## G. & E. RAILROAD BUILDS TO SNYDER

PRESIDENT HEALY OF E. & G. IS  
PUSHING THE ROAD RAP-  
IDLY TO THE WEST

Estacado and Gulf to Complete Line  
to Roby, Taking in Snyder as  
Objective Point.

Ft. Worth, Texas, July 6—M. J. Healy, president of the Estacado & Gulf railway is in the city arranging for the transportation of ties and rails, which he says have been purchased for the further extension for the road and for the further completion of the part of the road not yet finished.

The railroad is graded and built from McCauley on the Orient to the Clerk Fork of the Brazos and that stream is bridged.

From the river to Roby the grade is finished and some of the newly bought rails are to fill that gap, giving a Roby connection with the K. C. M. & O.

From Roby the work is progressing westward to Snyder, forty eight miles with Gail in Borden county, thirty miles more, as the present destination. When Snyder is reached, a connection with Fort Worth will be made by way of the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific to Sweetwater and from there by the Texas and Pacific to Fort Worth.

While, said President Healy, the work is actually in progress, no definite date is set for the completion.

### The Revival Meeting

The revival meeting at the Baptist Tabernacle is growing in interest.

**Orient Railway Trouble**  
Wichita, Kansas, July 6—Added to financial difficulties which receivers of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway are endeavoring to untangle, is that of a threatened strike by trainmen on the entire system between Wichita and San Angelo, Texas. Trainmen have demanded a 12 1-2 per cent increase in wages. A committee representing the trainmen met at Altus last Wednesday, but the Orient receivers did not appear.

J. O. Davidson of this city, one of the receivers arranged today by wire for a conference between the dissatisfied trainmen and the receivers at Kansas City next Wednesday. The trainmen say that they will strike, if their wages are not increased. Mr. Davidson stated that the road could not pay the increase demanded.

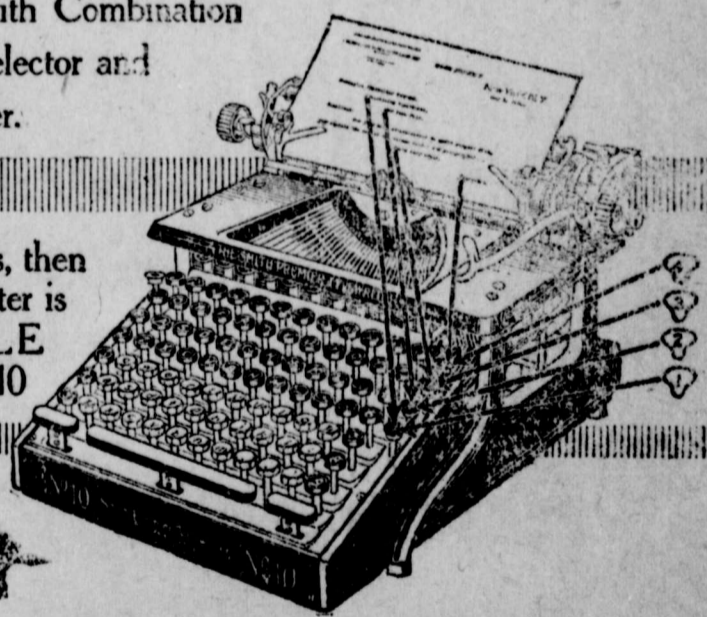

**JUDGE RAMSEY IN SNYDER**

Distinguished Candidate Speaks to Great Audience. His Cause Is Close to the Hearts of Scurry County People.

Judge W. F. Ramsey, candidate for the democratic nomination for governor delivered an address at 10 o'clock Tuesday to an audience of perhaps 1600 people at the Baptist Tabernacle in Snyder.

The coming of the distinguished jurist had been well advertised and people were here from all parts of the county. Judge Ramsey came in on the Santa Fe and was met at the station by a large number of personal and political friends.

Many others called at his hotel to pay their respects.

The tabernacle was filled with people even before the speaking hour. The speaker was greeted with cheers upon his arrival.

Judge H. B. Patterson called the great congregation to order. Rev. M. C. Bishop led in an appropriate prayer.

Hon. Mac. Taylor made a ringing democratic speech in introducing Judge Ramsey as a clean, honorable democrat. He referred to Ramsey's legal ability and righteousness of character as the reason why, when a Supreme Judge was needed the governor of Texas turned from the busy politicians and chose an astute, profound lawyer from the private ranks.

The elevation of Judge Ramsey started the wave of judicial reform and the effects of his efforts are already noticeable in Court matters.

Judge Ramsey spoke in complimentary terms of the development of the West. He spoke along the lines of his other speeches, published in

the State papers.

He referred to the Colquitt Slogan "Political Peace and Legislative Rest and he declared there has been turbulence all the time.

Ramsey favors making the scholastic age seven to twenty years, favors a daylight closing law.

He predicts his election by a majority of one hundred thousand votes.

He says—Elect me governor and give me a legislature that can be trusted in the dark and two years hence we will show the coon skins as proof of something done.

He spoke plainly in favor of prohibition and of moral conduct in private and public affairs.

He pointed out the influences that are back of Colquitt's candidacy, charging that the liquor dealers are waging an unscrupulous—campaign in favor of Colquitt.

He shows that he is a consistent prohibitionist and an old fashioned democrat.

He stood in the thick of the battle for Jim Hogg and has always been true to Democracy and to the people.

He says the other fellows have the money, but he has the voters.

He is fighting for the preservation of the rights of the common people. He wants to see Texas freed from the domination of the liquor dealers for "Liberty is worth more than liquor and righteousness more than ruin."

Judge Ramsey was met here by at least a score of his old Johnson county friends and neighbors and he counts safely on these to give him whatever any one may ask in the way of a certificate of ability and spotless character.

There were a number of Roby citizens here to meet the judge and take him to Roby where he was to

the State papers.

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**COLQUITT, MAN SPEAKS.**

Secretary of State Pleads Eloquently for Governor's Retention Scores Ramsey's Record and Ambition.

Wednesday brought to Snyder an inning for the Colquitt team with Uncle Ben Davis at the bat and it was a spirited inning.

There were not as many fans in the arena as were here the day before to root for Ramsey, but the crowd at the court house were filled with enthusiasm.

Hon. C. C. McDonald, Secretary of State was the speaker for the occasion.

He was met at the station by several friends and escorted to the Manhattan.

About 250 people assembled at the District Court room, where Mr. B. F. Davis made a short spirited speech introducing the speaker.

Mr. McDonald said he regretted the necessity of making a campaign for a second term for a governor who had made good in every part of his official course, but was glad of the opportunity to show an intelligent people a record of duty well done.

Mr. McDonald is an artist on the platform. He knows what he has to say and says it in a straight forward logical way.

He showed up the good points in Colquitt's administration, trimming nicely around the main points upon which the Ramsey people base their objections to giving the office to Colquitt for a second time.

He explained Colquitt's veto of the daylight bill—said it was because of two subjects and that if the legislature would pass separate bills he would sign them, but this was refused.

He said the fellows who had been selling oyster shells and seashore sand are opposing Colquitt, because he stopped their graft.

The insurance companies oppose him because he has interfered with them and others in the same way.

Says that nobody but Campbell brought Ramsey out against Colquitt.

Says Ramsey, while on the penitentiary commission should have moved to abolish the bat.

Charges that Ramsey helped hold up local option in Johnson county two years and that he didn't contribute any time or means to carry state wide prohibition in 1911.

Mr. McDonald is an orator. He is a Kaufman county man and holds his office by the grace of the present governor.

He says he is putting in his vacation to promote demeratic doctrine and to aid a faithful governor in his race for re-election.

He gave a brief history of Colquitt's career as an orphan boy who worked for small wages, cropped on the shares and learned the printing business and studied law at odd times.

Then he gave a history of his career in public life as State Senator and Railroad Commissioner.

His speech was highly satisfactory to the Colquitt men present.

Gabe Lucas of McKinney came to Snyder on the first train Monday morning to watch the effects of the nice rain that fell here Saturday evening.

Dr. Kirkpatrick made a flying trip to Amarillo, last week. Mrs. Kirkpatrick and daughter, Ruth have gone there this week to spend several days.

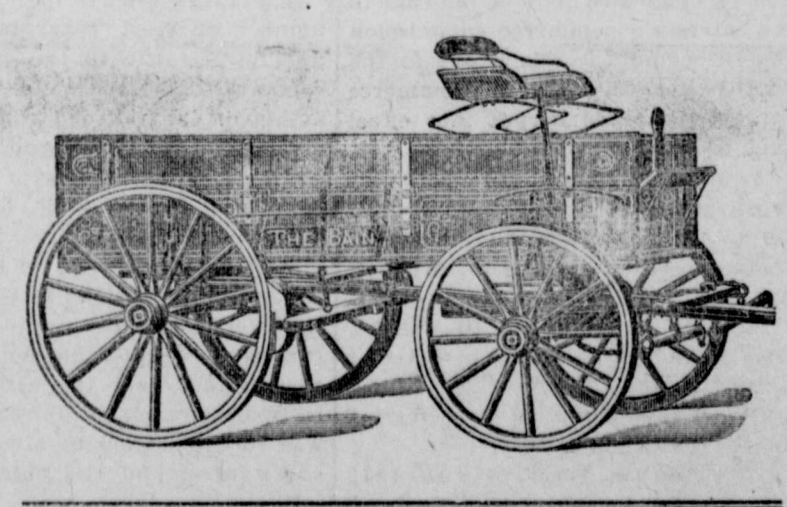

### DALLAS AGREES WITH ROADS.

Holds That Contraction of Favorable Freight Limits Right.

Some weeks ago, several west Texas towns, including Snyder, San Angelo, Sweetwater, Winters and other points learned of a move among railroads to make a change in the limits of common point territory which change would increase freight rates in a vast region in the West.

To head off this move a number of interested towns had a representative meeting in San Angelo and a protest was filed against such a change. These towns got in communication with the Chamber of Commerce at Dallas, believing that Dallas would stand by the interests of West Texas, but it seems in that West Texas was mistaken.

The San Angelo Standard publishes a budget of correspondence on the subject showing that Dallas Manufacturers and jobbers are in agreement with the railroads and West Texas is not getting support from Dallas. A part of the correspondence on the subject is here given, one to the suspension board at Washington and another to Railroad Commissioner Wortham:

Secretary Owen of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce has received copies of letters sent by Mr. Maxwell manager of the freight bureau department of the Chamber of Commerce of Dallas, which are sent in answer to one from W. C. Blanks vice president of the local organization.

The letter of Mr. Blanks as well as the ones written by Mr. Maxwell, follow.

San Angelo, June 18, 1912.  
Sec. Chamber of Commerce:  
Dallas, Texas:

Dear Sir—As Vice President of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce, I have been instructed by the board of Directors to write your body and ascertain definitely, what the attitude of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce is and has been with reference to the recent proposed change of rates affecting this territory by the railroads.

We desire this information on account of conflicting reports that have reached us about what the real attitude of your Chamber of Commerce is.

To be frank with you we have it intimated to us early in the proceedings that the Dallas Chamber of Commerce looked favorably upon the proposition of the railroads to increase the freight rates in this territory, and we had our secretary to wire you. Your reply in substance was that while you were not lending your aid to the proposition to restrict the common point territory you had no objection thereto.

We therefore propound the following questions to you, and would thank you for a frank and candid answer.

1. What is the disposition and desire of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce with reference to the proposed action of the railroads in restricting common point territory in this section, so as to put San Angelo, Ballinger, Brady and other cities in this section out of common point territory?

2. What representations or statements did the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, or its freight bureau, or other representatives make to the interstate commerce commission, or have filed with the interstate commerce commission with reference to the suspension of this proposed change by the railroads?

3. Did the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, its freight bureau or any other agency connected with it, protest before the interstate commerce commission against the action of said commission in suspending the proposed new tariff?

4. Did the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, its freight bureau or any agency connected with it indicate to the interstate commerce commission that it would be satisfactory to the said Dallas Chamber of Commerce for the railroads to put into effect said proposed change?

Your early reply will be very much appreciated as it is important for us to know what the attitude of Dallas is with reference to this matter.

Mr. Maxwell replied by referring to the following letters:

Dallas, Texas, May 15, 1912  
Hon. John L. Worham, Railroad Commissioner, Austin Texas.

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the freight committee of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, held in the office yesterday attention was directed to the protest filed by you with the interstate commerce commission against the action of the rail-

roads in contracting common point territory in connection with their interstate rates.

The matter was discussed at considerable length and our committee was unanimous in its expression to the effect that from our point of view, we do not consider it advisable to oppose this change in the common point boundary line.

There seems to be some question as to the scope of your protest to the commission and it was thought possible that the position of the Dallas jobbers and manufacturers might be considered as in sympathy with the protests being filed by West Texas towns.

In order to prevent any misunderstanding in this respect I am instructed to write you and advise our position and to suggest that any further action which you may consider it necessary or advisable to take in connection with this matter will be qualified as to preclude the possibility of the interstate commerce commission getting the impression that we are opposed to the change.

Suspension Board, Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C.:

Gentlemen:  
The Press reports indicate that a number of West Texas towns have filed protests with the interstate commerce commission against the action of the railroad companies in restricting Texas common point territory in connection with interstate rates as published in F. A. Leland's supplement No. 5 to I. C. C. No. 893.

At a recent meeting of the freight committee of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, this proposition was discussed at considerable length and it was decided that the action of the railroad companies in this matter was fully justified by all of the circumstances, and the object of this letter is to advise your honorable board that the manufacturers and jobbers of Dallas are in a manner opposed to the change and that we feel that the railroads are entitled to some additional revenue for the extra service performed in serving these far western and sparsely settled Texas points.

### COMMENT ON NOMINATION.

T. F. Baker, Chairman Scurry County Wilson Club Comments on Nomination of Wilson.

God gave her no children of her own, but her mother heart and tender arms went out to other children and gave them love and shelter. Her daily life was the life of the devoted Christian and those who knew her best, loved her most. For her to live was Christ; to die was gain. Christ's words were her guide, his life her pattern, his promises, her guardian, His resurrection, her hope. For her are the words of the angel of the Apocalypse: "Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they have right to the tree of life and may enter in through the gates into the City" So she has entered into her well earned rest, and her works do follow her.

On the 4th day of June, 1912, in the full tide of the year, she went home to be forever with God and the angels in the Summerland.

She left a sorrowing life companion, and a brother, Mr. J. S. McLendon of Callahan county, and a host of friends and loved ones to mourn her departure, while realizing that in her life they have an heritage better than gold.

To Brother Knight, we extend our deepest sympathy and earnest prayers and while he awaits the hour of reunion may the loving Christ comfort and keep him and give him a place to labor and live for Him who said: "My Grace is sufficient for thee."
