SOUTH VIEWS NEWSPRINT AS NEW INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 ombined findings of the U.S. Forest Service and an expert chemist may form the basis for a huge new industry in the South-manufacture of newsprint from Southern Pine.

The forest service is taking a cenus of national timber resources and up to Oct. 1 had covered more than 100,000,000 acres in Southern state: much of it in pine acreas.

Dr. Charles H. Herty, chemist and . 11 To wilt. research scientist, is working with Georgia on a co-operative project suitability Southern Pine for making news-

Experiment Advancing

Dr. Herty is said to be well-along in his experiment. The Department of Agriculture's forest products laberatory at Madison, Wis., is doing

work along the same lines. If Herty's project succeeds, groups interested in establishing the industry can employ the forest service census to determine the availability and location of suitable Southern Pine forests. The latter survey, how. ever, will not be competed for four or five years, officials said. If emergency funds are withdrawn and the forest service is required to fall back on the original, \$3,000,000 appropriation for this work it might

not be finished in 20 years. 
