Worley's Video Is Cisco CofC Business Of The Week

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce Business of the Week is Worley's Video, located at 1001 West 8th, in Cisco.

Worley's is open from 1:00 to 8:00 p.m., Monday thru Saturday. The business is owned by Hazel Worley, but it is a family operated

Joy said they have a little over 500 videos to rent out to their customers. They also sell blank cassette tapes and some computer supplies.

Sanitation Rate Hike To Become Effective Sept. 1

City of Cisco manager Mike Moore asked the City Council members to consider raising the Cisco Sanitation Collection rates to help create revenue for Cisco at their regular meeting held Tuesday night at City Hall. The rates will be raised \$2.00 and will become effective September 1, 1987.

Mr. Moore told the council members that the additional revenue created by the rate hike is essential to the City of Cisco. He also stressed that the rate increase will effect nearly everyone in Cisco, not just property owners.

Mike said this increase will create a cash flow coming into the City of Cisco each month, instead of just once a year as it happens with taxes.

Council members and City Manager Moore also discussed the reading of the proposed annual budget for the fiscal year, from October 1, 1987 to September 30, 1988.

Mike Moore said the new budget is \$73,000 less than that of last year. Mike said that even with the sales tax increase that was approved

by the State of Texas and other increases, Cisco will receive \$8,000 less in sales taxes than they have in the past. Mike said the oil revenue to the City of Cisco is down from \$33,000 to \$5,000.

He added that the City of Cisco will receive the same level of services as they did in 1986 with this budget. Mike said since there were cuts made in 1986, this year's budget was projected to meet with these same cuts.

Mike said the main cuts will be in maintenance. He said the street seal coating will be cut and the city employees will work more on grading roads and keeping the same level of roadwork that Cisco now has.

Mike said minor improvements will be made to the park when necessary and most of the major expense will be given to the waste water treatment plant.

In other matters, the council members approved an ordinance of the City of Cisco, establishing the tax levy for the 1987-88 budget year of Cisco. Mike asked the council members to declare an

emergency for this ordinance so there will be time to have the tax statement to be prepared.

In another report to the council, Mike Moore said the new Wastewater Treatment Plant has encountered some problems due to soil erosion. He said there is not enough grass cover to prevent this erosion. There has been \$10,500 worth of damages and this has to be taken care of before the plant can be finished.

Mike said he is in touch with the contractor in charge of the job and will keep the council informed of the situation.

Council members agreed to postpone the next regular council meeting till Thursday, August 27, 1987, at 6:00 p.m.

City Manager Mike Moore requested this change of date, due to the fact that he will be in Austin on Monday and Tuesday, August 24 and 25 to attend the West Texas Utilities Rate Case. Mike said he has taken a real strong interest in this case.

Mike said WTU is due a rate increase since the com-

pletion of the Oklaunion station. He is on the Public Utility Committee and if the members of the committee are not there to intervene then WTU could have a substantial higher rate than what they should have.

Mike said, "If the WTU rate hike passes, this will sink us. The cities need to be there to say, no, we can't afford this. If we are not there representing our town then we will get stuck with it and we just can't afford it."

In other action, Mayor Joe Wheatley asked the council members and City Manager Moore to agree to let contractors or other builders pick up a permit to have free access to the city dumping ground. Mayor Wheatley said this permit would be for those people who are rebuilding homes or doing other construction work in Cisco.

All of the council members and Mr. Moore agreed to this proposal. Mayor Wheatley

said he would let these contractors know about this permit. There will be no charge for this permit. The permits may be picked up during regular business hours at City Hall, located at 116 West 7th.

Council members attending the meeting were Allen Masters, Arlie Whitley, Roy Dennis, Bural Chambers and John Muller. Also attending were Mayor Joe Wheatley, City Manager Mike Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

There were two citizens from Cisco attending the meeting.

Cisco Is One Of Many Bidding For Center

Cisco is among a dozen or more cities in the Methodist Church's Central Texas Conference area who are bidding for the Aldersgate Enrichment Center, a residential community, that will be built in the next few years. Manager Don Shepard of the Chamber of Commerce told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon.

A selection committee of the conference will be in Cisco on August 28th to in-

spect a proposed site that will be offered to the church for the project, Mr. Shepard said.

The Center is a project of men of the Central Texas church conference and plans call for spending \$4,000,000 on construction the first year and an additional \$2,000,000 per year for the next four years on the project that will serve mildly and moderately retarded adults who are not ill but who can be trained to be self-sufficient.

Church officials estimate that some 120 persons will be employed by the Center, which will include 18 to 20 residences for workers plus housing for residents.

The CofC is making a proposal with the view of bringing the project to Cisco, Mr. Shepard said. He pointed out that plans call for the Center to have facilities to train residents for gainful employment.

The CofC proposal will compete with other cities on the list that the selection committee will visit. President Roy Dennis was in charge of the program and introduced Mr. Shepard.

Lion Andrew Sheppard of Cross Plains was a guest.

Two years ago the Scranton Community Center became in need of a new water supply. The members of the community met and elected a committee to study and try to obtain water. Nelson Geist, chairman, Van Chambers, Woodard McCulloch, and Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Bailey were elected to serve on the committee.

Contributions were received to pay for this project and four test holes were drilled on the center site but not enough water was found to supply the center. Approximately \$2,250 was spent on this project. R. D. Boland spent numerous hours work-

ing on this project with the committee. Another source was found in May, when the chairman went to the West-bound Water Board and obtained a permit to extend the line to the Community Center, the Scranton Cemetery, at the expense of the center, and two residents who were in need of water (Mrs. Neva Horn and Tim Gosnell). Money was raised at the 100th anniversary of the Scranton Exes to help defray the expense for the center. Some \$1,320 was raised at that time.

Many segments have made it possible. There were those who decreed that it would not founder as an entertainment center, and these have worked hard to keep the spirit alive. Hard work, dedication not mention generous contributions from near and far have made the restoration possible, and now the final happy time of re-opening possible.

The Connellee Theatre was opened in 1919 when the population of Eastland was about 25,000. It was built by founding father C.U. Connellee, and originally seated about 1,000 and featured travelling vaudeville shows and the very latest - moving pictures. The theatre was a real showcase, and served as an entertainment in North Central Texas.

The Connellee boasted an orchestra pit, trap doors for magic acts, and the very latest in projection with arc lighting. Technology tends to age quickly, however, and in 1946-47, the theatre was completely remodeled and reopened as the Majestic Theatre, under the auspices of Interstate Theatres. It was used mainly for movies and an occasional pageant, until finally the building was closed in 1966.

On January 19, 1987, the citizens of Eastland held a town meeting in the Majestic's auditorium to discuss its restoration and reopening as a civic center.

Earl and Billye Bradley of EBAA Iron of Eastland donated money to buy the theatre fixtures, including projection equipment and sets, and Dr. Jim Whit-

tington and family of Ft. Worth gave Eastland half of the building itself, while the city paid for the other half.

A non-profit group, the Eastland Fine Arts Association, was organized to take charge of the project, and committees were formed to plan and execute the renovation and develop a production schedule.

Rev. Carl Braugh Finds 'Human Tooth' At Glen Rose Pauluxy River

The Rev. Carl Braugh, a Baptist minister from Dublin, Texas, and brother of Peggy Roberts of Cisco, recently took what he says is a human tooth to the Balcones lab in Austin for identification. The Rev. Braugh who is an avowed creationist has been excavating through layers of limestone along the Pauluxy River near Glen Rose, Texas for five years. He said the human tooth, that is 7.9 millimeters wide was found June 16 while he and others were searching for human tracks.

"Implications of this discovery (the human tooth) are far-reaching. Being found in scientific context with dinosaur tracks, it essentially disrupts the evolutionary geologic column and reconstructs our concepts of life origins in favor of creationism," said Braugh.

Baugh said he took the specimen to the lab, which is associated with the University of Texas at Austin, before he officially announced his find as human.

"I took the tooth along with other teeth to the laboratory for identification and basically they (technicians) were stumped about what the tooth was, and they could not rule out that it could be human," Braugh said.

Local Citizens Have Fun In San Antonio Festival

The 16th annual Texas Folklife Festival is supposed to provide an educational setting where traditional activities of pioneer Texans can be demonstrated.

The Cisco Civic League appreciates the intention of the festival and started teaching children in the small town 100 miles west of Fort Worth that children of yesteryear did not have many of today's luxuries.

The group of 14 men and

women, which is here for its tenth or eleventh festival, is demonstrating rushlights and hoecakes as they were made in the state's early days.

"Today's children just flip a switch for a light," said Yvonne McMillan, past president of the civic league. "We wanted to teach them what children of many years ago had to do."

McMillan said rushlighting is an ancient form of candlemaking. The wick comes from cattails, the fruit of the rush plant that is often found in still water at the edge of streams and lakes.

Tallow for rushlights is a by-product of animal slaughtering and uses fat from around the heart, lungs and kidney areas. The fat is fried and the grease is strained to remove all impurities. It is later put to boil in water for one hour. The boiled grease makes tallow, which is heated over a double boiler.

The wick is then dipped into the tallow. Twenty or more dips will make a candle or rushlight. The number of dips determines the size of the candle.

"This requires little talent. We do other pioneer things like make hoe cakes and bread," McMillan said. "When we expressed interest in coming here, the festival people told us no one was doing rushlighting and asked us to do it."

Hoecakes date back to when the pilgrims landed in this country. The recipe includes cornmeal, salt, boiling water and lard.

McMillan said many of the children in Cisco now better appreciate history and understand how times have changed.

"We enjoy coming here every year," she said. "I think this is a wonderful thing San Antonio is doing. It helps retain the culture."

ORDINANCE NO. 0-87-5

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO ESTABLISHING THE TAX LEVY FOR THE 1987-88 BUDGET YEAR OF CISCO, TEXAS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That for the budget year of 1987-88 there is hereby levied on all of the property located in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the first day of January, 1987 and not exempted from taxation by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas, an ad valorem tax of \$.55 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100 per cent of the assessed market value of such property for the purposes listed below, such tax to be apportioned as follows:

\$.55 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100 per cent of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the current expenses thereof.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 3. The City Council, in order to provide adequate time to prepare tax statements for 1987-88, declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.

I've Been Wrong Before

Years ago, maybe 20 or more, I used to go with the preacher on Sunday afternoon to visit and hold services at the jail for anyone who cared to participate. Along with the praying I liked to hand out a candy bar or pack of smokes and maybe they felt more like someone cared more than just talking. With changing preachers or many other things to do I quit. I don't even remember when or why.

A couple of years ago I saw a man I knew trimming the lawn at the jail and later visited but without the old time hand shake. We talked through glass. I offered to get him some candy because he said he felt underfed. However, I learned that you can't give them anything direct. You leave money for their account and they buy what they want from the jail store.

Now I hear that another man I know is inside looking out. So I went to visit but it was the wrong day. So I went back on the right day but was told I could only see him if I was on his approved list of visitors. Again I left disappointed. Times sure do change. NO I DO NOT INTEND TO CONTACT THE ACLU.

I understand that there have to be rules. Exceptions cause everybody to want to be treated exceptionally. So we try to live with rules even when some seem like so much Mickey Mouse intended for nothing but to make life more miserable. As if it wasn't miserable enough already.

Given the potential for breaks, hostage taking etc. it is a wonder we used to be permitted into the cell block. Understanding that prisoners have been slipped dope in candy or cigarette packages even the restriction on direct delivery of such is understandable. I have seen pictures of strings soaked in dope, book bindings and pages laced with narcotics etc. until it is small wonder that most prisons only permit books sent directly from publishers. Then again, considering the moral level of some printers one might think trusting them was risky to say the least.

I believe that Texas prisons restricted who could even write to prisoners at some joints. But the worst Mickey Mouse regulation I knew of was in Louisiana where they rejected any and all clippings from news papers. I never figured the slightest sense in that. You could write the prisoner what the paper said verbatim and even give him all the details in the funnies even it took many pages but NO CLIPPINGS. Now if you figure the sense in that one please let me know.

It seems the prisoner was carrying on a propaganda campaign in hopes of influencing public opinion in his favor so the Louisiana prison authorities severely restricted the amount of paper, envelopes and stamps he could receive.

However, they could in no wise restrict the amount of these things if his attorney delivered them on the claim that they were needed in working out an appeal. However, the strongest regarding materials and activities is that many prisons which permit pornography and practice of Jewish, Budist, Hindu and Black Muslim religions refuse to permit literature and practice of Identity religion. Maybe I should not be surprised at that after all because no bigotry is so violent as religious bigotry and nobody calls

another a biggot as quickly as one who is himself bigotted.

A few people are certain they will never have friends or kin in jail or prison. We only hope they are right in that. However, there are those who turn away from anyone who stumbles into the poils of law. Maybe they think that the last people worthy of being visited in prison were those in Bible times.

Funny thing about it is that I never read anything say I should only visit the in cent. So the only reason I don't visit or write more often is lazy, too busy thinking about my own problems, or not putting forth a bit of effort to learn of anyone who might want to hear from anyone on the outside.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I am scheduled to go in to the hospital next month. I am afraid I will have to pay more than last time as I do not understand the Prospective Payment System. Please help!

ANSWER: To set your mind at ease the law requires hospitals to accept Medicare payments as payments in full and prohibits them from billing you for anything except the deductive \$520 and such items as TV. Just remember the Prospective Payment is a fixed charge and has no relationship to the cost of length of time you stay in the hospital.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, my mother is a victim of Alzheimer's disease. We are at our wits ends in knowing

how to care for her. Can you advise you?

ANSWER: Alzheimer causes two victims to become involved, the person who has the disease and the person(s) who are the caretakers. The disease was classified or diagnosed as "old age" or "sensitivity". Specialized doctors have found both may be untrue. It is a disease that is no respecter of economic status, intelligence or age. I would suggest you get in contact with the Alzheimer Chapter c/o West Texas Rehabilitation Center, 4601 Hartford Street, Abilene, Texas or the Alzheimer Hotline 1-800-432-3515.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, my daughter became divorced and her husband, by court order, got my grandson. Now my former son-in-law will not let me see the little boy. Is there anything I can do?

ANSWER: There are 50 states in the USA and must be that many laws (some silent) in regard to your problem. There is a magazine that gives information regarding the problem: "Out Front" 50 PLUS, 850 Third Avenue, N.Y., N.Y. 10022.

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

County Dispatch Equipment Needs Improving, Officers Say

The Eastland County Cooperative Police Dispatch needs to replace most of its equipment, according to reports at the Dispatch Board meeting last Wednesday afternoon.

The meeting was attended by Chief Dispatcher Bob Mercer, Board members, Sheriff Don Underwood, Eastland Police Chief Lyndall Underwood, Ranger Police Chief Charles Edwards and Texas Ranger Gene Kea.

Mercer said few improvements have been made since the County began handling emergency calls 12 years ago.

County Sheriff Don Underwood and Eastland Police Chief Lyndall Underwood stated there was a critical need for immediate improvements.

It is difficult to understand messages and transmit them to the surrounding towns on the present equipment, they

said.

The suggestion was made that \$13,000 now held in reserve be applied on new equipment. This money is in a Savings Account set aside to pay line fees for teletype services, should these ever be assessed.

Board members asked that Mercer and Chief Lyndall Underwood draw up specifications for improvements, and send these plans to various radio manufacturers.

Representatives from several of these companies

will be asked to meet with the Dispatch Board at the September meeting. A decision will be made on whether to purchase equipment for cash - or to enter into a lease-purchase plan.

During the meeting Board members also voted to raise fees on Answering Services to \$220 per month. This new rate will begin Oct. 1.

The new Dispatch Budget, expected to be signed in September, gives a 5 cent per hour salary raise for each year the Dispatcher has worked.

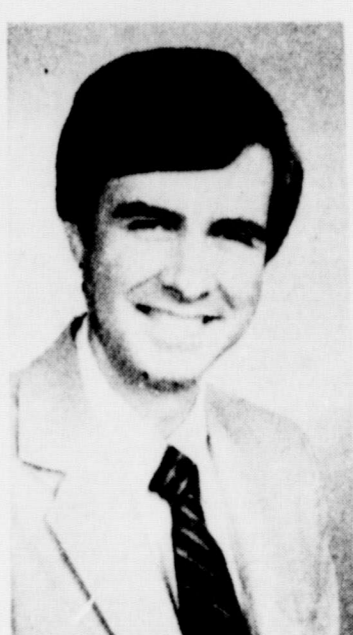

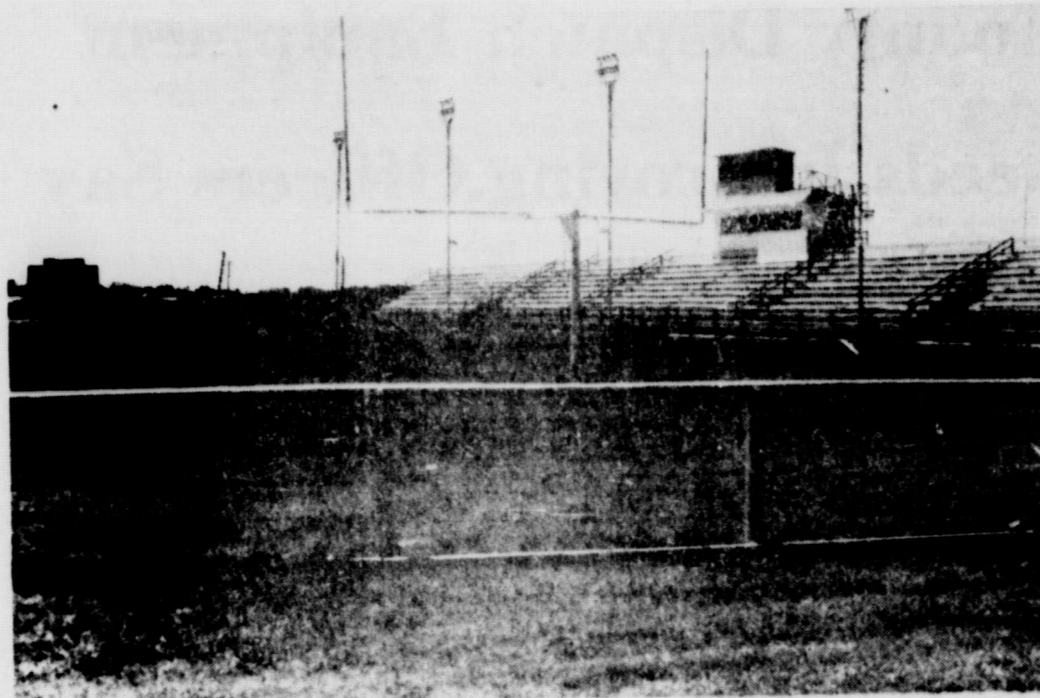

A total of 172 people attended the Cisco Senior Center and helped to honor E. F. "Chief" Bender celebrate his 90th birthday.

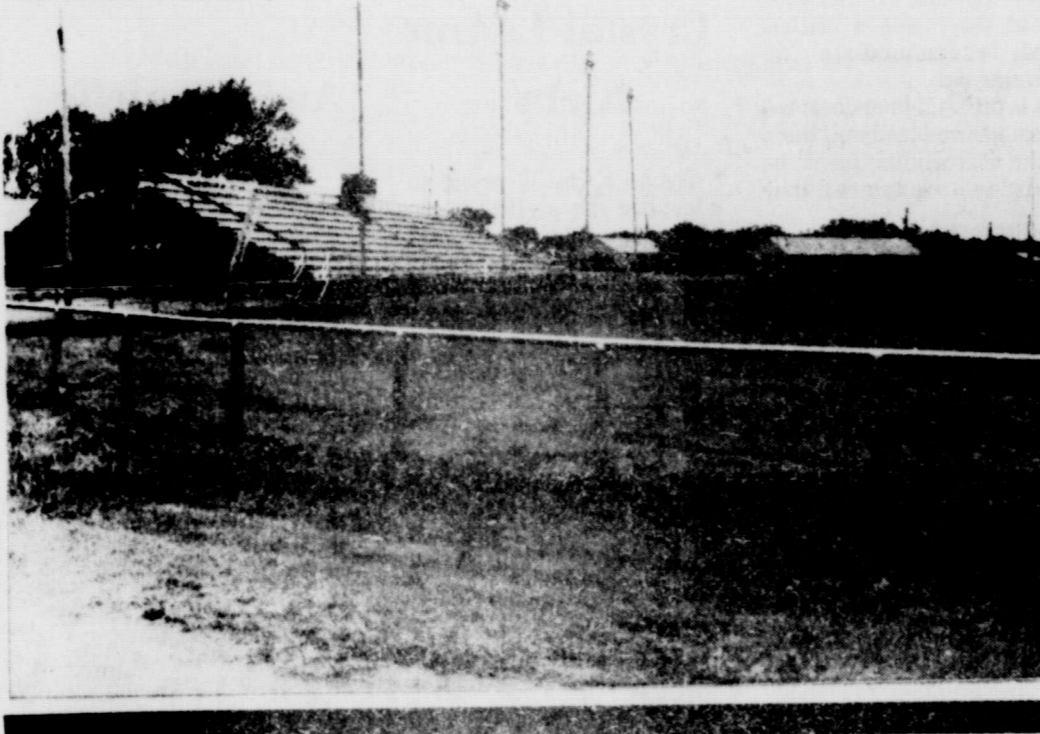
Mr. Bender was born in Belleville, Illinois. He served in the U.S. Army during World War I. He came to

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Critical Needs Here Too

Eastland County people are familiar with stories of poverty and hunger in other places. Many have contributed funds to assist the needy around the world.

Last Thursday, in a meeting at the First Baptist Church in Eastland, citizens were informed that similar conditions exist right here in the county.

The meeting was called to gather information about the food, clothing and job needs of the community, and discuss how resources could be pooled to meet these needs.

Persons attending were Becky Johnson of Abilene, Regional Volunteer Specialist with the Texas Department of Human Services, Eastland Department of Human Services personnel Nanette Keith, Casey Dawson and Martha Knowles.

Also present were Jean White, representing County Judge Bailey's office, Mary Dunn, Vista worker with the Multipurpose Center, Donald Hughes, representing Goodfellows, the Rev. Wesley A. Howard Jr. pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Eastland, Dr. Robert Jeffress, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Eastland, and Viola Payne, representing the Eastland County Newspapers.

The discussion was led out by Nanette Keith, who told how the amount of people in need had increased rapidly during the past year or two. She spoke of the efforts to meet these needs at the Department of Human Services.

"There is no way we can do everything," she said. "We need community involvement - things you can offer to people who need help."

"Of course there are those who have lived this way for years - made it a way of life," she continued. "But many others have had a drastic change in their lives. They have lost their jobs - have nothing to fall back on."

She spoke of "Children unattended and roaming around" and how she saw hungry children in her office while the parents filled out long forms.

Other Human Services workers added comments on the needs they came in contact with. They mentioned that most families in real troubled were single-parent households.

Becky Johnson said that Eastland County had 1,000 persons on food stamps more than a year ago, and that the figure was undoubtedly higher now. She said that volunteers were needed in the local Department of Human Services offices, and left leaflets with job descriptions.

She had several suggestions for helping meet the needs of the county. One was to pool county resources and open a center with volunteer workers.

During the discussion Pastors Howard and Jeffress told of the critical needs of people who came to them. The Rev. Howard mentioned the need for food, and money for transients who are stranded here. Donald Hughes spoke of people who came to the Goodfellows with more needs than this organization could fill.

Mary Dunn told of the services offered at the Multipurpose Center, including a food pantry. "The food situation is critical," she said. "There is not enough food to go around."

"We need jobs in this county," she continued. "People come here, looking for jobs."

"Maybe food baskets could be set up in all the Churches, where people could donate when they come to worship. That would really help us."

She said that persons wishing to donate could also bring food, or clothing, right to the Multipurpose Center at 204 N. Lamar in Eastland.

Jean White said she hoped that help for the needy could be made a county-wide thing. Others also expressed the opinion that a clearing-house of county resources was needed. Several

remarked that this would be a great type of Christian outreach.

Nanette Keith passed out cards and asked people to list the resources of their organization. These will be brought back to the next meeting.

This meeting was set for Thursday, Sept. 17, 12 noon at the Baptist Church, 405 S. Seaman. All interested citizens are urged to attend. Bring a brown-bag lunch if desired. At this time there will be a summing-up of the county resources available.

It is hoped that a number of "Good Samaritians" will come out and help work on these local problems.

LONG BEFORE it was taken over by the army for a secret scientific project, the Pajarito Plateau was home to a succession of Indian cliff dwellers, homesteaders, bean farmers and schoolboys.

Today it's known as Los Alamos, about 35 miles northwest of Santa Fe, N.M., and it could well be a destination point, along with historic Santa Fe, for a vacation get-away.

Los Alamos had always been a "someday-see" wish by our family because of its historic and scientific significance. We saw Oak Ridge, Tenn., in '82, so this visit rounded out that interest.

Project Y was the World War II code name for the laboratory established at Los Alamos to develop the world's first nuclear weapons. It must have been a primitive spot back then, but today it's a town in its own right, and easily accessible.

The Bradbury Science Museum is open to the public and offers a glimpse into the history of that wartime project and also features exhibits reflecting the advanced science and technology of Los Alamos National Laboratory today. We were told that the vast complex does the research, develops the theory, but does no development. The construction and testing is done south at Alamogordo and other test sights.

Models of "fat man" and "little boy" the atomic

bombs first used are on display at the museum, with a lot of others including lifelike statues of Oppenheimer and Gen. Graves, the two principals in the project.

Hosts point out areas of special interest and answers questions. Visitors are free to wander throughout the exhibits to peer through microscopes, align lasers, talk to computers, in a hands-on atmosphere. Exhibits show the latest research in solar, geothermal, laser and magnetic fusion energy. An informative display of the Laboratory weapons research program includes an actual rack of underground nuclear weapons testing and presents an overview of the nation's nuclear arsenal. Other exhibits range from a Geiger counter to a model of an accelerator, one of today's atom smashers.

Films produced at the Laboratory are shown continuously in a small theater. Among them are award-winning features on many different subjects, from computer graphics to geothermal energy. Historical films include rare old footage of some eminent scientists of the twentieth century, many of whom lived and worked at Los Alamos during the war years.

Bandelier National Monument is 20 miles from Los Alamos and encompasses 33,000 acres of ooded mesas and canyons with extensive ruins of an ancient pueblo Indian culture. The monument houses a small museum in which artifacts depict Indian culture from A.D. 1200 to modern pueblo times.

In Los Alamos proper there's also a museum showing early culture and replicas of scenes from Los Alamos Ranch School days and the Laboratory's wartime era.

The boy's school was shut down in preparation for the scientific work, and the last

year's work, and the last year's work compressed into a few months.

SANTA FE AND VICINITY BARRIO DE ANALCO HISTORIC DISTRICT NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK - One of the nation's oldest European settlements, this barrio, or district, was founded in the 1620s across the Santa Fe River from the side of town where prominent officials and citizens lived. Characterized by numerous examples of adobe construction, which merged Indian and Spanish building styles, the barrio continues to be an active working-class neighborhood.

PALACE OF THE GOVERNORS NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK, north size of the plaza - The oldest public building in the United States was erected in 1610 by Governor Pedro de Peralta, who established Santa Fe as the capital of the Spanish Southwest. The building served as the Spanish seat of government for more than 2 centuries, except for the period of the Pueblo Rebellion of 1680 when the palace was seized by Indians and occupied until the reconquest in 1693. In 1821 the Mexican government took over the palace for official business. General Stephen Watts Kearny raised the American flag at the building during the Mexican War of 1846. It subsequently houses 22 U.S. territorial governors. Today the palace has been restored and contains a museum devoted to the history of New Mexico.

SANTA FE PLAZA NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK-This historical heart of Santa Fe, founded as the Spanish capital of New Mexico in 1610 and the oldest seat of government in the United States, was the terminus of the Old Santa Fe Trail. The plaza is associated with such landmarks as the Palace of the Governors and the nearby Mission of San Miguel, which was begun in 1610 and is one of the oldest churches in the country.

Ted Kirby Finalist For Beautification Award

Establishing a profusion of wildflowers along Interstate 20 in Eastland County has led to some innovative harvesting methods for Joe T. (Ted) Kirby.

The state highway maintenance construction foreman's erosion control efforts and successes with his invention of the "Bonnet Bin" seed harvester are being recognized this year. Kirby was chosen as one of six finalists for the 1987 Lady Bird Johnson Award for highway beautification.

Each year, the former first lady presents a plaque and \$1,000 to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation maintenance supervisor judged to have done the best job of beautifying roadsides under his care. A runner-up also will be chosen, and he will receive a certificate and a \$500 cash award.

Kirby's main goal in beautification is to seed every slope of the 40 miles of the I-20 across Eastland County with Indian paintbrush and bluebonnets. To hasten nature's seeding process, the 19-year highway department veteran built a bin form discarded signs, which he fills with whole plants that have been harvested from areas of abundance. The "Bonnet Bin" holds about 64 square feet of bluebonnet plants, sits in the sun, and is stirred once a day, allowing the plants air and sun to prevent molding.

The seeds pop from the pods and drop to a tarp spread under the bin. The "Bonnet Bin" will yield about 15 pounds of seed, or half a tow sack full, which Kirby hangs from the ceiling of the maintenance shed to wait for fall planting. After the first frost, he sows the seed at selected sites and

covers them with light soil.

The method, Kirby admits, may be a bit more trouble than sowing the seeds as soon as they are harvested in the summer, but success is guaranteed. Birds don't eat the seeds, and an early frost doesn't ruin the tender young plants.

Proper planning and scheduling of mowing, along with an erosion control program in the sandy soils of Eastland County, has resulted in miles and miles of wildflowers. Kirby also oversees an aggressive program to transplant small

trees to roadside parks to provide welcome shade for travelers.

Award finalists and their spouses will be Mrs. Johnson's guests at ceremonies and a luncheon at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park at Stonewall on Oct. 6. An award also will be given to the highway department district judged to have done the best job of enhancing the natural beauty along its highways. Another award will be presented for preserving and propagating colorful fall foliage.

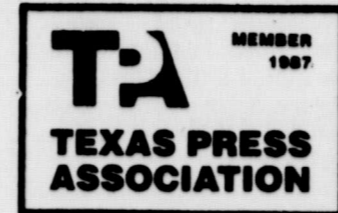

Fishing Outdoors

Tommy Maynard and Terry Wilson will be competing in the Lone Star Bass Classic on Lake Twin Buttes August 13, 14, 15 and 16.

Tommy and Terry are considered as dabblers. Meaning they fish in the middle of cover where those real lunkers live. We wish these gentlemen good luck in their quest to obtain the title for 1987 West Texas Team Champions.

TRANSDUCER INSTALLATION - THE KEY TO GOOD PERFORMANCE

Fishermen using depth sounders can expect maximum performance from their units only if they have their equipment properly installed. Installing the depth sounder itself is a simple operation. Anyone capable of drilling four holes can easily mount the control head bracket.

The most critical step in sonar equipment installation is properly mounting the transducer. This small accessory actually sends and receives the ultra-sonic signal, therefore, its location is of vital importance to the operator.

Also, since depth sounders are designed to perform a number of operations, it is important that the application of the particular unit be determined prior to any installation procedures.

For instance, some units are installed for the purpose of achieving a reading at speeds in excess of 75 miles per hour. To accomplish this, care must be taken to assure the transducer be positioned away from excess air bubbles caused by turbulence from the hull. Humminbird's High Speed Transducer is the first of its type efficiently designed to give good high speed opera-

tion with a transom mount. Its design actually forces air bubbles away from the face of the transducer to insure good, high speed operation, even on aluminum hulls.

This high speed transducer works equally well when installed inside the hull of a fiberglass boat. Figure A shows the recommended location for such an installation.

Since shooting through the hull will affect the sensitivity of some depth sounders, the recommended installation for maximum sensitivity is outside the hull. The newly designed "high speed" transducer will provide excellent readings on the outside of most hulls, including aluminum when installed as shown in Figure B.

The face of this transducer is actually positioned approximately 1/4 inch below the hull to avoid the air bubbles created by various hull configurations.

Serious fishermen who operate a bow mounted depth sounder experience the best performance from their unit with the transducer installed on the foot of the trolling motor. Again, maximum sensitivity is realized anytime the trolling motor is placed in operation. (Figure C).

Because most modern fishing boats are designed with a "Deep V" bow configuration, it is not recommended that the transducer for the bow mounted unit be placed inside the hull. In order to reach an area where the transducer signal would shoot perpendicular to the bottom, it would be necessary to position the transducer several feet

behind the bow, thus defeating the purpose of the front depth sounder. Units small enough to fit on the bow and designed for shallow water fishing perform best with this mount. Included are the Super Thirty II flasher, LCR 3004, LCR 4000 and LCR 4 ID.

Perhaps the most versatile transducer of all it is the portable model. This transducer is identical to the "high speed" model shown in Figure B. The major difference is the mounting bracket which is equipped with a heavy-duty suction cup. This method of mounting allows the transducer to be installed and removed easily from the boat and is generally used in conjunction with a portable depth sounder.

Because the suction cup is not designed for high speed operation, it is suggested that slow or idle speeds be maintained while this system is in operation. (Figure D). It is also important to secure the cable in the event the suction cup comes loose. This will prevent damage to the transducer or the prop and avoid pulling the portable unit overboard.

The portable transducer also offers winter time anglers the option of using their portable units while ice fishing. A small amount of moisture on the surface of the ice is all that's necessary to achieve satisfactory performance shooting through the ice, provided no air is trapped between the ice and the water.

Many problems encountered by depth sounder operators can be traced to improperly mounted transducers. It is highly recommended that a person carefully follow the step-by-step instructions in the operation manuals for installing the transducer.

Transducers mounted outside should be checked regularly and the face cleaned periodically. Dirt, grime or foreign matter on the face of the transducer can reduce the performance of the unit.

Immunization Required By Schools

More than any other preventive health care practice, immunizations begun in childhood and kept current, save money, misery and lives. In the U. S., an estimated \$1 billion are saved annually in would-be medical costs because of immunizations against polio, tetanus, measles, rubella (German measles), mumps and diphtheria.

In Texas proof of vaccinations for these six communicable diseases is required by law for all children registering for day care or public school. In addition, pertussis vaccine is required for children less than 5 years old in day care and public school. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) and the American Academy of Pediatrics recommended pertussis (whooping cough)

vaccine for most children through six years old as well. Wes Hodgson of the TDH Immunization Division, said, "Today's parents of young children are sometimes too young themselves to remember a time when immunizations were neither available nor required. But a few decades ago, outbreaks, and epidemics of killer diseases such as polio and diphtheria

not only threatened every child but were occurring more frequently every year."

Hodgson said because of vaccinations, polio and diphtheria are now rare in Texas. In the past ten years, only six cases of diphtheria and four cases of polio, one of them fatal, were reported in the state.

"What some young parents may not realize is that although outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases are now less frequent in Texas, the diseases can still spread among us. Children are not born immune to these diseases," Hodgson said. "It is important that their parents follow their physicians' advice in scheduling all the necessary vaccinations and boosters, and in keeping accurate records for each child," he added.

Some preventable diseases persist, mainly because parents often do not take them seriously enough to ensure their children's immunizations are up-to-date. In 1986, TDH recorded sporadic outbreaks of measles (396 cases), mumps (239), pertussis (112), rubella (78), and tetanus (12) in the state. Victims included unimmunized children as well as adults who had allowed their own immunizations to lapse.

Hodgson said, "Parents who are not sure that their children's vaccinations are current should begin now to update their records, to be ready for the coming school year. Their family physicians should be able to advise them on any booster shots that are due. Parents who have no family physician, or who cannot afford a private doctor should check with local public health clinics."
