The supply of the stock was not proportionately as large as that noted in steers. But demand did not show any unusual urgency and trade was not lively but prices were about the same as on former days of the week with volume enough to trade to a good clearance. The best styles of fat cows and heifers went at \$3.80-\$4.00 but sales above \$3.60 were not numerous and the country should note the fact that the bulk of fat to good dressed beef and butcher cows and heifers sells between \$3.00-\$3.50. Canners are not in brisk demand and sell largely at \$1.75-\$2.50 though offerings on the cutter order make around \$2.75. Very few bulls are coming, prices range from \$2.00-\$3.50 with bulk around \$2.25-\$2.60. Cows are still selling at \$6.50 to around \$7.00 for choice to fancy veals, fair to good \$8.75-\$9.25, other calves \$5.00 down to as low as \$2.00 for common heavy weights.

MARKET WAS RATHER SLOW AT YESTERDAY'S BEST PRICES.  
There was a material reduction in local supplies today and while the market was more or less slow, prices generally ruled steady with yesterday's best time, which was strong to 5c higher than the extreme close. There was nothing on sale as choice as the fancy heavy load which topped the market yesterday and there were not so many good to choice heavy weights. Offerings ran largely to light mixed and butchers and medium heavy grades, common to fair trashy light and underweight offerings not being so plentiful as yesterday. Pigs were in very good supply and the market was fairly active at fully steady prices, desirable kinds selling at \$3.00-\$4.00.

PRICES RANGED FROM \$4.50-\$4.90, WITH THE bulk selling at \$4.65-\$4.85. The bulk yesterday sold at \$4.65-\$4.85, a week ago at \$4.50-\$5.00, a month ago at \$4.75-\$5.25, a year ago at \$5.20-\$5.45, two years ago at \$6.55-\$7.00, three years ago at \$5.75-\$6.15 and four years ago at \$5.27-\$5.65.

THE AVERAGE COST WAS \$4.78% AS COMPARED WITH \$4.74 yesterday, \$4.94% a week ago, \$4.78% a month ago, \$5.33% a year ago, \$6.91% two years ago, \$5.94% three years ago and \$5.30% on the same day four years ago.

MISSOURI LEGISLATURE.

House Repeals the Breeders' Bill. Only Seven Votes Being Cast to Repeal the Gambling Law.

Jefferson City, Mo., Feb. 22.—The committee's substitute to repeal the Breeders' law passed the house by a vote of 110 to 7. Those voting against the bill were: Conkling, Hoerber, Osenfort, Richardson, Shaw, Steele and Watts. Those absent were: Walmsley, Trimble Smith, Silver, of Cole, Schueddig, Shriver, Quigg, Pratte, O'Donnell, Miller, Lemon, Keenoy, Johnston of Pettis, Heanessy, Hartly, Harrington, Grace, Dauer, Clark and Bohley. The committee substitute not only repeals the Breeders' law, but makes it a severe punishment to include in bookmaking. The substitute which passed the house and now goes to the senate for final settlement follows: "No person or persons shall record or register, by mechanical or other means, bets or wagers, or sell auction pools or engage in bookmaking, or through any device, book, instrument or contrivance whatever, upon the result of any trial or contest of skill, speed or power of endurance of man or beast, which is to take place within or beyond the limits of this state, nor shall any owner, lessee or occupant of any room, shed, tenement, booth or building or part thereof, knowingly suffer or permit the same to be used for such purpose or purposes. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of one year, or by a fine of \$1,000, or by both such imprisonment and fine."

Rate Legislation Drops. Washington, Feb. 22.—The senate committee on interstate commerce has reached no definite conclusion as to postponement of railroad rate legislation at this session of congress. The committee will go on with hearings Thursday when the resolution of Senator Keen providing for an investigation of the subject of rate legislation during the recess will be considered.

Ten Women Lived in Squalor. St. Louis, Feb. 21.—An investigation into the deaths of Mrs. Marie Barrett and Mrs. Mary Dahr, each 60 years of age, which occurred within 48 hours of each other, will be begun by the coroner because it was discovered that the two aged women, together with eight other women whose ages range from 60 to 80 years, had lived in two rooms at 1930 Franklin avenue for seven years. The health department will also make an investigation into the squalid manner in which the aged women lived.

May Call Extra Session. Washington, Feb. 21.—President Roosevelt, who for weeks has been hopeful that some definite action might be taken at the present session of congress on the railroad rate question, practically has relinquished the idea of securing legislation on the subject this winter. It is reasonably certain that he will not call an extraordinary session of congress to meet in the spring, but unless he changes his mind, he will call congress together, probably next October.

800,000 as Mute Witness. St. Louis, Feb. 22.—Chief of Detectives Desmond and Former Sheriff Dickmann who brought Charles Kratz from Mexico, departed last night for Butler, Mo., where they will testify for the state in the trial of Kratz. Chief Desmond stated that the \$60,000 alleged bribery fund had been shipped to Butler by express under heavy guard.

Would Remove Raymond. Muskogee, I. T., Feb. 22.—Leslie C. Fuller, special inspector from Washington to investigate charges against Judge C. W. Raymond, says he will recommend Judge Raymond's removal on the ground that he is "absolutely corrupt."

Conditions which prevail in the Beaumont, Tex., oil field will be investigated simultaneously with the inquiry into the Kansas field. The monthly statement of the collections of internal revenue show that for the month of January the receipts were \$17,380,443 an increase as compared with January, 1904, of \$484,959.

Attempts to Wreck Train. Emporia, Kan., Feb. 22.—An attempt was made Monday night to wreck Santa Fe passenger train No. 9 half a mile east of Emporia. The train was running 60 miles an hour when it hit a pile of new ties. The shock threw the passengers out of their seats. The train was immediately stopped but no trace of the wreckers was found. No. 9 is the California Flyer and left Kansas City behind time and was running at high speed to make this up. There are no clues to the perpetrators.

House Votes for New Battleships. Washington, Feb. 21.—The house after a seven-hour session, passed the naval appropriation bill, carrying a total of \$99,914,359. The provision for two battleships as reported by the committee on naval affairs was retained.

Cortelyou Home from Europe. New York, Feb. 21.—George B. Cortelyou, former secretary of commerce and labor, was a passenger on the steamer Republic, which arrived yesterday from Naples. He was accompanied by Mrs. Cortelyou.
