#### Mince Meat Pies Play An Important Part In The Menu At Christmas Time

Although few people today know it, the pie represents the cradle of the Christ Child surrounded by the gifts of the Magi. It was made originally in oval form, to symbolize the cradle, and the varied ingredients were the gifts.

At one time mince-meat pie was banned, and at still another time in its history, it was the cause of Christmas itself being abolished for a brief period.

For many years in England dur ing the time of Oliver Cromwell the custom of feasting and drinking at Christmas was regarded as worldly and sensual, and the more strict Puritans refused to eat mincemeat pie during the holiday season. This prejudice was finally overcome after the Restoration.

In the New World, during the first half century after the Pilgrims' arrival at Plymouth, similar troubles caused the banning of mince-meat pies and Christmas. In 1659, and for several years thereafter, there was no Christmas in New England as a result of an argument over the shape and meaning of mince-meat pies. Eventually the indignation spent itself, and the ban was lifted.

A pie which no other can approach in the intricacies of its creation, mince-meat pies originally were made almost entirely of meat seasoned with spices. Fruit chiefly currants, was added, and probably because the dish was regarded as a sweet, the fruit content was gradually increased until mince-meat became a mixture of fruit and spices, with or without the addition of meat.

## Fertilizer On **Cotton Pays Off**

When properly used, fertilizer unde cotton doesn't cost; it pays. This fact is shown by the results of

To emphasize the point, M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, cites as an example demonstrations conducted last year in Guadalupe county under the supervision of county agent B. N. Rector. Rector reports that Munroe Schubert of Kingsbury made over one and one-half bales of cotton per acre on part of his fertilizer demonstration.

On a plot that was not fertilized, Schubert obtained a yield of 610 pounds of lint cotton per acre. He obtained a yield of 785 pounds from a plot which was fertilized with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 at planting time and side dressed with 100 pounds of the same fertilizer when the cotton was about knee high. Other plots in the demonstration which received different

amounts of fertilizer gave yields that ranged between the high above and the low received when no fertilizer was applied.

Figuring that 16-20-0 fertilizer costs not more than \$4 per hundred the cost of the three sacks of fertilizer applied was \$12. The increase of 175 pounds of lint obtained by fertilizing was worth about \$70, figuring the price of 1950 cotton fertilizer demonstra-tions. cotton at 40 cents a pound. There-fore, Schubert's increased income over the cost of fertilizer was about \$58.

The lowest increase obtained was 30 pounds of lint from applying 100 pounds of 5-10-5 at planting time. Thornton points out, how ever, that this gave a return of about \$21 on an investment o \$2.50 for fertilizer.


