

Sarah Jane Moore caught after brief prison escape

ALDERSON, W.Va. (AP) — Sara Jane Moore, serving a life sentence for trying to kill President Ford, scaled a 12-foot prison fence and got her first taste of freedom in three years. It lasted a few hours.

Prison officials said she would be put back into a phased-out maximum-security building she once called a "corner of hell."

Ms. Moore and a fellow inmate clambered over the barbed wire atop the fence and left a trail of footprints in the snow as they made their abortive bid for freedom in the dark foothills of the Appalachians.

Ms. Moore was serving a life sentence for the 1975 assassination attempt.

She and Marlene Martino made their way out of the Federal Correctional Institution here sometime between 7:30 and 9:30 p.m. Monday, said Jack Fevery, an associate warden.

The two women were picked up by police while hitchhiking along U.S. 60, about 20 miles from the prison, just before midnight, said Capt. B.H. Cassell of the state police.

The maximum security unit at Alderson — Davis Hall — was shut down Jan. 1, but officials said Ms. Moore and Ms. Martino would be housed there after the escape.

Ms. Moore, an activist at the prison here, once called Davis Hall a "corner of hell." She frequently complained about conditions there during her months in the maximum security unit.

Ms. Moore, 48, was sentenced to life in prison in January 1976 on her guilty plea to a charge of trying to assassinate Ford on Sept. 22, 1975, in San Francisco.

Ms. Martino was serving a life sentence for conspiracy to commit murder on a government reservation in the contract slaying of a Fort Bragg, N.C., soldier.

Ms. Moore was seen by prison staff members at about 7:15 p.m. The two women failed to report during a count of inmates about 9:20 p.m.

Fevery said he believed that after climbing the fence enclosing the 95-acre inner prison complex, the two made their way through a wooded area and off prison property.

"Apparently they went out the front gate," Fevery said in reference to the outer, unfenced boundary of the 195-acre prison. "It's not manned."

"We did pick up some fresh tracks, with a small amount of blood," he said, adding one of the women apparently cut herself on the barbed wire that tops the fence. Both women were in good condition when apprehended, officials said, despite sub-freezing temperatures.

The Alderson prison, one of two federal correctional institutions for

women, is set among the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains in southeastern West Virginia.

Ms. Moore was sent here in early 1977, and was held in the prison's maximum-security unit for her first 15 months in West Virginia. She was moved out of the unit in October 1978.

A divorcee, Ms. Moore has a young son who was placed in a foster home after her arrest. A former bookkeeper and housewife with a history of mental illness, she became involved with radical groups and served as an FBI informer in 1974.

She would have become eligible for parole in 1985. Her attempt on Ford's life followed by 17 days an attempt by Lynette Alice "Squeaky" Fromme, a follower of Charles Manson.

Cold spoils Teng's Japan talks

TOKYO (AP) — Chinese Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping arrived from the United States today but canceled the start of his talks with Japanese leaders because of a cold.

Teng, making his second trip to Japan in less than five months, was to have dined with Foreign Minister Sunao Sonoda. Sonoda's secretary said this was called off because of a cold the 74-year-old Chinese leader caught during his eight-day visit to the United States.

Teng is scheduled to meet Wednesday with Sonoda and Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira for talks expected to cover his American trip, the situation on the Korean peninsula and the Vietnamese invasion of Cambodia, China's ally in Southeast Asia.

Teng flies to Peking on Thursday.

Sonoda, other Japanese and Chinese officials and U.S. Ambassador Mike Mansfield greeted the vice premier on his arrival at Haneda Airport after a flight from Seattle, Wash., and Anchorage, Alaska.

Hsinhua, the official Chinese news agency, said Teng sent President Carter a farewell message in which he said his visit had been a "complete success" and relations between China and the United States "will witness major progress under the new historical conditions."

The United States and the mainland Chinese government opened full diplomatic relations Jan. 1 for the first time since the Communist victory in 1949.

Teng's U.S. visit was given extensive coverage by the Japanese news media and was watched closely by

Japanese officials and business leaders.

Even before Tokyo and Peking established diplomatic relations in 1972, Japan had become China's No. 1 trading partner. Japanese firms that supply China with plants and heavy equipment for the Chinese government's modernization drive were reported apprehensive about competition from U.S. interests eager to enter the Chinese market.

Japanese financial leaders have said publicly that Japanese and American firms do not have to work against each other in China. Toshiwo Doko, head of Keidanren, an organization of Japanese business groups, said he viewed with optimism recent cooperation between U.S. Steel and a Japanese trading firm in the development of a Chinese iron mine.

Controversy continues to swirl around shooting death of Lee Chagra

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — As much controversy has surrounded Lee Chagra in his death as during his lifetime.

On Dec. 23, Chagra died in his new downtown office from a single .22-caliber pistol shot. Had he died in the street, things in this border city would be a lot more quiet.

A court of inquiry that concluded Monday has sidetracked the investigation of Chagra's death by a police department that is sometimes the butt of jokes because of its implied ineptness.

Chagra, a flamboyant lawyer who gambled and declared his winnings as income, specialized in drug cases. Members of the El Paso Bar have expressed their dismay that police at the crime scene went through lawyer-client files the lawyers consider privileged.

The widow, JoAnne, a sister of Abraham, said, "Lee's rights are every U.S. citizen's rights. We are

very upset. If people can abuse Lee's rights and not be upset, then..."

Abraham said he was at the crime scene the night of the killing. "I admonished and indicated to the officers that there were files that should not be looked into. We left, and they did (look)."

So far, it's known from testimony that Drug Enforcement Agency officers were at the death scene. It's known from testimony that other documents from Chagra's office were made available to the IRS. And the FBI said it has looked at the case.

That Chagra was a meticulous record-keeper is known.

Whether his office files contained information that would incriminate is the subject of cocktail party talk around the town.

A source close to the investigation told The Associated Press last week the court of inquiry is "a kangaroo court out to discredit the police de-

partment."

The source cited the most popular theory surrounding the aftermath of Chagra's death. He said pressure from El Paso's upper crust prompted the inquiry in order that whatever records Chagra kept will be "tainted" by the court decision that police acted illegally by searching materials from the office. The extension of that theory is that gambling records collected by Chagra contain names of some of the city's movers and shakers.

Other theories focus on drugs, claiming Chagra was a dope smuggling kingpin (he beat a drug rap in Tennessee years ago because of the lack of a speedy trial). Monday, Abraham said he "would not dignify (such allegations) with an answer."

Some maintain that federal agencies had Chagra killed because of dope deals.

JoAnne Chagra, 40, is disturbed that the investigation into her hus-

band's death is dragging.

Her attitude is a reversal of sentiments expressed by Joe Chagra after the slaying, praising the police department and expressing confidence in their efforts.

Mrs. Chagra has admitted that the family has hired private investigators and has vowed to "march in the streets" to see that her husband's killer is caught. She said she has been advised to seek help from Sen. Ted Kennedy of Massachusetts, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Chagra died with his boots off from a shot that entered his body near an armpit and traveled through his lungs, severing an artery along the way. Some have doubted that such a shot is the mark of a pro and they speculate that the shooting was done by a friend. This theory is backed by the extensive electronic surveillance Chagra had on his office and his generally careful outlook on life.

Judge Bean has said that publicity generated his calling of the court of inquiry, but that any "tainting" of evidence that might result is a matter for courts to decide.

His decision Monday left many citizens still walking on tiptoes.

Vast new Mexico oil discoveries usher in new era of bargaining

HOUSTON (AP) — Gale W. McGee, U.S. ambassador to the Organization of American States, says vast oil and gas discoveries in Mexico have ushered in a new era of bargaining between the two countries.

McGee said Mexico now has a stronger bargaining position and no longer will be an underdeveloped nation to the south negotiating with the patronizing colossus to the north.

The ambassador was in Houston Monday to participate in a special project sponsored by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research.

Victor L. Urquidí, a professor at the El Colegio de Mexico in Mexico City, said his nation approaches negotiations with the United States with distrust.

"For Mexico, the United States is a superpower pursuing its own self-interest," Urquidí said. "I hasten to add that Mexico views the Soviet Union in the same light."

McGee said discovery of new oil holdings in Mexico "is a dramatic reminder of the urgency that already existed for better understandings. And, it would be best for Mexico and the United States if the oil and gas was sold to the United States because of the geographical conditions."

McGee said when Mexican oil reserves hit the national market there could be a rapid development of the Mexican economy which would have a leveling effect on the flow of immigrants to the U.S.

"But, there will always be those in Mexico who want to come to the United States to work, to supply the seasonal agricultural labor demand," McGee said. "This is useful in portions of the Southwestern United States and I don't think it will cease."

McGee's comments came a week prior to President Carter's scheduled visit to Mexico where a major issue will be the price the United States is willing to pay for Mexican natural gas.

Carter has said he will not personally negotiate the question of prices during the trip. He also has said that the United States is very interested in importing Mexican natural gas but that he sees no urgency in acquiring it.

Former Central Intelligence Agency director George Bush introduced McGee at Monday's program.

"Today, the United States is the preeminent economic and military power in the world, but has not effectively established a position of leadership appropriate to the new international picture," Bush said.

"The need for a fundamental review of our foreign policy is one of the most widely shared views in American politics."

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Two more states join in price-control suit

DALLAS (AP) — New Mexico and Wyoming have joined Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma in their federal suit to block federal price controls of intrastate natural gas, attorneys for several of the states said Monday.

The five states account for 87 percent of domestic natural gas production.

Assistant attorney generals for the five states met in Dallas Monday to discuss their pending suit, which challenges the constitutionality of the 1978 Natural Gas Policy Act.

"Five or six" other states, including one on the East Coast, have expressed interest in joining the action, assistant Attorney General Gary Geiser of Louisiana said.

New administrations have taken over in Texas and Oklahoma since the suit was filed in November, but the officials said the momentum has continued.

"I think there's complete continuity," said David Hughes, Texas assistant attorney general. "I think one of the reasons we had this meeting was to test that."

The states are asking a U.S. district court in Oklahoma City to declare the act unconstitutional. That law gradually decontrols the price of natural gas. It also extends, for the first time, the controls to include gas produced and consumed in a single state.

The states contend the government lacks the authority to control the price of natural gas that never crosses state lines.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which has responsibility of enforcing the new act, filed a motion asking the states to specify what parts of the act they consider unconstitutional.

The states have contested the motion, saying their petition is adequate.

Texas Railroad Commission officials estimated the act will cost Texas \$1 million a year and require 41 new employees to administer. The states have begun categorizing tens of thousands of wells so a price ceiling for gas can be established from those wells.

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Safety issue of strikers

CHALMETTE, La. (AP) — Some 385 union employees continued their strike today at the Tenneco Oil Co. refinery in Chalmette, and one union leader said it could last for months.

"The last time we went out it lasted almost five months," said Ferd Beaucoeur, a member of the negotiating committee for Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Local 4-522. "I wouldn't be surprised to see it last that long this time. We're ready," he said Monday.

The walkout started Saturday night. The big issue, strikers said, was safety.

Three men were recently suspended for refusing to repair a line loaded with hydrofluoric acid unless the pressure was taken off, they said. According to the strikers, one man was killed and another injured in separate accidents on that line within the past year.

An explosion three years ago killed 13 men at the plant.

"In the past, there have been instances when men were allowed to refuse to do a job which they felt was unsafe and no disciplinary action was taken," said Harold Salles, acting local chairman and president of the negotiating committee. "The union feels that it is necessary, in the view of the safety record of this plant, that we be allowed to determine whether a job may be safely performed."

New bracero program opposed

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements' proposal to re-enact the bracero program is unthinkable and would create "enormous problems in relations with Mexico," Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt says.

Clements made the suggestion last month as he prepared for a meeting with Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo about problems facing Mexico and Texas. The new Texas governor said the

bracero program might be the answer to the illegal alien problem Texas and other border states face. He said he hoped to get with governors of other border states — New Mexico, Arizona and California — soon to negotiate a treaty with Mexico aimed at solving U.S.-Mexico problems.

"Under no circumstances can we go back to the kind of patronizing, condescending, exploitative approach the bracero program represents," Babbitt said in a telephone interview Monday with the Corpus Christi Caller-Times.

"The bracero program itself is synonymous with all that has been wrong in our relationship with Mexico," he added. "I read the United States Constitution to leave treaty drafting to the President and Congress," Babbitt said. "As chairman of the border states commission, I'm not about to get into the business of drafting treaties. That's not a proper function."

Babbitt, a Democrat, said a renewed bracero program would meet with "enormous amounts of antagonism" in his state. "I can't imagine anyone in Arizona recommending a return to the bracero program," he said.

A bracero plan "may or may not" ease the illegal alien problem, Babbitt said, adding: "I do think it's time to re-examine the whole issue" of illegal aliens.

It might be possible to "expand quotas to allow Mexicans to work in the United States," he said, but such an action would require extensive study. The original bracero program was adopted in 1941 and abandoned in 1964. At its height, the program brought 40,000 Mexican nationals a year across the border to work. Babbitt said Clements' proposal evokes memories of the famous 1960 television documentary, "Harvest of Shame."

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD "How do you make the slam on this hand?" San Francisco expert Kai Larsen asked me recently. "If West has the ace of hearts, your only chance is a revoke," I told him. Wrong again.

has to do is refuse the first heart trick and wait to take the next two. If West takes the first heart and returns a heart, declarer can win with dummy's ten. (Still assuming, of course, that South has K-Q-x of hearts.)

UNUSUAL CLUB PLAY South takes the king of clubs, draws trumps, cashes both diamonds and then leads dummy's ace of clubs. South drops the queen of clubs to give the impression that he started with only Q-x in clubs.

West knows that South started with five spades. If South has only two cards in each of the minor suits he must have four hearts. So when declarer next leads a heart from dummy and plays the king from his hand, West cautiously refuses the trick.

That's how you make an unmakeable slam.
DAILY QUESTION Partner opens with one notrump (16 to 18 points), and the next player doubles. You hold: S-42; H-Q985; D-10943; C-852. What do you say?
ANSWER: Pass. You might get lucky if you bid two diamonds, but you might well dig yourself deeper into the hole. Your best bet is to pass and hope that the next player bids—and this gets you out of trouble.

Mexican-American leaders in the Texas Legislature also had blasted Clements' bracero recommendation. Babbitt, chairman of the Southwest Border Regional Commission, said the bracero program will be discussed when his group meets in Washington, D.C., at the end of this month.

"But there won't be anything about drafting treaties," the Arizona governor added.

Discussion of new prison bill postponed by Bryan senator

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A bill that could start another controversy on where to build a new state prison has been postponed in the Senate. Sen. Bill Moore, D-Bryan, had notified senators he would try to bring up the bill Monday, but he held off "at the request of another senator."

Moore apparently meant Sen. Raul Longoria, who wants assurances from prison officials they will not try again to build a new prison near Longoria's hometown of Edinburg.

Moore's bill would allow the prison system to sell or swap its Blue Ridge Farm in Fort Bend County and acquire land elsewhere in Texas. The bill drops a requirement that proceeds from selling the farm be used to buy land within a 75-mile radius of Huntsville. The measure would remove legal obstacles cited by former Attorney General John Hill last April that blocked the \$8 million purchase of 6,740 acres near Edinburg. The 1978-79 general appropriation act said the prison system could buy land for a new prison but had to use money from the sale of Blue Ridge Farm. Interviewed after the Senate adjourned on Monday, Moore was asked where he thought prison officials might want to build, and he said, "It wouldn't surprise me anywhere they look."

Moore said the new prison would have to be located in an area with a long growing season and sufficient water to grow cotton for prisoners' clothes and food for them to eat. Prison officials indicated at a Senate Finance Committee hearing last week that they had already ruled out the Van Horn and Fort Stockton areas of West Texas because of insufficient water reserves.

Daniel Flood undergoing tests in Washington area hospital

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Daniel J. Flood, described as "in total physical collapse," is undergoing treatment at a hospital here, only days after his trial on perjury and bribery charges ended in a mistrial.

The 75-year-old Pennsylvania Democrat was admitted to Georgetown University Hospital Monday for treatment of physical exhaustion, as well as to undergo a series of tests, his office said. Routine tests will be performed as part of his semi-annual checkup, which was delayed for several weeks, the announcement said. In addition, "diagnostic tests of previous illnesses" will be conducted, the announcement said.

Flood has suffered from various illnesses in the past, including cancer of the esophagus and stomach and septicemia, a blood disorder, said Michael Clark, a spokesman for the congressman. Clark said Flood, a member of Congress for

26 years, was "in total physical collapse" and was expected to remain in the hospital for at least a week. A federal district judge declared a mistrial Saturday in Flood's trial on 11 felony counts after a jury failed to reach a verdict. The government has not announced whether it plans to retry the case.

Equipment recovered

Midland County sheriff's deputies are investigating the theft of \$24,000 in oil field equipment recovered Sunday afternoon.

Capt. George Thompson said the equipment first was spotted in an equipment yard in Midland County by employees of Shell Oil Co., which had reported the thefts from Ector County.

Sgt. Robert Defer of the Midland County Sheriff's Office, Ector County sheriff's deputies and representatives of Shell went to the yard and recovered the equipment, Thompson said.

Monday, Defer recovered a down hole pump, reported stolen from Tom Brown Inc. Thompson said. The pump was valued at between \$1,000 and \$1,300.

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Oklahoma pair arrested by Midland FBI agents

ENID, Okla. (AP) — A local man and woman wanted in connection with a 1976 stabbing death were to appear before a federal magistrate in Texas today.

Elmer Eugene Craighead and Terry Sue Pratt were arrested Friday in Ozona, Texas. They had been sought on first-degree murder warrants.

Warrants for the pair were issued Sept. 7, 1976, three days after a Blaine County farmer found 27-year-old Elgin Morrison's body southwest of the Fairview Country Club just inside the Blaine County line.

Chief Deputy Wayne Wahl of the Crockett County, Texas, sheriff's department, said by telephone Monday Craighead and Ms. Pratt had been staying in an apartment east of Ozona.

"The FBI set us on to them and our officers and FBI agents from Midland made the arrest," Wahl said.

The deputy said the two had been in Ozona only three or four days before their arrests on federal warrants charging them with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

An FBI spokesman in Dallas said Monday afternoon the pair was sup-

posed to appear before a federal magistrate in San Angelo, but that appearance was delayed by an ice storm.

Blaine County Sheriff Jim Sinclair said Morrison was reported missing Aug. 30, 1976, by his relatives, who said he was overdue from a camping and fishing trip at Canton Lake.

An Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper found Morrison's blood-stained

pickup truck that same day three miles south-east of Canton Lake.

Vanderbilt tumbles badly as Tigers control SEC

The Louisiana State basketball team showed Vanderbilt all the moves — and as a result, moved into first place in the Southeastern Conference race.

"We were just physically overpowered," said Vanderbilt Coach Wayne Dobbs after a 92-71 loss to eighth-ranked LSU in an SEC showdown game Monday night. "Tonight LSU was about as good as any team in the country and could go to the (NCAA's) final four if they play this well every night. They pulled every card out of the hat and couldn't do anything wrong."

The Tigers and Commodores were tied for the league lead before the game at Baton Rouge. But LSU showed Vanderbilt who was boss right away, building an early lead and never losing it.

DeWayne Scales and Lionel Green took the inside game away from the 17th-ranked Commodores, teaming for 41 points and 31 rebounds.

"I wouldn't know how to guard him," Dobbs said of Scales, who had 24 points and 10 rebounds. "You have to keep him away from the ball and we couldn't do that."

IT WAS a revenge beating for the Tigers, who lost to Vanderbilt 88-87 earlier in the season.

"The last three times out of the shute, we've played our best games," said LSU Coach Dale Brown. "We played fumbly-bumbly for about a minute and a half in there in the second half, but otherwise we were perfect."

Elsewhere, top-ranked Notre Dame blasted Loyola of Chicago 84-66; fifth-ranked Louisville defeated Memphis State 103-82 and No. 16 Alabama stopped Georgia 67-59.

Vanderbilt led briefly in the early stages of the game with LSU, but the Tigers then outscored their SEC foes 12-2 to take an advantage they never relinquished. The Tigers built their lead to 20 points early in the second half, virtually locking up the contest.

Tracy Jackson came off the bench to score 18 points and lead Notre Dame past Loyola. The Irish never trailed in the game at South Bend, going ahead for good with 9:42 left in the first half.

"I'm used to not starting," noted Jackson. "There's pressure from some of your peers and friends who say you should be starting, but I accept my role."

Jackson, a former high school star from Washington, D.C., hasn't started any of the 46 Irish games in which he's played.

"I haven't started in so long that I've forgotten how it feels," the 6-foot-5 sophomore said. "And I like the way I'm being used. I can get the feel of the game sitting there watching early. And I don't have the pressure that goes with starting."

BOBBY TURNER scored 23 points and Larry Williams added 16 as Louisville defeated Memphis State in a Metro Conference game. The victory was the Cardinals' 12th straight and 20th in 23 games.

"Nothing Bobby Turner does sur-

prises me," said Louisville Coach Denny Crum. "He has a knack for being in the right place at the right time. Our whole bench played well."

Freshman Ken Johnson poured in 20 points and Reggie King contributed 18 as Alabama whipped Georgia. The Crimson Tide led by as many as 16 points in the game.

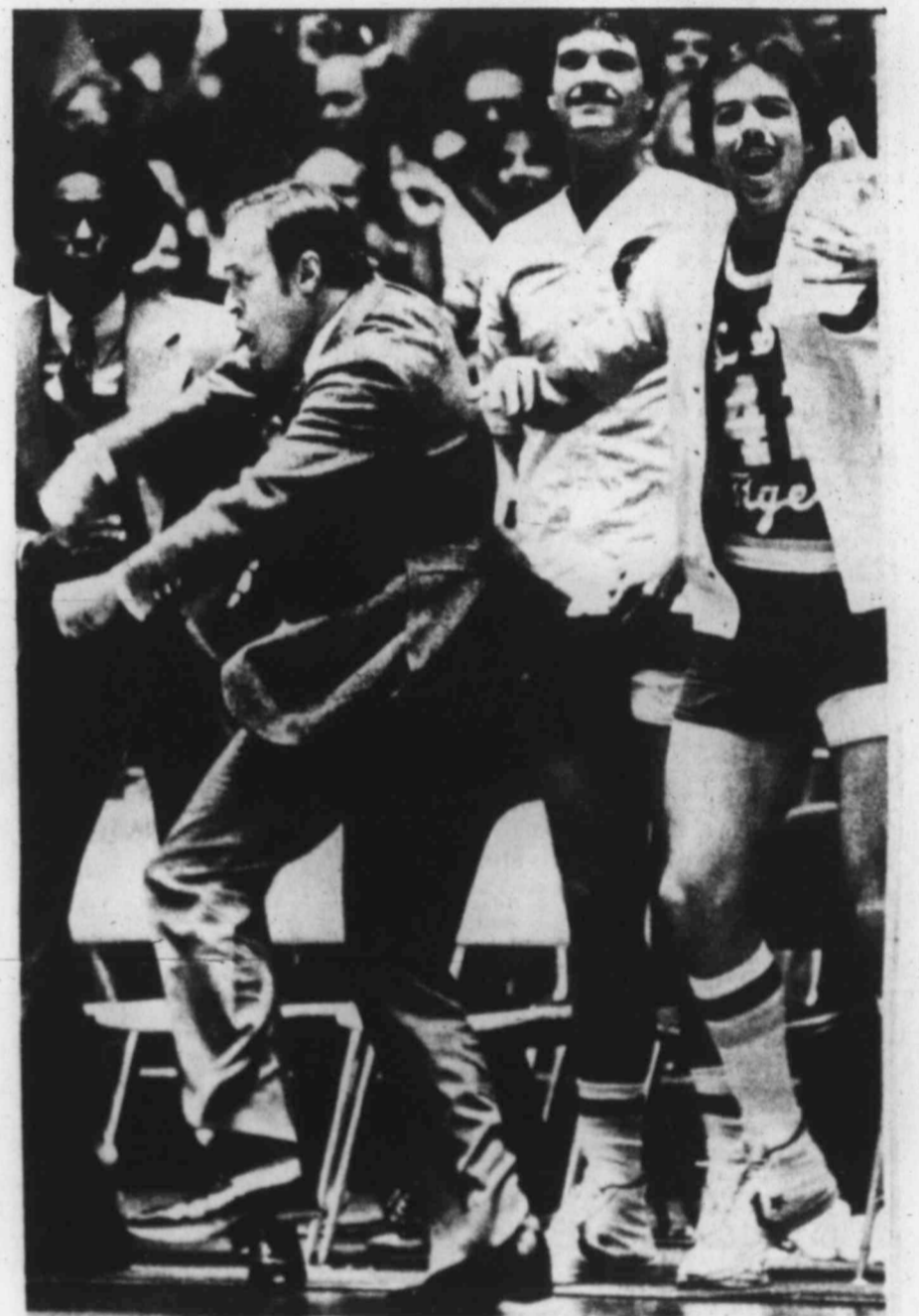
"This is the type of game I like," noted Alabama Coach C.M. Newton. "It was a test of our defensive soundness."

game-high 12 rebounds and scored 16 points, leading New Mexico State past Tulsa 85-78; Colgate upset Army 77-75 in overtime as Dave Hargett scored 29 points; Carlyton Neverson put in 16 points to pace Pitt over Hawaii 71-53; John Schweiz provided the winning points with two free throws near the end as Richmond nipped Niagara 66-65 and Kevin King scored 20 points to pace UNC-Charlotte over Georgia State 90-69.

Winfred Reid and D.C. Smith combined for 33 points to lead East Tennessee State over Austin Peay 85-73; Mike Reese's free throw with 18 seconds remaining lifted Western Kentucky over Eastern Kentucky 78-77; Delmar Harrod scored a career-high 31 points to pace St. Bonaventure over Hofstra 101-81; Northeast Louisiana rolled to a 79-61 decision over Southeastern Louisiana as Calvin Natt scored 26 points; The Citadel beat Davidson 79-70 as Tom Slawson contributed 21 points and Middle Tennessee defeated Morehead State 70-66 as Chris Harris and Leroy Coleman combined for 35 points.

Irish hold to poll lead

NEW YORK (AP) — Notre Dame and Indiana State maintained the No. 1 and No. 2 positions, respectively, in The Associated Press college basketball poll Monday while preseason choice Duke inched closer to the top.

The Irish collected 25 of 54 first-place ballots and 1,036 points in balloting by a nationwide panel of sports writers and broadcasters, edging the Sycamores by 33 points. Notre Dame scored victories over Brown, Xavier of Ohio and Dayton last week, raising its record to 15-2.

Indiana State was tabbed first on 20 ballots after posting a 91-89 overtime victory over New Mexico State and a 66-56 triumph over Tulsa last week. The Sycamores, 20-0, trailed New Mexico State by two points with three seconds left last Thursday night but tied the score on Bob Heaton's 50-shot at the buzzer.

Notre Dame and Indiana State both were named on all the ballots. The

Irish were tabbed no lower than sixth, while the Sycamores were ranked as low as ninth by one voter.

Duke, runnerup in last year's NCAA championship, received seven first-place votes and 984 points after defeating Wake Forest and Maryland last week.

UCLA, No. 5 last week, moved into the No. 4 position with no first-place votes and 918 points, followed closely by Louisville with two first-place votes and 874 points.

North Carolina fell from No. 3 to No. 6 this week with 729 points, 11 more than No. 7 Syracuse. The Tar Heels were beaten by Furman last week.

Louisiana State moved from No. 10 into the No. 8 position with 673 points followed by Marquette, 619, and Michigan State, 498.

Texas A&M headed the Second Ten, followed by Southwest Conference rival Texas. Ohio State, No. 7 last week, was 13th followed by Arkansas,

Iowa, Alabama, Vanderbilt, Georgetown, Temple and Illinois.

Iowa, 15-4 and tied for the lead in the Big Ten Conference, was the only new member of the AP poll. Maryland, No. 17 last week, dropped out of the Top 20 following losses to Virginia and Duke.

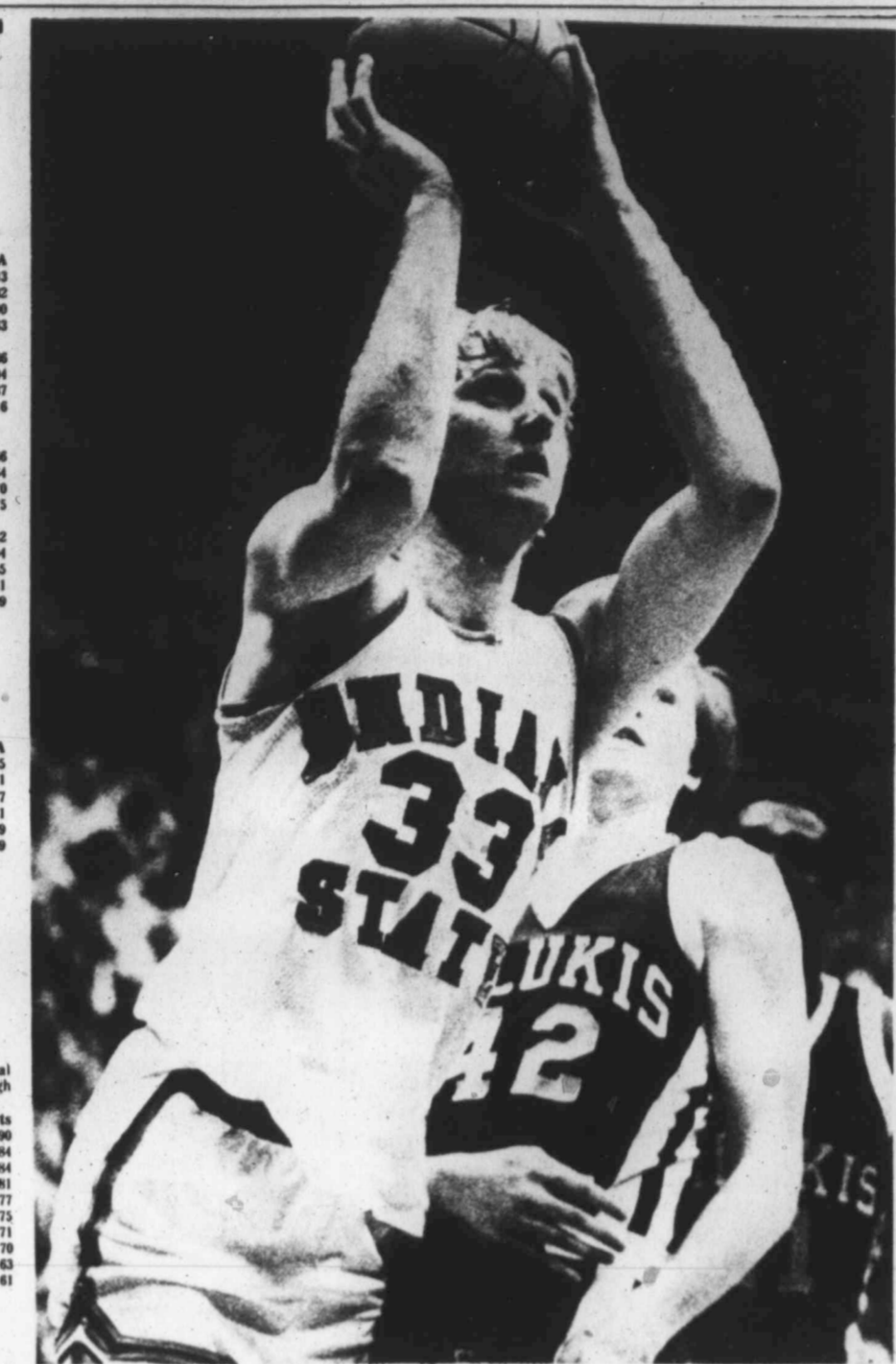

Teammates praise Larry Bird's effort

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (AP) — After nearly three seasons as a teammate of All-America Larry Bird, junior forward Brad Miley still is amazed at the overall play of the nation's leading scorer in major college basketball.

"He never relaxes on the court. He's always giving 100 percent and he never seems to tire," Miley said. "Playing ball with Larry is good for me and good for the team. It makes everyone alert and they have to be on their toes. He's outstanding in picking up an open man when he's being double-teamed."

The overall play of Bird, the 6-foot-9 center of undefeated Indiana State's second-ranked team, is sometimes overshadowed by his scoring average of more than 30 points per game for three seasons with the Sycamores.

But last season, Bird was second on his team in assists and led the team in steals and rebounds. This season, his 15.5 per game rebounding average has placed him among the top three in the nation. And rival coaches say that his defensive ability is just as impressive as his offense.

"That Bird is as smart a ballplayer as you'll ever see," Purdue Coach Lee Rose said after Bird scored 22 points against the Boilermakers this season. "Just his presence on the floor helps them."

Bird, from the small southern Indiana resort community of French Lick, has the Sycamores thinking seriously about a national championship in his final year with the help of

NBA expansion seems strange

Bring a few hundred basketball people together under one roof and something strange is bound to happen.

That's one way to explain the National Basketball Association's decision to begin the expansion process that is expected to add two clubs to the league by the 1980-81 season.

At a time when more than half the teams are experiencing attendance declines, when TV ratings are down for the second year in a row and when just about everyone involved in sports has a pet theory as to what is wrong with pro basketball, the NBA decided last weekend to expand to 24 teams.

Commissioner Larry O'Brien, announcing the Board of Governors' decision to begin processing expansion applications, emphasized that the league has not sought out new investors. "All the flow has been in the other direction, with people coming to us," said O'Brien. "What we are doing is responding to that interest."

What they also are doing is setting the stage for a one-shot windfall for the existing 22 teams, who would share in the expansion fee. Keeping that in mind, maybe the decision to expand at this time isn't as strange as it seems.

How much will a new franchise cost? O'Brien wouldn't even offer a guess.

When four teams were admitted from the dying American Basketball Association in June 1976, each paid \$3.2 million. Inflation over the past three years pushes that figure to \$4 million. The two new teams also have to be stocked with players, raising the cost more. And there's always the greed factor.

If the admission fee is \$8 million — \$2 million more than the last expansion team, New Orleans, paid to join the league in 1974 — each existing team would get nearly \$750,000. If the fee is \$11 million, each of the 22 clubs would get an even \$1 million. Those are the kind of numbers that turn red ink into black.

And that, say the cynics, is why the NBA is talking expansion.

Formal applications already have been received from groups in Dallas and Minneapolis-St. Paul. There have been informal talks with groups from Miami and Toronto. O'Brien also mentioned Cincinnati, Pittsburgh and St. Louis as "cities that appear to have the greatest potential for success," although one Cincinnati official said the expansion talk "caught him completely off guard."

Weekly documents disease

ATLANTA (AP) — A small publication printed each week in a basement room at the national Center for Disease Control provides the only official and up-to-the-minute report on the state of the nation's health.

Physicians, journalists and a broad spectrum of businessmen such as coffin manufacturers, aspirin makers, pharmaceutical salesmen and travel agents read it avidly.

It is the 26-year-old MMWR — the Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, published by the CDC's Bureau of Epidemiology and mailed every Friday to 85,000 subscribers.

The 12-page MMWR provides technical but fascinating accounts of obscure medical phenomenon. A recent item told of three Colorado women who were poisoned by a common herb used as a folk method for inducing abortion.

A key section is Table No. 4, which appears every week on page 8. The table lists the number of deaths from all causes in 121 U.S. cities, as reported by state and local health authorities.

The first flu reports are analyzed by aspirin manufacturers, who consider MMWR statistics an aid in determining production levels.

Cult members have job woes

Dear Dr. Solomon: The 20-year-old son of some very dear friends recently left school to join a religious oriented cult. The parents are hard-working, law-abiding citizens, and they are heartbroken. What would cause a young man from a good family to join such a group?

Dear Mrs. T.: Without specific knowledge of the family or the son, obviously only a general response is possible. Dr. Marc Galanter of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine has made some observations based on responses to a questionnaire completed by 237 members of a cult. Dr. Galanter concludes that they had started dropping out of society even before they considered joining the particular group.

The main attraction appears to be that of belonging to what members view as an elite group, together with the predictability of day-to-day life inherent in the city.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I smoke and feel so good from that hot smoke, it seems to heat my body. Isn't it true that no one really has hard facts that the hot smoke or compounds of the cigarette are harmful?

Dear Mr. S.S.: You may think you feel good from the hot smoke, but when you inhale on a cigarette, the hot smoke assaults delicate tissues in your mouth, throat, breathing tubes and lungs.

Your lungs retain from 85 to 99 percent of almost all of the compounds you inhale. There are hundreds of chemical substances in cigarette smoke. Three of the most damaging are nicotine, tars, and carbon monoxide.

Levels of the gas in the blood of smokers is four times higher for heavy smokers, sometimes 15 times higher than for nonsmokers.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Where can someone go to be tested for sickle cell anemia?

Dear Ms. S.C.: You can receive the test for "sickle cell" from your doctor or local clinic. A visit to one of them might show the need for counseling and/or treatment should the tests show that the individual has sickle cell anemia or carries the sickle cell trait.

All members of the black community should be tested for "sickle cell."

Possible deregulation of transportation discussed

Dr. Edwin Becht, vice president of The University of Texas at the Permian Basin in Odessa, Monday discussed deregulation of the transportation industry during a regular meeting of the Midland Downtown Kiwanis.

Becht said 35 percent of the U.S. population works in transportation, and that trucks "affect our lives more than trains." He noted this was a change which had taken place since the 1900s.

McCrory convicted in murder of girl

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — A jury today convicted John W. McCrory of the rape-strangulation of a 17-year-old Lewisville girl whose body was found in Denton County last June.

Jurors received the case against McCrory Monday, and deliberated a total of about three hours before returning the guilty verdict.

Prosecutors said they intend to seek the death penalty for McCrory, convicted of killing Jeana Melissa Walker. Her parents, Al and Lee Walker have observed the trial and were present when the verdict was announced.

Jurors have been sequestered since testimony in the case began Jan. 29. Defense attorney Rusty Duncan complained Monday that a magazine found in the jurors' sleeping quarters included an article titled "The Terrible Trauma of Rape" and said it would be one argument for an appeal of the case.

The jury asked the bailiff to leave the courthouse chapel unlocked overnight.

During deliberations Monday, jurors asked to see all the physical evidence. Judge Stanley Kirk ordered the material delivered to the jurors.

The state attempted to prove McCrory, acting alone, raped, beat and strangled Miss Walker and left her partially nude body in a rural field.

Prosecutor George Preston, in closing arguments to the jury, said the evidence tied McCrory to the scene of the death in several ways. He said foam recovered from the dead girl's clothes matched foam in the torn back seat of McCrory's car, and a strand of fiber attached to a piece of foam matched a sample taken from a seat cover in McCrory's car.

Defense lawyers said McCrory was at the scene of the slaying, but was not involved in her death and did nothing more than stop to offer aid to a stranded motorist.

The defense lawyer argued McCrory's behavior was "inconsistent" with the behavior of a guilty man. He said the defendant voluntarily gave his fingerprints and samples of his saliva and hair to police.

McCrory also voluntarily went to the Denton County sheriff and told him his fingerprints would be found on the car and engine because he saw the car parked beside the road and stopped to see if there was something wrong with it, Duncan said.

The defense attorney pointed out that an FBI fingerprint expert testified he could not identify 18 fingerprints on the car Miss Walker was driving.

Police failed to compare the fingerprints of four persons arrested as suspects in the case with fingerprints found on the car, Duncan said.

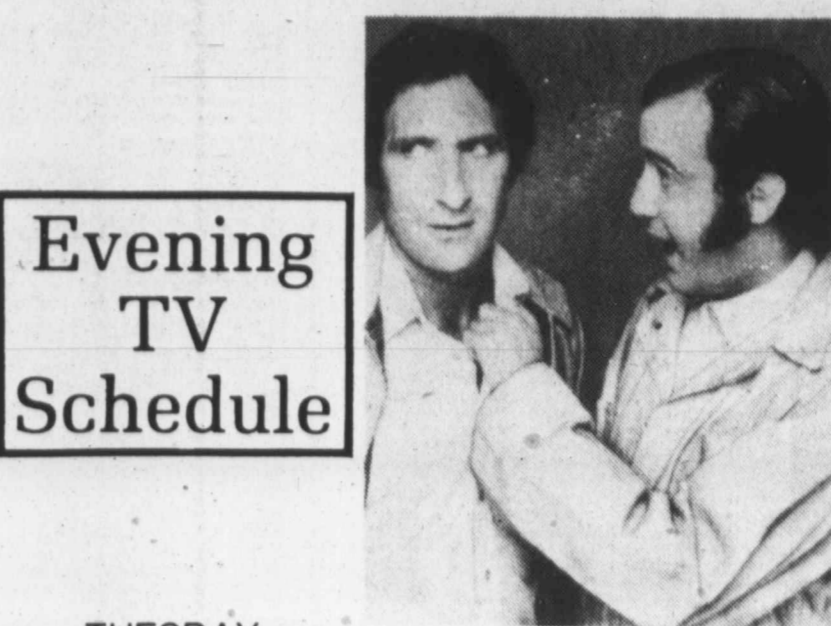

The News, in today's editions, gave this account of the incident: Comic Larry Best, addressing the audience gathered at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, said, "It's a pleasure to be here to honor Mrs. Warner — Hilton, Todd, Fisher, Burton, Burton, Warner." He left out her second husband, the late actor Michael Wilding.

The audience boomed and hissed and someone yelled, "Why don't you apologize?" Miss Taylor, the wife of U.S. Sen. John Warner of Virginia, just stared.

When she got to the microphone, the Academy Award-winning actress modified the final line from the movie "A Star Is Born," saying, "After that last little performance I must say 'This is Mrs. Norman Maine' ... my name is Elizabeth Taylor Warner."

Then she left early.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The signing of slugger Rod Carew by the California Angels has made a true believer out of former President Richard Nixon, who has purchased a pair of season tickets.

"Since you've obtained Carew we know you are making every effort to bring a winner here and we want to support you," Nixon was quoted as saying in his ticket request.

Some 250 season tickets requests were received by the Angels after they signed Carew for a reported \$800,000 a year. The requests represent about \$90,000 in ticket sales.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bianca Jagger wants a \$10 million settlement and \$14,000 a month in alimony from Rolling Stones lead singer Mick Jagger, and she's hired Michelle Triola Marvin's lawyer to get it for her.

"Although Bianca has been hoping for a reconciliation these past couple of months, the lawsuit was necessary because Mick has made it clear that it is not possible — because he has been living with another lady," said Marvin Mitchellson, who filed the petition Monday on behalf of Mrs. Jagger, who was in London.

Jagger was unavailable for comment. The petition said he had been living in Los Angeles with model Jerry Hall.

The Jaggars were married in 1971, and separated last October, the petition said.

The petition was filed by Mitchellson during a break in the community property case of Michelle Triola Marvin against actor Lee Marvin.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Despite efforts by Yugoslav officials to ignore reports that 86-year-old President Tito has divorced his third wife and married a 35-year-old opera singer, rumors of a new marriage persist.

"Such things are considered the private affair of every citizen in Yugoslavia," a government spokesman said Monday. "There would never be any official comment."

Tito is out of the country on a 15-day tour of four Arab states and Belgrade reporters were unable to contact Gertruda Munitic, the Sarajevo opera singer linked to Tito.

Tito's third wife, Jovanka Budisavljevic, has not appeared in public since last summer.

The rumors, which began circulating this winter, surfaced again Friday when Yugoslav border officials barred a truck carrying copies of an Italian newspaper, Il Piccolo, with an article about the purported romance.

ATLANTA (AP) — It's not food but expert advice that developing countries need to improve their way of life, says Lillian Carter, the president's mother.

Mrs. Carter told a subcommittee of the Presidential Commission on World Hunger on Monday that she reached that conclusion after serving in India with the Peace Corps for two years.

"In India, food was sent every day and it was piled in a warehouse," said the 80-year-old great grandmother. "I had access to it, but I saw people in front of me who were hungry, who didn't even know what milk was."

"We need to send people experts to show them what to do for themselves."

OLTEN, Switzerland (AP) — Anatoly Karpov of the Soviet Union is still the world's best chess player, the International Chess Federation says.

The federation has rejected challenger Viktor Korchnoi's protest of the decisive 32nd game of last fall's title match in the Philippines, the Swiss Chess Association announced Monday.

Korchnoi claimed the match organizers made him play under "intolerable conditions" but the federation decided at a closed meeting in Graz, Austria, that the protest by the expatriate Russian grandmaster was filed too late to be accepted.

It would be Reagan's third attempt to capture the Republican presidential nomination.

The newspaper said Reagan has delayed his official declaration because he is earning \$300,000 annually from a radio broadcasts, newspaper columns and paid speeches, and once he became a candidate most of the income would be cut off.
