Reggie Pittman Issues Statement To Cisco Voters

My name is Reggie Pittman. I'm a candidate for County Commissioner, Precinct 4.

There are roads in our precinct that are flat dragged. I mean there is no way water can get off the road to the bar ditches. Are they flat to keep us from sliding off into the ditch when it does rain? Then there are some roads that have been dug down to rock bottom. It'll jar your teeth when you go over them, the roughness of the rub board. Imagine what it does to your vehicle.

I will stop flat dragging and go to putting a crown in road where the rain can run off into the ditch.

I believe the roads should have a crown and should be maintained in such a manner that would build a crown, something like a turtle back, but not quite as steep.

Now the ditch should be clean and where there is a drive way or gate there should be a tin horn or a pipe to allow water to stay in ditch and to run back in the road.

This would take people working together to get this done.

We have seen pictures of bridge work that has been accomplished in the last three years in our precinct which is great.

However, there are still a few bridges and culverts that are unmarked.

Also there are a few tin horns that run across the road that have been caved in for years, which leaves room for only one vehicle at a time to pass.

Also, there are bridges and tin horns narrower than the road and there is no marker or sign of any kind. Some bridges have only one guard rail.

The bar ditches are poorly maintained as well as some roads. There are places

On the Democratic ballot will be three "For or Against" Propositions: No. 1 dealing with the right of citizens to demand a trial by jury in either civil or criminal cases, No. 2 on whether Judges should be elected or appointed, and 3 on legislative matters dealing with insurance.

These items are meant to offer a referendum on the Democratic Party Platform, and are not Amendments to the State Constitution. A strong "Yes" vote will probably cause them to be adopted at The Democratic Convention next June.

After the polls close at 7 p.m. March 13, Precinct Conventions will be held at each polling place.

On Jan. 1, 1990 there were 11,002 voters registered in Eastland County, and more have registered since. So a large voter turnout is expected.

Law Enforcement Officers Association. I have served as president of the Eastland Lions Club, Eastland Civic Theatre and Cross Timbers Shrine Club, as a Master of the Eastland Masonic Lodge, and as a vice president and director of United Fund. I have participated in the Quarterback Club and Chamber of Commerce. I am also a member of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and the National District Attorneys Association.

In addition to my extensive trial and appellate experience of criminal cases in Eastland County, I am a graduate of North Texas State and of Baylor University School of Law. I am licensed to practice law in the State of Texas, am a member of the Eastland County Bar Association, and I serve The State Bar of Texas as a member of the local District Committee on Admissions. After graduating from law school, I was employed in Abilene where I was the First Assistant City Attorney when I moved to Eastland County to raise my family.

It was my honor to be the recipient of the first "OUTSTANDING LAWMAN AWARD" presented by the Eastland County Newspapers Co. In 1989 I was one of the two prosecutors from throughout the United States asked to appear before a subcommittee of the U. S. House of Representatives to address the issue of the sales abuse of health insurance for the elderly.

It seems that all too often in my job, and that of law enforcement officers, we are faced with the problems of the rights of criminals. I maintain, however, that the rights of the victim of a crime should be just as important. I'm also concerned about the rights of the law abiding citizens and the security and protection of their persons and property.

Promises are one thing but past performance is a better guide of what you can expect. I have tried nearly every type of criminal case there is under the laws of Texas including several landmark cases, one of which saved the Eastland County Commissioners Court and taxpayers over \$19,000.00 in fees claimed by one defense lawyer. I have successfully de-

fended all of the efforts made by defense lawyers to obtain change of venue in criminal cases from Eastland County to some other county which has saved untold additional expenses to the taxpayers of the cities and county. Also, I have been recognized by a former Chairman of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles as one of the most effective prosecutors in the State in being able to keep prisoners in the penitentiary beyond their initial parole dates.

I know and understand the framework of laws under which law enforcement officials must work and there are numerous ones which I do not like; however, I can and do work with various law enforcement officers throughout Eastland County and I have from time to time worked with law enforcement officers in every community in the county at every hour of the day and night.

I am a full time prosecutor and I do not have a private practice of law which would in anyway interfere with the duties and responsibilities of my office. I am grateful for the opportunity to have served you in the past and I respectfully ask that you allow me to continue serving you with the integrity and manner in which you rightfully deserve.

As we are filing over 500 cases annually, I have continued the duties and responsibilities of the Office throughout the campaign and consequently I have not been able to personally visit with each citizen in the county. I hope you can understand that the Criminal District Attorney's Office is a full time job which necessitates a full time devotion to it. To those citizens of Eastland County that I have not been able to see, I say to you "I am dedicated to keeping my proven record of experience and stability working for you." Your support and vote in the Democratic Primary will be gratefully appreciated.

The varsity averaged 59.3 points per game while allowing 60.25 points to opponents. Seven of the losses were by margins of 5 points or less.

Harvey Perkins led all scorers with 400 points on the year. Donald Dobby had 392 points, Angelo Williams 366, and Steve Summers had 254 to balance out the majority of scoring. Tris Parnell had 93, Roy Worley 57, Dusty Schaefer 46, Ken Roark 37, Billy Hammond 20, and Brian Callarman 4.

Top rebounders were Donald Dobby 278, Perkins 245, Schaefer 100, Williams 188, Parnell 136, Roark 34, Summers 77, Worley 32, Callarman 15, and Larry Thompson 3. The team pulled down a total of 1,113 rebounds, an improvement of 289 rebounds over last year.

Donald Dobby was top 2 point field goal shooter, and Angelo Williams was top 3 point field goal shooter. Tris Parnell had 36 of 55 free throws to lead that category.

Steve Summers had the most assists and passes leading to scores. Angelo Williams had most steals and recoveries. Making the fewest turnovers per game was Brian Callarman, and Billy Hammond had the fewest violations for the season.

Senior members of the team were Perkins, Schaefer, Williams, Hammond and Thompson. Returning lettermen next year will be Roark, Worley, Callarman, Parnell, Dobby and Summers.

Kelly Cozart led JV scorers with 175 points for the season. Other scorers were Jay Nixon 143, Robert Smith 135, Heath Parnell 106, Brent Shepard 80, Jimmy Williams 35, Jeremy Rhodes 14, Curtis Lacy 14, Mark Callarman 7, Keith Stowe 4, Trey Bilibrey 2, Terrence Fletcher 42.

Brent Shepard was leader in rebounds with 178 and 36 steals. Jay Nixon led in shooting with .565 percent, and Heath Parnell was leader in free throws with .705 percent. Nixon, Shepard, and Fletcher each had 13 assists to lead JV.

Coach Charles Parnell said he was pleased with this year's progress over last year's campaign. "The young men put forth much effort this year," he said. "I felt like we made

Dear Editor,
One of the rewards of being a teacher is the opportunity to share in the successes and accomplishments of former students. Cisco has produced more than its share of fine young men and women who have won acclaim in their various fields of activity. Recently, an unexpected long-distance telephone call renewed friendship with a former student, a Cisco lad who has achieved remarkable success and at the same time brought to reality a youthful dream that he shared with me in a classroom many years ago. I vividly recall how in those far-away days he would literally come alive with boyish enthusiasm at tales of adventure, particularly those which dealt with the great out-of-doors and animals - specifically horses. His fascination and insight into the wonders of Nature were quite unusual for a youth of his age.

Seven years ago, middle age found this woodsman with sufficient savings to launch a career that has not only been financially rewarding but has come as a fulfillment of boyish dreams and provided him the satisfaction and freedom that comes from working at what one best likes to do.

The year 1990 finds Tex Perdue and his wife Nancy busily engaged in breeding and training fine Arabian horses at their T&N Stables near Montague, California. Located on scenic acreage

along the California-Oregon border with Mt. Shasta hovering in the distance, their establishment is open to the public by appointment only. Visitors there see some of the finest Arabian breeding stock in the United States who compete with the best in the business (including Wayne Newton) and bring home their share of the championships.

How can one not be moved by recent global developments in which people throughout the world have literally put their lives on the line for the right to self-government?

Who can forget the gripping television footage of the lone Chinese student in Beijing confronting a tank sent to quell supporters of democracy?

From Eastern Europe to Latin America, thousands of brave people have shown their willingness to stand up and fight for democracy. This privilege was fought for by our fathers, our grandfathers and their fathers before them. We must not forget their sacrifices.

It is my hope that these sweeping worldwide political changes will inspire more Texans to vote on March 13 in the Democratic and Republican party primaries. The time has come for all of us to demonstrate by example how democracy works. We enjoy the fruits of democracy and we should share it with a world hungry for freedom. It is a simple task to cast an Election Day ballot.

Hundreds of important decisions at all levels of government will be made in the upcoming primaries, but, if recent trends continue, a disturbingly small number of Texans will make those decisions.

This year's primary election already is under way with

the Feb. 21 opening of the "extended" absentee voting period.

Those old excuses about being turned off by having to stand in long lines or taking time off from work on a weekday no longer are valid. From Feb. 21 until March 9, Texans, who are registered to vote, can appear at polling places across the state and cast absentee ballots - and they need no excuse to do so.

This "no-excuse" voting period, which the state Legislature approved in 1987, literally leaves Texans no excuse to stand on the sidelines and watch others decide who to nominate for governor and the many other statewide and local offices that will be filled in the Nov. 6 general election.

I am hopeful that the "extended" voting period combined with the aggressive, statewide voter registration/education campaign conducted by my office and the "get out the vote" efforts undertaken by the political parties and their candidates will make a difference in 1990.

If recent history repeats itself, however, less than 30 percent of the state's registered voters will turn out in the primary to nominate candidates for November. That's not a typographical error. In the two most recent gubernatorial election years, primary day turnout has not exceeded 26 percent.

In 1986 - the last time Texas

elects a governor - only 21 percent of those who were registered turned out at the polls in the Democratic and Republican party primary elections. In the gubernatorial election of 1982, a 26 percent turnout rate for both political parties was recorded.

If the trends continue, it won't get much better in the November general election. In 1986, the general election turnout rate was 47.2 percent, while a turnout rate of 49.7 percent was registered in 1982.

The plain and simple truth is these election statistics are embarrassing. We must reverse these trends.

To put the turnout rate for gubernatorial election years in perspective, 66 percent of registered Texas voters cast ballots in the November 1988 presidential election. In the 1984 presidential election years, a 68 percent turnout rate was recorded.

It should not matter for which office we are selecting a candidate or what issues we are deciding. We have a fundamental responsibility to participate in our democratic process by voting each time an election is held.

The deadline to register for the March 13 primary is passed, but with so many candidates vying for so many offices, runoffs in many of the races are all but assured. Runoffs will be held April 10 and you have until March 11 to register to vote in the runoff.

As Texas' chief elections officer, it is my responsibility to encourage you to exercise your constitutional right. It is up to you to participate. Your vote can make a difference.

Chunky Mexican Beef Soup Wins Texas Beef Cook-Off

A flavorful, nutritionally balanced beef soup that highlights Texan and Mexican influences was crowned champion of the 1990 Texas Beef Cook-off Feb. 17 at Houston.

Winning the \$3,000 first prize and an expense-paid trip to Seattle, Wash., Sept. 20-22 to compete for National Beef Cook-Off honors was Robin Bonifay, an amateur cook who works for a Dallas petroleum company. Bonifay's winning entry, which she calls "Chunky Mexican Beef Soup," is an original adaptation of *caldo*, a popular beef soup in Mexico.

"I grew up in Brownsville, Texas, and learned how to cook the native South Texas dishes," Bonifay said after claiming her prize. "It amazes me that the food we grew up on would, years later, become gourmet specialties. This particular recipe is one such dish. It's a basic, good, down-home soup. No frills."

The basis of the recipe is a home-made beef stock and chunks of chuck pot roast. Bonifay combines the stock and beef chunks with spices and half a dozen vegetables to create a one-dish meal that can be prepared in 20 minutes and takes 75 minutes to cook.

The champion recipe was praised by the cook-off's panel of judges for making good use of the chuck and for its flavor.

Bonifay said her adaptation of the *caldo* recipe took form about two or three years ago. Secrets to the recipe's success, she said, are the lean beef of the chuck pot roast, which she trims of any additional fat before cooking, and the home-made beef stock. Store bought beef stock can also be used, she said.

"The soup needs a very rich, flavorful stock to support the rest of the beef in the dish," Bonifay said. "Other than that the recipe makes good use of leftover veggies. You can substitute vegetables like turnips that you have in your refrigerator."

Two other contestants also captured top awards at the Cook-Off.

Doreen G. Howard of Garland won second place and \$2,000 for "Bangkok Beef Bundles." Her recipe calls for stir-frying marinated strips of top sirloin and then wrapping them in large Redleaf lettuce leaves. The bundles are served with a tangy dipping sauce.

Third place and \$1,000 went to Jean Connor of Palestine, Texas, for her "Off-The-Wall" Fillets with Borscht Salsa. Connor's dish, which was inspired by the tearing down of the Berlin Wall, is an innovative combination of beef tenderloin fillets with pickled beets as components of the Borscht Salsa and as garnish.

The Texas Beef Cook-Off was hosted by Texas Cattle-Women and kicked off the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the largest show of its kind. Overall, 10 finalists competed for the honor to represent Texas in the indoor competition at the National Beef Cook-Off in Seattle.



Gordon Spot

Does the following sound like you? It is borrowed from Dale Rollins' Extension Wildlife newsletter, "On the Wild Side". Dale is Extension Service Wildlife Specialist in San Angelo. As I read it, it reminded me of the way I sometimes do things. Did you hear about the fellow who noticed a screw coming out of the hinge on his front door. As he was going to the basement to get a screwdriver, he noticed a puddle of water in the kitchen, so he went to the closet to get a mop. Laying by the closet door was a cuff link. He

picked it up, put it in his pocket and started for the bedroom. In his pocket, he found a receipt he had been looking for, so he started to the study to put it away. Halfway down the hallway he noticed the hall clock had stopped, so he headed for the garage to get the ladder. In the garage he remembered to check the oil in his car; sure enough, it was low. He remembered the oil was in the storage building in the backyard. So...to the backyard he went where he noticed that the flowers needed watering, but the hose was in the front yard. He went around to the front yard to get the hose and saw some sort of flyer on the front door. It said they were having a big sale at the hardware store, so he went in the house to get the keys so he could go to the sale. As he opened the front door, he noticed a screw coming out of a hinge. He thought, "Now I wonder where my screwdriver is?" Dale says it is like a quail

hunter, who when aiming at the whole covey, hits nothing. He said it's better to pick one bird, stay on it and follow through and your bag will be the heavier for it. We could well use this same principle in doing all our daily jobs.

We get questions every year about the proper time to prune roses. Early March is the best time to prune roses in Eastland County. Hybrid Teas, Floribundas and Grandifloras are usually pruned heavily at this time (down to 18"-24" from the ground). Weak or dead canes should be removed or shortened to healthy tissue anytime during the year. Weak growth along with canes that cross and some general thinning can be accomplished at this time. Some rose growers prefer a less drastic approach to annual pruning. Shaping the plants and cutting back the vigorous canes one-fourth to one-third their length can result in more attractive plants, especially

for old shrub-type roses. Care should be taken to prune most climbers and one-time bloomers after they flower in the spring so as not to reduce their seasonal show.

Most old garden roses are attractive landscape plants with a pleasing natural form. This form should still be apparent after pruning. In addition to pruning in late winter, some rosarians cut plants back moderately in mid-August. This practice along with a light application of fertilizer can help promote fall flowering.

The Texas Horticulture industry is still in the process of determining the effects of record low temperatures that swept across the state in December. Plant losses have been extensive, with the citrus industry being hit the worst. Nursery and greenhouse producers estimate a loss of 10-20%, while vegetable producers lost approximately 30% of the planted acreage.

Many landscape plants were also severely damaged as the result of these cold temperatures. However, the extent of injury will probably not be totally evident until spring.

Since frozen plants look so bad, the practical thing to do is to prune back the obvious dead wood so the remaining landscape is a little more appealing. Once this is done research has shown that further pruning should be delayed until first spring flush has hardened off. At this time, cut back all limbs to healthy wood. This practice will result in the best plants in the shortest time.

Referendum & Election Of TPPA Approaching

The Texas Peanut Producers Board will hold its biennial election on May 1, 1990. The current terms of three of the nine board members will expire at that time. (Two from Dist. 1 and one from State at Large). Any person living within the following counties who is engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, peanuts for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote in his district, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers, if such person is subject to paying the assessment that is collected on peanuts within the following counties:

District No. 1 includes the following counties: Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche, Brown, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Llano, Lampasas, Mason, Gillespie, and Runnels.

State at Large include all the peanut producing counties in the State of Texas.

NOMINATION TO THE BALLOT:
Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board for a six year term from the district in which he farms by application to the above organiza-

tion, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such application must be received at least 30 days prior to the election date - May 1, 1990, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

PEANUT REFERENDUM TO SET ASSESSMENT

Texas peanut producers qualified to vote in the election may also vote on a proposition to set the refundable peanut assessment rate in an amount not to exceed \$2.00 per net ton of farmers stock peanuts. Such assessments to be collected at the point of first processing or sale on a "refund only" basis, and to be used for funding programs of research disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing and use of peanuts design to enhance producer income. All Texas counties are within the proposed referendum area.

The election and proposition vote will be held by physical balloting under provisions of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Chapter 41, Texas Agriculture Code. Balloting locations will be open from 7:00 a.m.

on May 1, 1990 and kept open until 7:00 p.m.

Balloting locations are at the following county extension offices: Atascosa Co., Jourdanton; Frio Co., Pershall; Wilson Co., Floresville; Lee Co., Giddings; Waller Co., Hempstead; Hill Co., Hillsboro; Erath Co., Stephenville; Parker Co., Weatherford; Houston Co., Crockett; Fannin Co., Bonham; Grayson Co., Sherman; Denton Co., Denton; Eastland Co., Eastland; Comanche Co., Comanche; Brown Co., Brownwood; San Saba Co., San Saba; Mason Co., Mason; Haskell Co., Haskell; Hall Co., Memphis; Gaines Co., Seminole; Bailey Co., Mulshoe.

Absentee ballots will be made available in the county agent's office of each peanut producing county two weeks prior to May 1. Any person qualified to vote may request an absentee ballot from the county agent's office in the county in which the peanuts are produced or from the Texas Peanut Producers Board, P. O. Box 398, Gorman, TX 76454, telephone no. 817-734-2853.

Absentee ballots must be postmarked no later than April 28, 1990 to be valid.

Mammography Unit To Be In Eastland

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services EASTLAND, TEXAS today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation was renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society

Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age

35 and 39. A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in EASTLAND, TEXAS on MONDAY, March 5. You may call 629-2601 for an appointment.

Q. If I found myself identifying with characteristics of co-dependency what does that mean?

A. A co-dependent relationship means that you over-identify with another person. It means that you under-identify with a healthy you. You are the reactor to a negative someone or situation. Co-dependency has been attributed to the most classic of all stacked decks, the alcoholic family. Just as alcoholism can lead to co-dependency, so can an abusive relationship. Abuse, alcoholism, and co-dependency are all related. All three cause pain. All three require denial. Relating how co-dependency and drinking interact to produce spouse abuse problems can be understood. But if you are in denial (that there is a problem), working through it can be complicated.

Here are some of the patterns:

- Using violence to avoid drinking or using alcohol to avoid violence
- The abuser drinks and then believes he has a license to abuse
- The woman drinks and then becomes a target for abuse
- Drinking may occur before, during or after violence (or before and during and after)
- (Although an alcoholic's drinking may conform to a predictable pattern, his violence may not. Many alcoholics drink in cycles, creating even greater uncertainty in the fact that he may not be violent every time he drinks.)
- The abuser who drinks seeks treatment for battering, but continues drinking
- The drinking abuser seeks treatment for alcoholism but continues to abuse.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

A Flipping Fool
Far too often in today's fast moving tackle industry anglers become flooded with too many new products and techniques. I don't mean to imply that any of these or bad, but it occurred to me that beginning

anglers might be missing out on some of the best ways of fishing.

Flipping, a term which has been in existence for many years is still probably one of today's most consistent methods of catching quality fish.

A very simple and effective method that can be used with only 7' to 10' of line and a can pole with no reel. However today's anglers do apply 7 1/2' telescoping poles of fiberglass or graphite coupled with a reel with either a "flipping mode" or a heavy duty drag system. Spool these with no less than 17 pound Trilene XT line and you are prepared to do battle. In our region of the state water color will normally allow you to go as heavy as 30 pound high visibility line.

Prior to heading out to the lake for a day of flipping a little exercise I have found very useful is to get out in the back yard or in the den and practice flipping. Take a one gallon bucket for beginners and a coke can for those wishing to brush up a little. Place the container a good 10 foot away at first and start flipping. Later on as you become proficient move your target further away. The key is not only accuracy but to land in the target as quietly as possible.

I guess I might have gotten the cart before the horse here a little. The process of flipping

is done by spooling out 7' to 10' of line, engage your reel, grasp the line between the reel and the first eye on the rod pulling the line to the side until the jig swings about waist high. Begin a slow drop of the rod tip moving forward and releasing the line in your left hand. To help insure a softer landing just as the lure touches the water surface slow the lines momentum slightly. There are many options to this procedure; leaving the reel in free spool for a straight descent, not touching the line with your left hand but using only the length of your rod to swing the bait out, (this is sometimes referred to as doodlesocking). The trick here as always is to find a method that is both comfortable to your and catches you some bragging size bass.

As always if I can be of any help in this or other matters please feel free to ask.

There are two basic lures used when flipping worms rigged weedless and jigs. Some other lures which I have found to be deadly with this style fishing are spinnerbaits, Rat-L-Traps, topwater, and live bait.

The Flipping technique has accounted for every fish I have caught which weighed over 6 pounds and probably for 70% of all the bass I have been fortunate enough to land over the past eleven years.

Easy to learn, easy to apply and best of all flipping produces more quality fish than perhaps any other method now available and best of all its back to the basics of "Fishing Outdoors".

Regulations To Curb Misleading Advertising Proposed

Individuals and organizations that misuse certain words, letters, emblems or symbols associated with Social Security or Medicare would face stiff monetary penalties, based on proposed regulations announced by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

Under the proposed rulemaking signed by HHS Secretary Louis W. Sullivan, M.D., misuse of the terms "Social Security," "Social Security Account," "Social Security Administration," "Social Security System," "Medicare" and "Health

Care Financing Administration" the letters "SSA" or "HCFA" or any combination or variation of such words or letters; as well as any symbols or emblems associated with the Social Security Administration or the Health Care Financing Administration would be a violation.

Misuse of the terms, symbols or emblems would occur when they are used directly in an advertisement, solicitation or other form of communication that gives a false or misleading impression that an item or service has been approved, endorsed or otherwise authorized by the Department of Health and Human Services, SSA or HCFA.

Under the proposed regulations, the Department's inspector general may impose civil money penalties or up to \$25,000 per violation for a misleading broadcast or telecast. Civil money penalties of up to \$5,000 per violation could be imposed for violations occurring in printed media. Total penalties for an individual or organization cannot exceed \$100,000 per year.

Penalty amounts under the proposed regulations would be based on:

- The nature of the solicitations and the degree to which the party attempted to mislead or deceive;

- The violation's frequency and scope;

- Any efforts made by the party to include a clear disclaimer;

- History of the party's willingness or failure to comply with informal requests to correct violations;

- Harm to the public; and

- Other matters required by justice.

In recent years, the Department has received numerous complaints regarding mail solicitations and advertising claims that made use of certain program terms, emblems, letters or agency symbols. These program terms, emblems, let-

ters and agency symbols were used in such a way as to mislead or falsely represent that the items being offered were approved, endorsed or authorized by the Department, the Social Security Administration or the Health Care Financing Administration. Congress has addressed these concerns by giving HHS new statutory authority through Public Law 100-600,

Section 428 (a) to impose civil money penalties for such violations.

TEXAS ACADEMIC SKILLS PROGRAM: ACCOUNTABILITY IN HIGHER EDUCATION

One of the most controversial and news-worthy educational issues of the 1980's was the passing of HB72 and particularly the "no pass, no play" rule. Interest groups went in arms to Austin to fight the rule causing political unrest throughout the capitol. While all of the news was being focused on HB72, another bill, HB 2182, passed through the legislature in 1987. This bill, while failing to be cited nightly on the news, will have and is having one of the biggest impacts on education in the past decade. Passage of the bill created the Texas Academic Skills Program, a program that will affect all students planning to enter a public institution of higher education.

The Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) was created by the legislature in an attempt to answer charges that students were graduating from college with inferior levels of reading, math, and English skills. The program is a comprehensive one that includes testing, advising, placement, and evaluation. The program is designed to ensure that all students attending public colleges and universities have the reading, writing, and math skills necessary to perform effectively in college-level courses. If a student demonstrates that he or she is deficient in any of the three basic skill areas, then the college must ensure that the student receives appropriate remediation. Thus, the program itself will net and cannot determine whether or not a student may be admitted into a college. However, the program will determine in which courses a student can enroll once at a particular college. The program is also designed to prohibit students from completing college when they fail to demonstrate mastery of the basic skills by a certain time.

The first component of the TASP program is the TASP test. Any full-time or part-time student in a public community college or university who did not earn at least three semester credit hours prior to fall 1989 must take the TASP test. This includes anyone who enrolls in a college-level degree program, anyone who enters a certificate program that contains nine or more hours of general education courses, and anyone who transfers from outside Texas or from a private college if such person did not earn three hours prior to fall of 1989. Additionally, any student planning to enroll in a teacher education program must take the test prior to being admitted into teacher education classes.

The biggest misunderstanding about the test involves the time frame in which the student must take the test. The law states that students must take the test prior to accumulating nine or more college level semester hours. For a full-time student this time will usually fall during the first semester of college. If a college or university chooses to give its freshmen a placement test upon entry to the college, its students must take the TASP test prior to the end of the semester in which they accumulate fifteen or more college-level credit hours. Most junior colleges fall into the second category. Students failing to take the TASP test at the appropriate time will be denied enrollment at any Texas public institution of higher learning until the test has been taken. High school students are allowed to take the test once

they have passed the Exit-Level TEAMS test and have been admitted to a Texas public community college or university. The advantage of taking the test while still in high school is that the student might be allowed the opportunity to retake the test before enrolling in college if he or she fails to master all sections.

Another component involving the TASP test is the remediation component. Any student who does not pass all three sections of the test must continuously participate in a remediation program. Courses designated as remedial are designed to help students obtain skills that should have been obtained while still in high school. Since the work in these courses is considered to be pre-collegiate, the courses will not count for credit towards any type of a degree. Even though these courses do not count for credit, they can prove to be invaluable in giving students the skills necessary to be successful throughout their college career.

The TASP program also mandates that public institutions be actively involved in advising and in evaluating the effectiveness of remedial programs. The program also mandates that public school districts receive scores of their graduates in order to evaluate the effectiveness of the curriculum within the district in preparing students for college. The state of New Jersey has had a similar program in place for several years. As a result of the testing scores received by college students, public schools in New Jersey have made changes in the curriculum guidelines in the high schools, junior high schools, and elementary schools.

Thus, the Texas Academic Skills Program has the potential of affecting curriculum changes not only at the college level but also in grades K-12. Students planning to enroll in college in the near future will need to be concerned with gathering information from prospective colleges about the institutional policies regarding TASP. Although the program has been criticized by some as being inconclusive and complicated, the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board have taken the position that TASP is here to stay and will serve the purpose of giving students in Texas an education that will allow them to compete in today's highly competitive world. Only time and statistics will really tell!

'Steel Magnolias' To Be CJC Spring Production; Cast Named



Lady Wranglers Win Final Home Game Of Season



IN REMEMBRANCE



EASTLAND COUNTY'S FAMOUS FROG
 1897 --- 1929

Ninty three years ago last Wednesday, Old Rip was put into the cornerstone of the old courthouse. In 1929, he emerged live and well and spent several years publicizing Eastland County, before his untimely death.

In the 62 years since, he has done a pretty good job of spreading his own and Eastland County's name far and wide.

He was saluted Wednesday, Feb. 28th, the anniversary date of his original unentombment by a small, but dedicated crowd of well-wishers in the lobby of the county courthouse where he remains in state for all to see.

County Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners Court was on hand as were three men who had close ties to the original event, and Chamber Manager James Wright and Co/C Retail Trades Committee Chairperson Ann Folsom who placed a descriptive text alongside the tomb so that all viewers will know the true and complete story of Old Rip.

Mr. Felton Moser described the excitement in '29 when he was a 15-year-old on-looker when the old Court-

house was torn down and the frog taken out of the cornerstone. Mr. Moser received an Old Rip pin as being the oldest citizen present at the Wednesday event.

Mr. Lynn Hammett told that his older brother, who was the first motorcycle high-way patrolman in this county, was given the frog by the county judge after the unentombment, and that it stayed guarded at their house for several days before it began its national journeys.

"Old Rip is not a 'legend,'" he said, "he is the original frog that was put in the cornerstone in 1897 and taken out alive in 1929," Mr. Hammett avowed.

Mr. Joe Gray, another original witness, spoke briefly and clinched the argument that another live frog could have been substituted because the frogs are hibernating creatures and would not be out in February.

All were given commemorative cards of the occasion, a reproduction of which adjoins this article.
