AAA Range Plan Applications Arrive At Agent's Office

Arrival of 1940 range program applications at the county agent's office was announced Tuesday by Claude D. Coiten, administrative assistant.

The range program forms, officials of the state AAA office at College Station report, were late in being sent out from Washington, and resulted in an unavoidable loss of time—so far as getting the applications to county agent offices was concerned.

Due to the fact all 1940 range program applications must be in the state AAA office by June 25, every Scurry County rancher is urged to come to the county agent's office at once and sign the necessary papers.

This must be done, the agent's office points out, before applications for 1940 range benefit payments can be sent to the state office for approval of payments.

Although the range program papers have been received here later than expected, due to the delay in mailing from Washington, the state AAA office says applications will be handled, upon receipt, as fast as possible.

Sadler Plan For Social Security Cash Is Definite

(Editor's note: This article is another in a series of impartially-presented stories dealing with the candidates for governor of Texas. It was prepared by Boyce House, well-known political commentator at Austin.)

The most clear-cut and tangible tax program of any candidate for Governor is that offered by Jerry Sadler when he announced his candidacy, say a number of political observers. He tells where he proposes to raise the money for old age assistance and other social security, what the tax rate will be and how much it will raise. Sadler proposes:

An additional tax of 2 1/2 cents per barrel on oil, to yield \$13,000,000 of new revenue; a tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on natural gas, to produce \$10,000,000 of new revenue, and an increase of 22 cents a ton on sulphur, to provide \$355,000 of new revenue—a total of \$23,355,000.

Of this, one-fourth (or more than \$5,000,000) would go to the schools, leaving \$17,516,000 of new money for pensions and other social security. To this would be added the \$9,000,000 already being raised, and, if matched by Federal funds, the total would be \$35,516,000 for social security in Texas—old age assistance, aid to dependent mothers and children, the needy blind and crippled.

To provide the state's share of the teacher retirement fund, Sadler proposes a tightening of the state franchise tax—a tax on corporations for the privilege of doing business in Texas.

Critics object that Sadler would place the entire load of paying social security on three industries—oil, gas and sulphur—but his supporters assert that the tax rate proposed is not heavy and that those industries are not now paying anything for old age pensions and other social security.

Sadler is strongly against a sales tax and he declares that a transaction tax or a gross receipts tax is just a sales tax under another name—that the consumer will have to pay it finally.

That is what critics of Sadler's own tax plan say—that it doesn't matter what kind of tax you have, the public usually is the one who pays it. However, Sadler counters with the declaration that 80 per cent of the oil, gas and sulphur produced in Texas is consumed outside of Texas and, so if the tax is passed on, it still will not be paid by the people of this state.

Dozens of Scurry County people mapped plans this week for attending the eleventh annual Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford July 2, 3 and 4. This year's annual reunion is expected to attract approximately 65,000 West Texas people.

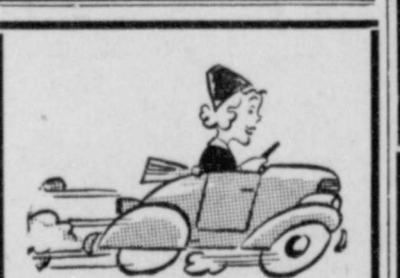

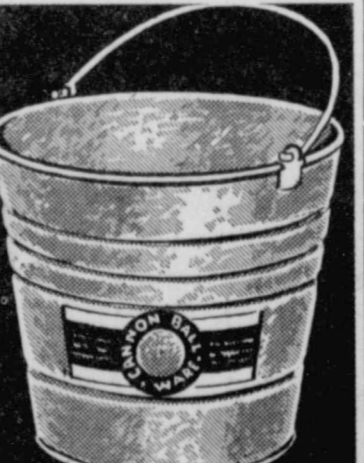
