

School Elections Polled Heavy Vote Saturday

School trustee elections in the Stratford Independent School District and Texhoma Independent School Districts drew the largest number of voters to cast their ballots for many years. According to the unofficial returns of the election, Vern Reynolds, Newton Crabtree, and Clifford Byrd were elected as new trustees of the Stratford Independent School District. In the election Vern Reynolds received 220 votes, Newton Crabtree 184, Van B. Boston 117, Clifford Byrd 146, Jim Taylor 114, Cone Donelson 108, Dan Foreman 140, R. K. Everett 119, and Glen Slaton received 1 write-in vote.

G. L. Taylor has been re-elected trustee-at-large of the County Board of School Trustees. In precinct 4 he polled 12 votes in precinct 4, 47 votes; in precinct 1, 4 votes; and in precinct 2, 5 votes. In this election on which there were no names on the ballot Bob Burgess received 5 votes in precinct 1.

Precinct 4 elected Elmer Hudson as the county trustee. He received 16 votes. Precinct 3 elected Roy Schafer as county trustee with 80 votes. Precinct 1 elected Arthur Milton as county trustee with 6 votes; E. K. Everett received 4 and Oma Ellison 2. Precinct 2 seemed confused in their voting for a county trustee. Travis Spurlock, Meritt Sweny and Elmer Hudson each received two votes. As Hudson makes his home in precinct 4, and it is believed that Sweny is living in the Sunray school district, Travis Spurlock will probably be declared trustee although no official action has been taken.

Texhoma Independent School District elected G. M. Riffe, J. M. Gorman, and Rennie Hamilton as trustees. G. M. Riffe received 102 votes, Rennie Hamilton 98, J. M. Gorman 89, C. J. Renner 79, Robert Pierce 65, J. H. Hall 71, Lawrence Baugh 8, and Paul Gaddy 9.

\$273 Is County Cancer Quota For Year

Sherman County has been allotted a quota of \$273.00 to raise for the annual Texas Cancer Crusade. It is the county's share of the state quota of \$600,000.00. Sherman County has been one of the first counties in the state to secure its quota in previous years.

Harold Oquin is serving as treasurer and Mrs. Cone Donelson will assist in public relations work.

An appeal for support of the Texas Cancer Crusade by farm organizations in this area was issued this week by O. L. McMinn, Crusade Chairman of Sherman County.

Mr. McMinn emphasized that such support is vital to the success of the American Cancer Society's educational and fund-raising activity.

He quoted statements issued by the Hon. Charles F. Brannan, Secretary of Agriculture, and M. L. Wilson, director of extension work of the Agriculture Department.

Secretary Brannan's statement said, "The people who live in the rural areas of America, as well as those who live in the cities, know only too well what cancer can do to an individual and a home. Fortunately, victims of this vicious disease are gaining new hope as a result of the research, education and service programs of the American Cancer Society. All of us can well join with this fine organization in a determined fight to bring cancer under control."

Mr. Wilson's statement read, "It has been a privilege of the Extension Service of the Department of Agriculture to work closely with the American Cancer Society in its endeavor to stamp out cancer. From intimate knowledge of its program, we want to urge everyone to give this great work their fullest support."

Mr. McMinn said that most of the major farm organizations nationally have endorsed the Cancer Crusade and have made outstanding contributions to the cause of cancer control.

He urged that farm organizations devote at least one meeting to the subject of cancer in order that rural families might know the life-saving educational message that cancer is usually curable if caught in time.

E. E. Coons Speaker At PTA Meeting

County Attorney E. E. Coons was the principal speaker at the meeting of the Stratford Parent-Teacher Association Tuesday night. Mr. Coons used for his subject, "Our Resources and Our Destiny." He stressed the importance of early childhood training as a resource and the fact that parents and teachers should teach children by precept and example, especially by example. Our destiny, Mr. Coons stated, depends on the manner in which we follow the teachings of the Bible and try to carry out the will of God. Otherwise the nation will fall as have all of the other great nations.

A \$500.00 reward was posted Wednesday afternoon by W. N. Price and Keith Glasgow for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the party or parties committing the felony of killing livestock in their pasture this week.

A Hereford cow and a Hereford heifer whose quality topped the herd, were shot in a pasture 8 miles northeast of Stratford along U. S. Highway 54.

Victims of the attack were grazing at the time the shots were fired. Their mouths were filled with grass. Bullet holes in the heads of the cattle and fragments of the bullets which were found in their bodies gave rise to the belief that they were killed with .22 and .38 caliber slugs.

One dead cow was observed in the Gunzelman pasture a short distance from where the Price and Glasgow cattle were killed but an examination had not been made to determine the cause of death.

Red Spiders Found In Wheat Fields

A few farmers in Sherman County report that insects are causing damage to their wheat crop. Inspection shows that some of these insects include the red spider or mite, and a few flea hoppers. These insects are common to this area and there are usually a few infestations spotted around over a few fields each year. Where damage is great enough to warrant application of chemicals one of the following may be used:

Sulphur and lime is the one most commonly used against red spiders, however, it has to be applied as a dust and with dry windy conditions prevailing, its application may not be practical.

Parathion has given good results, however, two or more applications may be required to control the infestation.

Demite and aramite may be used for control of these insects, however, the farmer may have some trouble locating a supply of these chemicals.

DN 111 (dinuro-ortho-cyclo-hexyphenol) has been used effectively to control red spiders on apples and will probably be effective against red spiders on wheat. But again farmers may have trouble locating a supply for treating a very large acreage. These chemicals, with the exception of sulphur and lime, should be used as a spray.

Anyone using parathion should be very cautious in handling this chemical because it is a very deadly poison to human beings as well as insects. It has been used safely where treated clothes, rubber gloves, and masks are worn while handling the material and spraying it. Some commercial airplanes are available to spray this material at a cost of about \$3.00 an acre for the first application and about \$2.00 for the second. These other insecticides, demite, aramite, and DN 111, are safe for farmers to handle and spray.

Farmers desiring further information on use of these chemicals may call at the County Agent's office.

Amend Well Has Rainbow Showings Of Oil

Shamrock Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Amend is drilling at 5,670 feet after finding showings of oil and gas. Tests from a depth of 5,471 to 5,511 feet recovered 245 feet of fluid. Drilling mud with rainbow oil showings took up 65 feet of the test. Slightly gas cut mud filled the remaining 180 feet of the test.

Nine new drilling locations were announced for the Texas Panhandle this week but none were made in Sherman County.

The estimated cost of the new project is: \$45.00 for curb and gutter for a 30-foot lot, and \$125.00 for paving of the street in front of a 30-foot lot.

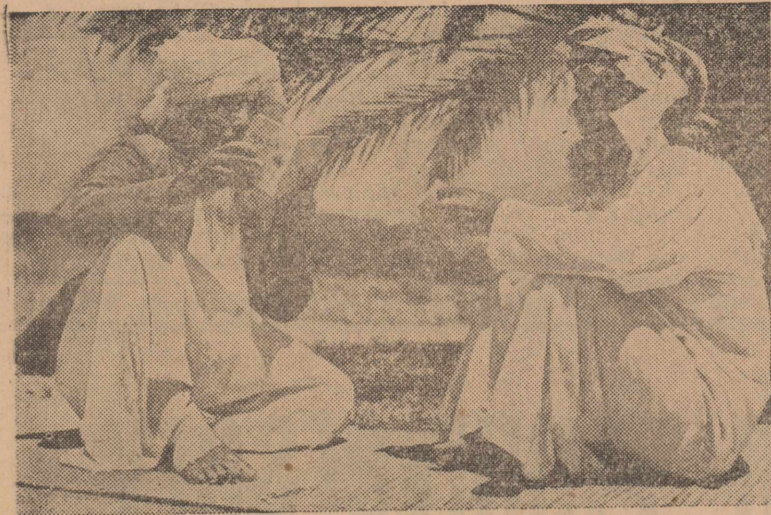

THIS WEEK IN Washington

POLITICS at the Washington level is at least confounding the experts. The managers of the booming campaign of General Dwight Eisenhower, who a short few weeks ago were screaming to get General Eisenhower back into this country, are now divided up on the expediency of his coming home now for fear lest some of the romance and glamour of the five-star general might rub off in close contact with the people.

The best information obtainable now is that the general, who has said he may "re-examine" his position, will be back probably by June 1. And further, it is likely that if "Ike" makes any speeches prior to the GOP convention in Chicago, they will be "non-political" speeches.

The general feels that it would be in bad taste for him to campaign in uniform of a general of the army, and for that reason, if he is nominated by the Republican convention, he will resign from the army, give up his pay and retirement emoluments, and campaign strictly as a civilian.

This is in direct contrast to the action of General Douglas MacArthur, who has declared he is willing to accept a nomination and is making political speeches against his commander-in-chief, with uniform, army plane and all.

At the other end of the Republican field, Senator Robert A. Taft, "Mr. Republican" himself, who has been considered as the Republican organization candidate, or at least the candidate of the professional politicians in the convention, hotly blasted the disaffection in the New Jersey Republican organization and withdrew from that state primary on the ground he is not getting a square break against General Eisenhower. Senator Taft's withdrawal from New Jersey is considered a confession of weakness, although his managers still claim he is out in front of the Republican field by a two-to-one delegate vote at this time.

Senator Taft's stinging defeat at the hands of the Eisenhower supporters in New Hampshire and the unprecedented write-in vote in Minnesota in favor of Eisenhower have given the Taft supporters

cause for anxiety and although General Eisenhower came out of Minnesota with none of the delegates, all going to Harold Stassen, who has agreed to divide delegates with Ike, the Minnesota vote was more important politically than the few delegates General Eisenhower picked up in his New Hampshire victory.

SENATOR TAFT needed an extra strong showing in the Wisconsin primary. Of course there are many more delegates, which the Taft supporters declare they will garner from conventions and party appointments, than are named in primaries which will show up in his camp at Chicago, but even the professional politicians can read a trend.

Stassen will wind up in the Eisenhower camp, probably angling for some cabinet job and that may also be true of Governor Warren of California, although there are some who give him a chance in case of an unlikely deadlock.

On the Democratic side of the picture, President Truman is as uncommunicative as ever as to his intentions. Politically, the President is being wise in putting off any announcement as long as possible, particularly if his decision is not to run. If this is his decision, he might be placed at a disadvantage in dealing with our European allies, and, if he does decide to run, he is not being hurt, since the consensus is that he only has to make his wishes known to gain the nomination.

Senator Richard B. Russell of Georgia, who has thrown his hat in the ring, has opened up national headquarters here and actively started his campaign. He is being importuned by his southern supporters to head up a Dixiecrat party, but the word is that he has refused on the theory he does not believe President Truman will run. What his reaction will be if the President does run remains to be seen, although he refused to bolt the regular Democratic party when the Dixiecrats took a walk at the Philadelphia convention in 1948.

In the meantime, Senator Estes Kefauver is making hay where he can with a back-breaking schedule.

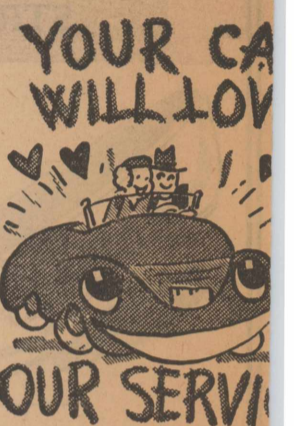

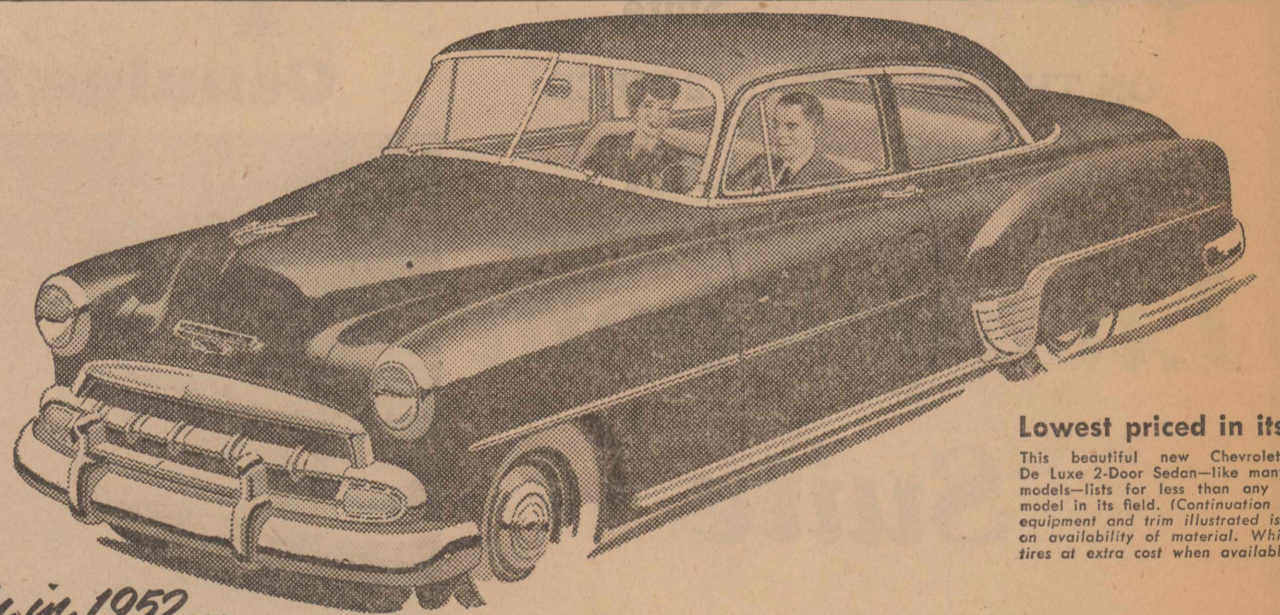

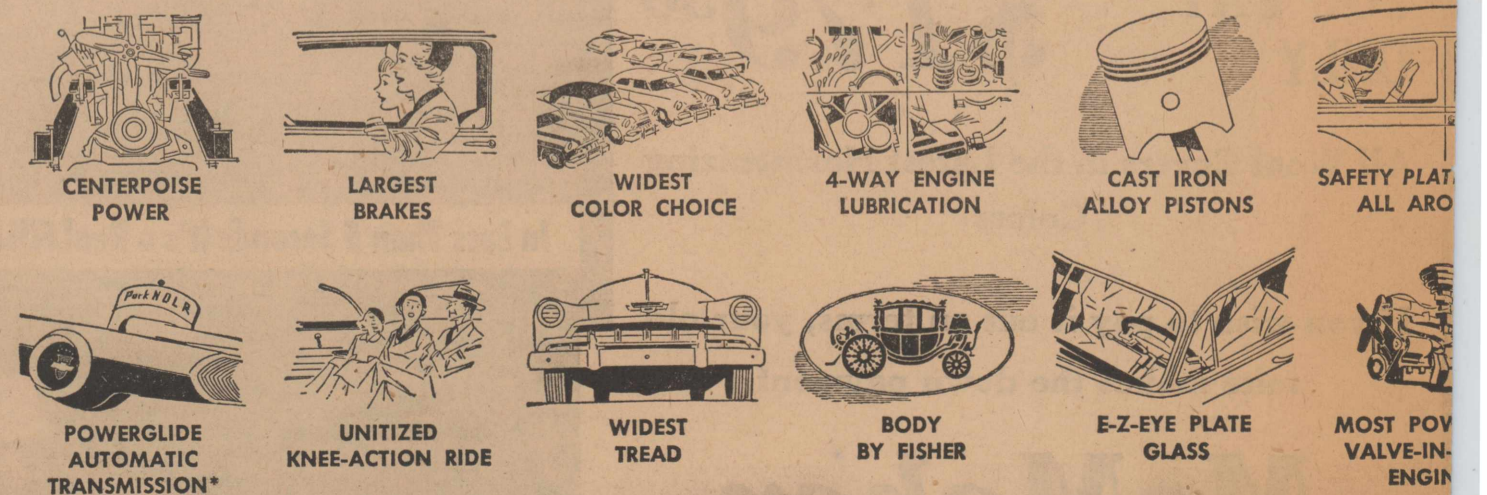

The Risen Lord

Lesson for April 13, 1952

In all the choralizing Easter music, in all the multitudinous many-voiced "I believe . . ." in the midst of the Easter lilies, is it hard to believe? Some find it so; and feel ashamed that in the presence of others' bright faith their own doubts rise darkly dim, their faith once clear and warm now grown opaque and cold. It is at Easter time that such a person finds his case most tragic. Doubt that echoes a universal loss of faith is almost natural; but why must doubt stand like a dark rock in a sunny meadow, cold in the midst of flowing springtime?

The Man of Dark Mind

TRAGIC such loss of faith may be; but not new. For in Christ's first Twelve—we must say first Eleven, for Judas had sold himself to another—even in that choice company there was one who, on the First Easter, when the voice of all his friends spoke as one: He is risen! could only answer, Is he risen, indeed?

The church has given the name of Saint to these eleven men; they will not deny it to Saint Thomas. For sainthood is not confined to those who have never wrestled with doubt; saints are not only those in whose eyes God and his ways have been always clearly seen.

High in the roll of Christian saints is the name of Thomas, a man of dark but honest mind. His doubt was very like him. He was not a man who most easily believed what was most pleasant.

When Jesus had set his face to go to Jerusalem, the other Ten looked for a Throne, and thrones for all; Thomas alone looked for death. Yet in the very hour, cheered by no bright illusion, Thomas could say what no other did: "Let us go too that we may die with him."

In the upper room at the Last Supper, again the voice of Thomas bespoke his dark mind. "We know not whether thou goest; and how can we know the way?"

So it could have been small surprise to the Ten that when they went to Thomas with the glad news of Easter Day, he was slow to believe.

The Last Beatitude

NOW the Lord Christ did not rebuke this man Thomas, when at last the two came face to face once more; nor did he praise him. He knew that Thomas had acted as a Thomas will.

But our Lord also looked down the centuries, to us and beyond. Thomas had not asked the impossible; but soon, soon would come the time when a request like his could not be granted.

Not forever could Christ be seen on earth with the visible eye. To only a few would be granted even the dream or vision of what Saint Thomas could have touched if he had dared.

The time was shortly coming when men must believe, if they believe at all, without seeing. Easter days would come and go, the voice of faith would rise in a thousand songs; He is risen! But not on any Easter, for twice a thousand years at least, would Christ return to break bread with his friends in such a way that doubt could no longer be. Blessed are they that have not seen, and yet—!

The Risen Lord

SO Saint Thomas was wrong, and right. He was wrong if he thought: I cannot believe unless I see. The Christian way is not the seeing that is believing; it is the believing that is seeing.

But he was right if he thought: I must believe for myself, I can take no other man's faith for my own. And he was right at the last: "My Lord and my God!"

Was Thomas only a man of temperament, a man easily blown from depth of doubt to height of faith? By no means. He knew what difference Easter makes, once the truth of it comes home to a man's mind.

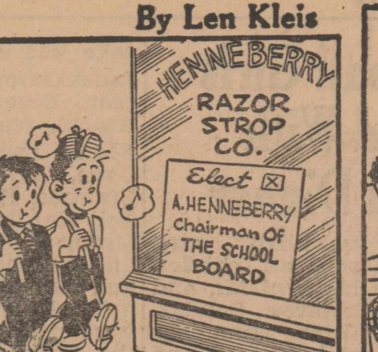
If the message of Easter is not true, Christ is dead,—rather Jesus is dead and there is no Christ; his brain is dust, his dream a cobweb in the wind of death. But if the message of Easter is true—and the whole Christian church is witness that it is true—then Christ who lived again on Easter morning lives forever past all the mornings of the world, lives to be man's only king, reigning from the very right hand of God.

If Easter is not true, we shall walk softly as befits those in mourning on the return of a day of sorrow; if Easter is true we shall say and sing with Thomas and all the saints: My Lord and My God!

Devotional Gems

(By N. D. Carter)

Let us think on the two words "wages and gift" for a short season. They have a few things in common. Both are bestowed upon the one receiving them. The difference in the two words are that one is earned while the other is not. If we are paid for something that we have done, then we have earned the payment and it is called wages. On the other hand, when we receive something when we have not earned anything at all, or only part to say the least, then what we receive is a gift because it is not payment for work or other things and it is freely given.

Now, in Romans 6:23, the word of God says that the wages of sin are death. If death is a wage then it is earned. Certainly we earn death (eternal death or hell is meant) when we come before God and are still in our sins. Sin is disobedience to the laws of God. It is rebellion to his will. Remember the words of the dying thief who said that he had earned all his pain and his suffering was a just recompense? In the same manner are we paid in death and eternal agony which is the wages of our sins.

The same verse also says that the "gift" of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ. Then can we rightly say that we are given eternal life for things that we have done? God says that it is a gift. Then if it is a gift, it is not earned; for if it were then would it not be "wages" or recompense? Everlasting life is a gift given by God himself through Jesus Christ. It is by acceptance of the sin atonement that we are given the gift. It is not earned and indeed cannot be because

the Lords thoughts are not our thoughts; neither are his ways our ways. Then the lesson should be clear. While we earn destruction we are given life. While one is a wage, the other is a gift. Through Jesus Christ we receive the remission of sin and the gift of eternal life.

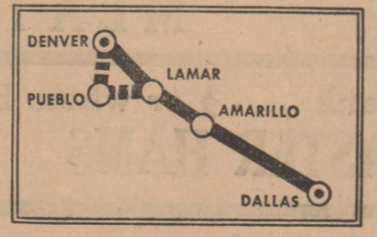

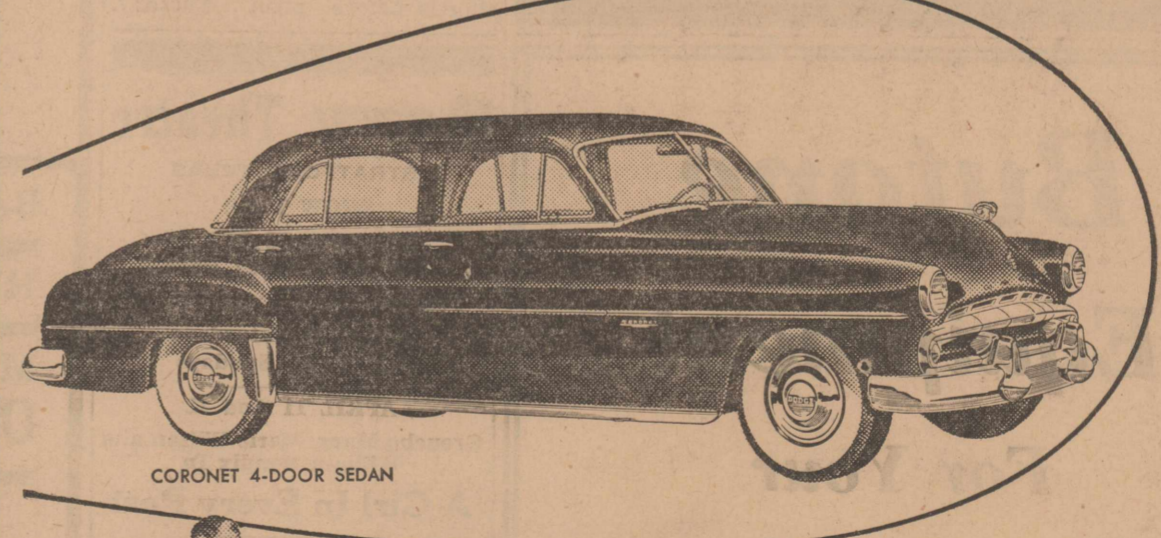

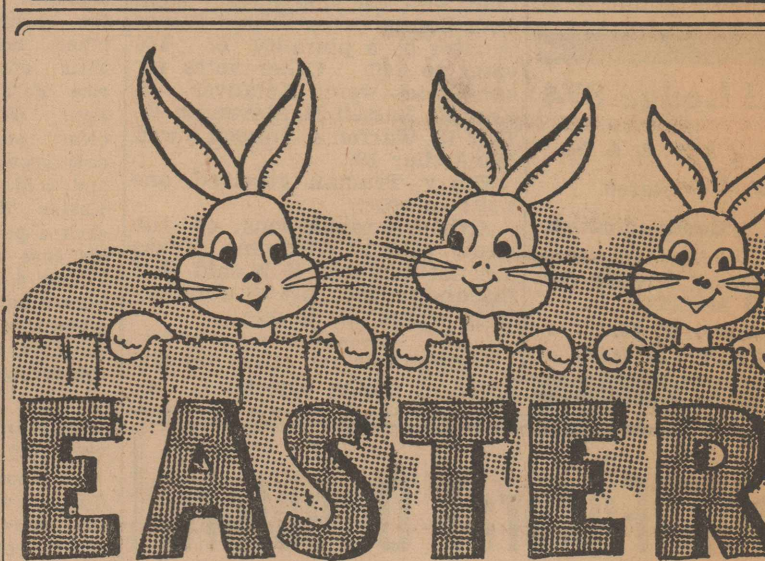

"I REMEMBER" BY THE OLD TIMERS

From L. C. Baldwin, Fulton, N.Y.: I remember the winter of 1898 at Altona, Col. We lived right in the Rocky mountains, altitude 7900 feet, and that winter the house we lived in — which was an old tollgate house — was completely covered with snow.

From Mrs. L. E. Kavanaugh, Noneset, Ill.: I remember back when my mother baked all our bread. It was started Friday evening after supper and put in a warm place for the night. In the morning the big bread pan was full to the very top. By 10 or 11 o'clock there would be lined up on the kitchen table eight or 10 big golden loaves of bread, a coffee cake, biscuits and biscuits for dinner. If I live forever, I'll never forget the smell of that delicious home-made bread.

From Leo Bolles, Laceyville, Pa.: I remember when foot peddlers, carrying packets of trinkets, were common visitors through this rural region. Especially two such gentlemen at my home. Each declared he was a native of Germany who had left the fatherland to escape military service, then compulsory.

From Mrs. Robert Myers, Corvallis, Mont.: I remember the first Fourth of July fire works I ever saw. Balls of twine were soaked in kerosene then lighted and thrown by a group of young men from one to another in the town square. The throwers wore leather gloves furnished by the town merchants.

From Mrs. H. G. King, Elkins, W. Va.: I remember when we made black shoe polish with lamp black, soot from the globe of a kerosene lamp chimney. We mixed it with hog lard to a soft paste. Ladies did not dare to go to church with the toes out of their shoes.
