

Death Penalty Is Off The Table

District Attorney Kathryn Gurley will not be seeking the death penalty in the capital murder trial of Daniel A. Cardon Jr., 50, of Artesia, N.M.

In a telephone conversation Monday, the district attorney confirmed information received by the *Muleshoe Journal*, adding that while it was a tough decision to make, it was one that was supported

by the victim's family. With the death sentence removed from consideration, Gurley

said the possibility of moving the trial up — possibly to the end of May 2013, exists because it would require less time for both the prosecution and the defense to prepare.

Cardon is accused of the alleged murder of his estranged wife, Lucila Perez, 38, during the early morning hours of June 4.

He was indicted for capital murder on July 23. If convicted, Cardon could serve a

life sentence without the possibility of parole.

According to Lana Perez, a sister-in-law of the alleged victim — who contacted the *Muleshoe Journal* in the days following the alleged murder, Cardon allegedly kicked in the door to her residence, across from the Dillman Elementary campus on West Third, and shot his estranged wife, Lucila Perez, in her (Lana's) presence.

Perez also said the

victim had left her husband several weeks earlier, and had planned to file for a divorce.

After fleeing from the scene of the alleged murder, Cardon was the subject of a manhunt involving area law enforcement officers. He was later located and apprehended, following a stand-off, at the City of Lubbock's water plant, east of Muleshoe on Hwy. 84.

In early September, 2010, the suspect,

Cardon, was himself the victim of a shooting at the residence of Valdo Perez — then Cardon's father-in-law, near O&C Sprinkler, just off Hwy. 84.

According to Sheriff Richard Wills in September 2010, the shooting at the Valdo Perez residence was related to an incident involving Cardon and his wife — the alleged murder victim, that occurred earlier that morning.

Radar Trailer's Usage Expands

You see it flashing in the distance, it's yellowish-orange light eventually separating enough to allow you to determine the flashing lights are numerals.

A moment later, the flashing yellowish-orange lights are suddenly accompanied by red and blue lights and a message that you've been caught.

Muleshoe Police Department has employed its radar trailer for a couple of years now, but until recently all it could do was help monitor the approaching traffic on the street it's been

located.

According to Police Chief Roy Rice, the addition of a single piece of equipment estimated at less than \$25 the trailer's use has been greatly expanded.

Now, the information gathered by the trailer's onboard computer can help the police

Tragedy Opens Box Of Memories

Last Monday's events in Boston have brought bitter memories to many across the nation.

As they did following so many other disasters, people — myself included, have gathered around televisions and internet news sites watching for the details; hungry for information about those lost and suffering from the event, as well as for the why and who of the instigator.

While such acts bring to mind the events of Sept. 11, 2001, and the destruction of the New York City's World Trade Center, and the loss of so many lives, there are others whose lives were also touched by the 1996 bombing at the Olympic Park in Atlanta, Ga.

As for me, there will always be memories from the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in downtown



Oklahoma City. As terrible as any of these events are, I suspect the one that touches and troubles you the most are the ones that directly touch your life.

I don't know anyone in or from Boston, nor do I know anyone in attendance at this city's famous marathon.

But I know some of the people who lost loved ones in the Oklahoma City bombing, and also lost people I considered friends in that tragic event.

My last trip to the Murrah Building in Oklahoma City was to pick up some court records I needed, but the trip before that was

to drop off a shotgun that had been seriously shortened below legal limits, and to discuss the case of its possession with agents I knew in the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms office.

For many, Tuesday's tragedy focused on the area surrounding the marathon's finish line... as documented by the various news agencies.

But when something like this occurs, like many others no doubt, I can't help but reopen that box of memories from 1995.

I can't help but remember the view from the BATF office, and details of the conversations with

agents who fell on that tragic day.

I can't help but remember the sound of a friend's voice — a radio news reporter who was only a few blocks away when Timothy McVeigh's bomb detonated, as the young reporter recorded what he saw while running on foot to the scene for later broadcast.

And I can't help but remember the events that followed.

As far as the memories go for the people directly connected to the horrific incident at Boston, it doesn't matter if the bombing was foreign or domestic in nature. And it doesn't matter if it was brought about by a conspiracy of individuals or by the actions of one single person.

Certainly, now that an arrest has been made, there will be a degree of closure, but I believe the things that will help the victims and their families the most as they struggle to get through the days and weeks ahead will be the love and prayers from those around them, as well as from their countrymen and well-wishers from around the world, and of course from God above.

It Was A Shameful Day

US Sen. John Cornyn spoke on the Senate floor on Thursday, April 18, in response to recent Senate votes on gun legislation. Excerpts of his remarks are below:

"[I] say this more with sadness than anger — I watched the President of the United States say it was a pretty shameful day for Washington on the national news. That was yesterday. And I agree but for different reasons than the President himself articulated.

"When good and honest people have honest differences of opinion about what policies our country should pursue when it comes to the Second Amendment and gun rights and mass gun violence, the President of the United States should not accuse them of having no coherent arguments or caving to the pressure.

"The President could have taken the high road, could have said, 'Ok now that we have been unsuccessful in these measures, let's move on to area where we know there is consensus, and that has to do with the mental health element in so many of these mass gun tragedies. But instead, he chose to take the low road. And I agree with him, it was a truly shameful day.

"I, and many of my colleagues, are not worried, as some of the press like to portray it, about the gun lobby who would spend a lot of money and paint us as anti-Second Amendment. I don't work for them. I don't listen to them. I work for 26 million Texans, and I'm proud to represent them. And the views I represented on the floor of the United States Senate are their views. And if I don't represent their views, then I am accountable to them,



and no one else.

"And no, those of us who did not agree with the President's proposals are not being intimidated, as he said yesterday. And it's false — it's absolutely false to say it comes down to politics, as he said.

"For me, it comes down to a meeting I had with the families who lost loved ones at Sandy Hook Elementary School. I told them that I was not interested in symbolism, in things we might be able to do that would have had no impact on the terrible tragedy that day or at Tucson, or Virginia Tech, or at Aurora, Colorado. I'm interested in trying to come up with a solution.

"I told them that day, the family members who came to visit with me, as we grieved with them for their terrible loss, I told them that, as I understood what they were telling me, they weren't coming to sell a particular political point of view or an agenda or a legislative laundry list of things they wanted to see passed.

"It really boiled down to this: These families who lost both children and parents and spouses want to make sure that their loved one did not die in vain. They want to make sure that something good comes out of this terrible tragedy. And why wouldn't we want to work together to try to help them achieve their goals?"

"Instead of calling the President names and taking the low road, like he did yesterday, and chastising my fellow senators for their good-faith disagreement and the best policies to pursue in order to make sure these families' loss was not in vain, I'm here

to ask for his help. I'm here to ask for every Member's help, to try to make sure that we

department determine when a police officer can most effectively monitor the traffic moving through an area. Much like the state's traffic counters, which include the placement of black pneumatic hoses across the streets monitored by the Texas Department of Highways, the radar trailer is capable of counting the number of vehicles traveling through an area, determining the speed at which the vehicle is traveling, and also the time period most of the vehicles are speeding. That means if the majority of vehicles speeding on West Ave. D, are doing so between 4 p.m. and 4:30 p.m., the police department knows when to assign a patrol officer to the area to issue citations.

“The trailer is a clear reminder for traffic of the speed limit and makes drivers aware of their own speed,” said Chief Rice. “Sometimes, motorists just need to see a reminder of how fast they are going and allow them to correct their own speed,” he added. But the trailer can also provide information about the city's traffic flow, street usage, and even help determine the priority for street maintenance. “Another thing I like about the trailer is the data it collects. It collects data not only on speed of the vehicles traveling the street, but also the number of cars and time of day the traffic is the fastest and heaviest,” Rice said. The trailer will be parked all over town at

sometime or another and will be at its location for approximately a week at a time, according to Rice. According to City Manager David Brunson, a portion of the information may be included on the city's interactive web mapping program for use by city officials and possibly the general public. actually continue to look for measures that we might be able to get behind to actually make things better, that would have offered up a solution to some of these problems. “So I believe that there is actually a way forward for us, and I hope that Senator Reid, the Majority Leader, who controls the agenda on the Senate floor, will not choose to quit in our effort to try to find solutions, indeed something we need to pursue, instead of just symbolic gestures which would have had no impact on these mass gun tragedies.”

“The library staff sat down together to nominate our choices for Library Family of the Year, and we all had thought of this family. They have never returned books late, never had a fine and have never lost a book,” Dunagan said. “The children were the only ones who volunteered to read books online to our mascot Boston Betti. The library staff all agrees that these are the best behaved children we see in the library,” she said. “Alejandra, Celeste, Meliton and Mariana



If you want to find me looking "spiritual" and know it's what passes for the real deal and not just intestinal gas, catch me on top of a mountain in the snow.

I'm sure I'd like sleeping in a good bit more on Sunday mornings than I get to, which is, sadly, almost never.

I'm certain I'd like not giving tithes and offerings. I'd be willing to try mentally assenting that all blessings come from God but never being thankful in a way that involved much painful check-writing.

But I think I'd miss a lot.

I'd miss joining my heart and voice and prayers with others so that faith becomes a river and not just a dried up trickle.







Cook defeated LeBlanc in Thursday's finals 6-1, 6-3.






