

PUTTING DOWN A CARPET

It begins to look as if the Japanese success with its policy of "take first and explain afterward," as demonstrated in the conquest of Manchuria and the establishment of the puppet state of Manchukuo, is beginning to go to the Japanese head. The Japanese system of expansion is something new to modern diplomacy. It is a combination of ruthlessness and conciliation. The ruthlessness is the old spirit of military conquest which modern day internationalism has sought to bring into bad repute; the conciliatory half is a concession to the Christianized world spirit. The Nipponese simply catch the rest of the world not looking and bite off a sizeable chunk of objective. While they leisurely digest the bite, their diplomats suavely explain to startled sister powers that the movement was essential to far eastern peace or the protection of helpless China, and allay foreign office fears with protestations of friendship and international amity. The serious danger with such a policy of pushing forceful expansion on the thin edge of world peace is impatience at home. Sometimes a boastful official does exceed propriety in statements and must be suppressed. The success of initial ventures in Asiatic domination calls for a firm hand upon these outbreaks of national vanity, and the wisdom of the Japanese is seen in the recent change in government personnel which removed from power an aggressive military figure and substituted therefore a man of known pacific temperament.

FUTRELL DEFENDS NAME OF ARKANSAS

Gov. J. M. Futrell of Arkansas is a humanitarian. He never identifies himself with the dark ages or dark age barbarism. He issued an order to the state prison authorities 'to take prison farm convicts out of the traces of cotton planters." He said the mere pulling of a 100-pound planter was not harmful to the convict but the thought that it is the work of a mule suggests that the practice be stopped."

The superintendent of the Arkansas prison farms has an alibi. "A shortage of mules to pull the planters caused him to resort to the substitution of convicts-six of them hitched to each planter with a seventh between the handles.

As usual a leading newspaper of Arkansas launched the crusade against convicts being used as mules as pullers of the iron planters. This was the editorial comment: "Whether or not the work of the human mules at Tucker farm are being required to perform 'is inhuman or not,' it is unquestionably degrading, shameful and one of the worst blows struck at the fair name of Arkansas in years.'

Thomas M. Campbell abrogated the convict lease system of Texas. It was a humane act. Convict labor was not sold to the highest bidder after the coming of the Sage of Palestine. Oscar Branch Colquitt was the successor of Campbell. Colquitt abolished the bull whip and the bull whip was one of the most biting instruments of torture that modern civiliza-
