Cisco Is Being Considered For Aldersgate Enrichment Center To Be Built Here

The Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church is seeking a location to establish the Aldersgate Enrichment Center. The purpose of this center will be to provide an independent community for the training of mildly to moderately retarded adults. The purpose of the Aldersgate Enrichment Center is to have an independent community for persons who are trainable and socially adaptable to a lovingly disciplined atmosphere, with the objective to give those persons an opportunity to grow in self-esteem and self-sufficiency, to increase spiritually and religiously, improve their physical condition, and develop vocational skills so that ultimately they may be more comfortable in a world often unkind and not understanding of their handicaps-- either within the established community or in an outside society.

The search for such a location includes 200 acres, more or less, outside a corporate

city, but not too far, a portion of which must lie so that it can be developed into a residential sub-division, with paved, curbed and guttered streets, utilities, etc., ultimately to provide housing for approximately 120 residents, in homes of 6 to 9 persons, about 18 to 20 residences of approximately 1800 to 2000 square feet. In addition, there would be homes for the administrator and some staff. (Some staff would live in the local community away from the center.) Space must be available for warehouses, working buildings, administration building, chapel, service structures, and recreational activities.

This facility will expend \$4 million during the first original year of construction and \$2 million in the community following normal operations. The center will provide approximately 100 to 120 jobs to the community. Cisco Chamber manager Don Shepard said, "The Cisco Chamber of Com-

merce is grateful for the opportunity to make a proposal for this proposed center and we are especially grateful to Rev. Ken Diehm, pastor of the Cisco First United Methodist Church, who made us aware of this proposal."

The site selection committee will be visiting towns in this region for the next couple of weeks searching for

that community that will be receptive to the center and demonstrate support, compassion and understanding for its residents.

Cisco will be visited on Friday, August 28th, by this committee to view the proposed site which borders the eastern city limits of Cisco. The Cisco Industrial Development Committee will accompany the group to

view the site. Civic leaders of Cisco have been invited to meet and become acquainted with the Site Selection Committee at 4 p.m. Friday at a tea to be held at the First United Methodist Church in Cisco.

New Playground Equipment To Be Built By Volunteer Workers

The Cisco PTO will be working with volunteer workers to help build safe and educational playground equipment that is also fun for the students. They will begin the building project on September 12, and will complete the project on September 19. The project

will allow the Cisco Elementary School to have approximately \$40,000.00 worth of equipment for about \$3,000.00. The Cisco PTO raised the \$3,000.00 in its fund raising drives during the last school year.

Letters asking the citizens of Cisco to donate some of

the items the PTO will need will be sent out in the near future. The materials do not necessarily have to be new, since many of the materials that will be donated, can be recycled.

Members of the PTO board reported that if anyone cannot donate any of the building items needed, they can use everyone's help with the work. They will be setting posts on Saturday, September 12, between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. On Friday, September 18, they will work from 5:00 p.m. to dark

and on Saturday, they will build from 8:30 until 6:00. If needed they will work on Sunday, from 1:30 until 5:30 p.m. Everyone is urged to sign up for a work time, even if they are unable to work for the full time.

The playground consultant is Shirley Coleman, of Bronte, Texas. She is the elementary school principal in Bronte.

Shirley is the co-ordinator of the whole thing and will be here in Cisco to help work with the citizens to show everyone how to put the

equipment together. Shirley has worked with 10 elementary schools across Texas to help build playground equipment. Shirley said she likes to do these as fun. She taught at Sul Ross University for two years in playground building.

Shirley is a good friend of Glenda Denison, Cisco Elementary Kindergarten teacher.

Some of the equipment that will be used to build the playground equipment are, back hoe, tractor with post hole digger (60 post holes will be dug on Saturday, September 12), 1/2 inch electric drill, 2 small hand drills, chain saw, circular saws, hand saws, levels, T squares, chalk line and measuring tapes, pipe threader and cutter, 1/2 inch bits-- extra long, counter sink bit-- 1 inch, hammers, screw drivers, wrench and socket set, 5 to 6 heavy extension cords and 2 to 3 splitter boxes, wood chisel and planer, wrenches, cement mixer, shovels, wheel barrow, rakes, hoes, ladder-free standing, bolt and chain cutter. The PTO ask that everyone have their name on their equipment.

CJC To Have Scrimmage Against McMurry Sat.

An inter-squad scrimmage Wednesday afternoon plus a doubleheader scrimmage program Saturday will feature first week activities in the fall football training camp of the Cisco Junior College Wranglers. Coach Rick Frazier reported Monday.

The Saturday program will begin with a scrimmage game between Cisco and McMurry College at Chesley Field in Cisco. The Wranglers will go to Brownwood for a 2:30 p.m. scrimmage with Howard Payne College. The two-day work program will be concluded Friday, and the Wranglers will begin once daily workouts on Monday as the school year begins.

The Wranglers starting lineup is expected to be composed almost entirely of sophomores. The team has some 35 lettermen from last year's team in camp. A total of 127 players had been issued uniforms Monday.

Quarterback duties are expected to be divided between Pike Martin of Springtown and James Darby of Jacksonville, both sophomores. There are three other quarterbacks in camp and John Brayton, freshman from Springtown, has looked promising in initial drills.

Running back for the season's beginning is expected to be Paul Jones, sophomore from Beaumont. The squad includes a dozen

other freshmen plus a few sophomore candidates.

The coaches were reported to be "searching" for a number one fullback. Bill Clark, Irving sophomore, and Pepper Proctor, Kaufman, appeared to be the leading candidates.

Wide receivers looking good include Kevin Evans, 6-4, Fort Worth; Chris Coffee, 6-3, 185 pounds, Dallas, and Gary Palmer, Gilmer. Tight end top prospects include Joe Huff, 6-4, 227, Menard, starter last year, and Stacy Hunter, 6-5, 273, Jacksonville.

Fernando Gonzales, 6-1, 285, El Paso, was the starting center last year and is the leading candidate.

Guards include Terry Grey, 6-2, 285, Klein Oak, and Seaburn Phillips, 5-11, 250, Dallas, sophomore. Leading tackles are Roger Anderson, 6-7, 292, Katy, Cam Pepper, 6-4, 267, Katy, and Kyle Finch, 6-5, 292, Fort Worth.

Eric Edwards of Ocala, Florida, has returned for his sophomore year as the team kicker, and he will handle punting and place kicking. He won all-conference honors last year and was an honorable mention All-American. He led the conference in scoring.

The Library will continue with the children's section and the Summer Reading

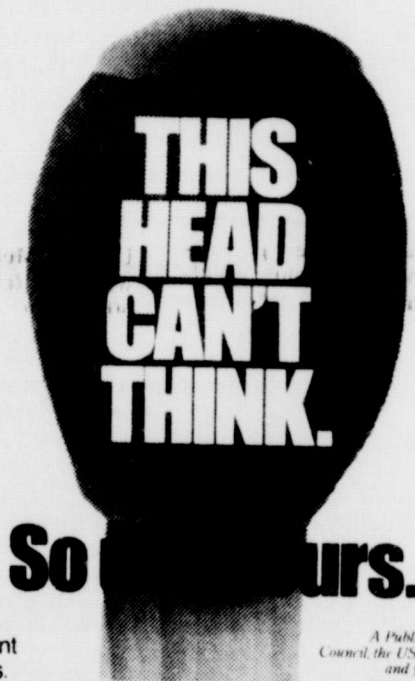
Program. The Literacy program is also continuing, and "English As A Second Language" is planned.

It's been brought to our attention that a native Eastland County girl was at one time a vocalist with Woody's band - and certainly we remember the name: Ela Mae Morse, a legendary blues singer. Scouts report that she started school at Carbon in 1930. She is the daughter of Ann and Elmer Morse, and many may remember.

Some of her songs were "Cow-Bow Boogie," "House of Blue Lights," and "Blacksmith Blues" among others. Seems we remember that she was also with the Earl Bradley Band at one time. She's a cousin of Larue Broussard and Bill Ussery here, and they report that she's now living in California. We might all want to look through our old 78s to see if we don't have some recordings of hers.

We're looking for those who "fell in love" to the music of Herman during the war years, and those who may have listened and/or danced to his music at the big ball rooms which were so popular during the '30s and '40s.

FOLKS in this area can be proud that something is being done about rail-hauled

hazardous material.

The Railroad Commission has posted for comment regulations which would allow the agency to enforce federal hazardous materials standards for railroads in Texas.

Commissioner John Sharp said the action reflects the agency's concern over the increasing number of incidents involving hazardous materials on the state's rail system. "More carloads of hazardous materials roll over Texas rails each year than in any other state," he said. "Our action would step up the pace of safety inspections in Texas and help stem the tide of rail incidents involving hazardous materials."

Under the proposed rules, state inspectors would be able to check railroad operations involving hazardous materials, to include handling and loading, for compliance with federal standards. Violations could be fined up to \$5,000 per viola-

tion, with the Commission seeking prosecution of the violations through the state Attorney General.

"As I said during my campaign, the people of Texas shouldn't have to live in fear of railroad incidents driving them from their homes with dangerous chemicals," Sharp said. "Last year, we had more rail incidents involving hazardous materials than any other state - some 90 percent more than the number two state Illinois." Some 79 percent of the

state's more than 13,000 miles of track carries hazardous materials each year. Commission statistics indicate the state had 146 rail incidents involving hazardous materials in 1986.

"Our record in rail safety enforcement is pretty good," Sharp said. "When we added state inspectors, the rail accident rate in Texas went down. We expect that same kind of success with our hazardous materials inspections."

The Daniels, in cooperation with and organization called World Relief (a subgroup of the Emergency and Refugee Service arm of the National Association of Evangelicals) will spend two months biking from Portland up into Montana and then down through Denver. From Denver they will cut straight across the country to Manassas.

Greg is also the grandson of Opal Edwards and the late Otis Edwards, of Eastland, and the nephew of Ronnie Edwards of Eastland and Shirley Mounce of Eastland.

The Daniels are raising money through pledges made by private individuals. To do this, they have spent nearly as much of their preparation time talking to groups as getting into shape for the 75-80 miles of biking per day.

People sponsor the Daniels by the mile. The average pledge has been about one cent per mile. This may seem like a small amount until one realizes that the Daniels are planning to bike more than 4,200 miles.

The Daniels' parents have been very supportive of their efforts.

All of the funds raised by the Daniels will go towards the animals and supplies, none will be used toward their expenses.

The Daniels left Portland, Ore., on August 3 and will return to Manassas, Va. on October 3.

Ciscoan Remembers France

Seventy years ago United States combat forces landed on French soil and stopped the German drive toward Paris and turned the tide of World War I.

The French Government is holding a year long observance and individual ceremonies commemorating the American Expeditionary Forces entry into the War. And some American veterans are even receiving expense paid trips to France.

A local check didn't turn up anyone on the list for a vacation in France, but Cisco resident Brady Leveridge fought with the American forces in France and received a purple heart a couple of years ago after being wounded on duty in World War I. If anyone else in our area fought in World War I and was wounded, your local newspaper would like to know.

When the United States decided to enter World War I, Brady Leveridge said that his dad read about it in the newspaper and told him (Brady) that it was his duty to join the armed forces. Twenty-one years old at the time, Brady Leveridge said that he wasn't interested in a military career but doing his duty was important.

Wishing to be with the unit that he considered to be the best, Leveridge attempted to join the Marines, but was told that he was three pounds too light for his height. After spending a week or two eating and taking it easy, he returned and was heavy enough.

After basic training at the Wanico, Virginia, Marine Base, Leveridge was shipped on the Henderson, a cattle ship converted to a transport, to the front with the Sixth Regiment, second Division of the Sixth Marines. The trip on the ship took longer than was expected as they had to keep changing course to dodge German submarines.

Once the Marines landed in France it was walk until you drop as they didn't have trucks. Mr. Leveridge said he got so tired, that he didn't care if he was going to be shot or not. There was no cooking, so the men ate hardtack and uncooked rations. There was also no sanitation facilities so the men had to go for long periods without bathing or washing their clothes. The lice became such a problem that they would build campfires and pull their clothes off and hold them over the fires to burn the lice off.

Now 91-years of age, Mr. Leveridge said that he couldn't speak French to communicate with the French people and that he didn't see or pay attention to much of the countryside. They were roughing it and there was no fun at any time.

Once while on guard duty at night, he became confused about the directions and marched into German territory by mistake. Realizing what he had done, Mr. Leveridge said that with the help of God and under cover of darkness he found the way back without being detected.

While on duty in the Bellou

Woods at a village, he possibly was on guard duty but is not sure after seventy years, he heard an artillery gun fire and tried to drop to the ground. But before he could, the shell exploded overhead and a piece of shrapnel went through his jaw. As another soldier had gone by just seconds before, he called out for help as he lay on the ground. The soldier returned and carried him away from the front. The next thing he remembered, he was in a hospital in Vichy, France

recovering from his wound, but he didn't remember much for a while. Mr. Brady Leveridge was one of only thirty-six men from his company who had lived to make the trip home in the make-shift transport ship. He had joined for the duration of the war, so after two years and three days he left the Marine Corps to return to the family farm at Scranton, and as far as he knows he never got to visit Paris.

Mr. Leveridge married Elexia Spralls, who lived across the county line to the west, and they reared a son, Tommy.

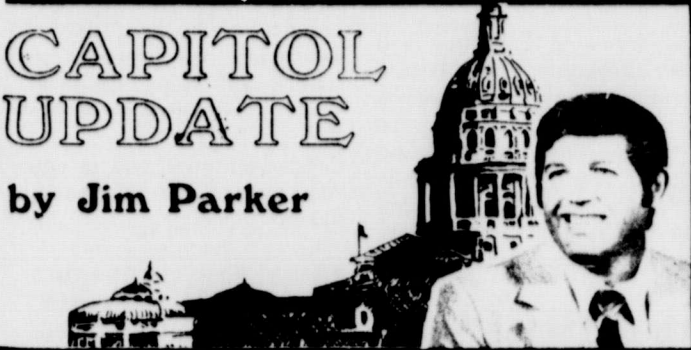
At the age of 91, Mr. Leveridge has outlived his wife, 8 of 9 brothers and sisters, and most of the men he went to France with, but he says that he still feels good. A Methodist, Mr. Leveridge says that he is not afraid to die because of his relationship with God.

And the people of France still remember and appreciate what he did to keep France free.

I want you to think about it and I want you to be informed and realize when you vote to use bond issues to pay for current projects, you are turning away from the historic "pay as you go" approach we Texans have always taken to state government. It may be time for that. I am not saying it's not. What I am saying is that it is a change in the direction of our state and a change in a unique Texas philosophy that we may never regain once it is lost.

Generally speaking, the constitutional amendments we vote on are, in most respects, not of monumental importance; but, I think I can tell you that general obligation bonds that look to future tax revenues of this state for payment and your approval of them may well be the most important constitutional amendment you will ever have the opportunity to vote on.

Please allow me to discuss an issue that I think should be of growing concern to all of us. That is the current trend of issuing bonds to solve our state's financial problems.

By way of background, we have always prided ourselves in this state for having a "pay as you go" clause in our Constitution that prohibits deficit spending. We have been very self satisfied by virtue of the fact that could not accumulate huge deficits like the federal government has done. By and large, we have been able to operate within that "pay as you go" framework.

Now, when faced with the need for huge expenditures in areas such as our prison system, we have proposed, and you will be voting on, a bond issue to fund that pro-

ject. Do not be misled into a misunderstanding of the nature of a bond. A bond is simply an evidence of a debt that has to be paid at some future date. Mechanically, it is not at all different than your going to your local bank, borrowing money and signing a note to pay the money at some future date. Any way you calculate it, it's deficit spending. Quite simply, it is spending money you don't have today against money you expect to receive in the future.

Before we go into the merits of a bond issue, I just want to be sure we all know what a bond truly is. It is a debt.

The merits of the bond issue you are going to be asked to vote on are of the highest order. We desperately need prison space. Even as I am writing this, our prisons are once again closed. Virtually everyone agrees that the construction of prisons is absolutely necessary and I firmly agree with that; my concern is how do we pay for them.

Commissioners Adopt Tax Rate For 1987 During Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners adopted a County Tax Rate of .2806 cents per \$100.00 for 1987 during their meeting Monday. The vote was unanimous.

The 1986 Rate per \$100 of taxable valuation was .229 cents, according to Steve Thomas, head of the Eastland County Appraisal District.

The Appraisal District Office had informed County Judge Scott Bailey that the effective county tax rate for 1987 would be .2725. This had also been published in county newspapers.

County property values were reported to be down \$70 million from 1986, which was one of the factors prompting the rise in rates.

The adopted rate of .2806 will generate about the same amount of income as last year, according to officials. The difficulty is that the County budget requests are about \$300,000 above projected income.

NCSL is a non-profit organization created in January, 1975, to improve the quality, effectiveness and communication of state legislatures. Its members are the legislators of the fifty states and American territories and commonwealths.



Quite a bit of the Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting Monday, Aug. 24 was concerned with taxes and finances, but decisions were also made on other matters.

Sheriff Don Underwood reported that there were 22 prisoners in the jail, with none presently being kept in other counties.

He had carried eight prisoners to the Texas Department of Corrections last week, just before the state stopped admissions due to overcrowding, he said.

Sheriff Underwood also reported that two new jailers had been hired - John Blair of Olden and Fred Hernandez of Eastland.

Other discussions on the jail were held with James Wheeler, an Abilene architect who is working on jail planning. Wheeler said he was considering a 30-position console for the jail Intercom system, and units could be added to this at any time. The equipment is offered by Kay Gee Inc. of San Angelo, a firm which handles Security and Fire Alarms. Further recommendations would be made.

In other business, the Commissioners heard a recommendation from the Wage and Hour Board of the Texas Employment Commission that they pay Alvin Kitchens \$271.60 for working 40 hrs. the first week of Jan. for Pct. 4 Commissioner Billy Bacon.

Kitchens is related to another Pct. 4 employee, and Bacon let him go because of the County's nepotism policy.

Bacon said he would have liked to have kept the employee and used him to train others. He questioned the nepotism policy, saying that he didn't think it would

stand up in court.

Richard Robinson and other officials present stated they thought the policy was a good policy, although it was not being enforced in all Departments. Robinson mentioned a husband and wife who were working at the County Jail.

"If we don't have any authority to make work policies we might as well close up and go to the house," Robinson said.

The Commissioners agreed to pay Kitchens the amount requested, and to discuss the nepotism policy at the next meeting.

In other agenda items, Commissioners approved the purchase of a Telephone Memory attachment for the DPS phone used by the J.P. Court Coordinator. They also approved the same schedule of fees for serving papers as those charged last year by the Sheriff and Constables of the County.

The Commissioners appointed election judges for general and special elections, and approved the firm of Smith, Verett and Parker for an outside audit for 1986-87.

Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, discussed the status of a road on the south side of Lake Leon near Staff. About one-half miles of this roadway needs considerable work, and he questioned whether this was actually county property. Further information will be forthcoming on this matter.

During the morning the Commissioners approved a number of pipeline crossings. Christie Gas Transmission Corp., represented by L.C. Locke, received permission to cross County Road 165 and 426 on Pct. 1 with a pipeline.

Pendragon Oil Co., represented by Kevin DeWoody, was given approval to cross County Rd. 436 in Pct. 1 with pipeline.

Also approved was a request by Fault Oil Co. to cross County Road 484 in Pct. 2 with a pipeline. Richard Dumas represented the Company.

Mattress Fire Causes Lots Of Smoke, Little Sleep At Jail

An inmate in the Eastland County Jail has been spending a few nights in an isolation cell since he set his mattress afire late Friday night. Charles Frank Snelson, who is charged with the armed robbery of the Beskow Jewelry Store in Eastland, was placed in the cell after the incident in which he may be charged with criminal mischief.

Snelson set his mattress on fire about 11:45 p.m. Friday night and when police and fire department personnel arrived thick smoke was pouring from the jail.

All prisoners were moved to the exercise yard while firemen used exhaust fans to remove the thick smoke from the jail. Snelson, who fought officers when he was removed from his cell, spent the two or so hours, handcuffed in the booking cell.

No one was injured during the incident, but Patterson Ambulance personnel administered oxygen to several jail, sheriff, and police persons during the late night and early morning fire.

A trustee, who was cleaning the smoke from Snelson's cell later Saturday

afternoon, had a reaction to the chemicals he was using but suffered no serious injuries.

According to Sheriff Don Underwood, the cell block suffered heavy smoke damage and most likely will not be used for at least one week, which may mean additional prisoners will have to be kept in other jails to ease crowding.

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CISD Approves Budget For 1987-88 School Year

A budget calling for expenditures and income of \$2,932,481 for the 1987-88 school year was approved by the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District at a called meeting Monday night at the new Primary School.

Supt. Ray Saunders told the board that the new budget represents a seven per cent increase over that of the past year. The board delayed setting the tax rate for 1987-88 until after school begins and enrollment figures are available.

In other action, the board approved the 1987-88 student handbook as prepared by administrators, assisted by teachers. The booklet will be printed for distribution to students.

Board members conducted a "walk-through" of the new elementary building and Superintendent Earl McMillan of the Edge-

Gemco Company. Abilene contractors, assured them that the new facilities would be ready when school begins Tuesday, Sept. 1. Capretting was being put down Monday and other finishing work was near completion.

Supt. Saunders reported to the board that everything

was in readiness for the new school year to begin. He noted that enrollment figures would not be available for several days but that they have already determined that kindergarten will enroll 75 students, a substantial increase over last year.

Faculty members have been meeting daily during the past week at the school for in-service training and work. This was to continue through the week.

The board approved advertising for bids to build a new girls dressing room at the high school gym. An of-

ficial bids notice appears elsewhere in The Press. Medical insurance for the coming year was approved by the board.

President Bruce Stovall presided and all members of the board were present along with school administrators.

Sending Toddlers To Nursery School

As other children in the neighborhood head off to day care centers and kindergarten programs, you may wonder if your child isn't missing out or falling behind.

Many parents choose half-day nursery school programs that meet 2-3 times a week to expand their children's experiences and introduce them to the larger world.

"For some children, a nursery school experience can be beneficial, but it's not essential for every child," says Diane Welch, a family life specialist.

Rather than send the child to nursery school because other children are going, she suggests that parents consider what the child will gain from the school experience that isn't obtainable otherwise.

Welch, who is a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, also recommends that parents consider the cost.

Would the child benefit as much if you took a portion of what the tuition would be and spent it directly on the child for specific toys, trips or something else?

"One valid reason to send a child to preschool is to provide the socialization experience of learning how to play with and relate to other children," says the specialist.

She explains that there are several options for providing socialization experience and giving mothers a needed break. They include informal "play groups" that mothers of several toddlers can arrange themselves, "mother's day out" program offered at many churches and the more structured nursery school programs.

"It's ironic that many mothers who left jobs specifically to stay home and care for a preschooler, then worry that their child's education is being held back by being at home," observes Welch.

"The home can offer many enriching opportunities for young children, and the kind

of individual attention they won't get elsewhere. Children do grow and learn in the home, and parents are extremely effective teachers," she emphasizes.

If you decide that your child would benefit from attending a nursery school, the specialist advises carefully investigating a number of programs before choosing one.

Some of the points to consider include the following:

- Are the personnel professionally competent, warm and caring?
- Are the facilities safe and clean?
- Will your child receive nutritious snacks?

"Is there a program appropriate for the age and development of your child or is it more like a baby-sitting service?"

•Are children grouped according to age, with different educational programs for 2-, 3- and 4 year olds?

Several personal visits and talking with the program director can help you decide if sending your child to a preschool would be beneficial." Welch concludes.

Preventing Athletes Foot

Americans spend more than \$150 million each year for the treatment of athlete's foot, when, for most people, a bit of simple prevention could save their itchy feet and relieve their pocketbook, says the Texas Medical Association.

Athlete's foot is easy to acquire. Anyone who has consistently damp, warm conditions in the shoes they wear can get the fungus.

Athlete's foot usually begins in the area between the fourth and fifth toes because it is the tightest, and therefore the warmest, web-space of the foot. It then spreads to the adjacent toes. Affected skin begins to crack, scale, and itch.

Sometimes the sole and side of the foot are affected and become leathery in texture and chalk-like in color. This form of athlete's foot may resist treatment and linger for years.

The key to preventing athlete's foot is keeping the feet dry.

Your choice of shoes has much to do with this. Wear leather shoes instead of

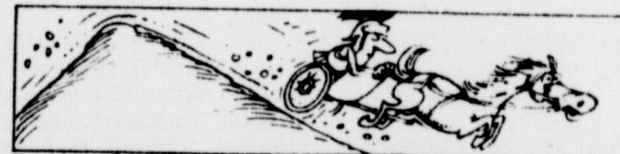
shoes made from synthetic materials like vinyl. Vinyl does not allow the feet to breathe. Select shoes that are well-ventilated. And do not wear the same shoes every day. Alternating pairs gives the interior of the shoes a chance to dry.

Also, wear cotton socks and change them twice a day. And be sure to dry your toes carefully after bathing. Even after following these suggestions, some people will acquire the fungus. Treatment is then necessary.

First, place absorbent material between the toes to allow air circulation and absorb moisture. Cotton works well.

Second, apply talc, dusting powder, or medication to the webs of your toes. Treatment should continue for two weeks beyond the time the foot looks normal.

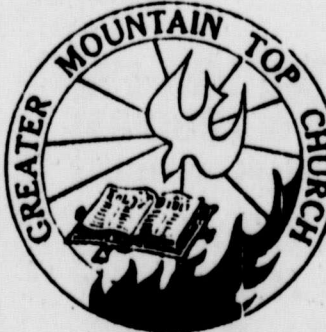
