In a field of seven candidates, J. Woodfin pelled 232 votes to win the city marshal and tax collector race Tuesday by a lead of 42 tal-

This, the only contested race in the city election, saw F. M. Brownfield rank second with 190, and S. J. Casstevens come in as a close third with 181. Sid Bruton came next with 128, with the bottom three coming into the finish stretch as follows: T. J. DeShazo, 67; Bob Martin, 25; Bill Wilson, 17.
