing of a new bond.

Dr. Norris a few days ago resigned the pastorate of the church and had gone with his family to Hubbard City for a season of rest.

He had not been there long when a message came saying that he had been indicted for Arson.

He returned at once and surrendered to the officers. His bond was set at one thousand dollars and was readily signed.

There is no telling now where the matter will end.

Doctor Norris was a preacher of great force and had made an extensive reputation.

Whatever may be the facts it is feared that the days of usefulness may be over.

There has been a belief that he has been persecuted, but the country can not believe that two grand juries and the court officers would deliberately set about to ruin a man.

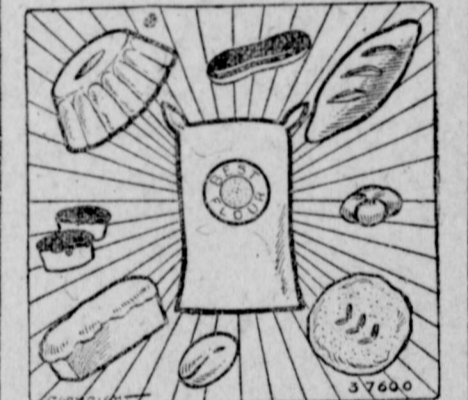

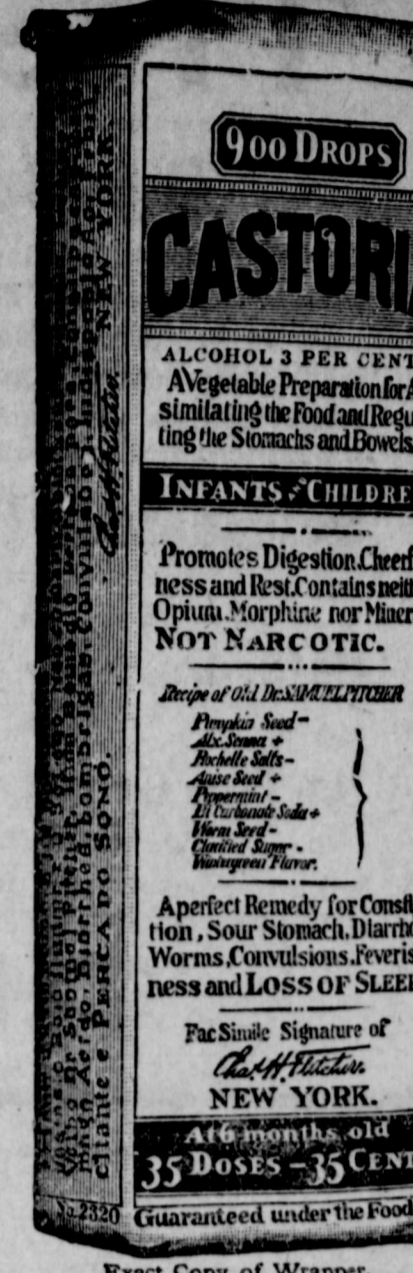

SWEETWATER MOTION DENIED

Civil Appeals Court Decree Sustains Disqualification in Shop Case.

Fort Worth, Tex., March 30.—In what is known as the Sweetwater case, the Court of Civil Appeals for the Second District today handed down a decree sustaining the contention that District Judge Shepherd of Nolan county was disqualified to preside in the case involving the removal of the Orient Railroad's shops from Sweetwater to San Angelo. The higher court also overruled the motion for rehearing of its action in reversing and vacating the action of the lower court.

The case is that of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railroad of Texas vs. S. A. Cole et al. Some time ago the road was restrained by District Judge J. M. Shepherd of Nolan county from removing its offices and roundhouses from Sweetwater to San Angelo and from amending its charter to permit it to do so. An appeal was taken and the action of the lower court was reversed

and vacated Feb. 24.

Files Charter Amendment.

The road by its president A. E. Stilwell, and other officers and directors immediately filed an amendment to its charter with the Secretary of State naming San Angelo as the place for locating offices, etc.

On Feb. 26 Cole et al filed a motion for a rehearing and next day made motion that the officers and directors of the road be held in contempt for alleged violation of Judge Shepherd's injunction. The Court of Appeals entered a fine of \$500 against the railroad and \$100 against each officer and cited them to answer March 8 to show cause why the fines should not stand.

The respondent in their answer admitted the procurement of the amended charter as alleged but insisted they were not in contempt of the court of Appeals because the judgment dissolving the temporary writ of injunction became immediately effective and because the temporary writ of injunction was void on the ground that Judge Shepherd was an interested party in that he owned lots in the Orient addition at Sweetwater the value of which would be affected by the removal of the shops, etc. The Court today sustained the contention that Judge Shepherd was disqualified and also overruled the motion for a rehearing.

The sale Friday morning of 18,000 head of cattle brought more than \$5000,000.

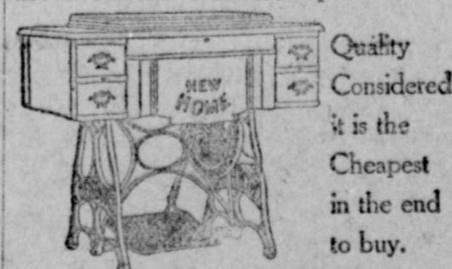

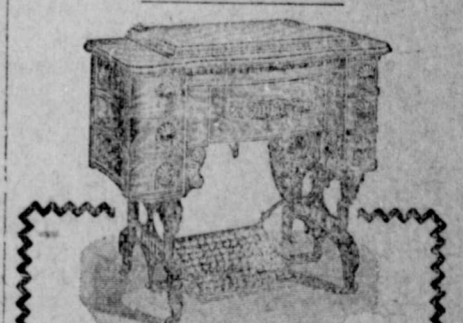
