Socialist Kicks on Record

To the Signal—
I notice you reproduce an article from Fort Worth Record on Socialism in Milwaukee. I wish to file objection.

A part of that article is true and part of it is false. It is true that the people became so disgusted with conditions that they elected a socialist Mayor and a majority of the City council. It is true that a fusion ticket defeated the Socialists at the last election.

It is not true that after two years conditions are found to be worse than ever. The fact is the Socialists gave the people a good honest administration and has been so stated by scores of their political enemies.

It is not a fact that Socialist principles proved impracticable. The Socialists at no time have had a majority of votes in Milwaukee. Seidel and his associates polled in 1910, 20,000 votes. Socialists have every cause to feel pleased over the gain in votes which will approximate 11 or 15,000 greater than when they captured the administration. Another such victory and the two old parties will be undone.

The Record said it was a tryout of Socialism and it failed to bring relief. It was not a tryout of Socialism. The Socialists did not have the power to repeal class laws as the Record is bound to know.

Scientists say that history and science points to Socialism. He thinks it might be tried, but first the consciences of all men must be searched and regenerated in other words. You cannot change human nature.

Statement from Development Co.

To the lot purchasers in the Snyder Oil Field and the Public in general:

The Snyder Development Company has completed the well in the oil field to a depth of 2,000 feet and nothing of a paying nature has been developed. The state geologist informs us that we have not yet gone deep enough to reach the oil strata that are supposed to lie beneath us. The formations as shown by the last cuttings from the well at the above depth indicate that we are in the strata overlying those in which gas and oil have heretofore been found.

Therefore, we desire to reorganize the company and increase the capital stock to \$20,000 and drill the well to a depth of at least 2500 feet. To do this we ask your co-operation on the following basis:

We will recharter the company and increase the capital stock to \$20,000. Five thousand dollars will represent the interest of the present stock holders, which has already been fully paid, and five thousand of the stock will be issued to a trustee to hold for the benefit of the present lot owners in said field; and \$10,000 of the stock to be sold, the proceeds of which will be used in sinking the well as far as same is practical, and seems best.

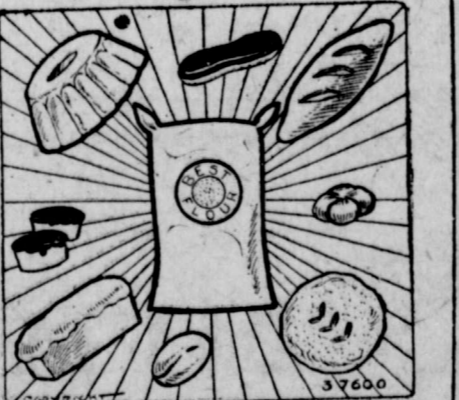

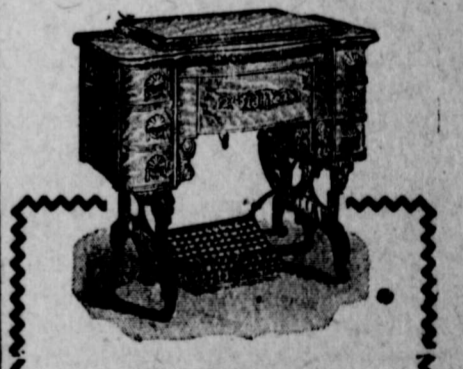

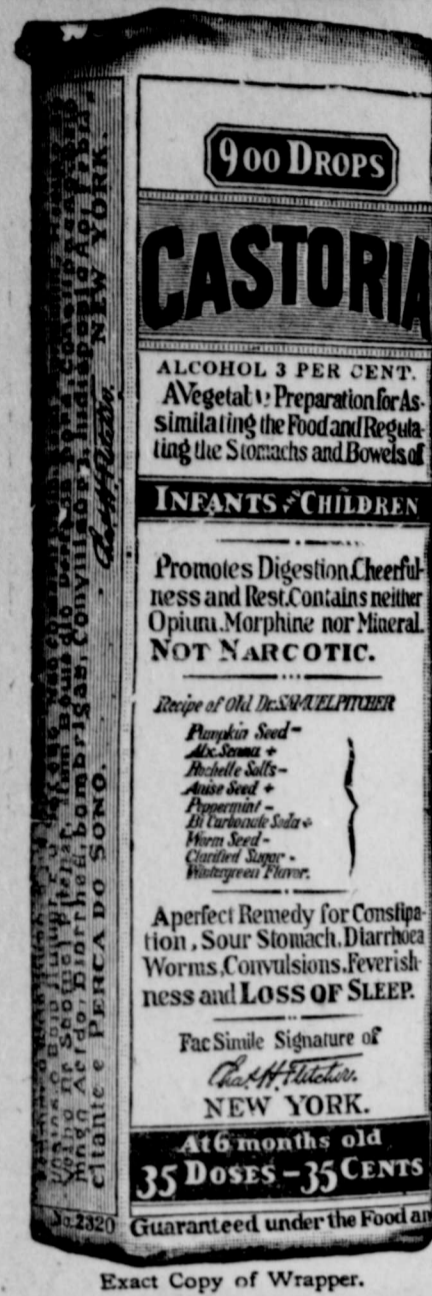

DISTRICT JUDGE IS ON TRIAL

Judge Blanton of Abilene Charged With Violating Quarantine Laws.

It will be remembered that during the recent term of the Scurry County District Court, Judge Thomas exchanged benches with Judge T. L. Blanton of Abilene for the last week of the term and that after occupying the bench here for one day, he closed up the term of the Court and returned to his home where it was veloped scarlet fever.

It turned out that the disease already existed in the Blanton home and the Judge has been arraigned before the local court charged with violation of the quarantine laws.

The Abilene Reporter of Sunday in reporting the trial of Judge Blanton says:

The information sworn out charged that Judge Blanton disregarded the quarantine laws by leaving his home where scarlet fever existed and which was then under quarantine going to Snyder to hold Court, also alleging violations by sending out letters while under quarantine and re-entering his home after spend nig a day in Snyder, all of which it is alleged is contrary to the laws and regulations respecting quarantine matters.

Counsel for defendant denied the allegations and set up the fact that permission was granted defendant to do things done by said County Health Officer, Dr. Cash, that he, the said Blanton thoroughly disinfectd himself before he left home and fumigated letters sent out.

Many witnesses were put on the stand for and against the various contentions and the case was hotly contested from beginning to end and only went to the jury at about six o'clock.

The jury retired and took a vote and went to supper and up to midnight last night had not returned a verdict.

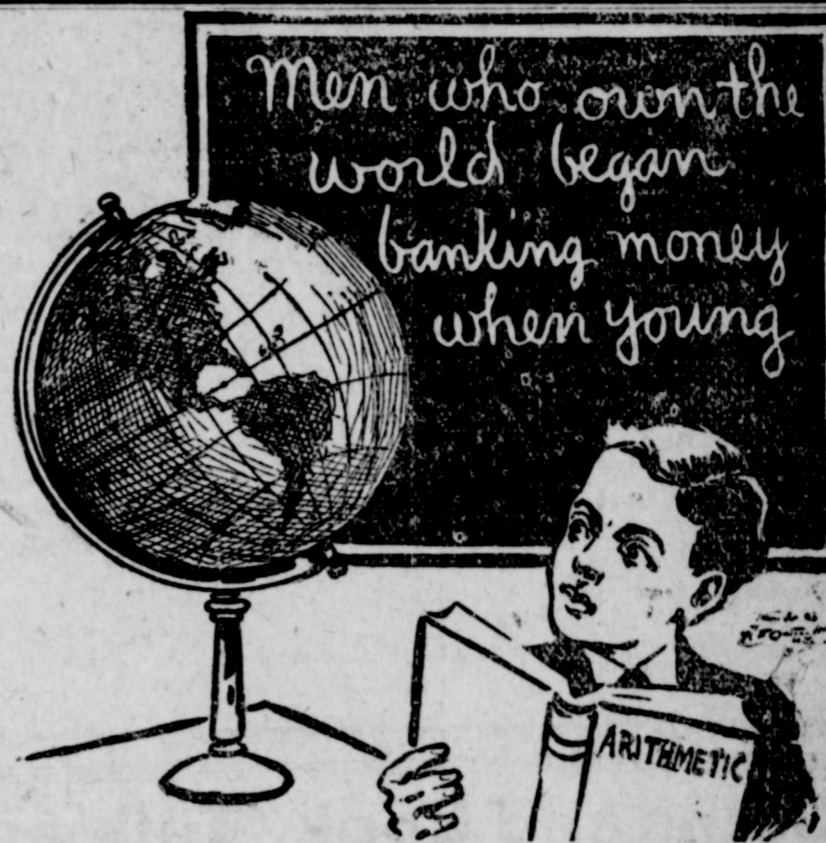

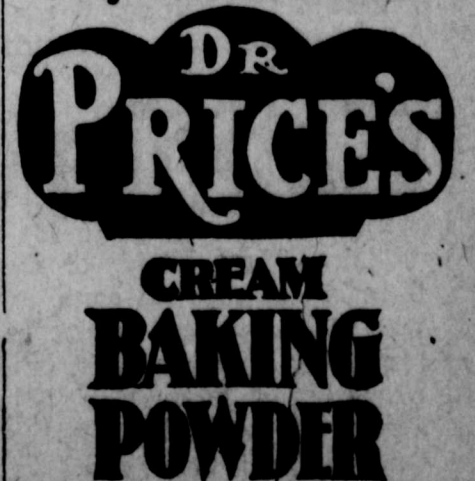
