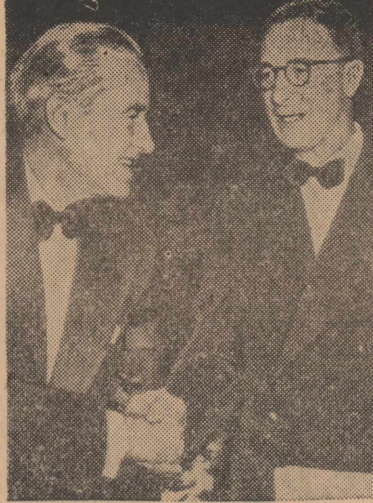

**Easy Does It**

**IF YOUR RANGE** has aluminum burners, wipe with a damp cloth after each use. For burned foods, use a metal cleaner. Chromium burners should be cleaned with a damp cloth, also.

Enameled burners on gas ranges need cleaning as soon as any food spills on them. If allowed to remain, it becomes difficult to remove.

A soft brush is best for cleaning the coils on an electric range. On the closed units a damp cloth or a brush are indicated, never some sharp instrument.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Potato Pancakes O'Brien**  
(Makes 8)

1 egg, slightly beaten  
3 tablespoons flour  
3/4 cup milk  
2 tablespoons each, minced onion, green pepper, and pimiento  
Salt and pepper to taste  
2 cups (firmly packed) grated raw potatoes.

Mix eggs and flour until smooth; stir in milk; add remaining ingredients. (Peel and grate potatoes just before adding to batter to prevent their darkening). Drop mixture in circles (3/4 cup each) on well greased griddle. Bake over medium heat about 5 minutes on each side, or until potatoes are tender. These are delicious with pot roast or with ham or bacon and eggs for breakfast.

If food spills in an oven, try to get it out immediately with a pancake turner or a similar instrument. When the oven has cooled, scrub with brush and use scouring powder. Leave the oven door open until dry, so that no burned food odor or cleaner odor will remain.

Freezing unit pans and trays from the refrigerator should be removed and washed in hot soapy water, then rinsed well. The same applies to racks and shelves.

The inside of the refrigerator is best washed with cool water in which one tablespoon of borax or baking soda has been dissolved. Rinse with a clean damp cloth and wipe dry. This all helps to cut down odors.

**Ideal Enlistment**

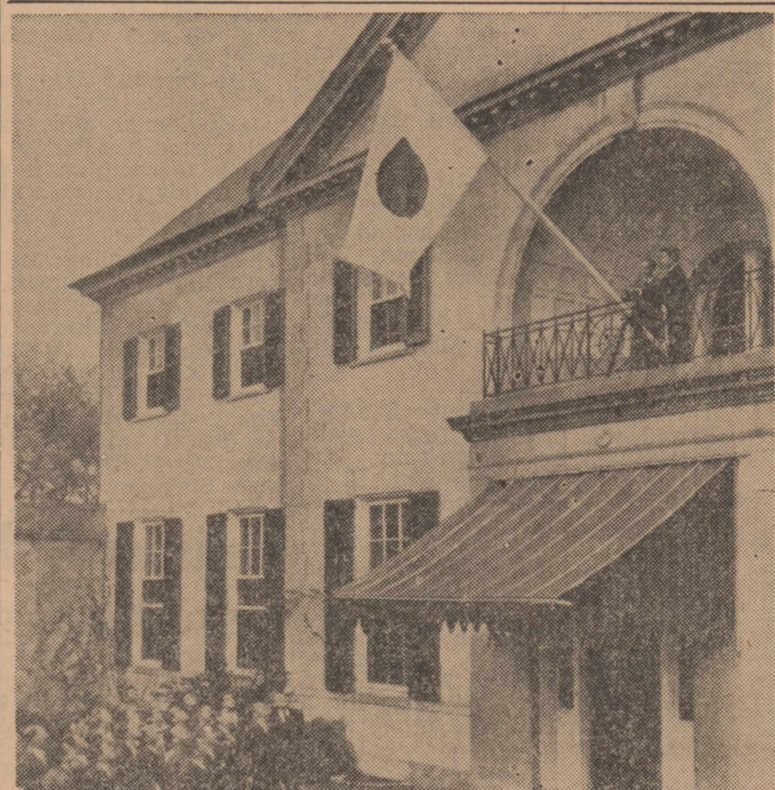

**Safety When Canning**

Be careful when canning, the next accident may be yours. During canning season the kitchen is the busiest place in the house, so remember to be careful.

Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, says some of these accidents, especially burns, can be avoided if you will follow a few simple precautions. She suggests that you lift the lids of pans and pressure canners away from you so the steam will not come into your face. Be sure the handles on pots and pans are turned so the handles do not stick out from the stove, this prevents knocking the equipment off. Have pot holders that are thick and dry. Jar tongs are a convenient piece of canning equipment. They will permit you to lift jars out of the canner without danger of scalding.

Miss King advises a careful check of the canner before it is used. Give special care to the pet cock, safety valve and lugs to see that they are in working order.

And last but not least, have some other place for the children to play other than the kitchen, when canning is in process.

**Cup Towels Versus Draining**

If you are one of those home makers that prefer to dry your dishes and glass wear use towels that absorb water quickly. Miss Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent, says special toweling may be bought.

This toweling usually comes in colored checks and is lintless. The agent advises a towel long enough to dry both inside and outside of the glasses or plates at the same time, this will prevent leaving finger prints. A cup towel 28 inches long after shrinking is long enough for the tallest lemonade or ice tea glasses.

As a work simplification suggestion, the agent says it cuts downs on laundry and is more sanitary when you drain your glasses and china. You'll be surprised to see how the glasses sparkle when the scalding and draining method is used.

### Cloud Seeding To Continue Until June 1

The death sentence on the rain-increasing program of the

OTK Weather Improvement association was postponed for two weeks by joint action between Dr. Krick's cloud-seeding organization and the OTK Board of Directors at a meeting in Guymon Thursday afternoon.

Representatives of Dr. Krick's organization agreed to continue seeding until June 1 thus allow-

ing two more weeks for supporters of the program to raise the balance of the \$80,000 necessary to continue the cloud-seeding experiments another year.

Counties in which attempts are being made to secure funds for a 1952-53 cloudseeding program are Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford, Sherman, Dallam, and Hartley in Texas; Cimarron, Texas and Harper in Oklahoma; and Seward county, Kansas.

Most Directors felt the cloud-seeding statement of Nobel Prize Winning Dr. Irving Langmuir which appeared on the front page of most of the metropolitan press Thursday, would be of considerable assistance in raising the balance of the money.

All county chairmen pledged renewed effort toward securing the necessary funds and agreed to help each other in this worthwhile community enterprise.

It was pointed out that the best support seemed to be coming from the many small operators and that many contributions were coming from people who did not pay last year.

All interested individuals are requested to send their contributions to the OTK Director residing in their county. The OTK Directors are: R. M. Lemon, Booker, Texas; J. C. Holmes, Laverne, Oklahoma; L. R. Connor, Farnsworth, Texas; Wm. F. D. Etling, Gruver, Texas; R. C. Buckles, Stratford, Texas; H. C. Hitch, Jr., Guymon, Oklahoma; Carl D. Etling, Boise City, Oklahoma; Asa Willis, Texline, Texas; and Fred M. Finch, Dalhart, Texas.

Of the ten counties in the project, three have met or exceeded their quota, seven have not. Of the Eighty Thousand Dollars needed, \$46,500.00 is now on hand.

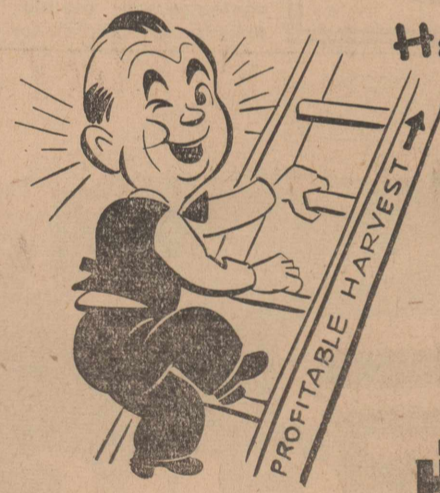

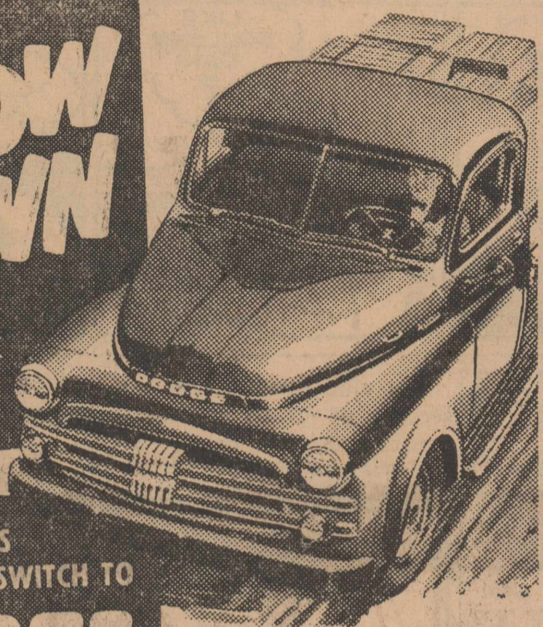

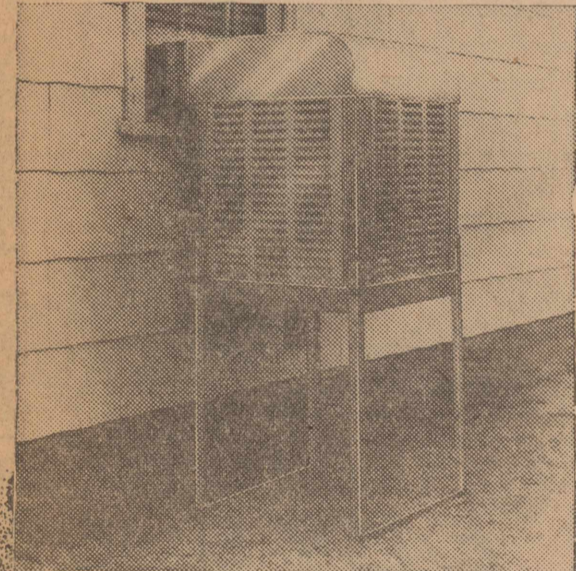

### Popular Recipe

**M**ANY RUG STAINS can be removed easily if you get to them while the stain is still fresh. Clean, lukewarm water sponged into the stain is often all that's needed.

In the case of rug stains where you know just what the stain is, you can treat it more effectively with the proper solvent. For example, if you know it's grease, sponge with cleaning fluid, and work to the center of the stain, to avoid spreading it and also to prevent a ring around it.

#### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

##### Bacon-Noodle Scramble (Serves 4)

- 1/2 pound sliced bacon
  - 2 tablespoons bacon drippings
  - 3 eggs
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 6-ounce package noodles, cooked
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
  - 1/4 cup grated onion
  - 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- Cook bacon slowly and collect fat as it cooks. When cooked, remove bacon from pan. Measure out bacon drippings into pan. Beat eggs, add milk, seasonings and cooked noodles. Cook mixture in drippings until brown, stirring occasionally. Arrange in center of platter and surround with bacon.

When you're using professional liquid cleaners for rugs, or dry powders, use a brush which fits neatly in the hand. A scrubbing brush, purchased and used just for this purpose, is ideal.

For a homemade rug shampoo, dissolve 2 cups detergent or soap in a gallon of water. If desired, add a drop or two of ammonia. Beat to a lather with an egg beater, then apply with a brush or sponge. Wipe off with a damp sponge or piece of terry cloth wrung out in clear, lukewarm water, taking up all soiled lather. Rinse a second time, the same way, then go over area with dry cloth.

Handhooked rugs can be washed successfully at home, either by the above method, or in the washing machine, if they're a small enough size. The same applies to small cotton rugs and mats.

#### Life Into Art

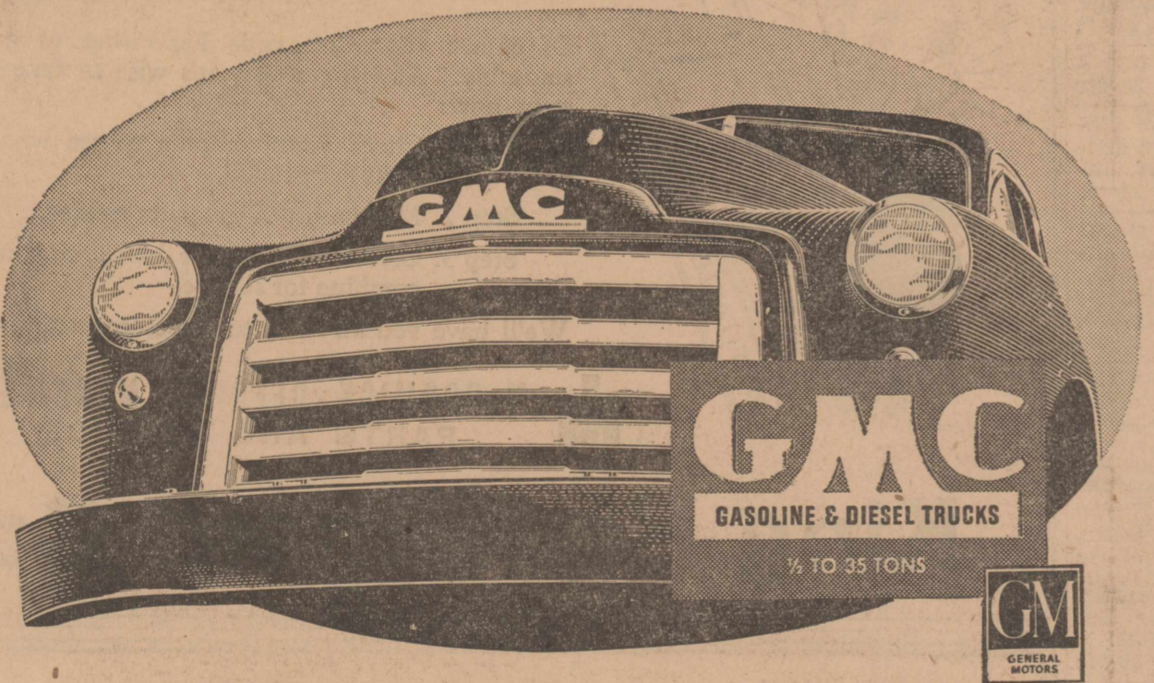

**Rain, Rain, Go Away**  
Rain is a handicap for the big circus. This is not only due to the fact that Jupiter Pluvius cuts down on attendance, but also because rain doubles and triples the immense work of setting up this town-sized traveling performance. The canvas of one "big top" weighs 11 tons dry—and three times as much when wet.

### Bird's Nest Barely Precedes the Egg

**I**F IT WEREN'T for such things as weather and accidents, most birds would be as predictable as the cliff swallows of San Juan Capistrano, which seem to come and go by the calendar and the clock. Or as the puffins of Labrador, which give up a carefree life at sea at a definite time each spring to take up nesting duties ashore.

In general, a bird's behavior—migrating, singing, mating, building a nest, incubating the eggs, feeding the young—is controlled by two major forces, which apparently leave little room for the use of intelligence. These forces are described by Arthur A. Allen, professor of ornithology at Cornell.

There is first, the physiological control from within the body, apparently governed largely by the activity of the bird's pituitary gland. Second is the force from without in the form of what students of bird behavior term "releasers."

Most of the releasers are visual. Dr. Allen says, but many are associated with hearing, and a few are due to the senses of touch and smell. Thus the urge from within to migrate, breed, and so on is not necessarily obeyed unless surroundings look, sound, feel, or possibly even smell right.

Experimentally, autumn has been turned into spring for captive sparrows, crows, pheasants, and other wild species. Gland activity is stimulated by gradually increased doses of light in a manner corresponding to the lengthening days of spring. Hand-reared grouse and quail will actually produce eggs in winter; but birds trapped in the wild do not proceed quite so far, since nest building and egg laying are controlled by releasers which are not so easily supplied.

With song, plumage, and fancy strutting, the male contrives literally to raise the rate of the female's pulse. It is usually the female's job to build the nest. In most species, nest building appears to occupy the six-day period required for forming and developing the first egg. The instinct to build seems to come with the formation of the first yellow yolk.

#### Foils Cement Dust

The dust from cement floors frequently causes trouble. In a cafeteria, for instance, the tread of many feet scuffs up dust which settles on food and counters. Factories complain that cement dust gets into machinery and products. To avoid such difficulties special paints may be obtained that prevent dust and give floors a durable, easily cleaned surface.

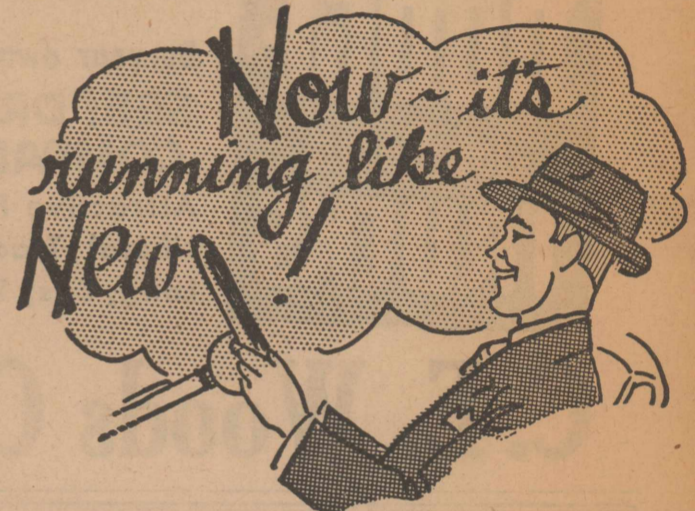

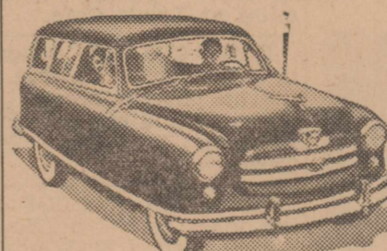

### God and Life

Lesson for May 25, 1952

IF THERE IS any one command-  
ment which Jesus not only did not  
abolish but made far clearer and  
sharper, it is the commandment,  
**Thou shalt not kill.**

By word and act, the Master  
showed that life is sacred. It is  
sacred because we  
are God's children;  
and whatever in-  
jures life, what-  
ever makes it less  
worth living, what-  
ever tempts men to  
do away with their  
own lives, whatever  
shortens life and  
makes it wretched  
and unbearable,  
this violates the  
will of God, this is a form of killing.

Jesus' attitude to disease is a  
case in point. We do not read of a  
single case where he came in con-  
tact with a sick person and urged  
the patient just to be patient. He  
always restored the sick to health;  
sickness in his eyes, is a thing that  
ought not to be.

Now you would think that a murder-  
er would pick out something  
more efficient. Why not a sharp in-  
strument? However, the blunt in-  
strument, whatever it was—a sash-  
weight, a brick or whatever,—did  
the work. A man can be just as  
dead from being hit with a sandbag  
as from being shot with a rifle.

As Simeon Stylites pointed  
out some time ago in the  
"Christian Century," there are  
all kinds of blunt instruments  
besides crowbars, sash-weights  
and bricks. Whatever tends to  
shorten life is a kind of blunt  
instrument; it may take a long  
time to have its effect but if it  
is deadly in the long run, then  
it is deadly, period!

Any sort of habit that cuts down  
one's good health; any carelessness  
or neglect; any stupidity or foolish-  
ness such as driving too fast on a  
wet night; giving way to worries  
and getting indigestion from them;  
these are not un-heard-of ways of  
shortening life. They are, in plain  
language, murderous.

**Alcohol the Killer**  
AS THIS IS the temperance les-  
son, this is a good place to recall  
the fact that alcoholic liquor is a  
too popular deadly weapon.

You have heard of the so-called  
antibodies or phagocytes which are  
in a healthy blood-stream. These  
are the little fighting cells which  
gather around invading germs and  
kill them. Without these in our  
blood we could scarcely survive a  
single day, the air is so full of  
germs which we cannot help tak-  
ing into our throats and lungs.

But alcohol taken internally  
will paralyze these phagocytes  
to such an extent that they are  
no use. This is not to say that a  
single bottle or drink of liquor  
kills all a man's phagocytes at  
once.

But still, as David Starr Jordan,  
president of Leland Stanford Uni-

only God and the devil know.

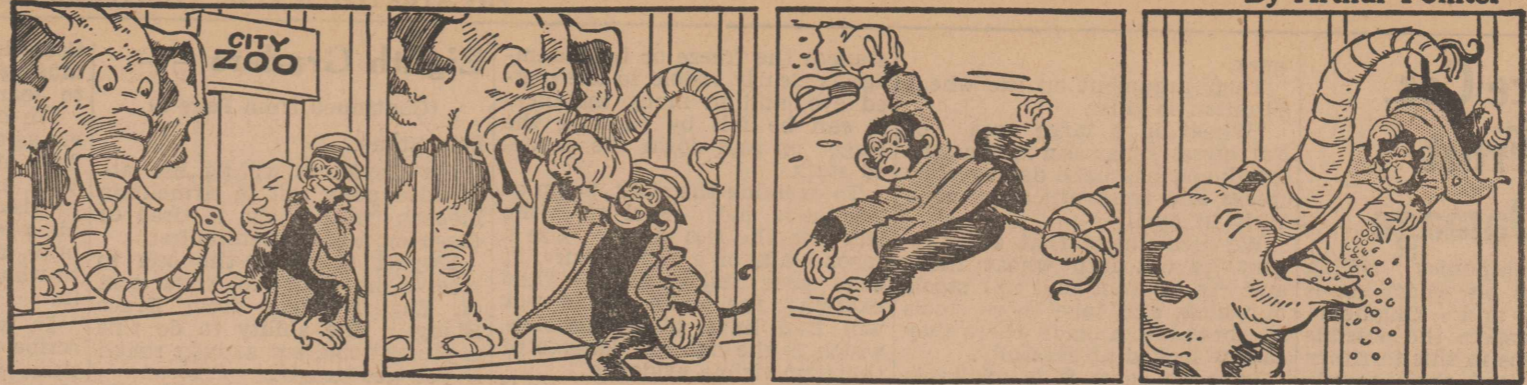
Liquor also creates poverty

people, if sober, might have lived?

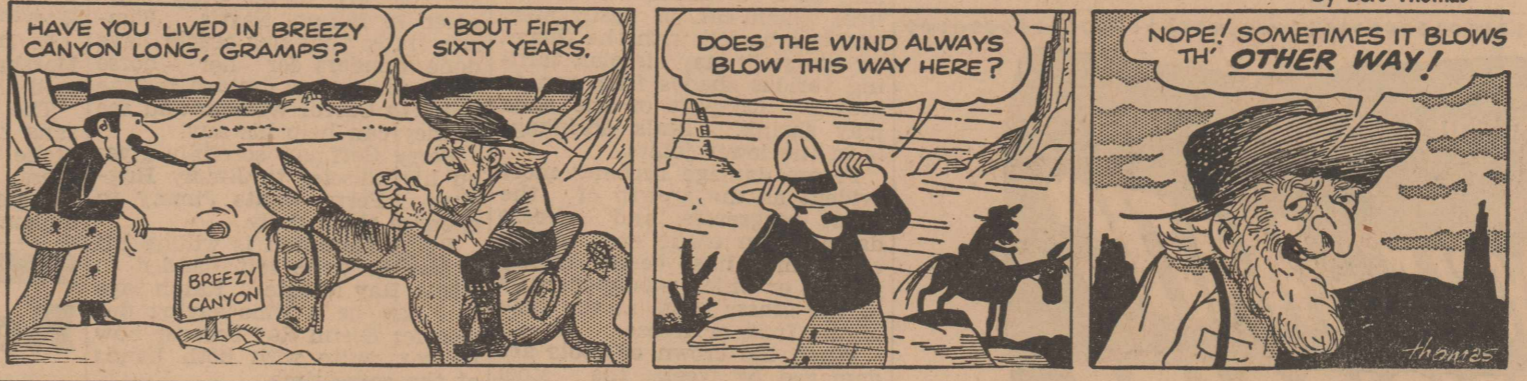

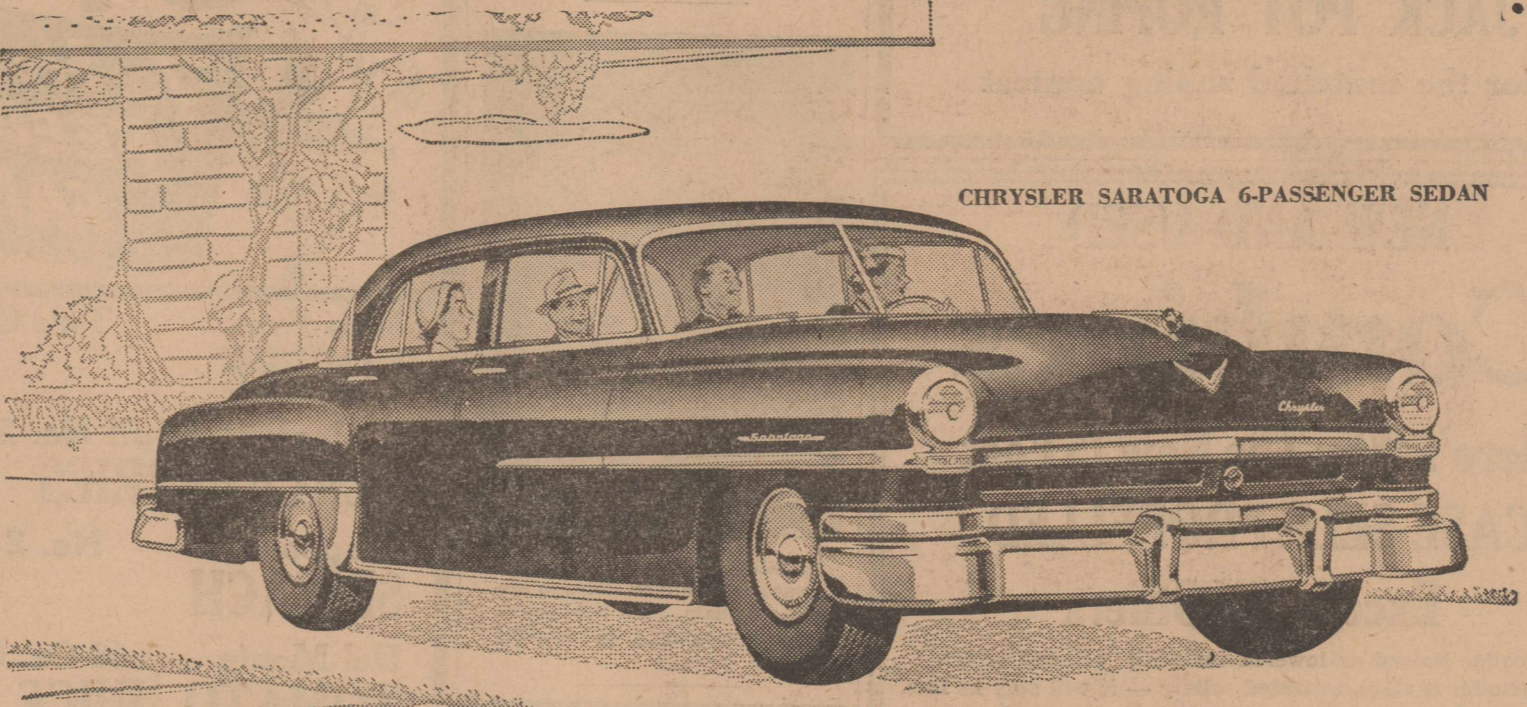

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### Insurance Cos. Expect Frost Wheat Damage

Insurance companies selling hail insurance on wheat crops in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles suspect the possible damage to crops in this territory and have advised their agents to inspect fields before writing policies, it was learned this week.

Their argument on the wheat situation is this: "Wheat in a large area of Northwest Texas and in Western Oklahoma has been damaged by freeze and frost which occurred early in April. We recommend that every agent go out into wheat fields and dig up (not pull up) stools of wheat, and take those stools of wheat into a place where they can be looked at carefully. In some cases it is advisable to use a magnifying glass or reading glass. But in most in-

stances the freeze or frost damage is clearly visible to the naked eye, and in many instances it can be felt by running the finger up and down the exposed stalk. To examine the stalk, begin at the lower end. Peel off the leaf and the leaf sheaf. Use a razor blade or a sharp knife, or even your finger nail. Then examine the stalk. Some you will find have silvery patches, which is the lightest damage or the first visible evidence. Freeze damage makes itself evident in other ways: there may be a surrangement or roughness which can be easily seen, and can be felt with the finger. Or the stalk may discolor, turning various shades from tan to brown. Or part of the stalk may shrink. Stalk shrinkage is in the lower joints.

Freeze damage becomes more evident as the growth of the plant progresses, and freeze damage can ensue even in a crop which has been closely grazed, or which was apparently in the grassy stage at the time of the frost or freeze. When the crown or roots are damaged by freeze, the stool may tiller in the usual way. The stalks will grow up straight and tall, the head will come out in the normal manner, and the head will even bloom. The head may begin to fill out. But as the grains fill into the milky stage, the nodes (commonly called joints) of the stalk will begin to contract and turn black, or the frozen stalk (which has just been described) will begin to deteriorate to the stage where no sap can reach the head.

The grain stops growing, it finally hardens into a small shriveled quarter or half-size grain. The farmer whose field looks like 20 bushels of wheat produces 3 to 5 bushels of wheat to an acre. Sometimes the farmer makes a couple of rounds with his combine, then withdraws from the field disgustedly because the wheat grains are so light that they are blowing out with the chaff.

Frost sometimes attacks only the heads, in which case a part of the head may never fill out, though the remainder of the head may produce grain of fair to good quality. One sign of damaged stalks as well as of frost, after the head emerges, consists of beards which flare out or are tangled looking, instead of straight and parallel as normal beards are. Further, such beards have a peculiar whitish appearance, instead of their customary healthy green.

We are not telling you that wheat in your territory has been damaged by frost or freeze. We are just asking that you go into the fields, secure the samples (including the roots,) examine those samples carefully after peeling down the leaves, and examine the heads, and then make up your mind. Obviously, there is no hail loss to the farmer when hail breaks over a stalk which is already doomed to die before it produces marketable wheat. Neither you nor we want to be embarrassed by a misunderstanding over a loss which may actually have been caused by freeze or frost. Therefore, it may be well for you to discuss the crop condition with your customers before you take his application.

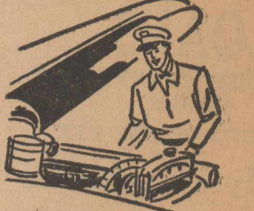

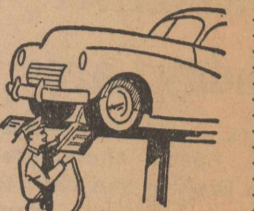

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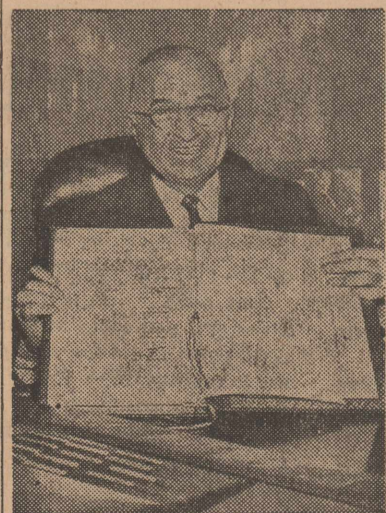
