UIL Refuses To Hear EISD Protest Monday

The University Interscholastic League executive committee refused to hear Eastland High School's protest against Cisco's alleged UIL rules violation Monday Austin because Eastland still has a lawsuit pending against the UIL.

Cisco Superintendent C.R. Saunders said, "We didn't know the lawsuit was still pending until we got to the meeting Monday. We thought it had been dropped."

Eastland school officials maintain that Cisco school officials had knowledge that Eastland had played an ineligible football player for four weeks and had known about the ineligibility since August, before bringing it to Eastland's attention.

If proven true, that is a violation of the UIL code of ethics rule which could subject Cisco High School and individuals to a private or public reprimand or suspension from participating in UIL activities.

As a result of playing the ineligible player, Eastland had to forfeit four games, which knocked the Mavericks out of the Class 2A playoffs. Eastland then filed a lawsuit against the UIL, claiming it had no knowledge that Tracy Alford had taken a General Equivalency Diploma test, which according to the UIL, is the same as being a high school graduate and not eligible for football.

The Eastland suit was not against the lack of knowledge of the rule, but that any person taking the GED is not a high school graduate and is therefore eligible to participate in UIL activities.

Eastland's lawsuit was a temporary injunction to halt the Class 2A playoffs, but district judge Pete Lowry of Austin ruled in favor of the UIL and allowed the playoffs

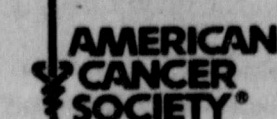

CJC Wranglers Must Forfeit 13 Games; Out Of Tournery

The Cisco Junior College men's basketball team, presently tied for the lead of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference, will forfeit all 13 of its games played in the spring semester because of using an ineligible player.

Lewis Hicks, sophomore point guard, did not meet scholastic eligibility requirements after the completion of the fall semester, but still played in all of the games.

"It was due to an unintentional miscalculation of his grade point average," according to CJC President Roger Schustereit. "The National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) was

contacted by Cisco and notified Monday.

"Pending the final results of any NJCAA ruling to the contrary, Cisco Junior College assumes its spring games are forfeited. Therefore, while currently tied for first place, CJC will not be advancing to the regional tournament."

Schustereit said he was extremely disappointed with the unintentional grade miscalculation and the ensuing forfeitures.

"I am especially sorry that our unintentional oversight caused a fine bunch of young men to lose their chance to be the champions, as I will always think of them."

On Tuesday, February 27, 1990, Aaron Whitley from Cisco attended the 1990 National Young Leaders Conference sponsored by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council with approximately 400 outstanding high school juniors and seniors from around the country who have been selected for this unique honor based on demonstrated academic achievement, leadership and citizenship.

The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference was "The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today." Throughout the six day conference, the scholars will meet with key leaders and newsmakers from the three branches of government, the media and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of the program will include a breakfast panel discussion led by prominent journalists at the National Press Club, welcoming remarks from a Member of Congress on the Floor of

Founded in 1985, the Council is a non-profit, non-partisan educational organization committed to recognizing outstanding youth and providing them with a "hands-on" civics learning experience in the nation's capital.

Rev. Berry Berger Will Speak At Bible Baptist Church March 13

The Rev. Barry Berger will speak at the Bible Baptist Church Tuesday, March 13, 1990. This service will replace the Wednesday service for this week only, according to Rev. Bill Fee, pastor. The Bible Baptist Church is located at 1609 Ave. E.

Rev. Berger will speak of Christ in the passover. A sermon demonstration will be given to show how Christ fulfilled the typology inherent in the ancient feast.

The traditional items will be set on the table, the speaker will explain the items and procedure of the Seder Feast which predates the birth of Christ by 1500 years.

Special emphasis will be given to the redemptive significance of each item, and the meaning of the gestures of Christ at the "Last Supper" will be told.

The Unleavened Bread, Passover Wine, and the procedure relating to two, shed much light on the meaning of Christian communion. Much of what our representative has to say is from the standpoint of Jewish family training, which has been brought into focus by his theological trainings as a Christian minister.

Besides giving Christians insight into Jewish traditions, it is hoped that this service will create understanding to help Jewish people of the community to know more about Christ and to help Christians to appreciate the Jewish heritage and alleviate any anti-Jewish feelings.

Barry Berger was born in Chicago in 1942, at age thirteen he received his Bar Mitzvah making him a "son of the Commandment."

Barry is married to Violette, and they have a daughter, Kipling.

Old Rip' An Item On County Commissioners Agenda Monday

During the County Commissioners meeting Monday Judge Scott Bailey announced that on Wednesday, Feb. 28, at 9 a.m. there will be a program in the Courthouse lobby (or outside, weather permitting) to observe the anniversary of Old Rip's removal (alive) from the cornerstone of the 1987 Courthouse.

"Old Rip" was released from the old cornerstone on Feb. 28, 1928, when the construction began on the present courthouse.

"We just want to commemorate an occasion probably in the national news more than anything that ever happened in the county," the Judge remarked.

He mentioned that Boyce House, Eastland newspaper writer, was told by his publisher to "Forget the Bible, newspaper and bottle of whiskey" that was in the cornerstone with Old Rip, and "concentrate on that horned frog."

House, like the symbolic frog, became nationally famous over that incident.

Judge Bailey said that all people who witnessed the original removal of Old Rip from the cornerstone had a special invitation to attend Wednesday's program.

Another event scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 28 drew the Commissioner's attention. Inspection of the County Jail by the State Jail Standards Commission was expected on that day, having been postponed from last Monday.

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that everything was ready - he expected the Jail to pass. He said that 22 prisoners were currently in the facility, "with six of these for TDC and one on a 'blue warrant' for Dallas." That would make 15 prisoners for the county - well under the limit of 24.

On another agenda item, Commissioner Richard Robinson reported on some details on the replacement of the current elevator with an automatic one. The company doing the work was request-

ing more information before beginning construction. Some of this information was needed about the old elevator shaft (now closed). Motors and pumps for the new elevator will be placed in the unused shaft.

The topic of county roads came up briefly. Pete Noska of Olden asked Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, why he, Noska, couldn't have some gravel for a short road near his home in Olden, and why the road was never graded?

Christian replied that the small road didn't show to be a county road, and didn't

appear to need it (gravel and grading) as bad as some other roads. He also said the road was narrow, with grass on either side, and graders would tear the grass up.

Noska answered that the road was very bad after a rain, and he had seen some other dead-end roads that were graded. The discussion ended when Christian said he would haul some gravel to the road, with Noska saying he would see that it was spread.

The session ended with payment of routine bills. The Commissioners said it must have been one of the shortest meetings on record - Court adjourned before 11 a.m.

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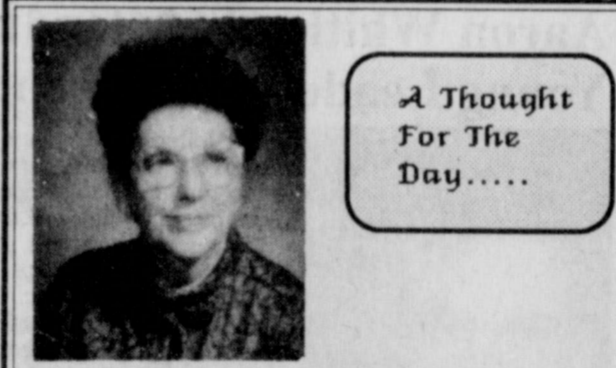

Update On Primary Election Time In Eastland County

It's Primary Election Time, and as usual voters in Eastland County certainly have some choices to make.

There's local and statewide interest in a number of races — and that poses problems for a number of voters. Some of the really interesting races are on opposite ballots.

And so, voters are going to have to pick their ballots in advance.

They can vote now without any "reason why" except you want to vote early. Voters don't even have to wait until Primary Day on March 13th; they can go to the County Clerk's Office through March 9th, and name their party choice and vote in advance.

But no one can vote both ballots. These are party nominations for the General Election in the fall.

Local voters who want to help decide who fills the local government offices usually chose the Democratic ballot. Even though they might want to have a say in who is nominated as the gubernatorial candidate on the Republican ballot, they can't. You can't

vote in both primaries.

Those voters who are determined to help make those state a gubernatorial Republican nominations are disenfranchised of helping make local decisions.

It's the nature of Texas politics.

JUDGE DECISIONS

Candidates to state court posts usually pose a problem for most local voters simply because we don't know the candidates or their qualifications.

In an effort to bring some reason to the process, this newspaper surveyed a number of local judges and attorneys who are better informed on the state court candidates, and these are the newspapers recommendations on these races:

The newspaper probably will endorse Phillips for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in the Fall General Election.

Will You Assist An Officer?

A call comes over the radios of local law enforcement officers. A traffic officer needs assistance and the code indicates that he is down.

The adrenalin starts to flow and a lump forms in the throats of nearby officers as they rush to the aid of a fellow officer. Lights flash and sirens scream as officers in speeding cars try to determine the location of the officer needing help and his problem. Has he been shot? Are others in danger? They will soon learn and may also be in danger, but they will help.

You may also assist an officer who needs help. So often officers can't solve serious and even brutal crimes because a necessary item of information is missing. You may be able to supply the information that enables an officer to solve a crime and catch a criminal. And nobody has to know that you gave the information.

You may see, hear or notice something that can help an officer, you may associate with someone who is involved in criminal activity, or you

may not want someone operating illegally in your neighborhood.

Call 629-TIPS and give the information to Crimestoppers. You will be given a number if your information could lead to an arrest. And the information will be given to officers across the county who will investigate.

It may be a while before there is an arrest and conviction. Officers may even wait until they get enough evidence to also arrest others involved. But if Crimestoppers finds that your information led to the conviction of a criminal, they want to reward you for it. Your call at a later date can result in money being paid to someone who knows the right number. The amount of money could be up to \$1000, and nobody would know your identity.

Crimestoppers wants to pay you money for information because it helps officers to solve crimes and arrest people before they hurt someone else. And if you are well paid, you may assist an officer again. If at first your information

doesn't solve a crime, don't quit trying. Next time you may have what an officer needs.

Glasgow Co-Authors Equitable Fundings Plans For All Schools

State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) is co-author along with Senator Bill Haley of a bill to guarantee that every child in Texas has equal access to a quality education as required by the Texas Supreme Court last year.

The bill, based on a plan outlined by State Comptroller Bob Bullock, would ensure that every school district could afford to spend \$3,600 per student in the first year with a local property tax rate of .85 cents per \$100 valuation. School districts currently spend an average of \$3,200 per student per year.

"This plan would guarantee that every district could provide a quality education with a reasonable local property tax rate," Glasgow said. "If a district can't raise \$3,600 per student with the target local tax rate, then the State will make up the difference."

The plan would not require that districts raise local property taxes to the target tax rate set by the State but districts taxing at a lower rate would receive less State aid. Some districts may be able to reduce their current property tax rates and still qualify for the full State guaranteed funding level under this bill, said Glasgow, who is a member of the Senate Finance Committee.

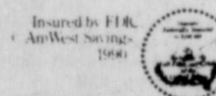

The State Treasurer reports that more than 120,000 Texans have \$99 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year - up 65 percent from last year's \$60 million.

The 120,000 are named in the 1990 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday, March 4 in 27 newspapers.

All listed accounts are worth at least \$50 with the largest account worth close to \$103,000. All safe deposit boxes and stocks are listed regardless of the value.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties, and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant for three to five years before they are turned over to the state.

Persons who find their names on the list can call the Texas State Treasury on its





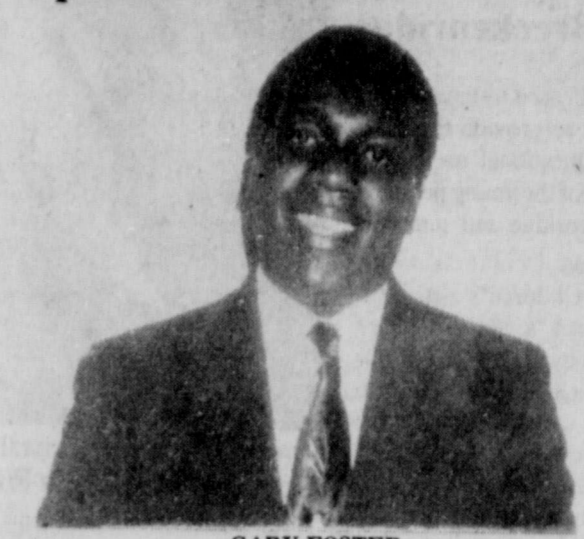

Disabled People Should Not Wait To Apply

Workers in the Big Country suffering from a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from working should consider applying for Social Security disability benefits when it appears the impairment will last 12 months or longer. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Social Security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled widows and widowers 50-60, and to unmarried adult children who became disabled before reaching 22. Under Social Security, a person is considered disabled if he or she has a severe impairment which prevents him or her from doing any substantial gainful work and is expected to last for at least 12 months or result in death. No payments can be made to a disabled worker, widow, or widower for the first five full months of disability. Before a person applies for disability benefits it will be helpful if he or she gathers certain information. This will help speed the application process.

- The person's Social Security number.
 - Date last worked.
 - Date person became sick or was injured.
 - Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, institutions, or clinics that provided treatment.
 - Military service dates, numbers and VA claim number if available.
 - List of kinds of jobs performed in previous 15 years.
 - Names and Social Security numbers of spouse and children.
 - Claim number for workers compensation or any other public disability payments.
- A person should not delay applying if this information is not all available. Just call 1-800-234-5772 for information or to set up an appointment to talk with a representative in Abilene. The Abilene office is located at 142 S. Pioneer.

Q. I feel that my husband is abusive. Could I be contributing to this abuse?

A. There are some patterns that women may develop that may allow them to continually take abuse. According to the book *Abused No More: Recovery for Women from Abusive or Co-Dependent Relationships* by Robert J. Ackerman and Susan E. Pickering there are some patterns that may be in a present or a past relationship.

- We received little nurturing ourselves and try to fill this unmet need by becoming a care giver especially to men who become needy.
- We believe almost nothing is too much trouble, takes too much time, or is too expensive if it will help the man in our relationship.
- We are accustomed to lack of love in our relationship and are willing to wait, hope, and try harder to please.
- We are willing to take far more than 50% of the responsibility, guilt, shame, and blame in a relationship.
- We have a desperate need to control our relationships, usually because of lack of security in childhood, and mask our control of people and situations by being helpful.
- Our self-esteem is critically low, and deep down inside we do not believe we deserve to be happy or that we are as good as other people.
- In relationships we are much more in touch with our ideas of how it could be than with the reality of how it is.
- We are drawn to people with problems that need fixing or we become involved in chaotic uncertain or emotionally painful relationship ignoring our responsibility or ourselves.
- We may have a tendency toward episodes of depression which we try to forestall through the excitement provided by an unstable relationship.
- We find "nice" people and comfortable relationship hard to identify with or be around.

Thermostat Options For Saving Energy

Setting back your thermostat for 12 or more hours during the winter is an easy way to save a substantial amount of energy. Depending on where in Texas you live, the savings will be 9 to 15 percent of your heating costs if you set the thermostat back 10 degrees at night and when your home is unoccupied.

Unfortunately, most people forget to set the thermostat back on a regular basis. One way to ensure the thermostat is always set back when appropriate is to invest in a programmable thermostat. There are many programmable thermostats on the market with a variety of features. The cost effectiveness of a particular type will depend on the type of heating system you have and how much you are willing to set back the thermostat.

For instance, programmable thermostats save more energy when used with a gas-fired system or conventional electric resistance furnace than with a heat pump system. With any type system, the more you are willing to set back the thermostat at night and at other times, the more energy and money you will save.

One recently introduced thermostat involves the innovative concept of comfort control rather than temperature control. With this thermostat, the occupant touches a control button when comfort conditions need adjusting. This helps the thermostat controller account for the environmental factors of humidity and air motion in addition to just temperature when occupants are not present, thus conserving energy.

When shopping for a programmable thermostat, the Texas Energy Extension Service recommends that you carefully compare several features. These include price, compatibility with your heating and cooling system, temperature setting and programming options, type of display, and warranty.

PRICE: Manufacturer's list prices on programmable thermostats range from about \$50 to \$250. A "comfort controller" thermostat likely will cost more.

YOUR SYSTEM TYPE: A thermostat that is compatible with the type of heating and cooling system you have is the first criterion for choosing a thermostat. Separate heating and cooling systems connect to the thermostat with two or three wires; combination heating-cooling systems use four or five wires. Heat pumps draw on multiple heat sources that require eight or nine wires, and are more difficult to connect. If you have a heat pump, select a programmable thermostat that is specially designed for use with heat pumps or avoid nighttime setback.

SETTINGS AND PROGRAMMING OPTIONS: For heating, the typical unit has one higher comfort setting and up to three lower ones. These thermostats can be set back in 3-degree to 15-degree increments. The more flexible models offer four to six independent temperature settings.

The most convenient programming option is to define four to six different time-and-temperature set points for each day of the week. The next best option is to set the same time and temperature program for five consecutive days, allowing for an alter-

nate program on weekends. The least convenient thermostats are capable of just one program that repeats all seven days.

Another convenient option is a temporary override. This allows you to manually change the set point if your schedule changes without destroying the regular program.

Although a keypad with lots of buttons might seem overwhelming at first, it is really easier to program than one that assigns several functions to only two or three buttons.

DISPLAY: Although a few units still use a mechanical needle to show the actual room temperature, most programmable models use a digital display for a continuous display of time, room temperature, and set point. Others show day of week and operating mode (normal or setback). These are all features that help you verify all is working properly.

WARRANTY AND REPUTATION: Typically, programmable thermostats have one- to four-year warranties that cover repair or replacement of defective units, but not the cost of installation. Be sure to purchase a thermostat from a reputable dealer; a warranty is worthless if the manufacturer will be out of business in a few months. As with the purchase of any product, you should check out retailers or manufacturers that are unfamiliar to you, by calling your local Better Business Bureau.

One last warning about thermostat purchases is to be cautious about buying a thermostat in conjunction with another energy-saving product. Not all homes need both products, and huge utility bill savings will not necessarily occur from installing both. For example, one company sells a thermostat along with a radiant barrier.

Many products are available that will save energy, but installing them all at once will not provide cumulative savings. For instance, if you have three products, each designed to save 20 percent of your energy bill, you will not see a 60 per-

cent savings by installing all three. The savings actually will be much less because the products are working together.

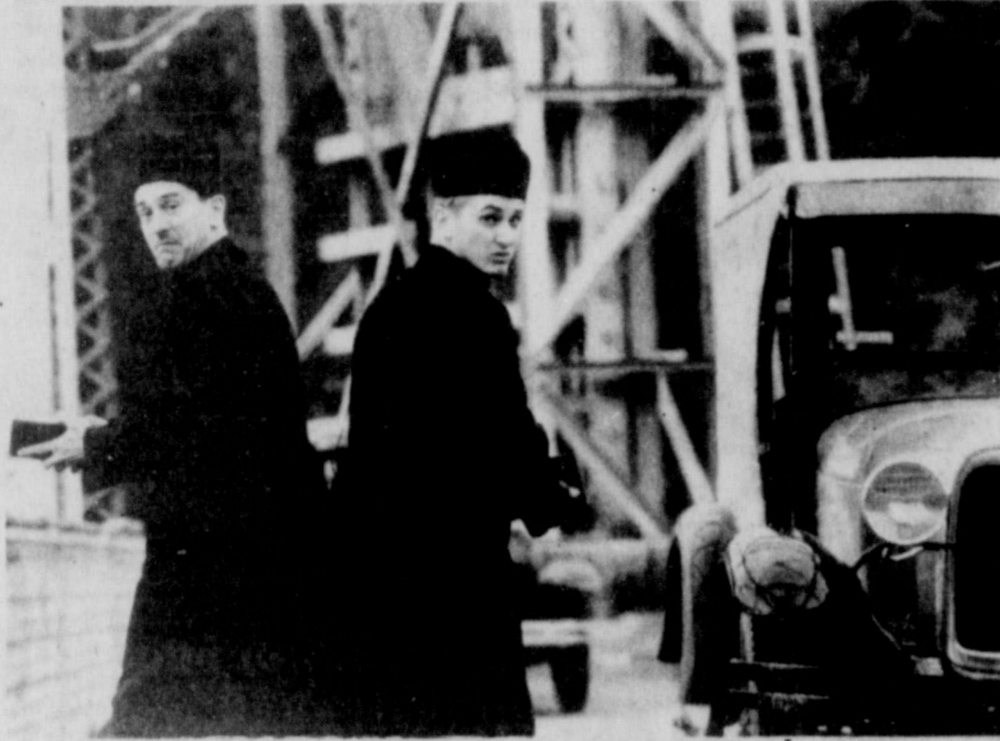

Strike Rind The Pork of Porks

Some excellent weather for enjoying the great outdoors has been upon us. And by the number of boats and bank fishermen the majority were "Fishing Outdoors."

Success for black bass was reported as fair, with some nice fish coming from the north shores. Especially in small creeks with rocks. At Lake Proctor anglers reported good success on jigs and crawworms in 2 feet of water. The crappie fishing is showing some improvement with limits of fish to 3/4 pounds each. Hubbard Creek anglers turned some excellent black bass in the 6 pound range in both major creeks and a few limits in secondary creeks. Jigs and spinner baits seemed to be working best. The crappie fish has fell off a little due to the boat traffic, but limits are still available in smaller fish. P. K. anglers are leading the area again with another 10 pound bass taken on Berkley's Strike Rind in 10 feet of water in the river section.

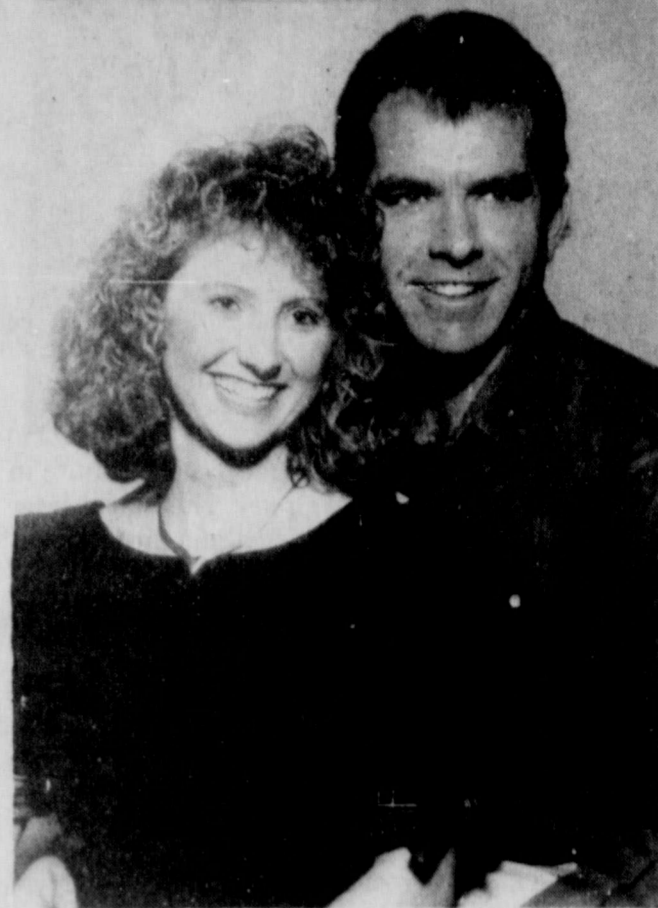

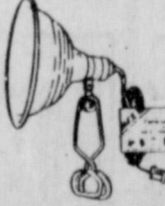

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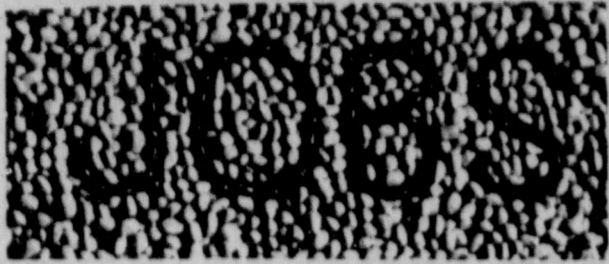
