

PLANT MORE FEED-

Conservative estimates place the feed shipped into this county during the past five years at one million dollars. This one million dollars has not been replaced through these years by an equal amount of money due to increased production of cotton. The feed bill invariably comes out of the next crop, or money borrowed. This drain on the county's financial resources is uncalled

We realize that a portion of this feed shortage has been due to drougthy conditions. But, the greater portion has been brought about by there being too small an acreage planted in feed and the lack of intensive cultivation. It is the result of too many acres planted tocotton and too much attention given to its cultivation to the detriment of the feed acreage.

The man who has gone through a drought knows the value and the feeling of pride and security which a crib full of maize and a stack lot of bundle stuff gives to one, when their neighbor is raking and scraping to get enough money to buy high-priced feed.

We advocate the planting of sufficient acreage in feed to make you plenty of feed to make another crop even if it does turn off dry and the yield is light. If the yield is heavy, you can sell your surplus the next spring and at a high



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
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
