Growers who want the protection of Government price supports on their 1947 potato crop be required to establish their eligibility for participation in the program, according to word received in the Bailey County Agricultural Conservation Office.

Price supports on 1947 potatoes will be in the form of purchases, diversion, export and loans. Details of the program have now been announced by the Department of Agriculture.

Here are the conditions governing participation of growers in the potato price support program. (1) Growers must comply with

1947 individual farm potato acreage goals set by the County AAA Committee:

(2) Price support is restricted to more emphasis on health and phypotatoes produced by eligible growers which are not objectionable because of diseases, insect infestation, frost, or other damage:

Soil Conservation A Community Problem---

No farmer can most effectively conserve soil and water without the cooperation of his neighbors. Conservation is a community problem. It can be handled best through the organization of a soil conservation district. Soil conservation districts are local subdivisions of government set up by farmers themselves by petition and referendum. They are chartered by the state government. They are administered by boards of supervisors or directors chosen by ballot from farmers in the district.

Of the 48 states, 45 have enacted state legislation authorizing soil conservation districts. Congress has directed the Soil Conservation Service to work with farmers through properly organized districts. If there is no district in your county, plans for such organization may be obtained from your state soil conservation committee.
