### President and Hull Due to Talk Over Japanese Situation

#### DR MAY HEAR STATEMENTS OF JAP ENVOY

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 25—President Roosevelt plans to see Secretary Cordell Hull today to discuss the Japanese situation in relation to China as well as other international matters. Beyond the brief statement that the Japanese situation would be discussed, the White House would say nothing more.

It was expected, however, that he would inform Mr. Roosevelt in the course of the conversation yesterday afternoon Under-Secretary of State William Phillips and Japanese foreign minister.

**FRIENDLY INQUIRY**  
TOKYO, April 25 — Foreign Minister Hirota today dismissed as "a friendly inquiry" Great Britain's recent received today, for information regarding Japan's startling declaration of far eastern policy.

At the same time, Hirota said he did not expect to receive representation from the United States ambassador Saito at Washington, had "explained everything" in an informal chat with Acting Secretary of State Wm. Phillips.

Sir Eric Lindley, British ambassador, visited Hirota for an hour today, making his inquiry regarding the Japanese assertion of dominance in the East, if not all Asian affairs. In the last 24 hours the foreign office modified various statements regarding Asian policy, especially one Geneva involving the Philippines, China and other regions.

#### China Assured of Treaty Support

PEIPING, China, April 25.—The negotiators of the nine-power treaty have assured China that they will uphold the treaty and oppose Japanese hegemony in Asia, a government spokesman assured the nation in a radio broadcast tonight.

#### Nefarious Scheme Is Charged Cannon

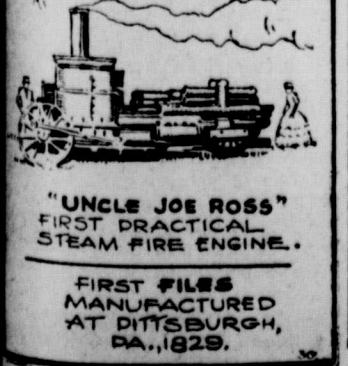
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 25.—Ambassador James Cannon, Jr., and his secretary were charged today with closing arguments before a jury in using a "nefarious scheme" to state the corrupt practices act. Summing up the evidence in this case on conspiracy charges, Asst. U. S. Atty John Wilson, detailed the transaction between the bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, and Miss Ada Burroughs, who acted as treasurer of Cannon's anti-Smith democratic committee.

#### COMMUNITY IS AGAIN DENIED GAS PETITION

ABILENE, April 25 — Community Natural Gas company this afternoon was denied its petition for an injunction in federal court here enabling it to put a "step-rate" schedule of gas charges into effect in the city of Cisco. District Judge Wm. H. Atwell held that the company must exhaust its remedy before the Texas Railroad commission before it could come into federal court. He gave the plaintiffs choice of continuing suit or withdrawing their petition, and the company elected the former, the case being set down for hearing on June 29.

#### Government Workers Increased by Slump

WASHINGTON, April 25. — The number of government employees in 1932 was 3,122,000, representing 104 per cent of the 3,003,000 engaged in 1929. The total includes federal, state, county and city employees, and represents the situation preceding the federal employment relief campaigns during 1933, when millions were employed with public funds.

#### Women Sell Tickets To Palace Theater

#### U. S. Fleet Passes Canal in 47 Hours

ABOARD U. S. S. CALIFORNIA, Off Colon, Panama, April 25.—The great battle fleet of the United States rode proudly at anchor at the Atlantic end of the Panama canal today, successful in the greatest test of speed transit from ocean to ocean in history. The entire fleet of 110 vessels passed through from the Pacific in exactly 47 hours, while ships of many nations waited at either end of the canal that cuts the western hemisphere in half.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 25 — Credit relief to the average salary or wage earner was the object today of an effort at the capital to round out the recovery drive by helping the "little fellow" as well as the nation's basic industries.

#### Public Schools Are Retained in Rating

The Cisco public schools retain for next year their high rating on the accredited list of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Supt. R. N. Cluck has been informed by J. W. O'Banion, chairman of the Texas committee. The association at its annual meeting, voted without reservation to retain the local schools on the list. Mr. O'Banion said.

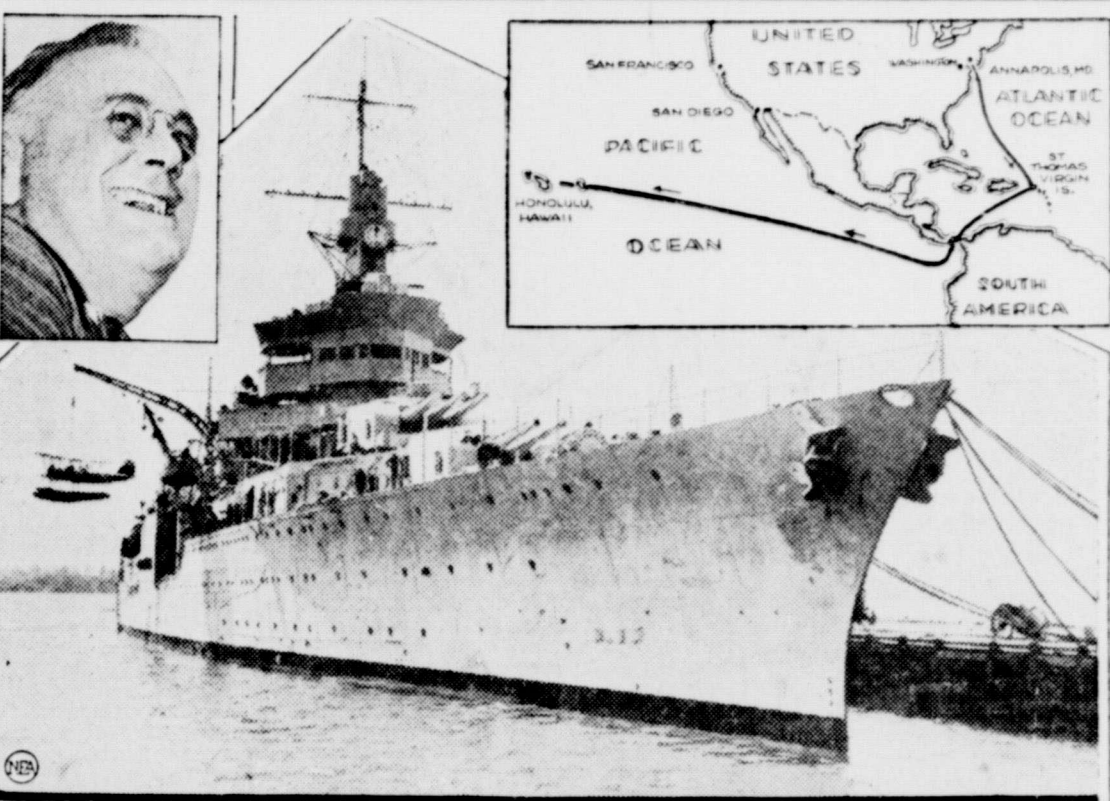
#### Believes 3rd Suspect Has Made Escape

C., April 25 — Cotton producers holding approximately 12,000 outstanding cotton options contracts issued in connection with the 1933 acreage reduction plan were warned today by the agricultural adjustment administration that these options must be exercised, either directly or by placing the balance represented in the cotton option pool, before May 1. If these outstanding options are not exercised or extended, before the expiration date, holders would stand to

All letters requesting extension should include information as to the state and county in which the producer holds the option, and the serial number of the contract.

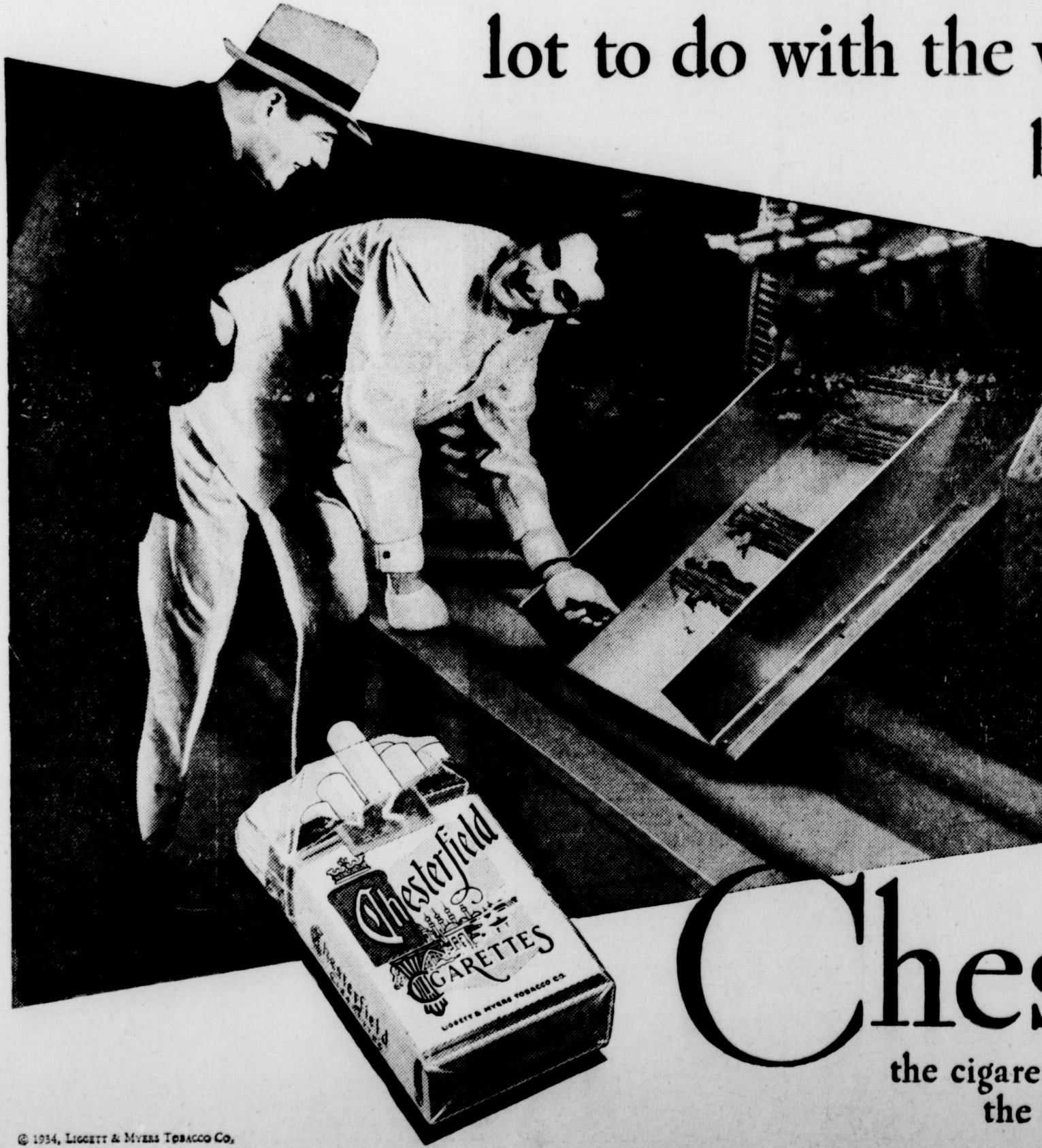
