Marine wounded, held in Iran gets 'hero's welcome'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Marine Sgt. Kenneth L. Kraus, the wounded U.S. Embassy guard held for a week by Iranian revolutionaries, came home to a hero's welcome Friday and said, "I did the job I was paid to do and...I'm glad that it worked

Kraus, 22, was met by the Marine Corps commandant, the secretary of the Navy, two senators, his family, a band and 80 Marines after being flown here from Europe

"I really didn't expect anything like this," Kraus, who was released Wednesday in Tehran, told onlookers at Andrews Air Force Base near Washington.

At a news conference, Kraus, of Lansdale, Pa., said he had been told during his captivity that he would be executed because of allegations that he shot three Iranians during the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran.

Kraus said he knew of no Marines who fired weapons at any of the attackers on the embassy during the takeover Feb. 14.

"They told me that they had the evidence and that they were going to shoot me," Kraus said. "I was the only American there (in prison) and I was scared."

Kraus said he was wounded, probably accidentally, at the embassy and then woke up in a hospital, where he remained for six hours before being transfersed to a prison where he spent the next week, much of it in a 10-by-15-foot room holding 20 other persons.

He said he was kept blindfolded and in handcuffs the first few days, and during questioning he was harassed at times and called a CIA agent. He said at one point someone stuck the barrel of a rifle in his ear and pulled the trigger, but the rifle was empty.

He said he was brought before a revolutionary tribunal last Sunday and told that under Moslem law he would be executed for killing Iranians.

He said he asked for evidence against him, but his accusers produced none and returned him to his cell. He said he heard nothing for two days and then on Wednesday was told the evidence had been found. He believed then that he was about to die, he said, but later that day he was released and driven back to the embassy.

Kraus stepped off the Air Force jet Friday, passed the Marine honor guard and embraced his mother, his fiancee and his three sisters.

"When I was out there I did the job I was paid to do," he said. "I tried to do my best. I'm glad that it worked out good for

me and my family and for our country.'

Marine Commandant Gen. Louis H. Wilson called Kraus' actions in Iran "inspiring" and presented him with a Purple Heart.

Navy Secretary W. Graham Claytor Jr. presented Kraus the Navy Commendation Medal.

After the news conference. Kraus left for his home in Pennsylvania. He will take 10 days leave, then may be reassigned to embassy duty. He said he would like to be assigned to the embassy in Cyprus, another occasional trouble spot, where a U.S. ambassador was killed several years ago.



China took its "self-defense" war deeper into Vietnam Friday, throwing fresh infantry divisions against beleaguered Vietnamese forces after launching air strikes on stores of Soviet supplies near Haiphong, sources

here and in Tokyo reported. The reported bombing outside Haiphong, 75 miles soutg of the Chinese border and Vietnam's main seaport, was the deepest yet by the Chinese and moved them perilously closer to a

confrontation with the Soviets. In Moscow, Soviet Defense Minister Dmitri Ustinov denounced Peking's 'dangerous provocations...against neighboring sovereign states" and said the Chinese were trying to plunge the world into a war.'

Connally kicks off crusade

A confident-sounding John Connally swept through Midland Friday as part of a trip through Texas to kick off his campaign for the presidency.

The former Texas governor spoke to a group of about 400 persons who paid \$10 each to eat sandwiches and hear him set the tenor of his cam-

"I'm not going to go around promising to solve everybody's problems.... The government doesn't have anything to give you it hasn't already taken away," Connally told his audi-

He said during his travels last year he found, "People are distressed. People are uneasy...some are frus-

"There is a sense of disappointment...a feeling something is happening in this country over which they have no control," the former cabinet officer said.

Connally attributed the mood of the people to a lack of leadership and decision from President Carter.

The United States has abrogated its role as a world leader, leaving a 'vacuum at international councils of the world," he said.

Even those (nations) who are not particularly fond of us...look to us (for leadership)," said Connally.

To support his claims, the former secretary of the Navy noted the killing of the American ambassador to Afghanistan, the abduction of embassy staff members in Iran and "indignities heaped upon" Carter in Mexi-

Domestically, inflation, "the most insidious thing that can permeate a society," is high. He blamed the problem on the lack of an energy policy, "cheapening the dollar" with continued deficits and lack of an ef-

Marxists challenge Islamic rule

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Fifty thousand Marxist guerrillas demanded quick radical reforms in Iran Friday in a strong challenge to Avatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolutionary government.

Khomeini condemned the Fedayeen guerrillas as "communists and enemies of the revolution" in what appeared to be a complete break with the leftists after the two groups had fought side-by-side to bring down Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

The Marxists' demands were made in a rally on the campus of Tehran University, a frequent staging area for bloody street protests that eventually led to the end of the Pahlavi monarchy.

In the Caspian Sea city of Rudsar, a police captain accused of setting a theater fire that killed 337 persons last September in the southern city of Abadan was executed early Friday, Iran's state radio reported.

It said the captain, identified as Mir Tahri, had been convicted by an Islamic revolutionary court, and that he also was accused of killing three young persons participating in an anti-shah demonstration before the

Spokesmen for the Fedaycen said the primary purpose of the rally was to make Khoemini realize that "not all Iranians want an orthodox Islamic

We are young, educated and liberated. A strict Moslem nation would only create more problems for the people," a Fedayeen spokesman

Khomeini, patriarch of Iran's 32 million Shiite Moslems, has scheduled a referendum in two weeks time for Iranians to decide whether they want an Islamic republic. Ayatollah, which means "mark of God," is a title of

respect for a man learned in Islam. The Marxists also want banks and foreign investments nationalized, cancellation of contracts with the consortium of foreign oil companies which markets much of Iran's oil, expulsion of foreign oil workers and no import of foreign goods that could be manufactured in Iran.

Meanwhile, Fedayeen members

told newsmen their party is an independent, nationalist Marxist movement and is not affiliated with the Moscow oriented Iranian Tudeh Communist party.

About 1,000 Khomeini supporters tried to shout "Our party is God's party" and "our leader is Khomeini," but they were ignored by the crowd as their chants were drowned out by

And the situation here on the Iraqi border, where flowers bloom year round, is repeated in countless other Iranian communities.

It illustrates the problems facing the regime of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini in restoring order, following the overthrow of Iran's 2,500year-old monarchy.

'The main problem we have is the lust for power many people have found," said Ali Farzam, the city's minister of justice.


"The only cure is for the central religious leadership in Tehran to assert itself and force local committees to abide by their rules. otherwise, we

will have anarchy," Farzam added. He said that unless law and order are restored soon, fighting will break out among Arabic-speaking tribes, which inhabit oil-rich Khuzestan province, threatening the security of the oil fields.


Ktoramshahr's religious leader, Ayatollah Mohammad Taher Shobbar Khaghani, says the new regime faces problems but believes they are small compared with those of other countries in the throes of revolution. Ayatollah, which means "Mark of God," is the highest rank in the Moslem

"After every revolution, disorder and lawlessness are natural," said the Iraq-born Khaghani. "I must say, the disorder and upheavel that followed the Iranian revolution is much less than what happened in other countries. We hope we will soon be able to put an end to disorder through democracy and Islamic law."

Nearly two weeks after the revolution, Khaghani and the religious community appear to be having only limited success.

Clayton W. Williams Jr. of Midland, the donor, is known for flying an oversized Texas A&M flag over his downtown office building.


The acreage in the gift is located in various parts of Brazos, Burleson and Robertson counties in central Texas, on the fringe of one of the state's newer oil fields.

Drilling is expected to begin in the area in the near future. Royalties could be almost 10 times the market value, university officials said.


The income will fund the Clayton W. Williams Jr. Endowment in the Texas A&M University Development Foundation, and the endowment will fund various academic and student pro-



Cost of living jumps; Purchasing power down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Led by the sharpest increase in food prices in nine months, the cost of living jumped another 0.9 percent in January while the average worker's purchasing power declined, the government re-

ported Friday. The 0.9 percent boost in the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index matched the highest monthly increases recorded last year - 0.9 percent gains in June and September but fell short of the 1 percent advance that many analysts had predicted for

January. by escalating prices for gasoline, cars, medical care and public accommodations, would amount to an annual inflation rate of 11.2 percent if continued for an entire year.

But Barry Bosworth, director of President Carter's Council on Wage and Price Stability, expressed confidence Friday that the inflation rate can be held to about 7.5 percent this year, depending on energy prices. The inflation rate last year was 9

In a reference to Black Friday, the day of the stock market crash of Oct. 29, 1929, Republican National Chairman Bill Brock said that "for American working people and those on fixed incomes, this day should be referred to as Black Friday II.'

The Consumer Price Index last month stood at 204.7, meaning that goods or services that cost \$100 in the base year of 1967 had a price tag of \$204.70 in January

The average worker's dollar bought 0.1 percent less last month than in December because of higher prices and a shorter work week, the Labor Department said. Over the past year, real spendable earnings have declined 0.7 percent.

Food prices soared by 1.4 percent last month, the biggest increase since the 1.6 percent gain of April 1978.

Shoppers paid higher prices for beef, poultry, fish, fruit and vegetables.

Commerce Department economist William Cox said consumers "can expect some further increases - fairly substantial ones — in meat prices" in coming months. He said prices might be tempered somewhat if shoppers switched from beef to chicken and other, cheaper meats.

Costs of medical care and transportation each rose by 1.1 percent in January.

Jones or district attorney investigator Jerry Davis by Fife on Feb. 8, and the photographs shown Fife by Davis during a Feb. 8 interrogation.

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

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



If East had Q-x-x or J-x-x or two low trumps he would surely lead a third heart. He would switch to clubs only if he had Q-J-x or Q-J-x-x of trumps and didn't want South to discover that West couldn't overruff.

NEW YORK (AP) -Back in 1752, Benjamin Franklin invented the lightning rod to intercept lightning bolt and lead it harmlessly into the ground, leaving the ouse untouched.

But more than 200 years later, American homes are still suffering damage from lightning, says Lee Meyer, president of the Independent Insurance Agents of America.

More than 50,000 homes in the United States are hit, directly or indirectly, each year by some 90 million lightning bolts, he says. Of the total hit, he adds, about 15,000 to 20,000 homes age, some 30,000 have less serious losses to wiring, appliances and

plumbing, and some 1,-500 homes burn to the Lightning is one of nature's worst destroyers, causing 500 deaths, 1,500 injuries and some halfbillion dollars-worth of property loss each year,

say members of Meyer's group, local agents who ounsel on homeowners' nsurance. They offer this advice in the area of lightning: -Evaluate your home's need for light-

ning protection. If it is surrounded by other houses on level land, it won't be the primary target it would be if it were alone on a hilltop. Then, too, your chances of being struck by lightning vary from place to place. Some parts of Florida have 10 times as many electrical storms as California.

-Since lightning starts fires, you'll want to question how far your nome is from fire protection. When you evaluate the location of your nome, its closeness to fire protection, perhaps even your own fear of lightning, you may find that lightning rods that are properly grounded and installed by an approved electrician will be well worth the cost. 
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
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Blanket amnesty offered to striking policemen

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - City negotiators offered blanket amnesty Friday to 1,100 striking policemen in an effort to end a strike that has disrupted Mardi Gras and garbage pickups and threatens to spill over to New Orleans Port - the nation's second

The amnesty issue appeared to be the major obstacle to resolving the strike, which started Feb. 16 and forced curtailment of Mardi Gras fes-

Striking policemen rejected a proposed settlement Thursday night, saying it did not specifically guarantee that no striker would be punished by the city.

"It was a misunderstanding," said Reynard Rochon, the city's chief negotiator, as he went back to the bargaining table with the union Friday. He said the amnesty issue had not

been mentioned in the city's contract offer, but had been agreed to by telephone. Asked again Friday if the city would offer blanket amnesty, he replied, "Yes."

Union men outside the meeting room complained that wasn't the only issue and argued the city should offer a better deal on pay raises.

The mayor's office accused the

union of constantly changing the issues which previously had centered on binding arbitrartion — an issue the union has dropped - and on including ranking officers in the contract.

Meanwhile, police pickets returned to their positions at garbage depots and fire stations, but none showed at the city-owned port facilities.

Joseph Valenti, a Teamsters offi-cial from Detroit, had said earlier that picketing might be spread to the New Orleans Port, the nation's second largest in tonnage, but that a definite decision had not been made.

Garbage pickups were not made in the city Friday for the second day. The Sanitation Department told the 325 garbage collectors to stay home for their safety.

Firemen stayed on the job, however, and officials of the firefighters union of the AFL-CIO said they told members at a Friday morning meeting to continue their normal routine. The firefighters' contract with the city expires next Friday.

A substitute force of 600 National Guardsmen and 150 state troopers maintained patrols along with about 300 non-striking policemen. The city says 1,100 of the 1,500 policemen are

on \$20,000 bond posted by his attorney. He was embraced by wellwishers as he left the courthouse in the rain. Attorneys declined to say where May would be staying until his next court appearance. It was not known who posted the

bond, but prisoners' rights attorney Ron Welch had said before the hearing that defense attorneys were pre-pared to meet "all eventualities" in making bail.

Outstanding blacks honored by Carter

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter honored Jesse Owens, Martin Luther King Sr., and 15 other elderly blacks Friday as "potentially unsung heroes" for their contributions to society.

After a luncheon in the State Dining Room of the White House, the president individually praised each of the 17 who were selected by the National Caucus on the Black Aged Inc. for a Living Legacy

"You have helped to write history," Carter said. "And you have proved that the strength of the human spirit can achieve excellence even in the face of extraordinary obstacles.

"It's a day of inspiration to have these potentially unsung heroes recognized - in many instances perhaps a little bit late," he said.

Carter said if he had to single out one individual, it would be King, the 80-year-old father of the slain civil

I look on him in many ways as a son would look on a father," the president said, adding the King family was a "beacon light of truth and integrity."

Noting King was for many years pastor of Eben-ezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, the president said: When it was impossible for a black voice to be heard clearly in the South ... black churches were a haven for liberty."

Cullen Davis' net worth includes \$139 million

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Attorneys for Priscilla Davis introduced documents Friday show-ing the net worth of her estranged husband, Cullen Davis, includes \$139 million from a single company owned by Davis and his brother.

Davis has been the only witness called so far by Mrs. Davis' attorneys since their divorce trial began Tuesday. She is arguing she should receive at least half of the \$98.7 million profits she contends Davis' companies have earned during their stormy marriage, which began in 1968.

Davis' entire net worth has not been revealed yet, but attorneys for Mrs. Davis are expected to show it is between \$150 million and \$200 million. Her attorney, Jerry Loftin, Friday introduced evidence showing Davis' net interest in Mid-Continent Supply Co. alone is about \$139 million. Mid-Continent is the largest of the parent corporations of Kendavis Industries International, a 102-company conglomerate owned by Davis and his brother, Kenneth W. Davis Jr., of Tulsa, Okla.

Mrs. Davis' lawyers also introduced information to show Davis netted about \$46 million by combining with brother Kenneth to squeeze a third brother, Bill Davis, from the power ranks of the Kendavis empire. Mrs. Davis' attorneys argued the \$46 million should

be juddged part of the community property.

District Judge John Barron will have to decide the size of the part of Davis' estate to be considered community property and which of his property should be considered separate. Property division is the only issue at stake in the no-fault divorce trial.

Loftin also delved into Davis' personal expenditures revealing a total of \$66,000 in payments to the

tures, revealing a total of \$66,000 in payments to the father of Davis' girlfriend, Karen Master. Davis testified he gave Miss Master's father, Ray Hudson, \$19,000 as a gift last Dec. 13, and said he previous-

ly gave Hudson \$45,000.

Miss Master provided Davis an alibi during his
1977 trial in Amarillo on charges he murdered his

12-year-old step-daughter. He was acquitted.

Davis previously testified he earned nearly \$1 million during the years 1976, 1977 and 1978, despite the fact he was in jail most of that time. After he was acquitted on murder charges he was accused last August of plotting to have his previous divorce judge killed. That case ended in a mistrial in Houston, and Davis has been free on bond since.

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
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



second baseman Manny Trillo and and two other players to the Philadelphia Phillies on Friday in a major eight-player swap in which they obtained catcher Barry Foote.

Trillo, the key man in the deal, went to the Phillies with catcher Dave Rader and reserve outfielder Greg Gross for Foote, second baseman Ted Sizemore, outfielder Jerry Martin and rookie right-handed pitchers Derek Botelho and Henry Mack.

All three players acquired by the Cubs are expected to break into the starting lineup, with Martin taking over center field and the veteran Sizemore replacing Trillo.

TRILLO, WHO batted .216 in 152 games last season, came to the Cubs with pitcher Darold Knowles and Bob Locker from the Oakland A's after the 1974 season for outfielder Billy Williams. It turned out to be one of the better deals

Rader was acquired a year ago in a trade which sent outfielder Jerry Morales to the St. Louis Cardinals in hopes of bolstering the Cub catching staff. But Rader was unable to help the Cubs much with his .203 average and 36 runs batted in while playing in 116 games.

Gross was acquired from the Houston Astros in 1976 and batted .265 with 39 runs batted in as a reserve outfielder.

Trillo will round out what could be one of the best infields in the National League with Pete Rose at first base, Larry Bowa at shortstop and Mike Schmidt at third base.

"GREAT DEAL, simply great, I'm really excited about it," said Cub Manager Herman Franks, who was reached in Salt Lake City while preparing to leave for the Cubs' training camp in

"Yes, I'd say Foote is the key guy in the deal but, hey, this Martin can play too. We got ourselves three regulars. As of now, Martin will start in center field and Sizemore will be at second base. We'll find out more about it in spring training.

"I've never seen Martin play center field," said Franks. "He's always relieved in right field or left field but Bob (General Manager Bob Kennedy) tells me he has seen him play center field and that's good enough for me.

Aggies claim Title IX detrimental to women

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) The federal government's proposed regulations forcing colleges to spend more money on women's athletics would be detrimental to the women's programs, officials at Texas A&M University said.

The school officals made their views known in a formal reply to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's request for comments on the Title IX program. Title IX is a civil rights statute designed to ensure equality in athletic programs in the nation's colleges and universities.

Texas A&M officials criticized the proposed per capita expenditure standard, which would require spending thousands of additional dollars for each woman added to the athletic program, whether the expenditures are needed or not.

"THIS FACT would penalize universities for increasing participation in women's athletics and would often discourage universities from actively striving to increase women's participation," A&M officials told HEW. "As such, the per capita standard is at cross purposes with the concept of incresing participation.'

A&M officials also pointed out that the per capita expenditure standard "would force women's programs into the same mold as men's programs," a situation they said would not necessarily meet the needs of women.

A&M OFFICIALS also challenged HEW's authority to become involved in intercollegiate athletics. In a letter attached to the report, Texas A&M President Dr. Jarvis Miller said the insitiution's response to HEW's questions did not in any way signify the school's acceptance of the agency's authority to regulate intercollegiate athletics.

"Texas A&M University is committed to the development of a first-class athletic program for our women students," jarvis said in the letter, adding that school's current budget for women's athletics is approximatly

He said strict interpretation of the Title IX guidelines could result in the school having to spend an addition half-million dollars on the program.

Los Angeles Times Syndicate In June of 1967, golf, which always needs one, thought it had a new hero of its own, one to go along with Hogan. Hagen, Jones, Snead, Nicklaus, Nelson and Palmer. A legend.

He was only 23 years old, right out of Texas, an NCAA champion from the University of Houston, the cradle of golf. He was still an amateur when ne showed up for the U.S. Open that year, and he electrified the golf world when he began to rout the world's finest players at Baltusrol. Then, he shot the worst round of the field on the final day. Jack Nicklaus beat him by 15 shots that day. Marty Fleckman shot 80.

STILL, HE had shocked the best golf had to offer. Plenty of hotshot young amateurs or new pros lead the Open after one round. And are on the way home the next night. Marty Fleckman had led the thing almost to the back nine.

Besides, he was Byron Nelson's protege, as tough as badlands crops and, when he turned pro, he won the very first tournament he ever entered the 1967 Cajun Classic. It was like hitting a grand slam home run your first time up, or bucketing 90 against the Celtics.

that case ace. "Fleckman-watching" became a cult. Purists were sure a guy who could shoot 209 in three rounds of an Open and had Nelson would find a groove and everybody else would just be trying to stay close. Marty was like a pitcher who was wild. He had the stuff, he just had to find the strike

IN 12 years on the tour, Marty Fleckman made just \$136,867. That's not even a good spring for Nicklaus. It's not even a good career for a department store Santa Claus. The closest he ever came to the top 60 was 1972 when he finished 81st. Marty Fleckman was in the low-rent district of golf. He shot his way into tournaments, nobody sent limousines after

But, suddenly, this year, Marty Fleckman began to make cuts. When you play all 72 holes of a tournament, you keep on going. The chaff is what has to qualify. Marty was finally in the top 60 - or 65 week after week.

And, then, last week, Marty was playing to win, not to stay alive. He finished a solid fifth in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson event. Still plagued by last rounds as mismated to the others as red and purple socks, he still managed to scare a lot of people.

Hogan Park offers handicap service

Reservations for tee times went so fast this weekend, one would think the golf season might be starting. This would seem a good time to go over the handicap system which is provided for golfers at Hogan Park Golf

Those golfers who were signed up in last year's handicap system will be provided one more computation. It will be sent in on Monday. Anyone on the list for this year who would like to continue their handicap service needs to sign up again before March 1.

To review the system used at HPGC for new golfers, we provide computerized handicapping system for those who desire to maintain an upto-date handicap. The annual membership fee for the service is \$6 and is pro-rated during the current year. Memberships may be obtained at the Golf Shop. The handicap book is located in the golf shop and each player is responsible for entering his own score. The player will be provided with a printout card after he has recorded a minimum of five scores at the time the sheets are forwarded to the computer for analysis. Players will receive a minimum of seven computations during a full year of participation in the system.

WHEN POSTING scores in the handicap book, the player will post the actual scores with the following exceptions: If your handicap is one through 18 you are limited to two over par on the number of holes equal to your handicap and one over par on the balance of holes; If your handicap is plus or scratch, you are limited to one over par on any hole; If your handicap is 19 through 36, you are limited to three over par on as many holes as your handicap exceeds 18 strokes, and two over par on the balance of holes; If your handicap is 37 through 40, you are limited to four over par on as many holes as the handicap exceeds 36 strokes. If you do not complete a hole, you should mark an x and use the formula just mentioned to determine the score for the hole. This formula is called Equitable Stroke Control.

The handicap service is provided for the convenience of the players, and the handicap cards will be issued only to those listed in the book. It is the responsibility of the player to enter each and every score. To participate in area tournaments and pro-am events, players are required to have a current handicap card. This system is acceptable for furnishing players with such a card. Only those players who are registered in this handicap system will be provided cards from the Golf Shop.

Crusty Keeler refuses to die

KEELER, Calif. - "Keeler is not a ghost town," the sign of Mrs. Lillian Hilderman's house used to say. 'There are 39 souls who live here.

Those were the days when she wrote a column for an Inyo County newspaper and would include such

"James Smith of Keeler has a new set of choppers."

Old Mrs. Hilderman isn't around anymore. Nor are a lot of the former Keeler crowd.

What was once a booming town of 7,500 near the shore of Owens Lake has dwindled to an echo. No train stops anymore at the rotting railroad depot. No lessons are taught in the empty schoolhouse. The Catholic church has long since been trucked away to another town for use as a golf course clubhouse.

But somehow, for about a hundred residents, Keeler is a town that ref-

uses to die. "There was one sheriff to serve the county in emergencies," Frances C. Karautter wrote in the book "The Story of Keeler.'

"But with distances as great as they were, he and his posse often arrived after an offender had taken the discretionary course of making a quick disappearance.

"In these cases sheriff, posse and the victim, as well as most of the neighborhood, joined in a general bout of drinking.

The community of Keeler came into being in 1882 as the result of a mine, Cerro Gordo, carved into a nearby mountain eight miles up a steep dirt road. In its day the hole yielded \$17 million in silver, lead and other ores. But how you gonna keep 'em down

in the mine after they've seen Keeler? 'There were," Ms. Krauter wrote, "boarding houses, the average quota of saloons, a theater where traveling show companies gave weekly performances, and the ubiquitous houses of dubious female entertainment and companionship.

One resident, Lo Yu, operated a laundry — where a person could really lose his shirt. In the back room was

Every few months a horse and buggy doctor would ride into town and see the ailing at one of the hotels. When a circuit judge would ride in, perhaps to preside over a murder he sometimes brandish

to control unruly spectators. And, of course, there was the Carson and Colorado Railroad, which did accept passengers. But mostly it was interested in the business of the mines and the related undertakings, such as

the talc works. 'What do we do here in our spare time?" Ken Suleski mused the other day, surveying the 42 blocks that is Keeler. "Fight, drink and make

Suleski is employed at Cyrus Industrial Minerals, the talc mill which is the town's leading industry. It has five workers. Another of the workers, Phil Rosen-

fulfilling a life sacking talc. "But it's hard to find a job around here," he added, trying to keep white powder off the sandwich he was munching

Joseph Guzman, who runs the mill, said a lot of the talc is trucked in from Death Valley to be pulverized in Keeler for use on babies' behinds and in roofing materials. Down the road, at Elnora Ander-

son's house, it was feeding time for

the animals.

Different people do different things in this shell of a community, and Mrs. Anderson makes her way in life by raising Yorkshire terriers and toy poodles. She sells them to a pet store owner in Los Angeles.

"I also do a little clipping for my old customers who drive down from Bishop," she said. "I used to live there." Her neighbor, Millie Finn, raises goats and supplies some of the townsfolk with milk from her modest herd. In fact, at Christmas one of the local

treats was goat-milk eggnog. The few children who live here are bused to school in Lone Pine, 13 miles to the northwest.

At the western entrance to the town is a service station, which at first glance would appear to be in business. But a look at the prices on the two pumps tells otherwise: 48 cents per gallon.

Broken windows and abandoned buildings abound. One is the former elementary school. Townfolk say it is privately owned now, but nobody seems to know what plans there are



MEET THE MINISTER

Rev. Sam Hulsey returns 'home' to Texas, Church of Holy Trinity

When the Rev. Sam B. Hulsey moved to Midland in early 1978 from Nashville, Tenn., to become rector of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Trinity, it was, in a real sense, a "homecoming" for him.

Until he became rector of Nashville's St. David's Episcopal Church in 1973, all of Hulsey's previous minis-terial posts had been in Texas and, with the exception of several years spent as a student elsewhere, he had been a lifelong Texas resident.

Born in Fort Worth and educated in the Fort Worth public schools, Hulsey received a bachelor of arts degree in English from Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va., in 1953.

He then was accepted for graduate study in English literature and theology at St. Andrew's University in Scotland, spending a year at that widelyknown institution.

He next enrolled in Virginia Theological Seminary at Alexandria, where he received his master of divinity degree in 1958. A number of years later, while serving as rector of St. David's Church in Nashville, he took special clinical pastoral education training at Baptist Hospital in Nashville; through the years, he also has had special courses in group dynamics, psychology and preach-

Hulsey's first pastoral appointment in July, 1958, was as curate and assistant rector of St. John's Church in Corsicana. He continued to fill the position until May of 1960. It was during this time that he and his wife, the former Linda Johnson, were married in Corsicana.

In the spring of 1960, Hulsey was named rector of the Corsicana parish, remaining in that post until October of 1963 when he resigned to become a member of the staff of a large Episco-

He also served as a director of the Pampa Fine Arts Association and as chairman of the Community Gallery committee. He was a board member of the Pampa Community Concerts Association, Lovett Memorial Library and the Community Day Nursery, and was active in the Pampa

Ministerial Alliance. Hulsey accepted a call to St. David's Church of Nashville in mid-1973, remaining as rector of that parish until accepting the call to Midland's Holy Trinity parish in December, 1977.

The Hulsey family moved to Midland in January of 1978. Hulsey was officially installed as rector of the parish a few weeks later although

he had been serving in that capacity since arrival here.

In Nashville, Hulsey served as a director of the Central State Hospital board and as a director and ultimately as president of Historic Nashville,

Since moving to Midland, Hulsey has become active in the Midland Association of Churches and currently is serving as chairman of the association's Christian education commit-

Hulsey now is on the executive committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Northwest Texas and he will serve as a clergy deputy from the diocese to the Episcopal General Convention to be held in Denver later this year. During his years in the ministry, Hulsey has held a variety of diocesan as well as area and national positions



obvious to those familiar with the Bible, of a transcendent, benign force active in human affairs. But unlike the biblical God, the filmed "gods" usually are outsiders to human history, immune to its origins and

"Celestial saviors," they're termed by a Catholic theologian, the Rev. Ted Peters of Loyola University in New Orleans. Yet they evoke a sense of

supernormal presence in the world. 'We are not alone," went the subcaption on the recent attraction, "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," in which extraterrestrial visitors in a brilliantly magnificent flying saucer bring tidings of love pervading

OTHER RECENT FILMS have abounded with such mystical messengers including "Star Wars," with its intimations about the "Force," and George Burns' portrayal of the deity

in "Oh God." The rash of interest in unidentified flying objects, often mirrored in films and science fiction about technological wonders surpassing this world, is laden with religious symbolism,

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A federal judge has rejected an attempt by the Worldwide Church of God to be freed from state receivership, but the church may get its wish anyway.

Superior Court Judge Julius Title decided Wednesday to lift the order which placed a reciever in charge of the church's financial operations if church employes cooperate with an audit of its books to make sure funds were not siphoned off by church offi-

On Jan. 16, during its receivership, the church had filed an appeal in U.S. District Court asking a federal judge to rule that the state attorney general's action was a violation of the First Amendment guarantee against government interference with religion.
