The following article was written by Dr. Joe Airola, and was entitled "Community Colleges and Upper Level Universities: A Partnership That Works for Texas."

We reprint as follows: "At times, worthy ideas are discarded not because they lack merit but because unrelated purposes cloud the initial issue. This is the situation we see unfolding across the state involving community colleges and upper-level universities. What should be a partnership of institutions working together to provide cost-effective postsecondary education has become, in many cases, a struggle for power.

The importance of the relationship between community colleges and upper-level universities is clear when viewed from a historical perspective. In 1965, the legislature created the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and charged it with the responsibility of creating a master plan for higher education in the state. The resulting plan generated a system of 10 upper-level universities throughout Texas to work in tandem with community colleges, providing a "smooth transition" for students transferring from community to senior colleges.

By definition, articulation is a planned process linking programs and services to assist students in transferring among postsecondary levels without experiencing delays or duplication of learning. The degree of success these institutions have in serving students seems to be related directly to articulation.

A sterling example of a successful partnership between an upper-level university and community colleges

can be found in the Gulf Coast area. Nine area community colleges feed into the University of Houston, Clear Lake. By legislative mandate, an advisory committee, made up of presidents of the community college districts, meets regularly with the chancellor of UH, Clear Lake to advise him on enhancing transfer relationship between their institutions and his.

By preserving upper-level universities and their relationship with community colleges, everyone benefits. First, students benefit from a unified curriculum and superior instruction. Learning is maximized at each level of study as both institutions specialize. The taxpayer benefits because money is not wasted by duplicating programs. Money is also saved in terms of outlay of long-term capital and operating costs. Finally, the entire state benefits when citizens attain a higher education level.

I believe that articulation between community colleges and upper-level universities has a direct influence on many students who would never enter a university otherwise. These are the students who initially need the open admission, remediation, small classes and superior instruction by concerned teachers provided by a community college. Once they experience success during the first two years of study, they are ready to go on to a university. Articulation improves their charges of continued success in attaining educational goals.

As the question of downward expansion of upper-level universities is raised, the only worthwhile answer must address better higher educational opportunities for all the students of Texas. Preserve upper-level universities, and thereby strengthen community colleges to fulfill their mission to our society."

Texas Public School Week March 5-9

Education is freedom. For Texans, that is not just a saying but a part of our history and everyday life.

When Texas Public Schools Week was first set up by the Texas Masonic Lodges, it was meant to coincide with March 2, Texas Independence Day, pointing out that freedom and education go hand in hand.

In fact, Texans cited the lack of a public education system as one of their grievances in the Texas Declaration of Independence, again, putting education on a par with freedom. Texans knew that education was crucial for future generations.

When we celebrate Texas Public Schools Week this year - March 5-9 - we should remember that "Building Brighter Futures" is what Texas schools have always strived for.

When the young republic was mired in the diplomatic, economic and military problems of a new nation, it never failed to keep education as one of its goals. The Texas Congress declared that four leagues of land be designated in each county to support public schools.

The first state constitution, written after Texas joined the United States in 1845, directed the state legislature to set aside 10 percent of tax revenues for a "perpetual fund" to educate children of indigent parents.

The Texas public schools system, as we know it today, came into being with the signing of the Texas Common School Law of 1854. The law also created the first school districts whereby each county was divided into

CJC Board Of Regents Seek Bids On Sale Of Victor Hotel

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents authorized the administration to seek bids on the sale of the old Victor Hotel in downtown Cisco. The building's first floor currently houses the Cisco Junior College Senior Citizens Center.

"A potential buyer has said he wants the Senior Citizens Center to remain in the hotel, and we want the same thing," said CJC President Roger C. Schusterreit. "We do not think any sale would jeopardize the Center," he added.

Bobby Smith, CJC Dean of Fiscal Services who will be handling the bids, said that the bid notice will state "that

CJC wants to negotiate with any bidder the continuation of the location of the Senior Center in the Hotel." Smith anticipated bids being presented to the Board of Regents for their consideration not earlier than the April 9 meeting.

In other business, the Regents awarded a bid for 20 computers to CompuCenter of Cisco. The computers will be used in the CJC Abilene programs.

Reports were heard on

various matters including an insurance consortium for medical insurance, the status of the use of the Rockwell complex by the VFW, and a spring enrollment report.

In personnel matters, the contracts of the president and other senior administrators were renewed. Faculty contract recommendations will be presented at the next meeting to be held Thursday, March 8.

Walton said that other cases were being worked on at this time. The Grand Jury will meet again the later part of March.

CJC Sets Regent Election May 5

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents called an election for May 5, 1990. Places 4, 5, and 6 are up for election and are currently held respectively by Rudolph Schaefer, Dr. Gary Harris, and Dean Madison.

While official filing can not begin until February 19, Dr. Harris and Madison both announced their intention to file for re-election. It was announced that Schaefer would not seek re-election after over thirty years on the Board.

"Rudolph Schaefer will be sorely missed as a Regent, but we know we can always call on him to lend his support," said Dick Woolley, Board President.

Ronnie Ledbetter, Cisco native and local insurance agent, has stated his intention to file in Place 4, vacated by Schaefer. "I hope I will have the opportunity to serve Cisco Junior College as well as Rudolph has," said Ledbetter.

Election Judge will be Melvin Bailey with Inez Smith as alternate. The election will be held jointly with the City of Cisco and the Cisco Independent School District. Deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is March 21.

Old virtues such as duty, patriotism and service to one's country sometimes today meet with a certain cynicism. So it's good to remember the birthday of George Washington... "first in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countymen." Washington was born February 22, 1732, in Westmoreland County, Virginia... one of five children of a family which had for three generations lived in America. Because his father, a well-to-do planter, died when he was twelve, he wasn't sent to England like his older brothers for an education... He became a surveyor and took his place in the militia when his brother became ill. As a major, he was sent on two expeditions against the French, and on the second was defeated. On a third, led by General Braddock, the British and Americans were again defeated. But apart from this start and these lessons, Washington rose to become the commander in later years of American forces in the hard-fought revolution against Britain. He then became the new nation's first president. For fifteen years seven in war and eight as president, Washington founded and guided a new nation to manhood and, as the father of our country, bequeathed a unique and precious heritage to all Americans.

Avoid Nutrition Worries By Following Simple Rules

According to Dr. Robert Bernstein, Texas Commissioner of Health, it is little wonder that the public is confused about how to prevent heart disease and cancer through proper nutrition.

"The fact that more people than ever before seem to be trying to avoid heart disease and cancer by eating the right foods is very good news," he said. "But given the volume of claims that are being made about different foods, it has become increasingly harder for people to make intelligent choices."

He added, for example, that recent controversies about the benefits of oat bran compared to other sources of dietary fiber may have stretched a concerned public's patience almost to the breaking point. "The last thing we want to have happen is for the public to become disinterested in the whole subject of sound nutrition, just because they can't separate scientific evidence from advertising hype," he said.

The commissioner stressed that proper nutrition for most people does not have to be complicated. "Most people who know their own health conditions, take care to read nutrition information on products, and understand some basic rules can avoid the pitfalls of believing all TV commercials, and other half-truths meant to sell products."

He recommended seven, basic principles, all of which are agreed upon by the National Institutes of Health. Those guidelines are:

Eat a variety of foods.

Maintain a desirable weight.

Avoid too much fat, saturated fat and cholesterol.

Eat foods with adequate starch and fiber.

Avoid too much sugar.

Avoid too much sodium.

If you drink alcoholic beverages, do so in moderation.

"Of course each of these rules needs more detail," Dr. Bernstein said. "But local health departments, county extension agents, hospitals—even school systems—either have nutritionists on their staffs or have free literature meant to clarify these nutrition basics."

He added that some people, such as diabetics, people with hypertension, alcoholics, and others with special health needs should adhere to modified diets prescribed by their physicians.

Report Lists 'Best And Worst' Schools In Texas

Petersburg School District in the Panhandle is the "best" school district in Texas, with 100 percent of ninth grade students there passing statewide tests of minimum skills. San Elizario school district, just east of El Paso, is rated as the "worst" school district in Texas, with only 12 percent of the students passing the tests.

These are the conclusions of "Report Card on Texas Schools," a study released by the National Center for Policy Analysis (NCPA) a research institute in Dallas. All schools in the state with at least 25 students in the 9th grade are being reported on.

A call from the Eastland Telegram to the NCPA brings the information that this Center receives no government funding, but is a non-profit group financed by individuals, corporations and foundations. The studies are independent, but results are sent to most newspapers in the state. The information is also shared with State Legislators and State Educational agencies.

The report identifies 52 Texas School Districts as the "best" in Texas. These are school districts in which at least 85 percent of the ninth grade students passed the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests.

The 37 "worst" school districts are the ones in which more than 60 percent of the students failed the tests. The TEAMS tests are administered each year to students in grades 1,3,5,7,9 and 11.

A spokesman for the NCPA reported that the ninth grade was chosen to be reported on because it gives a more accurate picture than grade eleven. After the ninth grade those who are failing simply drop

out of school. All students must pass the eleventh grade test in order to receive a high school diploma in Texas.

"Overall, Texas schools are doing a poor job," said NCPA president, John Goodman. "Four out of every ten ninth grade students in Texas are failing to meet standards in reading, writing, and mathematics."

Goodman states an opinion on minority students in the schools. "Minority students are the principle 'victims' of the failure of the Texas public schools," he says. "The longer Black and Hispanic students stay in school the worse they perform, relative to our expectations."

According to the NCPA Report, more than 70 percent of Black and Hispanic students pass the TEAMS test in the first grade. By the time these students have spent nine years in the public schools, only 46 percent of Blacks and 49 percent of Hispanics pass the test.

The report also addressed the issue of spending per student and the value of taxable property in school districts—two issues raised in Edgewood vs. Kirby, the case in which the Texas Supreme Court declared the current system of financing education in Texas unconstitutional.

According to the NCPA Report, there is no relationship between the taxable wealth of school districts and student performance on the TEAMS test.

There is also no relationship between the amount of spending per student and student performance on the TEAMS test.

On the NCPA report from Eastland County, Eastland

rated 78, Cisco 56, Ranger 77. Rising Star, Carbon and Gorman did not have enough ninth grade students to provide an accurate test.

In this County, as elsewhere in the state, there was no testing of church or private schools.

Here is how area schools rated: Baird 70, Clyde 51, Abilene 65, Breckenridge 80, Albany 50, Cross Plains 76, Brownwood 60, Coleman 67, De Leon 92, Dublin 56, Comanche 72.

The National Center For Policy Analysis plans a new project soon: the evaluation of the ratio of spending by schools on athletics and other departments.

Counting America's People And Housing

Counting the residents of a country as big and as vigorous as the United States is no easy task. Just ask the Census Bureau, which is preparing to take on the job for the 21st time, beginning in late March.

The Census Bureau, an agency of the Department of Commerce, expects to count some 250 million people and 106 million housing units across the country.

The 1990 Census will be a "do-it-yourself" count, taken almost entirely by mail. One questionnaire will be delivered to each housing unit. A short form containing 14 questions will go to five out of six households. An adult in each household will be asked to complete the form and return it by April 1—Census Day.

In some rural areas, census workers will pick up or help residents complete their forms. The primary use of census data has not changed since the very first census in 1790—to fairly apportion seats in the House of Representatives among the states, based on their populations. This provision was included in the Constitution by the Founding Fathers and is reflected in the changed make-up of the House after each census.

In addition, state and local governments responding to court decisions dealing with the principle of "one person,

one vote" have adopted the use of census figures to redraw their election district boundaries.

As the sharing of federal and state revenues with counties and cities has increased in recent years, census numbers have also been used to allocate millions of dollars in program funds based on populations.

Today, government planners and business economic developers wouldn't think of pushing ahead with a new school, health clinic, or shopping center without first studying census information to make certain that the new facility is placed in the best possible location.

Such statistical information is tabulated from the answers contained on over 100 million questionnaires. The data are arranged by geographic areas at the national, regional, state, county, city, neighborhood, and even block levels. Individual responses on the questionnaires, however, are strictly confidential, by law, for the next 72 years. The resulting numerical mosaic is a demographic "snapshot" of America's people and housing as of April 1, 1990.

From the 18th century to the end of the 20th century, the census has chronicled the country's growth and change. The 1990 Census will provide the statistical spring-

board for the journey into the 21st century.

Texas Oil And Gas Well Completions Increase

Texas oil and gas operators reported 314 gas and 498 oil completions in January 1990, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance. In December 1989 the total was 251 gas and 330 oil completions. January 1989's total was 239 gas and 400 oil completions.

Gas completions in January included nine in the San Antonio area (District 1), 45 in the Refugio area (District 2), 36 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 80 in deep South Texas (District 4), five in East Central Texas (District 5), 49 in East Texas (District 6), 27 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 32 in the San Angelo area (District 7C) seven in the

Midland area (District 8), two in the Lubbock area (District 8A), ten in North Texas (District 9), and 12 in the Panhandle (District 10), according to Hance.

Oil completions included 35 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 16 in the Refugio area (District 2), 32 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 20 in deep South Texas (District 4), 13 in East Central Texas (District 5), 11 in East Texas (District 6), 72 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 48 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 116 in the Midland area (District 8), 50 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 60 in North Texas (District 9), and 25 in the Panhandle (District

10). Total completions reported in January included 498 oil, 314 gas, and 67 service completions. In January 1989, operators filed 400 oil, 239 gas, and 58 service completion reports.

In the first month of 1990 the Commission recorded a total of 879 well completions, a 26 percent increase from the 697 well completions recorded during the same period of 1989.

Hance said operators reported 1,002 holes plugged in January, compared to 1,007 in December. A total of 381 dry holes were reported in January, compared to 178 in December.

Fuel Loading At Unit 1 Completed

Fuel loading at Unit 1 of the Comanche Peak Nuclear Power Plant was completed at 6:20 a.m. Feb. 14.

Fuel loading began shortly before 5 a.m. Friday, Feb. 9. A total of 193 fuel assemblies, each about 13 feet long and weighing about 1,500 pounds, has now been loaded into the Unit 1 reactor.

"The fuel loading process was accomplished in an efficient, professional manner

with no significant material or personnel problems," said Austin Scott, Vice President, nuclear operations. "Those involved directly are to be commended for the skill with which they have carried out this operation."

Each fuel assembly contains 71,808 nuclear fuel pellets and costs about \$400,000. One assembly equals the energy in 1.379 billion cubic feet of natural gas, which

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Area Native Honored At Ft. Worth Stock Show

An Eastland County native, a scientific peanut farmer, is one of 24 Texas farmers and ranchers saluted recently by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in connection with that city's Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show and Rodeo.

In the special section entitled "This Land is Their Land" written by Worth Wren Jr., Ted Higginbottom, now of Seminole is spotlighted.

A Gorman-area native, young Higginbottom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Higginbottom of Gorman.

His is a highly technical peanut approach, as this article points out:

Taking advice from veteran growers, Ted Higginbottom quickly evolved into a first-class Texas peanut nutritionist, doctor, digger and marketer.

All those roles must be played to near perfection by anyone risking more than \$500,000 a year to grow and harvest peanuts on 700 acres in country somewhat prone to hail and sand storms.

As peanut nutritionist, Higginbottom pulls plant tissue samples throughout the growing season to determine the crop's precise nutrient needs. A laboratory analyzes the samples and tells him what nutrient formulas to apply.

"We do not make blanket chemical applications of any

kind," he said, noting high costs of fertilizers and pesticides and environmental concerns as reasons.

Higginbottom, 39, has won praise for his ability to coax goobers to pod profusely in two far-flung, sandy Texas regions. But the peanuts just didn't multiply well enough to suit him in the Gorman area of Central Texas. So in early 1982, he hauled his farm equipment to this west-northwest region, 17 miles west of here and two miles from New Mexico.

"You won't make too many mistakes because you won't be in business," said Higginbottom, who oversees considerably more than \$1 million in annual production inputs for all his crops. Included are cotton, rye, melons, vegetables and peanuts on 2,000 acres plus some joint ventures with other farmers.

Peanuts routinely are his single largest income generator, at 50 percent of his gross, and reliably earn higher profits than his other crops, he said.

Higginbottom has made few serious peanut errors since his first area crop, when he harvested an average of 4,250 pounds per acre on 250 acres in 1983. The Gaines County average was about 3,700 pounds.

His pampered peanut land peaked at 4,800 pounds an

acre in 1987 and averaged 4,500 pounds on 700 acres last year.

Here's how he nurtures and protects the crop:

Higginbottom pulls pre-season soil samples for tests on fertilizer needs. He often uses up to 20 different fertilizer blends on various fields to give the crop precisely what it needs and nothing more.

Behind the tractor, he and his skilled employees pull special cultivators repeatedly over the soil and the young peanut plants. The plants aren't hurt while blades turn moisture clay on top of the persistent blow sand. That's to prevent the sand storms from shearing the plants at ground level.

Unless rainfall is abnormally heavy, repeated irrigations are needed in this dry country.

He checks for disease twice a week. He normally has to spray often for leaf diseases. But the area has less disease trouble than the Gorman area, he said.

His diverse crop rotation is another prime reason for his peanut success. That's to break and prevent the cycle of disease buildup that comes when peanuts are raised repeatedly on the same land.

Digging comes with machines in October. After the nuts dry some in the field, the harvesting machines separate the nuts from the foliage. Finally, the peanuts are dumped on a conveyor belt with fans to blow out the

sticks, hulls and dirt.

After inspections and grading, the nuts in semi-trailer trucks head to shelling, seed and export corporations in three states.

From the beginning, Higginbottom's crops have been fancy grade, premium-priced goobers. Consistently, the nuts have rated just short of perfect, far above the state's overall average quality and well above the U. S. Department of Agriculture's standard for peanut quality.

But none of them have ever been eaten in the United States, he said.

Higginbottom raises peanuts only on advance contracts for higher-priced seed going ultimately to other farmers to plant and for normally lower-priced, export-bound nuts sailing mainly to Europe. His sales split about 50-50 on these type of contracts.

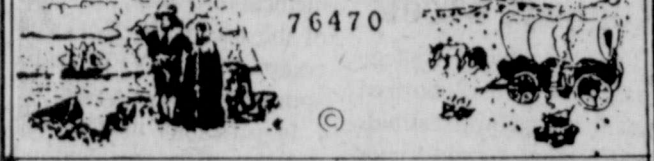

...NATIONAL ARCHIVES MICROFILM RENTAL PROGRAM PREPARES FOR RELEASE OF 1920 CENSUS! (Washington, D.C.) On March 2, 1992, the National Archives will make the 1920 census microfilm available to the public for the first time. And, the National Archives Microfilm Rental Program will rent copies made from the original silver masters.
"We're excited about the release of the 1920 census," said Rita Hoppe Counts, President of Professional Mail and Distribution Services, Inc. (PMDS), the company now fulfilling the Microfilm

Rental Program contract for the National Archives. "In fact, we expect such a great demand for the census microfilm, we're taking advance rental orders starting September 1, 1991, so we can have them processed and ready to go as soon as we get the microfilm in March."
The National Archives awarded PMDS the Microfilm Rental Program contract in September 1989, and PMDS plans to uphold the same level of service the program has provided since 1983. Under PMDS, the program will continue to be the only microfilm rental program to offer microfilm copied directly from the National Archives silver masters.

"Because of this," said the National Archives spokesperson, "the quality of film PMDS provides cannot be matched by any other rental program."

This microfilm can be ordered directly by individuals or through more than 6,000 local libraries across the country. The rental rates are \$3 per roll for orders of 1-4 rolls; \$2.50 per roll when 5-9 rolls are ordered; and \$2 per roll for orders of 10 or more rolls. The postage and handling fee of \$3 is waived for orders of 4 or more rolls.

To assist first-time users, the Microfilm Rental Program offers a Start-Up Kit for \$20. Included in the Start-Up Kit are the complete set of catalogs required for census and Revolutionary War research, order forms for ship passenger arrival and veterans records, research guides, coupons for that list available genealogical publications, and a Rental Program membership card.

The membership is a lifetime one, entitling the member to a 10% discount on a selection of National Archives and other genealogical publications.

Interested individuals can request a copy of the Archives Microfilm Rental Program, Post Office Box 30, Annapolis Junction, Maryland 20701.

NOTE FROM JEANE: This is a good program for any serious researcher. Remember you can start now with the census records 1790 through 1910; Military; and other valuable records. Even though you do not have to purchase a Start-Up Kit to rent through this program, it is my opinion the benefit is worth far more than the \$20 spent.

Health Care Items On County Commissioner's Agenda

The Eastland County Commissioners had a busy morning on Monday, Feb. 12, what with discussions on Emergency Medical Services for the county, and various other matters.

The meeting opened with a request by Don Bradford of the Staff Water Supply Corp. to obtain permission to cross County Rd. 327 in Pct. 3 with a water line.

Bradford said that the Staff area cannot have any more water from the Eastland County Water Supply District, so water is being brought the other direction from Lake Proctor. He explained that the Staff Water Supply Corp. line is now within three miles of Gorman, and needed to cross the road designated.

The Commissioners granted permission.

On another topic, Mrs. Bill Wende of Cisco told of an experience with the Emergency Medical Services.

While in Gorman one day her husband had a seizure, Mrs. Wende said. An ambulance was called from Eastland Memorial Hospital. When Mrs. Wende requested that her husband be transported to his Doctor in Abilene, the driver told her he could not do that. Mr. Wende was carried to the Eastland Hospital, checked by a Doctor, then sent to Abilene.

It was understood that a Doctor from Stephenville was on the scene in Gorman previous to the arrival of the Eastland Ambulance, but she was not available for consultation.

Mrs. Wende called the Ambulance Charges of \$500 for the trip to Eastland and then Abilene "ridiculous."

Marsha Carr, Administrator for Eastland Memorial Hospital, said that the Ambulance personnel in the case was only doing what had to be done under the very detailed regulations governing Emergency Medical Services. A patient must be transported to the closest appropriate hospital unless a physician designates otherwise. Each time a patient is loaded and unloaded there is a basic charge of \$165, with additional charges of \$2 per mile for a patient out of his own Precinct.

Mrs. Carr said that she wanted to work on a difficulties involved with the Ambulance Service, and attempt to improve it in every way possible.

The discussion turned to an agenda item on whether the County would continue to help fund part of the Emergency Medical Services.

Two Commissioners, Robinson and Bacon, voted to continue the arrangement where the County, cities and Hospital will share costs of the Service in Pct. 1 and 4, and the County will contribute its same amount to Emergency Medical Services in Pcts. 2 and 3. Commissioners Christian and Owens voted

against the measure, stating their reasons. County Judge Scott Bailey broke the tie, and the motion passed.

Another item related to Health Care was also on the agenda. Dr. C. R. Allen Jr. of Arlington, Director of Region 5, State Health Department appeared at the Court to discuss Public Health Services for the county.

He first told of areas in which the county was lacking in Public Health. He said that no Rabies Health Authority had been appointed—someone familiar with getting animal heads sent off to Austin.

The Doctor was told that the Court had attempted to appoint the local Constables for this job, but had met some opposition to the request! The Doctor indicated this typical behavior—that few law enforcement officers had the training necessary to care for the head of a rabid animal.

Dr. Allen went on to say that Eastland County also lacked skilled Medicaid beds in the Nursing Homes. When asked about this type of care in the local hospitals, he replied that Hospital Respite Care was a little different.

He said the main issue here, however, was Public Health, and that meant prevention—immunization, family planning and so forth. He said funds were hard to come by these days, and he requested that Eastland County pay the rent for the building (\$525 per mo.), utilities (\$95 per mo.) and janitorial services (\$235 per mo.) for the clinic located in Eastland. This would be \$10,266 per year to help support the Clinic. He asked that this item be considered for the 1990-91 budget.

County Judge Scott Bailey suggested that perhaps the millions of dollars of fees and

taxes paid out of Eastland County might provide something for public health work.

"We're hard pressed, but we recognize the value of the Clinic," the Judge said. "We might be able to make some contribution," he thanked the Doctor for attending the meeting.

On law enforcement matters, Billy Bacon was asked about the State Jail Standards inspection.

Bacon replied that it was scheduled for Feb. 20 (Tuesday) and that the jail was ready. "It's very clean," he said. "I don't see any reason why it won't pass."

He reported a total of 24 prisoners in the jail, with one scheduled for TDC and the other on a "Blue" warrant.

On other matters, the Commissioners voted to pay the hospital bill involved with a sexual assault case out of the General Funds of the County Budget. They also approved a number of line-item adjustments for various Departments.

Roy Gevara, President, opened meeting, asking Letty to lead in Prayer and welcomed new representative for District 16, Robert Vitello, and a new member Tracy Miller who accepted the position of Public Information.

memorials in Eastland and \$60 in Ranger.

Rosemary discussed the Crusade plans and said Crusade persons are needed in Ranger, Gorman, Cisco and Morton Valley. The Chairpersons divide the city into so many blocks and ask for leaders in each block. When there are plenty of volunteers, the blocks are visited quickly.

Pharmacy Topics

Research at East Tennessee State University links heart attacks to low magnesium levels. Shortages allow muscle cells (including the heart's) to keep contracting when they should stop, leading to muscle twitches, cramps, irregular heartbeat -- and maybe heart attacks.

Tests at Cochlin Hospital in Paris indicate that cyclosporine -- the drug used to prevent the rejection of heart transplants -- may halt rheumatoid arthritis.

In a study of the infection that causes traveler's diarrhea, volunteers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine took vaccine made from the milk of cows immunized against E. coli, the usual culprit. Researchers reported complete protection from the germ.

New no-estrogen contraceptive has been recommended for FDA approval and is already in use in 12 countries. Implanted rods release continuous dose of progestin levonorgestrel for five years, but can be removed if the woman wants to become pregnant.

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Five Killed In Plane Crash Near Putnam



A Twin engine turbo prop airplane belonging to gubernatorial candidate Clayton Williams, crashed in a rolling mesquite pasture located on the Waddle Ranch between Putnam and the Scranton Community at approximately 8:30 a.m. on Wednesday, February 14, 1990.

Williams was not aboard the airplane but it has been reported that 5 of his business associates were. Officers have confirmed 5 fatalities. The flight originated in Midland and was reportedly headed for Dallas.

The plane apparently sheared an electric line as it crashed. It took law officials approximately 40 minutes to locate the crash site due to the fact there was no smoke at the time of the crash. A small grass fire apparently started later from some of the debris and was quickly controlled by area firemen.

Wednesday was Valentine's Day, but it was an overcast day with a cold wind blowing which added to the bleakness as D.P.S. officers and Callahan County Sheriff's officers guarded the wreckage of a twin engine turbo prop airplane which had crashed in the rolling ranch country between Putnam and Scranton in eastern Callahan County.

The airplane had reportedly radioed that it was going down and had dropped from 14,000 feet. Over the Waddle Ranch, the airplane apparently sheared electric lines, hitting the ground instantly and scattering wreckage for about sixty feet. The aircraft was completely destroyed and its passengers were killed.

It took law officers about forty minutes to locate the airplane, which belonged to Midland millionaire and gubernatorial candidate Clayton Williams, as there was no smoke coming from it. A bulldozer pushed out a trail through the mesquite brush and prickly pears to the crash site, and area firemen quickly controlled a small grass fire which apparently started from some of the debris after the crash. Cisco sent an ambulance to the crash scene, and Eastland funeral director Terry Edwards was at the scene to offer assistance as the bodies were removed.

A call by officers to Clayton Williams verified that he was in Midland and not on the plane, but the flight plan listed six of his closest friends and business associates. However, William's campaign headquarters in Austin said that only five men were on the airplane. The plane had left Midland and was headed for Dallas when it went down at about 8:30 Wednesday morning. Officers were awaiting the arrival of an TAA investigator, who was expected to begin his work around noon. Since the aircraft was being used in a political campaign, an officer speculated that the investigation would probably be extensive. Angela Honea, a former Cisco resident now living near Cottonwood, drove north on

Hwy. 808 to Putnam about the time of the crash. She said that she saw a plane flying very low to the ground like it was trying to land, but at the last minute it pulled up. It was flying erratically and it flipped when it pulled up, she continued. The plane crossed the highway headed east and went out of sight near the location of the crash scene. She wasn't able to describe the airplane which she saw and she said that it didn't occur to her until later that she may have seen the airplane which went down. She said that she looked for either the plane to come up or for smoke but didn't see either.

The five men on the plane were: Jamie Winkel, 45, the Chief Executive Officer of William's business operations; Randy M. Kidwell, 37, the Vice President of Business Development of ATC, the parent company of Clay Desta Communications; Robert Smith, 62, President of R. R. Smith Consulting and a board member of Clay Desta National Bank; Aaron Giebel, 63, President of Aaron Giebel Petroleum and a board member of Clay Desta National Bank; and Kenneth Mardis, 52, a pilot with Williams Aviation.

Clayton Williams requested that his campaign stop for ten days in memory of these five men, with ads to be pulled, appearances cancelled, and events postponed. So a coffee for the

Williams campaign to be held in Eastland was postponed.

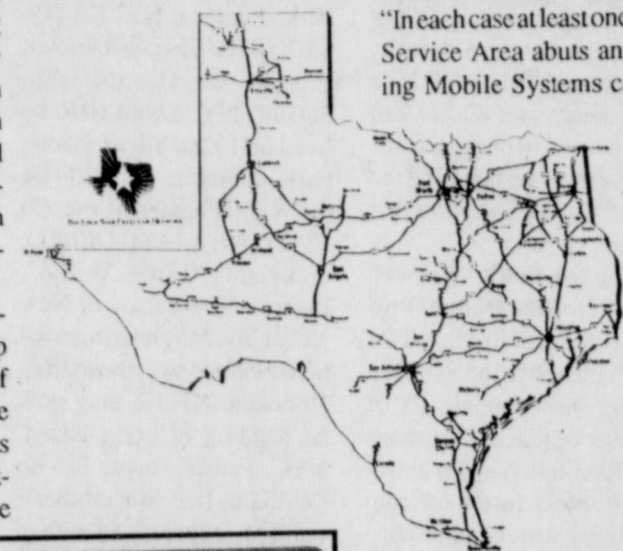

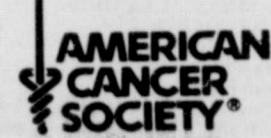
To Barr, Ruth Patchett's saga is not so much about revenge as about justice.

CONSISTENCY- THE KEY TO GOOD LEARNING HABITS

Parents and teachers want to help children learn to the best of their abilities. Sometimes there are barriers to learning because of poor self-discipline or work habits. As a teacher in resource it is my job to find those barriers and help the student find ways to remove the. One thing that we do is to set up a "goal of expectation" within the child's learning limits. We start with something simple to ensure success. A reward such as a sticker may be given. Then the task becomes a little more difficult.

Actually, the children feel more secure when parents are consistent with what they say they will do, according to the way the child performs.

Children deeply appreciate parents and teachers who mean what they say and follow through with promises. Consistency is the key to learning success.

The following list is a "6-Part Plan to Make Your Child a Brat", that is to make the child depend on you forever. She gave this in a workshop for parents and teachers to help them realize some of the mistakes that can be made in teaching children. Hopefully, parents and teachers will do the "opposite" of this plan.

- "6-PART PLAN TO MAKE YOUR CHILD A BRAT"**
1. Meaningless Threats - Make statements you don't mean or things you cannot carry out.
 2. Overstatements - Make promises you don't keep. Do something and undo it later. ("O, Alright..." means "I give up", "Next time...")
 3. No = Yes - Yes means No. This makes a child miserable and manipulative.
 4. Ping-ponging - go ask mother, go ask father. (This makes con-artists.)
 5. Respond Inconsistently - Something may be OK one time and not another.
 6. Random Discipline - Don't warn them that there will be a punishment for certain actions.

Actually, we hope that teachers and parents will be able to work together to "eliminate" these ways of dealing with children. Both parents should be consulted if a major problem arises at home. Time may be needed to make a decision about what to do.
