Local School Now In 8AA

The UIL has renumbered the districts in class AA, placing the local district in Region I. Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, De Leon, Bangs, Coleman, Goldthwaite, and San Saba will now be District 8AA rather than 13AA in Region II.

Reportedly a computer error placed the district to our north in 4AA rather than the desired 9AA, and that has been corrected.

While district teams remained the same, the new numbers changed up the play-off format, making it more like last year. The local district was 8AA last year in football, and this year it is expected to be 8AA in all sports.

Judge Bailey's work experience includes farm and ranch work, oil field labor, oil field supply store position with "Oil Well Supply" division of U. S. Steel Corp., High School Teacher and part-time Jr. College Instructor. 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Secretary Of State George Bayoud Says One Vote Can Make A Difference

Citing the one-vote margin that led to Texas being admitted to the Union 145 years ago, Secretary of State George Bayoud reminded voters about the importance of participating in the March 13 primary elections.

"The historical events of 1845 are a classic example of how a single vote really can make a difference," said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer.

The secretary of state's office has used newspaper

accounts of Texas' annexation in its VOTE '90 campaign. VOTE '90, which is aimed at registering new voters and encouraging turnout, includes public service announcements that highlight the outcome of that close 1845 vote. The campaign slogan is "Every One Matters."

"Some people think one vote doesn't matter. Fortunately, someone didn't feel that way in 1845," the head-

line of a VOTE '90 public service announcement reads.

"One vote made Texas the 28th state of the Union. Remember that the next time you think your one vote can't make a difference," the public service announcement concludes.

Austin Bray, an attorney in the secretary of state's elections division, researched the events leading to the admission of Texas to the Union in 1845 and found that a single vote on not one, but two occasions, played a significant role in Texas history.

While conducting his research, Bray found that in February 1845, resolutions favoring the annexation of Texas passed the U. S. Senate by a 27-25 margin and the U. S. House of Representatives by a vote 134-77. Those votes paved the way for President John Tyler to approve the resolution on March 1, 1845.

The critical vote was the 27-25 margin in the Senate where one less vote might have changed the course of Texas history. A 26-26 vote in the Senate would have been tantamount to defeat of the resolution because at the time the United States had no vice president to cast a tie-breaking vote.

During his research, Bray found that one of the senators who voted with the majority on the Texas annexation is-

sue - Edward Hennegan of Indiana - had himself experienced a close electoral call. In January 1843, the Indiana State Legislature, by a one vote margin, elected Hennegan to the U. S. Senate.

"This is pure conjecture, but who knows what impact Sen. Hennegan's own election to the Senate had on his decision to vote for admitting Texas to the Union," Bayoud said. "If nothing else, this look back at Texas history does indeed prove that one vote can and does make a difference."

On Tuesday, March 13, Texans will head to the polls to nominate candidates for the U. S. Senate, governor, lieutenant governor and many other statewide and local offices.

"Literally, hundreds of important decisions on representation at all levels of government will be made in the upcoming election, said Bayoud. "It is vitally important that all Texans who are registered to vote participate in the electoral process."

Sales Policy Announced For 1990 Crop Peanuts

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the national average support level for 1990 crop peanuts will be \$631.47 per short ton, compared with \$615.87 for the 1989 crop.

The following provisions were also announced:

—The national average support level for additional peanuts will be \$149.75 per short ton, unchanged from the 1989 crop.

—1990 crop additional peanuts owned or controlled by USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will be sold for export edible use at no less than \$400 per ton, unchanged from the 1989 crop.

CCC outlays for 1990 crop year peanut loans to producer associations will be subject to a reduction of 1.4 percent under the deficit reduction sequester order.

The Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended, requires that the national average support level for the 1990 crop of quota peanuts reflect any increase in the national aver-

age cost of peanut production for the preceding year, excluding any change in the cost of land. This statute also provides that the quota support rate for the crop may not exceed the support rate for the preceding crop by more than 6 percent.

The national average support level for 1990 crop quota peanuts was increased from the 1989 level of \$615.87 per short ton based on data which indicated that the cost of producing 1989 crop peanuts was greater than the cost of producing 1988 crop peanuts.

The price support level for additional peanuts must be set at a level which ensures no loss to CCC from sales or disposal of the peanuts. In determining this level, USDA must consider the demand for peanut oil and peanut meal, the expected prices for other vegetable oils and protein meals and the demand for peanuts in foreign markets. The price support levels are subject to quality and other adjustments.

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

The rains have been generous the last 30 days and a beautiful green spring appears to be just ahead. Maybe this will be the year that we will not have that late fruit-killing freeze. If you want disease free, worm free fruit, now is the time to begin your spray schedule. Peach, plum, and apricot trees should be sprayed when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide and a fungicide to control diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab and insects such as worms and sucking insects. Recommended fungicides include Benomyl, Chlorothalonil (Bravo or Daconil), Captan, Sulphur or Thiophanatemethyl.

The number one insect of fruit is the plum curculio which attacks plums, peaches, and apricots. This is the little white worms we find in the fruit. Other insects that cause damage are catfacing insects such as thrip, stink bugs, and lygus bugs. Recommended insecticides are Malathion, Sevin, Diazinon and Thiodan. Zolone is still recommended if you have some left from last year, but it's not longer being made. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticides and fungicides

premixed.

Start the first spray when 75% of the petals have fallen and repeat at 10 to 14 day intervals. It will be necessary to apply as many as 5 or 6 applications except on early maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches. Be sure to read and follow directions on the labels.

We have homeowners fruit and nut spray guides as well as spray guides for commercial growers in the Extension Office which gives more complete information on fruit tree spraying.

Soil temperature is the best guide as to the time to plant various vegetables. The soil temperature should be taken about 8:00 a.m. and a depth seed are to be planted.

The realistic or best soil temperature at which carrots, parsley, lettuce, radishes, and spinach should be planted is 45 degrees F. Other vegetables and their realistic soil temperatures are: beets (45), turnips (50), cabbage and chard (54), tomatoes (55), pepper (64), corn (70), beans and watermelons (72) and eggplant (75).

No-surgery technique to dissolve gallstones has been reported from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. Methyl tert-butyl ether (similar to a gasoline additive) can dissolve some stones within 24 hours.

Preliminary research indicates a relationship between depression and thyroid malfunction, according to a report to the American Psychiatric Association. New research may discover which comes first.

Melanoma can be totally cured if it's caught early enough, say doctors at the University of Pennsylvania.

Tubal pregnancies can be removed more easily via laparoscopy than by abdominal surgery, says a University of Southern California gynecologist. Tiny lighted tube is inserted through a small incision in the navel. Microsurgical instruments are guided through a second incision.

Researchers in Finland reported a direct relationship between smoking cigarettes and clogging of carotid arteries. Test subjects were pairs of twins, one a smoker and one not, for direct comparison.

FINANCIAL AID FOR HIGHER EDUCATION:

For families who will have children advancing their education this fall, it is time to be completing financial aid forms. With tuition costs rising every year, it pays to learn about programs that can help students pay for college, vocational, or technical education.

The U. S. Department of Education has published The Student Guide, 1989-90, which explains grant, loan and work-study programs for college, vocational, and technical school students. The guide gives information about how to apply for the financial assistance programs.

Federal financial aid falls into three categories: loans, grants, and work-study. Loans are borrowed money you must pay back with interest. You are given a grace period after you finish school before you have to start repaying the loan. Grants are awards that you don't have to pay back, and work-study is a program where you work to earn money to help pay for school. Eligibility for these programs depends primarily on your need.

The Student Guide will give information about eligibility criteria, deadlines and procedures for applying for federal student aid. To order The Student Guide, 1989-90 (item 516V), send you name, address and the item number to: S. James, Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

BABY FOOD SAFETY: Question: Should baby food meats be heated in the microwave oven? Some of the labels on meat products say "microwavable" and others say "do not heat in the microwave."

ANSWER: Experts recommend that baby food meats NOT be heated in microwave ovens.

Meat products usually require shorter heating times than other baby foods and can easily overheat in a microwave oven. The meat can get too hot and splatter from the container. It is best to heat baby food meats in an electric feeding dish or in a simmering pan of water inside a heat-resistant glass dish. The key to safely heating other baby foods in microwave ovens, is to remove contents from the jar and place in a microwave-safe bowl. Then, heat the food for only several seconds on medium (50%) power. Be sure to stir the food and test the temperature by tasting before feeding baby.

Remember, all baby foods can be served at room temperature.

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

Avoiding SSI Overpayments

If you receive supplemental security income (SSI) checks, you should tell Social Security whenever there's a change in your resources, income, or living arrangements. That way, we can be sure you receive the right amount in your check every month, and you can avoid the hardship caused by paying back overpayments. Too often, SSI recipients fail to inform us about a change that should be reported and end up being overpaid. Since the law requires the Social Security Administration to recover the overpayment, the money is usually withheld from future checks, resulting in a tremendous hardship for many recipients. Examples of changes that commonly result in overpayments when not reported are listed below. If you get SSI checks, you may be able to avoid being overpaid by promptly reporting these changes.

- an increase in income--both earned and unearned
 - if you get help with your living expenses
 - if you enter an institution
 - if you plan to leave the United States
 - if you move or someone moves into or out of your home
 - if someone who lives with you dies
 - if you or someone who lives with you has a baby or gets married, widowed, divorced, or separated
 - an improvement in your health, if you're getting checks because you are disabled or blind.
- It's easy to report a change--just call any Social Security office. You can find the number in the phone book under "Social Security Administration" or "U.S. Government." You should

report the change within 10 days after the month it happens. But remember, the sooner you report the change, the sooner Social Security can adjust your check. Avoid overpayments--report changes right away.

Letter to the Editor

Editor,

Have you ever considered why sports are a part of our educational process? Sports can teach leadership, responsibility, self-control, and most of all integrity.

A great tragedy occurred in Eastland last Saturday night. My apologies and sympathies to the children for things getting so out of hand. I'm thoroughly disillusioned with sports in Eastland, TX. Being raised in a 4A school and being involved with sports through participating and coaching for some 17 years now, I've never had to face such a problem.

"Little Dribblers" was instituted as a program to develop the "basic" skills of our young people, to spark interest in sports - giving every kid who desires a fair chance to participate no matter what their skills. A straggly, uncoordinated child of today could be the high school star if given a chance now and his interest is kept. In this day and age of video games, television, and computers, it's most important to get our kids to stay active. This program is also aimed at teaching good sportsmanship: how teams work together, support for others when a job is well done, being a good loser as well as a good winner. This is what I understood Eastland Youth Basketball to represent when I undertook the role of president; and this is what I expected the coaches to teach and instill in these young people.

There's a great need for players and coaches to improve their behavior on the court. Our behavior influences others. A quote from

the National Federation of Basketball Rules Committee states, "...it is important to understand that at times, a participant in a game, just like in life, may be wronged or an error may be made. It's under these circumstances where the true tests of sportsmanship happens." Competitiveness is

great; that gives us the drive to do our best. But when our greed to win is everything, everything else we strived to achieve with this program is lost. I've watched these kids for some three months now. Most are interested mainly in having a good time and learning basketball. We, as adults, their role models, have been a big disappointment to them. Saturday night was the greatest show of unsportsman-like conduct there could be.

Our program has been hurt and it could have been our best year ever. We registered some 148 third thru six graders this year. We've lost three very good referees. "Good" in the sense that they all enjoyed working with the kids and even though they were somewhat compensated, the kids were their main incentive to referee 12 hours every Saturday for three months. We also lost some valuable coaches through the lack of coach support and the lack of "volunteer" support. The league had 22 coaches this year and 22 assistant coaches who gave up time every Saturday and at least an hour every weekday for your children.

As parents, we definitely need to reevaluate the attitudes and goals we want to instill in our children, and the goals we want to achieve for Eastland Youth Basketball. There is a trend of deterioration in acceptable conduct of participants on all levels in all sports; but, I have faith that with great support and effort, this trend can be reversed,

and respect restored for this league, as well as other sports in our community.

Polls Open At 14 Locations In County Tues.

Polls will be open at 14 locations in Eastland County Tuesday for the Early Spring Party Primaries.

Democrats will be voting at nine sites and Republicans at five locations.

Absentee voting ended Friday afternoon, and polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to select the nominees for the fall General Election.

A number of primary run-offs are anticipated.

Democrats will be voting in Eastland, Olden, Ranger, Desdemona, Carbon, Gorman, Rising Star, Cisco and Lake Leon.

Republicans will be voting at Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

Approximately 11,000 are registered and qualified to vote, and each will first have to select a party, and both provide a wide assortment of choices from United States Senate to precinct chairman.

The Democratic ballot also offers three non-binding referendum choices for voters. Contested races abound locally, in the county, the district and state wide.

Attracting the most county-wide attention would probably be these races: district clerk, sought by four; county judge, sought by two; and district attorney, sought by three.

Statewide, seven Democrats and three Republicans seek the Commissioner of Agriculture spot.

Seven Republicans and seven Democrats race for governor. Apparent front-runners for the Democrats are Mark White, Ann Richards and Jim Mattox.

Leading for the Republicans are Clayton Williams, Kent Hance and Jack Rains.
