"The King And I" Is A Play To See

The actors and actresses in the Cisco Junior College summer dinner theatre play, "The King And I" gave a superb presentation, full of laughs, thrills, tears, etcetera, etcetera, etcetera and so forth.

When the King of Siam hears Anna Leonowens, the recently hired school teacher, say "etcetera, etcetera and so forth" while talking, he is very impressed with the words and uses them quite a bit in his conversations. Another phrase he learns and uses a lot is "is a puzzlement."

Thomas Soare, who plays the king, does an outstanding job. He voice projects authority, as befits a king, but those mischievous and little boy looks he has in his eyes while talking to Anna are hilarious. He is also a "Class A" male chauvinist. When the king recites "his type" of poetry to Anna, several of the young men in the audience thought it was very funny, but not too many of the young ladies laughed with them.

Anna has a hard time accepting this attitude, and in one scene really tells the king off, in the privacy of her room. Anna is played by Lanice Griggers.

Stealing the show though, were the children of the king. He had 77 children, but he said he was still young. His wife, concubines and children are played by local talent. His son, Prince Chululongkorn, is played by Zach Thomas of Cisco. The king's youngest child, played by Becky Lewis of Cisco, steals the show by coming in late in one scene.

Moran Woman Injured In Wreck Thurs.

A moran woman was injured in an accident last Thursday morning on Highway 6, about 3 miles north of Cisco. Lena Walker, 81, driver, was traveling north toward Moran, when she ran into the back of a truck owned by the Texas Department of Public Highways.

Ronald Green, Highway employee, said one lane of the road was closed so workers could work on the

road. Green was flagging cars to the side, but apparently the Walker woman did not notice him and ran into the back of a truck that was pouring oil onto the highway. The car hit the back of the truck causing extensive damage to the driver's side.

Dale McFadin, of Cisco who works with the Texas Highway Department, and Charlie Tatum, with Patterson Ambulance helped

pull the steering wheel away from Mrs. Walker so she could be taken to the ambulance.

Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Steve Tone said Walker received a broken arm and nose, a concussion, contusions and abrasions from the accident. She was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital by Patterson Ambulance. She was released Thursday afternoon from Graham, and

was expected to report to her personal physician in Eastland later on.

The Cisco Fire Department was notified that the Jaws of Life might be needed and took the machine to the site of the accident. Patterson's was able to remove Mrs. Walker from the vehicle without the use of the Jaws of Life.

Ted's and Rex's Wrecker Service hauled the wrecked vehicle, a 1980 Pontiac Bonneville, into town.

Local Business Man Explains Eligibility

Editor:
I was pleased to read the article concerning business benefits from the Government in The Cisco Press Thursday, August 4. It is good that some people are finally getting interested in this eligibility for help. I don't think people realize that Eastland County has been eligible for this for years.

We've been listed as a small disadvantaged prime contractor for about 9 years. There's a lot of benefits offered such as SBA money and advice that we have not been interested in taking advantage of. We've had a Government sponsored training program for over 12 years. We've issued journeyman certificates to young men who really wanted to learn.

People don't understand that a small business accor-

ding to the Government is any business that employs less than one thousand people. I don't think Taylor County would be eligible for all of this unless they could get included in a district that would conform to these rules. In other words, General Dynamics could work nine hundred ninety nine people under a separate corporate charter and become eligible to bid on all the small business set-aside. This would include "The Commerce Business Daily." This would be worth a lot of money to G. D. but it won't help Eastland County unless local people get interested. The best place to find out where to get information about this is from your local contractors, which are few in Eastland County. There's one amazing thing about this work, people help each other. Competitor's jealousy is almost non-existent.

The public needs to be convinced that the Federal Government is the largest consumer in the world. Anything people will use, the Government will buy, including arms.

Without public interest, this thing won't be worth anything. I brought in brochures and cards from

several companies that said they were looking at small towns for locations. Our Chamber of Commerce didn't seem to be interested in looking at them.

Any person or persons working on this needs to be commended. With a lot of public interest, this can help everyone, even the retailers. If you have more of the higher paying jobs, you'll have more people capable of spending more money in your stores.

We'd be willing to help anyone in our community with information on how to get into this Government money which we supply with our taxes. A person needs to decide on a product, anything from chickens to missile components. It would be very easy for us to give people information on how to make the contracts.

For health reasons, we turn down several Government solicitations every day.

Remember that you don't have to pay any fees or join any organizations to take advantage of this. If you live in Eastland County, you've been eligible for these benefits for years.

I hope your article will help spur public interest.

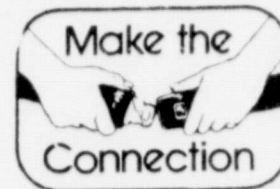

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Fishing Outdoors

"Maintaining Your Outboard"

Boaters with little mechanical aptitude are often intimidated by their outboard motor, thinking it so complex that they must keep their hands off it.

Not so, you should have problems taken care of by an authorized dealer, of course, and you should follow the owner's guide for scheduled maintenance by a dealer. But there are some things you can do yourself that are easy, take little time, and will keep your machine in top operating condition.

Use only oil recommended by the outboard's manufacturer. Don't stint. Saving a few pennies by buying cheaper oil is a poor economy if your five-or-six thousand dollar outboard is inadequately lubricated.

Check for damaged, loose or missing parts; tighten or replace as required. Add lubricant as needed to your gear housing as outlined in your owner's guide. Be careful not to overfill.

Check spark plug leads and electrical leads for damage. Then remove the plugs themselves for inspection; if they are badly fouled or worn, replace them. Make sure the gaskets are in place and put the specified new plugs in. Thread the plugs in by hand until they're finger tight, then tighten an additional quarter turn with a wrench.

Service the fuel filters, guided again by your owner's manual. Replace filters that appear to be contaminated. Then prime the fuel system and check for fuel leaks.

Once a year in fresh water

(every 60 days in salt water areas) pull the prop and lubricate the prop shaft with a product like Quicksilver 24-C. Inspect the prop and replace it if you have a badly bent blade or pieces broken off. Reinstall the prop and tab washer and tighten the prop nut.

Inspect your outboard's trim tab if it has one. Replace it if more than half of it has eroded away. Don't paint a sacrificial trim tab, by the way. It's made to corrode; paint simply interferes with its primary function.

Touch up scratched external surfaces with the primer recommended for your outboard's manufacturer.

Wash down your outboard completely with soap and water.

Possum Kingdom: Water clear; 75 degrees; 12 foot low; blacks good to 6 pounds on worms; white bass very good to 15-30 per string on slabs; striper good to 7 1/2

pounds; crappie slow; catfish slow.

Oak Creek: Water clear; 78 degrees; blacks good to 8 pounds on worms.

Proctor: Water mostly clear; 86 degrees; blacks slow to 4 pounds on jugs.

RULES ADOPTED FOR WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

Regulations for public hunting and other uses of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife management areas (WMAs) were adopted last week, including a significant expansion of the Type II WMA program.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized the changes which will go into effect Sept. 1.

Charles Allen, director of the Wildlife Division, said Type II acreage will be expanded by some 212,000 acres, to bring the total to 660,000 acres. The new acreage included additional lands leased from several forest products industries and some leased from the U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Five former Type I WMAs were transferred into Type II. These are Alabama Creek, Bannister, Caddo, Moore Plantation and North Toledo Bend.

Under the Type II program, holders of \$35 annual permits may hunt on any or all Type II lands during the regular open hunting seasons. Also authorized last week was a new \$10 annual permit for nonconsumptive users, for those who do not hunt or fish. There are exceptions, including provision for gun deer hunters only to be charged the \$35 fee on the Caddo, Moore Plantation, Bannister and Alabama Creek areas. No fee will be charged for other uses of those areas. Gun deer hunts on these four areas will have a later opening than the statewide season.

Type II permits will go on sale at department headquarters and law enforcement field offices around Aug. 15.

The commission also

restricted the use of motorized vehicles to designated roads and camping to designated campsites on Type II lands. It also required all persons to wear hunter orange whenever the hunting of deer is permitted (archery or firearms). Use of buckshot shotgun loads also was prohibited on Type II lands. Nontoxic steel shot loads will be required only on Type II areas that lie within areas designated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as nontoxic shot zones.

Changes for Type I areas in 1988-89 include:

- Addition of a new 200-acre unit (Taormina) to the Las Palomas WMA, and the 5,700-acre Mad Island WMA in Matagorda County.

- Increased the deer bag limit on designated units of the state park system where public hunts are authorized, allowing hunters to harvest two deer.

- Lengthening the season framework for javelina to allow hunts to occur one month earlier.

- Providing for a bighorn sheep hunt by permit on the Sierra Diablo WMA and lands within a bighorn sheep cooperative unit.

- Increasing the quail bag and possession limits to correspond with uniform statewide limits.

"The King And I" Based On Actual Characters And Events

"The King and I" has been one of Broadway's best loved musicals. Not only for the beautiful melodies written by Rodgers and Hammerstein on the pomp and grandeur of the location, but the fact that this musical is based on actual events and people that are included within the show makes it a special show for anyone who experiences it. This also holds true for the people involved in the current CJC production of "The King and I." For Carroll Brown, the director, and four major cast members, this is not their first time to do this particular musical. Each finds something new within the story every time they are involved.

"The King and I" is based on actual characters and events documented by Anna Leonowens in the memories of her experiences with the King of Siam. This King was King Rama IV who came to the throne in 1857. Prior to his ascension, he spent 27 years studying in a

monastery. He was fascinated by Western Civilization and studied the West to great lengths. He constantly studied poetry, novels, history, and art of the West. He was also a great admirer of Abraham Lincoln and Queen Victoria. King Rama IV was a knowledgeable and intellectual person to say the least. Because of his fascination with Queen Victoria, he decided to hire a teacher from England to teach his children English and about the Western civilization. King Rama IV did this only because he wanted to open up his country's eyes to the West and help future generations realize there was another world outside of Siam. He is still thought of by the people of Thailand (Siam) to be "the King responsible for turning the eyes of Siam to the West."

The teacher brought to Siam was Anna Leonowens, a widow with two children. Anna's husband was an officer in Her Majesty's Royal

Army in India, Singapore, and what is now Pakistan. He died while stationed in India leaving behind Anna and their two children, one boy and one girl. Anna applied to the embassy for teaching positions soon after her husband's death. She was then chosen by the King of Siam to teach his children. Anna sent her daughter (who was older than Louis) home to England to go to school.

After arriving in Siam, Anna was kept at the port for three weeks before even meeting the Kralahome (the prime minister), and six months before meeting the King himself. In fact, the first words spoken between Anna and the King are included in the show. Nevertheless, Anna stayed for three years teaching the children and becoming a great confidant to the King. Anna left Siam to visit England, but never returned.

Not only are these characters actual people, but the supporting roles of

the musical were actual people as well. The head wife, Lady Thiang, actually existed in the King's palace. And the arrival of Tuptim as a present from Burma actually also occurred. Not only did these people exist, but the events connected to them in the musical are actual occurrences.

Upon returning from Siam, Anna Leonowens wrote her experiences into a journal which was later discovered by Margaret Landon and turned into a novel entitled "Anna and the King of Siam." It later became a play in Europe entitled "Anna and the King." This play is not well known, but is documented to have been performed in England. This story was then brought to the attention of Hollywood, where it was burned into the movie "Anna and the King of Siam" starring Rex Harrison and Irene Dunne. It later came to the attention of Rodgers and Hammerstein who turned it into the stage hit "The King and I" and later the movie musical by the same name, starring none other than Yul Brynner and Deborah Kerr. In 1986, June Hogue, a patron of CJC Dinner

Theatre, was privileged to visit Thailand. And the position of his guides in the government enabled him to visit the actual palace of King Rama IV. While in the palace, he viewed the private chambers of the King and Queen as well as the Throne Room. These rooms are not open to the public, but Mr. Hogue's luck allowed him inside. There will be a lobby display during the run of the show featuring some pictures of the palace taken by Mr. Hogue.

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Trooper Stops Car - Gets A Confession To Murder

An Eastland highway patrolman got an earful Thursday afternoon when he questioned a motorist who had been stopped in Putnam.

Trooper Steve Foster had earlier been alerted that a blue car with Mississippi license plates was west-bound and driving erratically through Eastland County. Foster spotted the vehicle about 5:15 p.m. Thursday and pulled the vehicle over.

When he approached the vehicle, Foster received a surprise from a 34-year-old

Fayette, Miss., man. "I was just fixing to call the sheriff in Fayette, Miss.," Foster said Nathaniel Frye told him.

Then Frye explained why.

"I was fixing to turn myself in ... I killed my girlfriend. She passed last night," Foster said Frye told him.

Foster said he was shocked.

"Frye was not drunk," Foster said, but added that he found drug paraphernalia in the man's car.

Foster said he ran a check through the Eastland County dispatcher to Mississippi and found that the man was not wanted, according to records. Since he was skeptical about Frye's story, Foster telephoned the sheriff in Fayette, Miss. "Yes we want the man" was the sheriff's reply. Foster said.

Foster said he learned from the telephone conversation Frye and Estelle Oliver had a fight Wednesday night. The sheriff told him that after Oliver was severely beaten.

might help us in times of drought.

First, managing nutrition properly during normal times will keep cattle in better condition so that they don't suffer as quickly when a dry spell hits. Where pasture is still available but low in quality, the following suggestions are made concerning supplementation:

1. Provide a good mineral supplement which will maintain forage intake and efficient utilization. A complete mineral supplement containing 25 to 30% salt, 12% phosphorus, 5% magnesium, 0.17% zinc, and 0.045% copper has worked well in many areas.
2. Feed 1-2 pounds of a high protein supplement to dry cows and possibly as much as 2-3 pound to lactating cows to maintain forage intake and efficient utilization of the forage as well as the energy coming off the cow's back as weight loss. The oil meal supplements such as cottonseed meal, protein blocks, and liquid supplements would be appropriate.
3. If only dry, dormant forage is available for more than 100-200 days, consider supplementing or injecting vitamin A.
4. Hay cut under moisture stress conditions, especially sorghum type hays, may contain high levels of nitrate. If in doubt, it would be good to test for nitrate before feeding such hay, especially before feeding large amounts.
5. Prussic acid or cyanide poisoning can also be a problem in grazing drought stunted plants such as Johnson grass, sorghum, sorghum hybrids, and sudan grass. If forage for hay is allowed to sun cure thoroughly for 3 to 5 days, bleaching out any bright green color, prussic acid should not be a problem.

Gordon Spot

THE GORDON SPOT Peanut growers in Eastland County may now use the fungicide TILT for the control of southern blight in peanuts. The Texas Department of Agriculture has declared a crisis situation for southern blight on peanuts in Texas. They have asked the environmental Protection Agency to grant a "crisis" label for immediate use of Tilt. The request was granted to begin on July 27 and is good for only 15 days. Then the TDA will request a specific exemption to carry through until the Section 18 is granted.

Tilt shall be applied only through overhead sprinkler including center pivot, solid se, or portable (wheel move) irrigation systems. It is to be applied at the rate of 8 fluid ounces per acre per application. Two applications of product are authorized—one at early pegging and a second application at late pegging. Tilt should not be applied

through any type of overhead sprinkler irrigation system without safety valves or other devices to prevent back-siphoning of product into water source. To avoid illegal residues, do not make more than two applications per growing season. Do not feed green vines to domestic livestock, and do not apply within 28 days before harvest. Tilt should not be applied where the water table is less than 50 feet from the land surface and where soils are very permeable. Finally, do not apply where runoff is likely to occur to aquatic habitats.

In research and demonstrations Tilt has been very effective in the control of southern blight and leaf spot. We have it included in two peanut result demonstrations this year. Hopefully, by the time you read this column you will have received rain and some relief from the dry weather. Livestock owners need to be alert to some management practices that

A LOT is being written and said about a new controversial movie which is reportedly scheduled for release this fall.
The film, "The Last Temptation of Christ," is being criticized by many who hold that its purpose is to "blaspheme and re-create Jesus and re-write the Gospel into a confused, bitter tangle that will deface and disguise the historical, Biblical Jesus."
Some have seen the film; others have read parts or all of the script; and there's been a lot of information about the film distributed by those who oppose its showing.
And it would seem that this is another classic example of "caught in the middle." On the one hand, if it is as evil as it is being billed to be by some, then certainly it should be attacked by those who oppose such. But on the other hand, to make any

contrast, income from the IRA is taxable, and since the plan is a life policy, it also provides tax-free, probate-free estate protection for beneficiaries.
It's definitely a turning point for the IRA, a major bank official reports. "About 5.5 million of 27.5 million customers with IRAs will lose their IRA deduction completely, while about 12 million will qualify for a partial deduction. And a survey has shown that as many as 35 per cent of the IRA customers don't plan to contribute to their 1987 IRAs. The hardest hit are the mid to upper-income brackets. They've lost their IRA deduction or have had them severely restricted, Aaron said.
Tax reform has limited the number of people who can claim deductions for IRA contributions. According to the new tax code, taxpayers do not qualify for an IRA

pre-screening by Christian leaders IF the AFA (American Family Association, an organization of Tupelo, MS.) The film company reported reneged on the agreement and AFA and others are now opposing the showing of the film.

Passage of Medicare Health Bill Results in New Tax Implications

The Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act, recently signed into law by President Reagan, will boost Medicare health benefits in 1989 and subsequent years while increasing the tax liability of certain individuals.

"This act is designed to protect older Americans and the disabled from the extensive costs of hospitalization and treatment for serious illnesses," reported Robert Steed, the Eastland County investment representative for Edward D. Jones & Co.

"At the same time, it requires all individuals who are eligible for Medicare and pay federal income taxes to pay a 'supplemental premium,' or surtax, on their federal tax liability," Steed continued.

The amount of the premium, which starts in tax year 1989, increases each year from 1989 through 1993. There will be a ceiling on the premium to limit the amount that each individual must pay. This ceiling will increase from \$800 per person in 1989 to \$1,050 in 1993.

For example, in 1989 the surtax will be \$22.50 for every \$150 of income-tax liability, with a maximum \$800 surtax per person. A married couple eligible for Medicare with \$51,910 in taxable income, after deductions and exemptions, would

pay approximately \$10,667 in federal income tax in 1989. Their supplemental premium would be about \$800 per person, or \$1,600 total, which is the maximum.

A single individual eligible for Medicare who received \$25,000 in net taxable income would pay about \$4,680 in federal income tax. His or her supplemental Medicare premium would be \$702 in 1989.

"Because the surtax is linked to income tax liability," Steed said, "taxpayers affected by the Medicare act would be well-advised to review their tax status. In fact, many tax professionals are recommending their clients position some of their savings in safe, tax-free investments to avoid added tax liability."

The Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act will cover unlimited hospitalization after an annual deductible is met. The old law required individuals to share cost after 60 days in the hospital, and coverage ended after 150 days.

Covered medical services, such as physician and outpatient services, will also increase beginning in January 1990. Further, in 1991 Medicare will pay 50 percent of most outpatient prescription drug costs, and the percentage covered will increase in subsequent years.

New substance against osteoporosis seems to block the body's absorption of newly formed bones. Etidronate sodium seemed to increase average bone density by about 17 percent, say researchers at the University of Colorado.

Cryotherapy, freezing part of the eye to create protective scar tissue, reduces the risk of blindness in certain premature infants. Federal health officials reported on a widespread trial by the National Eye Institute.

More on cirrhosis and other liver disease: in a Toronto test, propylthiouracil, an anti-thyroid drug, doubled the survival rate of alcoholics with cirrhosis.

MRI -- magnetic resonance imaging -- can be used to confirm diagnosis of TMJ, temporomandibular joint syndrome. Procedure is non-invasive and painless, but still expensive, the American Dental Association was told.

Checkup by telephone is perfect for now-and-then arrhythmia, doctors at the Mayo Clinic found. As patient feels a spell coming on, he or she calls the doctor, places an "event transmitter" on the chest, and the phone on the transmitter. Results: instant cardiogram and an on-the-spot diagnosis.

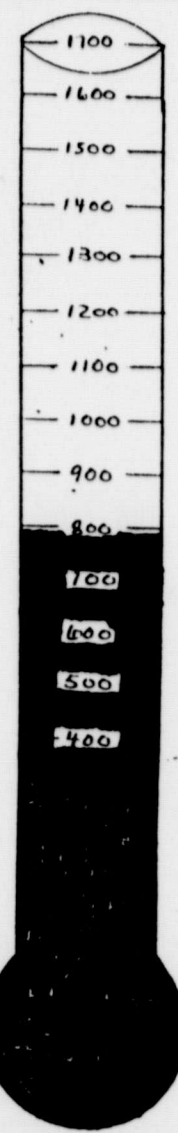

The latest report on the Jail Standards and Compliance will be given to the Commissioners. In related matters, an increase allowance for Juvenile Detention will be requested. Adult and Juvenile Probation matters will also be discussed.

There will be a request by B.L. Files for the paving of a road.

The meeting is expected to conclude with a Budget Conference and other budgetary matters.

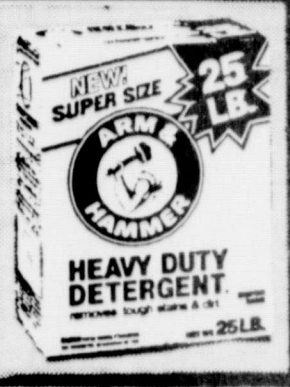

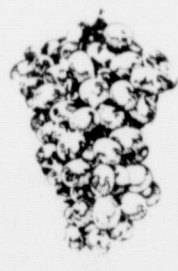
