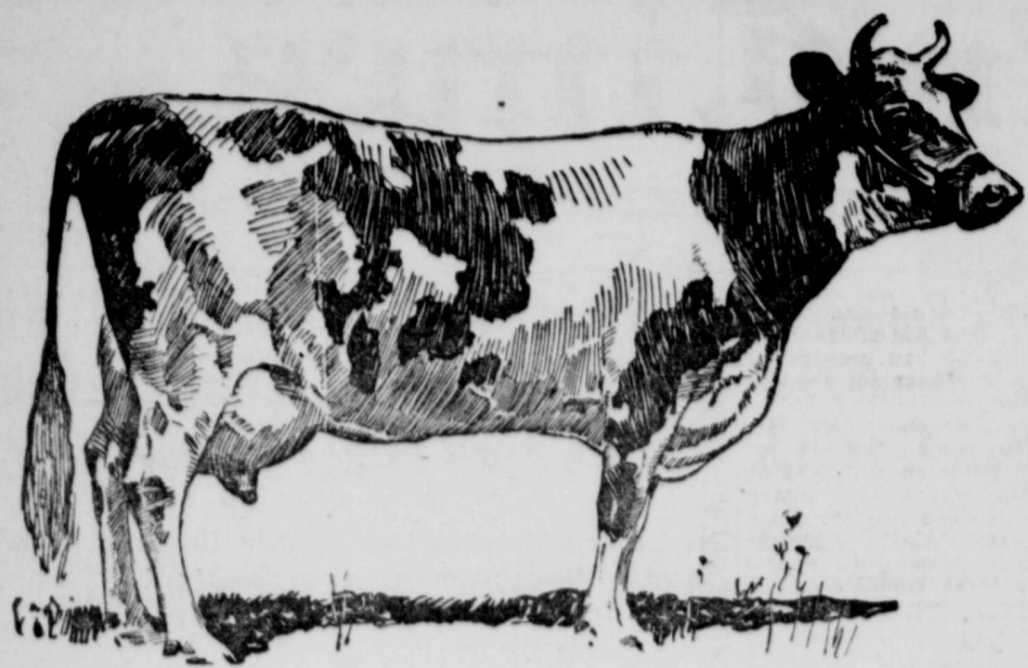

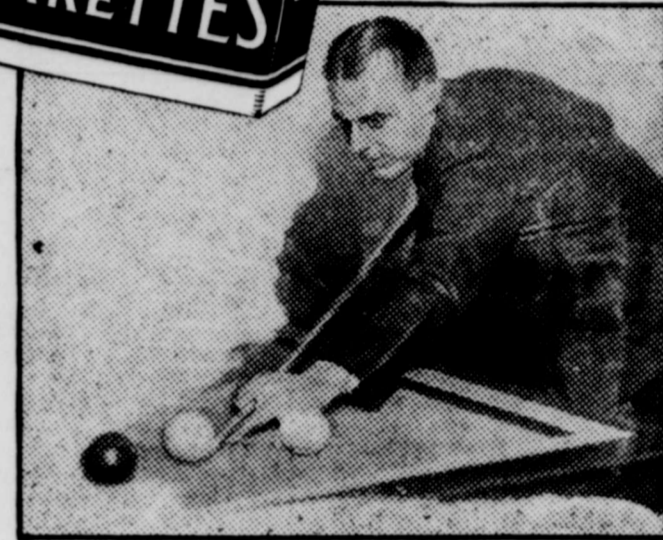

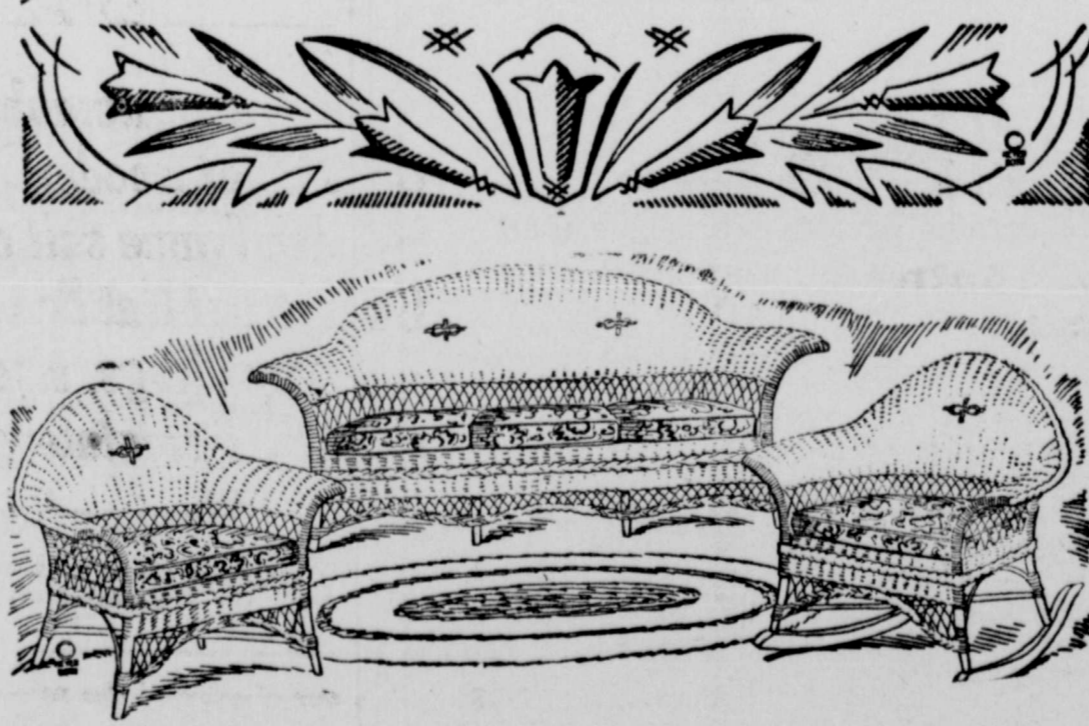

Fluvanna News Notes

Mr. Jas. H. Tate (V. P.) is the authorized correspondent for Fluvanna, and as such is authorized to receive renewal and new subscriptions. Cooperate with him in building a fine weekly news column for this thriving town.

Railroad Possibility

During the last few days the people of our village and community have been lifted almost to the pinnacle of expectancy because of the possibility of securing a trunk line east and west railroad. On last Saturday afternoon the following named gentlemen—railroad promoters—accompanied by M. G. Evans of Snyder, secretary of the Scurry County Chamber of Commerce, came to Fluvanna for a conference on railroad matters: Captain Ed Kennedy of Houston, chief promoter; A. L. Dickinson, also of Houston; L. P. Ward and J. W. Roach, both of Smithville, Texas. Later two other gentlemen, whose names we did not learn, came in from the west. These men, never visiting Fluvanna before, expressed great surprise on finding the large section of fertile, tillable country such as we have adjacent to this place, the abundant water supply and the thriving little town already perched at the top of this divide country. An open conference was held with members of our local chamber of commerce in the First State Bank building, at which time our visitors explained their plans and expressed the desire to build their road over this route. This enterprise may be further and briefly explained by saying that the road in question is the same about which there has been frequent mention during the past several weeks in this and other papers, and is being projected from Roswell, N. M., to some point in this immediate section. It may be added that a very enthusiastic meeting of our citizens was held Saturday night following the afternoon conference at which time (after free discussion) a committee of five men was appointed to confer further with the railroad promoters in order to gain a clearer understanding of the proposition before us. This conference was held Monday morning.

As in all such cases, the one real difficulty and question is whether or not our community can fully meet the requirements laid before us. If we succeed in doing this it evidently will prove the greatest material boon that has ever come our way—great for the time being and great for all time. In the meantime let every Fluvanna citizen rally to the situation.

Other Business

J. I. Pylant is beginning the erection of a commodious 5-room residence at the east side of town. The structure will be of the stucco type and will take the place of one of the old-time houses. This development is of a very substantial and desirable sort. A few days ago this scribe, with

his wife, had the pleasure of visiting and looking through the splendid new home of H. C. Flournoy now receiving its interior touches. Good homes mean much to any community. The congregation of the Christian Church, after thorough preparation, is now beginning the erection of a new church edifice. They will take down the old building and use much of its material in the construction of the new one. This will be another mark of substantial progress, and the congregation is to be congratulated on its achievements to date and its spirit of enterprise. No congregation should be satisfied to continue its work and worship in an old run-down building. The Cause always deserves the best that can be provided.

Two cars of maize in the head were shipped to the Fort Worth market last week by E. V. Boynton. The C. & M. Garage and blacksmith shop has added to its force a new smith in the person of M. M. Balentine. The new smith, however, is taking the place of a former one who has retired. Not only is our school moving along nicely at the present time, but it promises to grow greater and better as the years go by. Yes, it will be greater next year because the school census recently taken shows an increase of 38 scholars, making a total of 192. To this number will be added quite a number of transfers.

Church Services

An important business meeting was held at the Christian Church last Sunday night.

Rev. W. H. Harris held his regular services at the Methodist Church last Sunday morning and evening. The attendance and interest were very good. The Christian Endeavors held an enthusiastic Sunday evening meeting.

The Fluvanna Baptist Church will begin a revival meeting on Thursday night of this week in which the pastor will be assisted by Rev. W. G. Tankersley of Simmons University, Abilene. The meetings will include at least two Sundays. It is hoped that all the people will arrange to attend these services as regularly as possible. It is regular attendance that counts in a meeting.

As next Sunday is one of the regular days for preaching services at the Presbyterian; and that, too, being Easter Sunday, an Easter service will be held at the morning hour, consisting of appropriate music, readings and sermon. All who can should attend this service. The night service will be called off on account of the Baptist meeting. It is expected that all of the

young people's meetings will be held as usual.

Sickness and Accident

In addition to the fatal illness of the young son of C. E. and Mrs. Tarter, fully described in the next paragraph, we have had during the past week several other cases of a more or less distressing nature.


