


The Eastland County History Books are now available at The Cisco Press office. The 748-page books are priced at \$72.50 each.

We recently received in the mail a note from Mrs. Jack (Bobbie) Courtney of Longview. (They are former residents of Cisco.) She enclosed an article from the Longview newspaper entitled "New Eastland Book Produced." It was written by Nancy Ruff and the article reviewed the Eastland County History Book. She had many nice things to say about the book, including "It is a beautiful history book filled with biographical sketches of both early and current families, and church, school business and community histories."

Local Oilman Stanley Pirtle handed us the following article. It will give us all incentive to fill out an accident report with the complete details. This letter explains an occasion when the accident victim failed to furnish the insurance company the information needed. "Dear Sir:

"I am writing in response to your request for additional information. In block number 3 of the accident reporting form, I put "Poor Planning" as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter that I should explain more fully, and I trust that the following details will be sufficient.

"I am a bricklayer by trade. On the date of the accident I was working alone on the roof of a new six story building. When I completed my work, I discovered that I had about 500 pounds of brick left over. Rather than carry the bricks down by hand, I decided to lower them in a barrel by using a pulley which, fortunately, was attached to the side of the building at the sixth floor. "Securing the rope at ground level, I went up to the



ing jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, 1 proceeded at a rather rapid rate up the side of the building. In the vicinity of the third floor I met the barrel coming down; this explains the fractured skull and broken collarbone.

"Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were twoknuckles deep into the pulley. Fortunately by this time I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold tightly to the rope in spite of my pain.

"At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of bricks hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the bricks, the barrel now weighed approximately 50 pounds; I refer you again to my weight in block number 11.

"As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the building. In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles and lacerations of my legs and lower

UIL Realignment Announced; Cisco, Eastland And Ranger In District 13AA

The UIL realignment Thursday put Eastland County schools Cisco, Eastland and Ranger in Disyears. The realignment will begin with football next fall and the schools will remain in the district for basketball and probably track as well.

District 13AA will be a large district with eight teams, and it is expected to be very tough. Other district teams are DeLeon, Coleman, Bangs, Goldthwaite, and San Saba. DeLeon and Goldthwaite are always tough and they made the playoffs last year as did San Saba. Coleman, down last year, is usually strong and Bangs has had a lot of speed lately.

The district's playoff teams will advance in Region II, the Baird, Cross Plains. Santo and northeast corner of the state. Tolar. Last fall they advanced in Region I, the northwest. And with Lorena and McGregor moving to 3A, and Holliday

and Electra moving to Region I with Quanah, the District 13 winner may well be good enough to advance to the semi-finals in football.

However, Pilot Point and Mart may still be threats.

Early, Reagan County and Corrigan-Camden were some trict 13AA for the next two of the 2A teams moving up to 3A, while Coahoma and East Chambers were among those moving down to 2A from 3A. Some class A teams also moved up to 2A.

Class 2A teams have an enrollment between 140 and 284, while class A teams have less. Class 3A has between 285 and 689, class 4A is from 690 to 1,459 and class 5A is the largest schools.

In District 13AA, Cisco and Eastland are two of the larger schools while Ranger is the smallest.

The county's class A schools, Gorman and Rising Star, will be in 14A with

In Six Man Football, Strawn, Gordon, Moran, Lueders-Avoca, Newcastle, and Woodson are in District 10 while Carbon, May, Blanket, Mullin, Sidney and Zephyr are in District 12. Breckenridge is in 4AAA with Graham, Bowie, Bridgeport, Iowa Park and Vernon. In 7AAA is Wylie, Ballinger, Clyde, Comanche, Early and Merkel. Albany is in 6AA with Anson, Hamlin, Haskell, Hawley, Stamford, Jim Ned and Winters.

The non-district games are not finalized yet, but Ranger expects to play Santo, Gorman and Rising Star; Eastland plans to play Early, Wylie and 4AA Olney; and Cisco will probably play Millsap, Gorman and Merkel.

Paying For College

By AMY JOHNSON, M.Ed. Finding the resources to pay for college is one of the most important, and often, the most frustrating aspect of planning for college. Although there are no guarantees that you will receive financial assistance, vou can improve your chances of getting the money you need to attend the collge of your choice by learning

about financial aid and planning ahead. There are three kinds of financial aid. Grants or scholarships do not have to be repaid. Grants are usually based on need, and scholarships may be based

on need and other criteria, such as academic or athletic achievement. Student loans have lower interest rates but must be repaid after you graduate or leave school. Work programs, such as college work-study, involve ear-

Your need for financial aid is determined by the total amount it will cost you to attend the college of your choice, minus the estimated amount you and or your family have indicated through the application that you are able to pay. Therefore, even if you are relatively affluent, you may qualify for aid if the educational costs are high. For this reason, it is important not to rule out colleges or programs on the basis of cost without seeing if you qualify for financial aid.

This process includes completing your income tax return since you will use this information to complete your financial aid application. A student applying for the fall of 1990 will use income tax information from 1989. It is important that the information in your application corresponds exactly with your income tax return. Otherwise, a correction may have to be filed which will slow down the process. Also, schools may require a copy of your income tax and other records to verify that the information in your application is correct so it is important to keep copies.

Use the following checklist as a guide: Start the process early and investigate every financial aid source.

Request admission and financial aid information from the colleges you are considering.

Know which applications you have to file and when you have to file them. Complete the admission

process. Go through the financial aid application, and keep notes of any questions you have.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent-

HELP FOR MIL-DEWED ANTIQUES

You love antiques, but when you bring them into your home they sometimes bring a musty smell. You may be able to enjoy your antiques without the smell. Here's how.

To remove musty odors in enclosed parts of the furniture - inside drawers or cabinet doors, for example - first open drawers and doors to air. Next, with a mild soap and hot water, wash and scrub the insides thoroughly, including the backs of doors and, if drawers can be removed, the surfaces behind and beneath the drawers. Take care not to soak the wood. Quickly dry damp surface with a towel and leave doors and drawers open for a day or two to allow air to circulate. Enclosing washed areas while they are still damp could create a mildew problem. When thoroughly dired and aired, spray with a cedar deodorizer or place your favorite sachet of potpourri scent to keep it smelling beautiful.

To rid old wicker of mildew, rub the mildewed spots with a cloth dipped in a mixture of ammonia and water.

The cleaning cloth should be well squeezed so as not to saturate the wood, which could discolor from too much solution. Give cleaned areas a mild salt water bath and dry in the sun.

To clean a mildewed rug or piece of tapestry, take it

outside the house and brush away any loose mold. If you do this indoors, you could inadverently spread mold spores throughout the house. Vaccum away loosened mold and dispose of vaccum bags immediately in an outdoor trash can. Use a fan to dry damp spots. Remove mildew stains with a rug shampoo. If an item is badly stained or too delicate to treat, take it to a professional antique restorer. To clean dirty, mildewed

leatherbound books, use saddle soap. Work a damp sponge into a lather by rubbin it on the soap, then apply the sponge on the leather covers in gentle circular motions. Pass a clean, damp sponge over soaped areas until soap is gone, then dry. Buff with a shoe cream in a matching color to restore the leather's

3,000 new young people will become regular users of tobacco products every day. The problem is quickly growing in the new generation, while the older people are giving up the habit. From 1965 to 1987 eleven percent of Americans have quit smoking. For the other percent of Americans who do smoke, their problems are just beginning.

There are at least 4,000 deadly chemicals found in cigarettes. Forty-three of them are proven carcinogens and form part of the sticky, brown residue known as Tar. The others are carbon monoxide, acetone, methonal, and formaldehyde-Yes, the stuff used to preserve dead frogs

American public falls victim of social pressures of today. Many teenagers fall victim because of peer pressure, parental authority, and rebellion against the family. A 1986 survey by the National Institute on Drug Abuse has linked alarming relationships between academic performance and smoking. Only 7 percent of A average students are a daily smokers: On the other hand, 47 percent of students who have poor academic performance, smoke.

They also have evidence that young people who smoke could have a drug problem. Dr. Clayton of the University of Kentucky points out that of teenagers between the age of 12 to 17 who currently are cigarette smokers, almost half of them uses marijuana-of the nonsmokers, only 9 percent use marijuana.

The facts remains that many teenagers would like to quit smoking, but find it completely irrelevant.
