Called recently to the pastorate of the First Christian Church at Claremore, Oklahoma, home town of the late Will Rogers, world-famous humorist, Rev. McPherson's official duties there will begin March 1. Members of the local church are

planning to be out in full force at all Sunday services as a tribute to their departing pastor. Rev. Mc-Pherson's morning subject will be "The Prayer of the Aged." In the evening he will speak on "Christians, Having the Mind of Christ." Rev. McPherson has been pastor of the local church two and onehalf years. Church leaders say the congregation has been led forward and upward during this time, and that they see him leave with reluctance.
