WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8 Increased yields in Oklahoma and Texas sent the November cotton crop report estimate of the agricultural department up 215,000 bales today above the October 1 estimate. Today's report predicted that 13,-100,000 bales would be harvested in the United States this year, 1.7 per cent more than the estimate of last month. TAMMANY DEFEATED.

The spirit of revolt that has animated the American people and world people for the past three years has at last broken through the intrenched forces of the oldest and most powrful political machine in the country. Tammany Hall, stronghold of democracy and the Irish, invested by popular discontent, and popular indignation at the revelations of the Hofstadter committee as well as the strategy of its eternal foes, has crumbled before the assaults of two independent rival parties. Even the candidate which Tammany spurned has scored a moral victory by taking second place and relegating the organization that would have none of him to third. The big fat boy that Tammany chose was too lackluster, too obviously a tool to compare with the fiery LaGuardia who thinks for himself and the fusion group, and McKee, who also thinks too much for the powers that be. McKee made the nistake, perhaps, of being too obvious with his thinking. Tammany might have welcomed him and possibly won if he had played his earlier role in a minor and more subtle key. 




