Citizens of Cisco are being called upon to give a pint of blood to help insure that in an emergency the life-giving fluid will be available for those who are ill or injured.

The annual blood drive at E.L. Graham Hospital is scheduled for 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. June 6, 1990 at the hospital, announced Janelle Schrader, president of the hospital's auxiliary. She encouraged all those who are able, to give blood.

Mr. Beck, Graham hospital lab director, said the blood donated during the drive is like a bank account for Cisco. Blood is credited to an organizational fund for the city to help insure that it will be available when needed. The more that is donated, the more is credited to the city's "account" she said.

As long as the blood used here does not exceed the amount in the account, a handling charge for the blood is about all that is charged. If more blood is used, the more the cost to the hospital and ultimately, to the patient, increases, Mr. Beck said.

Technicians from the Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center will draw blood at the local drive. The whole procedure will take no more than 30 minutes, including the time it takes to fill out paperwork, Mr. Beck said.

Auxiliary members will provide fruit juice and other refreshments, Mrs. Schrader

Those who desire to give blood must meet the following criteria, said Mr. Beck.

1. Donors must be 18 years or older. Those ages 66 to 75 years must have written permission form their doctor on a yearly basis. Those 75 and older must have written permission each time they give.

2. Donors may eat before giving blood and in fact, are encouraged to do so.

3. Donors must not have taken antibiotics for two days previous to giving blood.

4. Donors must show no sign of colds, flu or other similar illnesses.







Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

MAYNARD AND WILSON WIN

AT BROWNWOOD An almost Fairy Tale win came to Bobby Maynard and myself at this past weekends Anglers Choice Team Tournament at Lake Brownwood. This win was probably one of sweetest tournaments for us this year. Two frontal passages recent heavy floods, and an overnight one and half foot rise at Lake Brownwood had Anglers baffled. What to do with these conditions couples with 95 degree weather. Prior to the Sunday tournament local anglers were predicting eight pounds of fish could easily be the top string.

Thirty teams headed out at 6:30 a.m. to attempt to find the piece of the missing puzzle, weighers. The first three hours of fishing were expected to be the time to catch the fish and most anglers did their catching early. Top water, spinners, and jigs or craw worms were the preferred early baits.

A hot and humid day beat

the anglers with little or no wind till the 3:15 cutoff for weigh-in. The final results with the top five finishers were: Bobby Maynard and Terry Wilson five fish 15.92; 2nd Ben Villapando and Luupe Cisneroz three fish 11.55; 3rd McJimsey and Sullivan four fish 9.12; 4th James Fullen and Tom Maynard four fish 8.59 and 5th Robert Brown and Herschal Duncan two fish 7.50. Big bass was won by Bobby Maynard with huge 7.76 lunker. And folkks she was a skinny fish. Had this bass been in normal shape she could have easily weighed 8 1/2 or 9 pounds. Second place big

Also from our area the team of Bob Moore and Chuck Burgess came in with one fish 2.62 pounds for 14th place. Giving Eastland County four teams in the top 30 of a very tough field of 63 teams. Way to go guys let's all keep up the good work and make it to the classic in October at Falcon Reservoir. The team of James Fullen and Tom Maynard make a big leap with this event from 46th all the way up to

away from the classic spot of 15th.

'The Big Boo Boo' could and I feel probably will be what the new 10 inch minimum length for crappie in all Texas lakes will be remembered as. Effective September 1, 1990, all crappie must measure 10 inches or larger to be retained. Avid crappie anglers from across the state meet with Parks and Wildlife Department officials in an attempt to head this move off, but to no avail.

The primary argument the T.P. & W. gave was to allow crappie to reach spawning size, which according to officials is normally around 10 inches. As most of your crappie hounds have seen crappie in the 5 to 7 inch range will normally poses eggs. If the rapid reproduction of the crappie could be slowed other than harvesting smaller fish a 10 inch limit would be nice. But these fish if left to spawn till 10 inches or longer I fear will eventually over populate our lakes with stunted fish.

One example I can use is Lake Leon, during a past drought anglers harvested a lot of very small crappie 5 to 8 inches during the spring. That fall and winter and all next year Leon experienced some of the best quality crappie fishing in the state. A one pound crappie was average in the annual river runs. Anglers became selective about the size of fish they would keep, not removing any small fish and now we are back to a lake

full of runts or wonder fish. A wonder fish is one that it's a wonder he wasn't big enough

Hopefully myself along with a lot of Texas anglers are wrong and this program will be a big boost. With a track record as good as the T.P. &W. has they must be doing something right. The past 10 years Texas has been brought to the front of the pack in wildlife resources and its thanks to our Parks and Wild-

life Department's fine work. Till next week remember its National Fishing Week, let's all introduce a friend to the Outdoors especially 'Fishing Outdoors.'





Limit Extension Cords To Reduce Risk of Fire

it you use a lot of extension cords in your home or apartment, government safety experts say doing away with as many cords as possible can improve the safety of your

Noting that May is National Electrical Safety Month, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) said homeowners can use fewer extension cords by taking the simple step of relocating floor lamps, clocks, radios, television sets and other electrical products

closer to wall receptacles. According to CPSC estimates, there are some 4,600 residential home fires each year associated with extension cords; these fires kill 70 persons and injure some 230 others annually. Apart form fires, another 2,200 shockrelated injuries happen with extension cords every year. CPSC offered the follow-

ing safety hints for using extension cords:

- Don't use an extension

Always use 3-wire extension cords for appliances with 3-prong plugs. Never remove the third prong which is a safety feature designed to reduce chances of shock or electrocution.

- When disconnecting cords from outlets, always pull on the plug rather than the cord itself. Discard any old, cracked, worn or damaged extension cords

- Don't overload cords by plugging in appliances that draw more watts than the rating of the cord. You can check this easily by examining the cord to see what its wattage rating is. Use heavyduty cords for high wattage appliances. Use extension cords labeled for Outdoor use when powering tools and garden products outside the home. Also, it is good practice to plug into an outlet protected by a ground-fault circuit interrupter (GFCI). the device shuts down power in milliseconds if the consumer is exposed to an electrocution or electrical burn hazard.

- Don't run cords under carpets or rugs since they prevent heat from being released by the cord.
